Comment: I know where I'm going, do ya wanta come too? De ja vous! A walk through memories.

"I Remember...."

In 1938, I arrived in Callahan County. In 1941 my sister, Ann, joined us in Callahan County. We arrived about the same time of year but at two different locations.

Kay-hospital at Baird on December 23.

Ann—at home in Cross Plains on January 6.

Cross Plains, as I remember it now; looked quite a bit different

A man by the name of Caton ran the variety store. There were two drug stores. One was Sims, but I can't remember the name of the other one. There were two grocery stores or maybe more. Some I remember, and some I

These probably date back to the 1940's or 1950's. Grocery Stores: One was Tom Cox and one was Fos Bond; it had soda pop and other items. It was near the bank. Then there was Fosters Grocery, Blue Front Grocery, ran by John (Jack) Meador which was run by my mother's father. It was a combination store and gas station.

Later, my mother's brother acquired the property. It is on Main Street, the other block from the First Baptist Church. After several years had passed, his daughter, Johnnie Fore sold the property to the First Baptist

Church. They recently built their new Family Life Center on the location. Johnnie Fore is my first

Another grocery store in the late 1940's was Piggly Wiggly. The man we knew who worked there was Doyle Birchfield. He and daddy played and sang with a group. Others in that group were Ervin Dennis, his brother Wayne Dennis (they both played the guitar as well as the fiddle.) W.M. Stansbury, and Doyle Birchfield were there. My uncle, Rueben Sanders sometimes came down from Abilene and joined them. He was left-handed and yet, he played the mandolin. I know there were others, I just can't recall their names.

I recall my grandmother's friend, Mrs. Mathis, who had the hotel, near the First Baptist Church. I remember when Dale Bishop put in his car dealership. I remember Granny Swafford and Bon and Ethel Huntington, along with two of their daughters, Alona Helen and Bonnie.

I remember the days when you could park cars in the middle of the street, buy candy bars - 2 for 5 cents, a loaf of bread for 15 cents and small candies for one penny each. I remember the ice house, long ago parades and family

When I started school here, the superintendent was Ted McCuin, husband of Maurine McCuin and father of Cynthia Lou and Jay.

I remember so much that I forgot to remember to forget.

Two of our residents, Jimmielee Payne and Sophia Holmes, went with us to Cross Plains to deliver the football mums to the kindergarten classes. Sophia (Jerry) said it was fun to see the children, it was just grand. Employees were: Angie Fortune, Ava Dodd, Nikki Perez and myself, Linda Merritt.

Those that helped make mums were: Residents, Jimmielee Payne, Billie Lewis, Sophia Holmes, Grace Jenkins and Volley Joe Williams; Employees: Jessica Nieto, Angie Fortune (instructor), Fredene Tennison and Linda Merritt.

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

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

New law to take effect on

how to calculate used

state law changes the method to calculate motor vehicle sales and use tax due when you buy a used vehicle. The tax will continue to be due when you title and register the vehicle at the county tax office. A purchaser must pay the tax within 20 county working days from the date of purchase or the date the vehicle was brought into Texas for use.

How much tax is due?

If you buy the vehicle from a licensed dealer, the tax is 6.25% of the sales price. If you buy from a private party, such as a friend or relative, the tax is 6.25% of:

• the sales price, if you paid The Keepers Car Club will be 80% or more of the vehicle's (SPV);

• 80% of the vehicle's SPV. If you paid less than the amount;

What is a vehicle's Standard Presumptive Value (SPV)?

The law requires the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to determine and publish a SPV data base for

motor vehicle sales tax Buying a used Motor used vehicles. Check the TxDOT website at

Where do you get a certified

You have two options. Get a certified appraisal from a licensed dealer for your vehicle type. Depending on the type of vehicle (car, truck, motorcycle) a dealer's fee can range from \$40 to \$500, with most fees from \$100 to \$300. Or get a appraisal from a licensed insurance adjuster for a fee to be determined by the adjuster. Submit the appraisal with you title application within 20 county working days of purchase or the date the vehicle was brought into Texas for use. Be aware that an appraisal fee may offset any tax saving. For example, tax on \$1600 of value = \$100. In other words, a \$100 appraisal must reduce the vehicle's SPV by more than \$1,600 to save money.

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New buck antler restrictions invoked in 60 area counties

These antler restrictions have been in place in 21 counties in the Oak Prairie ecoregion for several years. Harvest data collected by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department wildlife biologists indicate the regulations have been effective in improving the age structure of the buck herd, increasing hunter opportunity, and encouraging landowners and hunters to become more actively involved in better habitat management.

Hunting pressure on buck deer than one of which may have an in these counties has been excessive for many years, say wildlife officials. In 1971, the bag limit in most counties in the eastern third of the state was reduced from two bucks to one in an effort to mitigate excessive hunting pressure. Despite the reduction, the data continues to indicate excessive harvest of bucks, which results in very poor age structure, according to Mitch Lockwood, TPWD's deer program leader. Research results indicate that poor age structure within a buck herd creates a longer breeding season, which

season and a reduction in fawn production. Poor age structure also contributes to adverse hunter satisfaction.

"This regulation is the answer to the problem we've been hearing from smaller landowners who are worried that if they let a buck walk, the neighbor would shoot it," said Gary Calkins, TPWD district biologist in Jasper. "People are more excited about going hunting this year than they have in a long time."

The criteria used for candidate counties were: the county currently must be a one-buck county, 60 percent of the buck harvest in the county must consist of bucks less than 3.5 years of age, and the county must have a contiguous border with another county in which antler restriction regulations have been implemented. On this basis, the department identified the 40 counties affected by the new regulation.


