Split decision forces Board President to break tie ... LCHD Board votes to move forward with Lamesa Clinic project

ynn County Hospital District Board of Trustees voted 3-2 last Thursday night in favor of a motion made by Della Swartz to move forward with the Lamesa Clinic project by authorizing Interim CEO Steve Brock to sign a lease for a building in Lamesa at a cost of no more than \$25,000 per month for a three-year period.

Huffaker then put forth a motion to decline to move forward and remove from the agenda the Lamesa clinicproposal, which was seconded by Raindl. 
Brick by brick ... THS athletes invested in our community

Ag values increase for 2018 appraisals

Property owners in Lynn County should soon receive notices of appraised value, and while owners of irrigated agricultural land will generally see an increase of 10.3% in ag values, the dryland values have actually doubled, increasing 103%, according to information this week from Lynn County Appraisal District. Residential values for most of Lynn County will see some increases, partly due to removing factors on certain class schedules, based on overall sales.

(PAID) LCAD mailed appraisal notices on Wednesday, May 2 to all property owners in the county. The notice is not a tax bill, but an estimate of taxes based on current tax rates, Chief Appraiser Marquita Scott said. The actual tax statements will be mailed after the taxing units set their tax rates later this year.

Scott said that the biggest change this year was in dryland ag values, which have doubled due to several key factors. Ag values are based on a 5-year average, which are two years behind the current year. For 2018 appraisals, the crops from 2012-13-14-15-16 years are factored in. This 5-year formula dropped off a bad crop year and has, for the last two consecutive years, picked up higher net-toland years. Also, in the 2017 appraisals the 2015 dryland crop was incorrectly factored with a two-thirds planting, and a study showed that dryland crops planted solid in 2015, which means that the dryland value per acre for 2017 was too low, and had to be adjusted for the 2018 appraisal. Cotton lint prices went from 57 to 66.7 cents per pound, which is a 17% increase, and the cotton seed price went down from \$210 to \$190 per ton, according to figures from LCAD.

Native pasture land values have decreased, from \$30 to \$23 per acre in the highest classification, Scott noted.

Lower classifications of residences increased, based on sales in the county and adjustments for state cost schedules.

"Depending on which classification your residence is classified, you may see an increase in appraisal value whether or not you actually made any improvements to your property," she said.

The residential land cost table for the county showed an increase, particularly in the New Home School District area, for land sold for property development into residential lots. There were 19 new residential homes added to the 2018 appraisal year in the New Home ISD area. LynnCoNews@poka.com

and owners should review all notices received," said Scott. "Under state law, appraisal districts are required to notify property owners about changes in their property's value."

To provide owners the opportunity to review ownership, property locations, exemptions and agricultural use, Lynn County Appraisal District mails a notice for all property, she said. The notice includes instructions on how and when to file a protest, a protest form and the state comptroller's "Property Taxpayer Remedies." The deadline for filing a protest is June 1.



The appraisal district staff will assist property owners with their questions, and are available for an informal hearing prior to the Appraisal Review Board hearing. Property owners who disagree with the appraised value of their property, the exemptions or any other action by the appraisal district, have the right to appeal to the Appraisal Review Board. The board is an independent panel of residents responsible for hearing and settling property owner protests.

Scott encourages people protesting appraisals to meet with the appraisers in preparation for their hearing, for a review of the property and an explanation as to how the value was determined.



Groundwater levels show decrease in **HPWD** area

An average change of -0.16 of a foot was noted in the groundwater levels of the Ogallala/ Edwards-Trinity (High Plains) Aquifer from 2017 to 2018 within the 16-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) service area.

The 10-year District average change (2008-2018) is -8.76 feet while the five-year district average change (2013-2018) is -2.07 feet. The average saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer within the District is about 56

HPWD staff shared this information with the District's five-member Board of Directors during their April 10 regular monthly meeting.

In early 2018, HPWD field personnel made annual water level measurements in a network of 1,353 privately-owned water wells completed into the Ogallala/Edwards-Trinity (High Plains) Aquifers. In addition, water level measurements were also made in 33 Dockum Aquifer wells.

Since the 2017 measurements, there are nine counties with an average increase in water levels and seven counties with an average decrease.

In Lynn County, 95 observation wells showed an average decrease of -0.48 of a foot, and an average saturated thickness of 49 feet.

Field Technician Supervisor Keith Whitworth shared statistics for the 1,250 observation wells with publishable measurements. He noted that about 40 percent of the observation wells measured in 2018 had water level increases.

• 545 observation wells with increases ranging from 0.1 to 12.73 feet.

• 462 observation wells with decreases ranging from 0 to -.99 of a foot.

• 142 observation wells with decreases ranging from -1 to -1.99 feet.

• 63 observation wells with decreases ranging from -2 to -2.99 feet.

• 20 observation wells with decreases ranging from -3 to -3.99 feet

• 13 observation wells with decreases ranging from -4 to -4.99 feet

• 5 observation wells with decreases ranging from -5 to -6.96 feet.

"Each year, there are wells that show water level rises and others that show water level decreases. The largest water level rise was 12.73 feet in a Lubbock County well while the largest water level decline was -6.96 feet in a Castro County well," said Whitworth.



