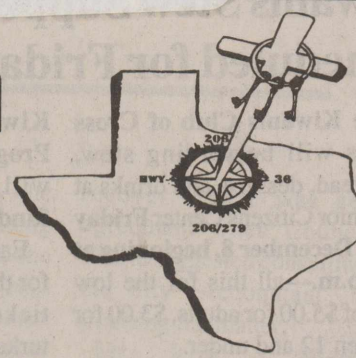

Senior Citizens Relax After City Council Meeting

At the November 14, 2006 Cross Plains City Council meeting, James Nichols, in a previously prepared statement read "by City Secretary Debbie Gosnell, rescinded his motion to appoint a committee to study moving the Senior Citizens' Center to the American Legion Hall. There was no opposition.

City Hall chambers were full to capacity, with a large number of citizens wishing to show their support in opposition to a move of the Senior Citizens' Center.

In the statement Nichols wrote, "Last month I recommended to the council that we look into the possibility of moving the Senior Citizen Center to the American Legion Hall. I made this recommendation after, and only after, talking with Kathy Anderson, Director of the Senior Center. Although the paper stated that I did not tell the council what Kathy's response was, I did in fact inform the council that I had spoken to Kathy, along with Gene Dillard being present, but did not

participate in the discussion, and again her response to the possibility of moving the center to the ALH, was that she would do whatever the council felt best and to let her know what she needed to do to help. If she had told me at that time that she did not think the Seniors would be in favor of the move, I would not have pursued the matter further.

However, since the last meeting, I have met with several of the Senior Citizens and they are not in favor of moving. The only reason that I suggested that they move was due to the cost of the upkeep of the Senior Citizens Building. The building is in poor condition, the utilities are high and in search of ways to keep costs to the citizens low, I felt that we could accomplish a couple of things by making this move. We could not only lower the repairs and maintenance as well as utilities of the Senior Citizen Building but we could also help the American Legion Hall at the same time.

Therefore, at this time I would like to rescind my motion to

procedures of carrying out its program within the framework of the Texas soil and water conservation district law.

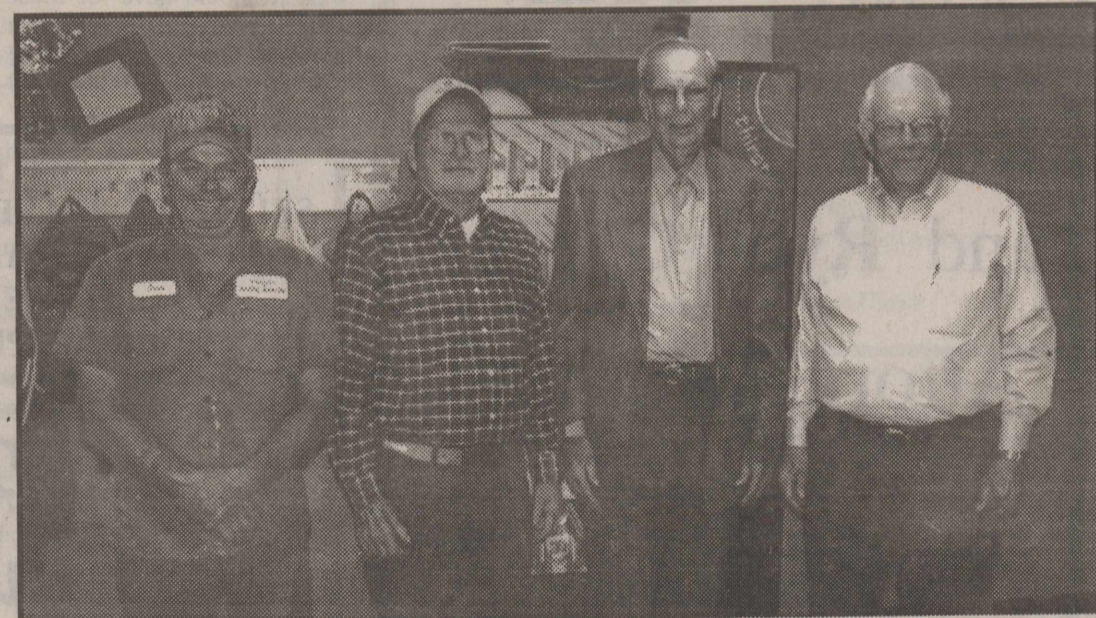

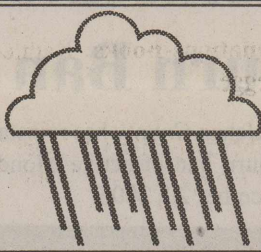

Attorney General nets \$779,000 in Medicaid fraud case

AUSTIN—Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott today (Wednesday, November 15th) announced a \$779,000 settlement with Omnicare Inc., a Kentucky-based company that agreed to settle a dispute with several states and the federal government involving allegations that it unlawfully altered certain drugs' dosage strengths for a profit.

