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The hot, blowing winds have depleted the moisture needed for grass, trees, crops, etc. When the temperature is 90 degrees by 9:00 a.m., up to 102 or so and still in the 90's at 10:00 p.m. it is REALLY HOT!!!!!!

The cottonwood trees around my house shed most of their leaves two weeks ago. It looks like fall already. The lack of rain has the trees stressed. The mulberry tree leaves are wilted and curled on the limbs. Most of the grass and even the weeds are turning yellow and dying.

Worst of all, the farmers and ranchers in this area are facing some tough times in that they are selling their cattle due to lack of grass and water. The number of cattle at area auction barns are increasing.

The crops can't mature when there is no moisture unless you have irrigation, which is not prevalent in our area. We depend on the Heavenly rain to replenish

# **Your Cross Plains EMS Needs Your Assistance** as a VOLUNTEER

I learned a lot from the December wildfire that burned so much of Cross Plains. Our homes, barns, equipment, cars, records, keepsakes, pets, cattle, feed, fences were consumed and our very lives threatened! Very important and encouraging, we in Cross Plains have a great multitude of good neighbors, near and far. Neighbors who out of good and compassionate hearts both saw the multitude of needs and gave and helped and gave some more. Jane and I were encouraged, helped, blessed and instructed.

But, there is a most important fact to know, recognize, understand and be instructed from. However great the need for fire insurance, it was too late to get when the fire happened, just too late! And I suspect we now all know and better appreciate the reality of this hard fact. It's much the same with our EMS.

EMS services just do not happen when needed. They are not 'just there' because someone is hurt and in great need. They just aren't. Like fire insurance and the military, it's not there unless it's been organized, maintained and in-force.

Years ago, some of our good and thoughtful neighbors recognized the need of our Cross Plains EMS. Baird, Brownwood and Abilene are over half an hour away! They got together, volunteered, were trained and equipped to have our crews today now standing ready, standing prepared for your family's emergency, maybe even yours! Some are drivers like are trained myself, others EMTs: Emergency Medical Technicians. Think with me of how many personal hours of these neighbors it takes to have our Cross Plains EMS when

needed. Consider how many days and shifts every week these volunteers limit their work, home life and other activities to be trained, updated, and organized to be available, to be on call. Let's be specific in our thinking. Unless we have a sufficient number of these trained 3member volunteer teams ready and the team-of-three on call, it's too late to get EMS service when a family member desperately needs help.

The point: Cross Plains EMS, your neighborhood EMS urgently need several more volunteers to be trained and scheduled to serve and be on-call as EMTs. Just 3 more would bless us greatly. Today, our few EMTs are truly unduly burdened with too many shifts every week. Some with 2 to 5 shifts every week! Burn out is threatened! More hands will make the burden lighter... and you will enjoy the comradery of these modern day Minutemen.

Persisting commitment, good humor and availability are priorities. We need you NOW. Be assured, trained EMTs have to be organized and 12 hour shifts accepted and scheduled.

Fact of life and EMS: to responsibly continue our local Cross Plains EMS services with

Max Evans and his grandson, Colton, stopped by the office this morning and asked us to pray for rain and the agricultural communities in the United States. I had already planned to write on the subject, so he provided me with some good information.

He is concerned about whether some of the smaller cattle operations will buy back when the drought is over. Max remarked that if 20 people with 20 head of cattle (making a total of possibly 400 calves per year) dropped out of the business, it would change our agricultural community.

Max noted that he heard an older ranch couple at the Western Heritage in Abilene speaking of selling a large ranch that had been in their family for 120 years. The new owners sold all the animals and currently there is not a hoof on the place. If the land is not put into production with cattle or crops a shortage of food could easily happen here in America. It is amazing how much we already depend on other countries for various food.

The cost of farming has increased dramatically in the past few years. With pickup trucks costing \$35,000 and tractors \$100,000 it adds up fast. Then you throw in the cost of diesel at \$2.81 to \$3.00 per gallon. You have a lot invested and then you have to gamble on the weather.

Cotton farmers further west have to contribute their first two bales of cotton per acre to expenses in order to break even. Max remarked, "You have to spend more and plant more acres to make the same amount as a few years ago."

Charles Payne has been talking to me about this for years. He is concerned about the toll it is taking on the people who produce the food for this country and others. He always comments that he doesn't want the U.S. to become dependent on foreign







## "Dig Holes and Plant **Flowers**"

The rains came a while back and washed every, yes everything fresh, and sparkling clean and all the plants received refreshment. Everything looks just dazzling after a rain. On each vine, leaf and

blade of grass that appears, it larkspurs. seems to hold a dew drop or a rain drop on the foliage.

Do you have a shady side to up or bloom at all.

Try something different on that to a golden hue. side of the house. Take up all the old plants, go over the soil in that soil like organic plant food.

Sprinkle it lightly and let it sit for about 2 days. Take a pin and paper and try to sketch out a design, tying always to put the taller plants in the back and plant the shorter ones toward the front. One good plant is the coreopsis. Get some of these plants that do well in shady areas such as: hostas, fern, day lilies, caladiums, dusty miller, amaryllus, candy tuft, red hot poker, creeping flocks, wild flock, pansies, and

For the back row or back corner you might consider mugwort, a small bush or shrub. Working in your house? You've tried jillions daylillies or some hostas with of flower seed in the hopes of their green leaves and large them coming up year after year, designs of either red, pink, white waitng to see if they would come would be nice.