Vehicle hits deer on FM 400

A Tahoka woman's vehicle struck a deer on FM 400 early Sunday morning, and officers responded to what was described by the caller as a child abduction last Thursday, but ended up with no official action taken after no custody paperwork could be provided in the case.

Kimmie Jones was the driver of a vehicle that struck a deer at 6:40 a.m. Sunday on FM 400 just north of Tahoka near the city landfill. She refused treatment by EMS, and no injuries were reported.

Lynn County Sheriff's Deputies, DPS troopers from Dawson County, and the O'Donnell Police Chief all responded to a call at 4:46 p.m. last Thursday, when a woman caller from Dawson County told officers that her child's father had

picked up the child from school, which she described as "child abduction and endangerment." According to the Sheriff's log call-sheet, law authorities ended up at a residence in O'Donnell where the man had taken the child, but no official action was taken since no official child custody paperwork was produced in the case

Deputies responded to several domestic dispute calls during the week, including one at 11:15 p.m. last Thursday at a rural residence on County Road BB, when a woman caller said a man was threatening her boyfriend with a gun. No shots were reported fired, and the man had left the scene before officers arrived.

Officers responded to a domestic disturbance at a Wilson residence at 4:48 p.m. Sunday, for a verbal dispute between

a man and a woman. The man had left the scene before officers arrived, but officers were called back to the scene for a second disturbance five hours later. This time, the man was still on the scene, and he was arrested on a warrant out of Hale County. Another verbal domestic dispute between a man and a woman in Wilson at 7:15 p.m. on Sunday had no arrests, with the male leaving the scene before officers arrived.

Lynn County Jail held 38 inmates during the past week, including 16 for Lynn County, 19 for Ector, 2 for Crosby, and 1 for Dawson County. Local charges included one for Driving While Intoxicated, one for Public Intoxication, and two for Possession of Marijuana.


Through a generous grant from Texas Farm Bureau, Wilson High science and AG students are experiencing the nature of aquaponics. It starts with fish in a pond, with controlled nitrates and ammonia, which then waters plants that do not require soil to grow.

The students each wrote about how they 'have personally benefitted from the program. Some snippets: "I didn't know that plants could be so fun." "I've learned how to keep my plants alive and care for something besides myself." "Aquaponics has really improved our Agriculture class." "We hope to buy all the sensors and equipment that's necessary to monitor the wellbeing of our plants and fish ... " " I have learned how to test water for pH levels, nitrate and ammonia... how to make and formulate plans for big projects ... "

In the big picture, real life experiences, such as this, allow students to develop skills across the curriculum, as well as critical thinking abilities.

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Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

Property owners have the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- · the appraised (market) value of your property
- · the unequal value of your property compared with other properties
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- · any exemptions that may apply to you
- · the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxing units taxing your property
- · the property ownership
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal failure of the chief appraiser or appraisal review board (ARB)
- to send a required notice any action taken by the chief appraiser, county appraisal dis-

telephone conference call, you must provide your evidence to the ARB with a written affidavit before the ARB hearing begins. You may use Comptroller Form 50-283, Property Owner's Affidavit of Evidence to the Appraisal Review Board, to submit evidence for your telephone conference call hearing or for hearing by affidavit.

You and the CAD representative have the opportunity to present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented by both parties. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

In certain protests, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You should



trict (CAD) or ARB that applies to and adversely affects you.

Informal Review

You may call (806) 561-5477 to discuss your protest with a Lynn County Appraisal District employee and try to come to a settlement without meeting with the ARB.

Review by the ARB

If you cannot resolve your problem informally with the CAD, you file a notice of protest requesting to have your case heard by the ARB.

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that hears and determines protests regarding property appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes based on evidence heard during the ARB hearing.

If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing and send you written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. You may use Comptroller Form 50-132, Property Appraisal - Notice of Protest, to file your written request for an ARB hearing.

Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. Before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD are required to provide each other with a copy of any materials (evidence) intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. Evidence may be submitted for any hearing type either in paper or on a small portable electronic device (such as a CD, USB flash drive or thumb drive) which will be kept by the ARB. Do NOT bring evidence on a smart phone. The ARB's hearing procedures regarding all the requirements to properly submit evidence on a small portable electronic device must be reviewed.

To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person or you may by telephone conference call or submission of written affidavit to present review ARB hearing procedures to learn more about evidence and related matters.

You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. ARB members are required to sign an affidavit saying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court, an Arbitrator or SOAH

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the ARB's decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. As an alternative to district court, you may appeal through binding arbitration or the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) if you meet the qualifying criteria.

If you choose to go to district court, you must start the process by filing a petition with the district court within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If you chose to appeal through binding arbitration, you must file a request for binding arbitration with the CAD not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order. If you chose to appeal to the SOAH, you must file an appeal with the CAD not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order. Appeals to district court, binding arbitration or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

Tax Payment

You must pay the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute, the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken or the amount of taxes due in the previous year.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

USUAL DEADLINE

Not later than May 15 (or within 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later)

Late protests are allowed for good cause if you miss the usual deadline. The ARB decides whether you have good cause. Late protests are not allowed after the ARB approves the appraisal records for the year.

SPECIAL DEADLINES

For change of use (the CAD informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was delivered to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change did not result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the change was delivered to you.

If you believe the CAD or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or legal, state or national holiday.