Omnicare, which bills itself as a leading provider of pharmaceuticals for seniors in long-term care facilities, will pay a total of \$49.5 million for its five-year scheme to switch seniors from brandname drugs to generic drugs at nursing homes. The scheme also involved switching the dosage levels. The company's actions caused the Medicaid program to reimburse Omnicare substantially more than it should have for those drugs.

"We are committed to protecting seniors and to rooting out

waste in the Medicaid system," said Attorney General Abbott. "Neither the public nor Omnicare's patients were served by this scheme. Texans can rest assured we will continue cracking down on costly Medicaid fraud."

Omnicare targeted specific drugs such as generic Zantac, Prozac and Buspar tablets then switched patients to more expensive capsule versions of the drugs, which resulted in an excessive Medicaid reimbursement rate that was neither medically necessary nor lawful. The practice also violated many states' pharmaceutical dispensing laws.

The national case, brought by an Illinois whistleblower under the federal False Claims Act and in Texas also under the Texas Medicaid Fraud Prevention Act, underscores the need for state-federal partnerships in combating widespread fraud.

I picked up, at random, a book from my bookshelves the other day and found it somewhat captivating, that I could hardly put it down.

"POEMS", by Walter J. Doherty. The book is a small, faded red hardback book, speckled by water marks and was published in 1913 by, publisher not named, and there are no other identifying notes about its origin. It begins:

"When stars were dotted o'er the sky
And lovers spoke a fond good-bye,
And night had chased the day away,
I'd sit and write my lonesome lay."

The book is dedicated to "Mary Cecelia Gaudin", a "Motherless Child" whose mother died in childbirth and whose father spent 30 years earning a living in business and using his spare hours

writing poems.

His book is captivating because he immediately captures your attention and sends your emotions on a roller coaster ride between gladness and sadness.

Through scenes of bright flowery-garden joy and lonely, almost undetected, sadness of a life of loneliness, the book shifts through the experiences of life that seem common to all of us. But his way of turning the right phrase and sudden revelations of insight delivers a fairly consistent picture of his life and times.

All in all, with the author's "lonesome lay" writing, it is a book of poems worth reading and since there are probably no other copies existent in the world, you can read mine if you like, if I ever find it again.

appoint a committee to look into the matter of moving the Senior Citizens to the American Legion Hall, and to leave them where they are at the present time. It is and has always been my intention to do what is best for the community. To save costs when possible and to see that the Seniors have a place to meet. However, if the building becomes in such a poor state that we cannot continue to fund the upkeep of the building, then other means will have to be sought and the City, together with the Seniors, will have to find ways to meet those needs."

Kathy Anderson is the Site Manager for the Cross Plains Senior Citizens' Center and was on the agenda to address the Council. She pointed out to the Council that there is an existing legal obligation for the City to lease the Senior Citizens building as long as the Senior Citizens remain an organized group. She attested that the figures previously given by Mr. Nichols for the cost of feeding senior citizens was in error, and that almost 18 senior citizens daily visit the center, and are given a meal for less than \$1.50 daily on average.

Ms. Anderson expressed concern about how well this

community is respected by the Nutrition Board. In concluding her remarks to the Council, she indicated that she felt that Cross Plains seniors could be better represented by someone other than Mr. Nichols, and described what she perceives as a lack of rapport between him and the seniors.

Katy Dunn, Director of the Callahan County Nutrition Project, referring to the Council's concern over expenses at the Center, addressed the Council briefly stating, "We support Kathy and the seniors. If this comes up again, contact me and the Board of Directors, and we'll try to work it out."

A motion to renew the City's commitment to the Callahan County Nutrition Project was carried with no objections.

A motion was made that the City assist the American Legion by paying for utility costs (water and electricity) at the Cross Plains Veterans Memorial and it carried without objection.

John Baum addressed the Council, stating that the Cross Plains Masonic Lodge wishes to join with the City to provide a continuous sidewalk from City Hall to the Veteran's Memorial. The City's part of the proposed project would install a sidewalk across the front of their property to the Veterans Memorial. The estimated cost of the City's portion would be \$2,445.66. The Lodge's part being about \$1,456.00. It was moved that the City join in the project and the motion was carried.

A motion was made and carried to place the funds received from the (FEMA) Federal Emergency Management Agency, for reimbursement to the City after the fires, into a Certificate of Deposit in the amount of \$95,000.00.

