





**Mexican Shot and Wounded** As the aftermath of a shooting affray in this city last Friday morning, Robert Long, about 45, well-known farmer and farm construction worker faces a complaint charging assault and attempt to murder, and Roy Medina,

a 27-year-old Mexican farm is recovering from a worker, gunshot wound which necessitated amputation of his left hand at the wrist. Surgery was performed at the Haskell hospital, where Medina was taken after the shooting, and the Mexican was discharged from the hospital the first of the week.


The shooting occurred at the intersection of Ave. C and North lst Street in the vicinity of the City Hall, and was witnessed by a large crowd of spectators who had gathered to watch firemen battle a blaze in a building across new faceas in educational booths the street from the municipal building.

Undulant fever or Malta fever a disease contracted from cattle goats or sheep which are infected with contagious abortion, is beng reported sporadically throughut Texas and the nation, accord-

ng to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. This indicates halta fever to be a public health oblem and the attendant need more general recognition by he public to the disease.

Undulant fever is so called be ause of the wave-like variations temperature. The symptoms inude rise in temperature, 105 weight and strength, chills ad joint pains. The disease has rather low mortality rate, but portant because symptoms may ersist for a number of weeks id even months before norma alth and strength are restored In Texas, the goat, horse and

ows are the usual spreader o his disease. The germs of undulant fever enter the body through the mouth or skin. Therefore care should be used in handling nimals known to be infected and






Farm tractor operators should be interested in making every gallon of fuel that goes into the farm tractor fuel tank work for him, says County Agent F. W. Martin. Tests and reports indicate that a lot of gasoline is being wasted and in most instances you can do something about it. Martin says there are about 240,000 farm tractors in the state and a conservative estimate indicates that each tractor burns about 900 gallons of gasoline per year. Tests show that aboutt 10 per cent of this is wasted. A little simple arithmetic and you have 21,60,00 gallons of wasted fuel. Now this is the amount of gasi-line that is not working for the farmers of Texas. Figure a little further and see what it is costing you in dollars and cents-that amount will help pay the taxes or might even buy the wife a new dress.

Anyway it's a lot of gasoline It would fill 2,160 tank cars-each holding 10,000 gallons and that in turn would make up 21 trains-each of more than 100 cars, one mile long. Much of this loss, says Martin, can be avoided if the farm tractor is properly maintained and operated.






