

County Judge approves order prohibiting burning

Callahan County, Texas Burning

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 240.906 of the Local Government Code, the Callahan County Commissioners' Court had found that dry conditions in the unincorporated areas of Callahan County create a public safety hazard that would ing; and, whereas, such a finding authorizes the issuance of an order which prohibits or restricts outdoor burning.

(1) Action prohibited.

A. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly burns any combustible material outside of an enclosure which serves to contain all flames and/ or sparks, or orders such burn-

activities by others. (2) Enforcement.

A. A violation of this order is a Class C Misdemeanor.

B. This order may be enforced by any duly commissioned peace officer in Callahan

(3) This order is effective and enforceable for 90 days after the date of adoption which is indicated below

(4) This order does not apply to outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission for firefighter training, public utility, natural gas pipeline, or mining operations, or, harvesting of agriculture

(5) Further, a person is not in violation if prior to the setting of any outdoor fire, he or she first obtains the permission of the appropriate volunteer Fire Chief. In this instance, the Fire Chief will have the authority to set the conditions, restrictions, and/or precautions which must be ob-



The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has recently learned that an employee took home electronic data from the VA, which he was not authorized to do and was in violation of established policies. The employee's home was burglarized and this data was stolen. The data contained identifying information including names, social security numbers, and dates of birth for up to 26.5 million veterans and some spouses, as well as some disability ratings. As a result of this incident, information identifiable with you was potentially exposed to others. It is important to note that the affected data did not include any of VA's electronic health records or any financial information.

Appropriate law enforcement agencies, including the FBI and the VA Inspector General's office, have launched full-scale investigations into this matter. Authorities believe it is unlikely that perpetrators targeted the

Out of an abundance of caution, however, VA is taking all possible steps to protect and inform our veterans. While you do not need to take any action unless you are aware of suspicious activity regarding your personal information, there are many steps you may take to protect against possible identity theft and we wanted you to be aware of these. 1. I'm a veteran, how can I tell if my information was comprised?

At this point there is no evidence that any missing data has been used illegally. However, the Department of Veterans Affairs is asking all veterans to be extra vigilant and to carefully monitor bank statements, credit card statements and any statements relating to recent financial transactions. IF you notice unusual or suspicious activity, you should report it immediately to the financial institution involved and contact the Federal Trade Commission for further guidance.

2. What is the earliest date at which suspicious activity might have occurred due to this data breach?

The information was stolen from an employee of the Department of Veterans Affairs during the month of May, 2006.

If the data has been misused or otherwise used to commit fraud or identify theft crimes, it is likely that veterans may notice suspicious activity during the

month of May.

3. I haven't noticed any suspicious activity in my financial statements, but what can I do to protect myself and prevent being victimized by credit card fraud or identify theft?

The Department of Veterans Affairs strongly recommends that veterans closely monitor their financial statements, and visit the Department of Veterans Affairs special website on this, www.firstgov.gov or call 1-800-FED-INFO (1-800-

4. Should I reach out to my financial institutions or will the Department of Veterans Affairs do this for me?

The Department of Veterans Affairs does not believe that it is necessary to contact financial institutions or cancel credit cards and bank accounts, unless you detect suspicious activity.

5. Where should I report suspicious or unusual activity? The Federal Trade Commission recommends the following four steps if you

detect suspicious activity: Step 1- Contact the fraud department of one of the three major credit bureaus: Equifax: 1-800-525-6285; www.equifax.com; P.O. Box 740241, Atlanta GA, 30374-

Step 2- Close any accounts that have been tampered with, or opened fraudulently.

Step 3-File a police report with your local police, or the police in the community where the identity theft took place.

Step 4- File a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission by using the FTC's Identity Theft Hotline by telephone: 1-877-438-4338, online at www.consumer.gov/idtheft, or by mail at Identity Theft Clearinghouse, Federal Trade Commission, Pennsylvania Avenue, NW,

Washington DC 20580.

6. I know the Departn Veterans Affairs maintains my health records electronically; was this information also compromised?

No electronic medical records were compromised. The data is primarily limited to an individual's name, date of birth, social security number, in some cases their spouse's information, as well as some disability ratings. However, this information could still be of potential use to identify thieves and we recommend that all veterans be extra vigilant in monitoring for signs of potential identity theft or

misuse of this information. 7. What is the Department of Veterans Affairs doing to ensure that this does not happen again? The Department of Veterans Affairs is working with the President's Identify Theft Task Force, the Department of Justice and the Federal Trade Commission to investigate this data breach and to develop safeguards against similar incidents. The Department of Veterans Affairs has directed all VA employees complete the "VA Cyber Security Awareness Training Course" and complete the separate "General Employee Privacy Awareness Course" by June 30, 2006. In addition, the Department of Veterans Affairs will immediately be conducting an inventory and review of all current positions requiring access to sensitive VA data to undergo an updated National Agency Check and Inquiries (NACI) and/or a Minimum Background Investigation (MBI) depending on level of access required by the responsibilities associated with their position. Appropriate law enforcement agencies, including the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Inspector General of the Department of Veterans Affairs, have launched full-scale investigations into this matter. 8. The Legacy of Love Memorial wall was created as a means to honor those friends of the West Texas Rehab Center who, through their love and generosity to others, made a lasting difference in the lives of fellow West Texas.

At the initial ceremony on May 27, 1994 one hundred thirty-four plaques were unveiled. Today they honor those who have passed from this life during the past year, by adding their names to those so honored in past years. The wall now has 325 names of individuals or couples who left a legacy for others to follow.

Each person honored found their own way of reaching out to the community. Guy Watson served as a volunteer for the Rehab and was among the 16 individuals honored in 2006.

inside. Perhaps for merely a second, they saw him at her side.


"I know you're with me Daddy." to the silence she called out. And what happened next made believers, of those once filled with doubt.