It was pointed out that a 1/4 percent sales tax on commodities in the city of Cross Plains is used for street maintenance, but that tax was due to expire without another vote. Ms. Gosnell requested permission to put that issue on the ballot for Cross Plains for May of 2007, and a motion was made, seconded and carried.

There was discussion of the Cross Plains High School interest in the Cross Plains baseball fields. Jackie Tennison, Superintendent of Schools, had obtained and provided to City Hall a sample lease, which Ms. Gosnell read during the session. The general consensus of the councilmen was that distribution of expenses, responsibilities and times of use seemed fair, and since practice for high school softball was to begin in February, the Council voted to accept the contract in principle.

Ms. Gosnell also reported having been contacted by a representative of a firm that proposes to recover unmerited tax monies spent by communities such as Cross Plains for 50 percent of what the firm is able to

recover. There was general agreement when Councilman Cassle suggested consulting with the City Accountant before pursuing the matter.

Mr. Jerry Biggerstaff addressed the Council regarding a programmable electronic sign which he hoped to finance privately, but requests that the City maintain. He stated that the sign will require electricity and a phone line (for remote programming of the sign) which should amount to about \$50 monthly, but the privately financed sign may cost between \$18,000 and \$20,000. He said the sign could be used to benefit tourism in Cross Plains, and would have the capacity to display both text and graphic images.

There was a general consensus among council members on approving the request to finance the maintenance of the sign, but no motion could be made at this meeting because this issue was not on the agenda. It will be on the next agenda for the Council.

October's Police Report by Chief of Police Don Gosnell consisted of 97 calls, including 4 family disturbance; 1 sexual assault; 2 gas drive-off; 4 criminal mischief; 1 runaway; 1 auto theft; 1 indecent exposure; 1 recovered stolen motorcycle; 3 trespassing; 1 attempted suicide; 1 DWI arrest; 1 shoplifter; 2 suspicious vehicles; 2 prowlers; 3 alarm responses; 2 abandoned vehicle; 3 assaults; 4 gas thefts. 46 warnings and 60 citations were given. The total revenue was \$12,040.59.

The Judge's Report consisted of 14 outstanding citations less than 30 days; 8, 30 days and less than 60 days; 22, 60 days less than 90 days; 12, 90 days less than 120 days; 8 120 days less than 150 days; 5, 150 days less than 180 days. Total open cases were 69.

At this point the City Council went into executive session. Afterward, the Council came back into open session, and the issue involving the City's Waste Water Plant permit was discussed. Mr. Mark Norris said that the City had been advised of noncompliance with certain portions of the permit and the permit needed to be amended.

Councilman Gene Dillard was not present at the meeting. City employees present at the meeting were Stuart Sowell, Teresa Kennedy, David Clark, Mark Norris, Don Gosnell and Debbie Gosnell.

"Any Other Thanksgiving"

Quite a few people trace their Thanksgiving meal back for generations. They vary somewhat. In some areas of the U.S. the bird is a goose or a pheasant. In the south, southwest and the western areas the bird is a turkey. Originally they were hunted down with a bow and arrow, rifle or shotgun.

Stuffing for the various and asundry birds also varied in different areas of America. There are those who make oyster stuffing with light bread, and onions.

There are also a number of folks who make a light bread stuffing

with celery, onions and mushrooms.

When we lived in New Mexico I found that most of the people made really good cornbread stuffing, to which they added chopped hot peppers. It was their custom.

Everyone has favorites from the meat and the stuffing to cranberries, potatoes, vegetables, rolls and dessert. After dinner appetizers include a cup of rich coffee, demitasse, brandy or cognac. Whatever you prefer.

There is also a great rice stuffing which is very good. I ate some at a party in Fort Worth nearly 40 years ago. I liked it so well that I asked the hostess, a Mosley relative, for the recipe and have been enjoying it ever since.

I've been planning on coming

out with a few (to us) menu for Thanksgiving. It includes baked turkey with brown rice stuffing, giblet gravy, sweet potato a la orangeade, English pea (apple and cheese)salad, corn casserole, hot rolls, 3 choices of cranberry plus one extra. These include homemade whole berry cranberry sauce; Aunt Mary cranberry; peel and chop two apples (either Delicious or Gala) cook in sauce pan until apples are tender and done. Pour 1 package sugar free cranberry sauce, stir and serve at room temperature. The extract of one is cranberry Tastee congealed asparagus. Desserts might be orange cheesecake, pumpkin pie, pecan pie and one shot strawberry cake. Add a bowl of strawberry punch, small chafing dish of nuts (peanuts, pecans, walnuts or parched olives), and small bowls of ripe and/or green olives.

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

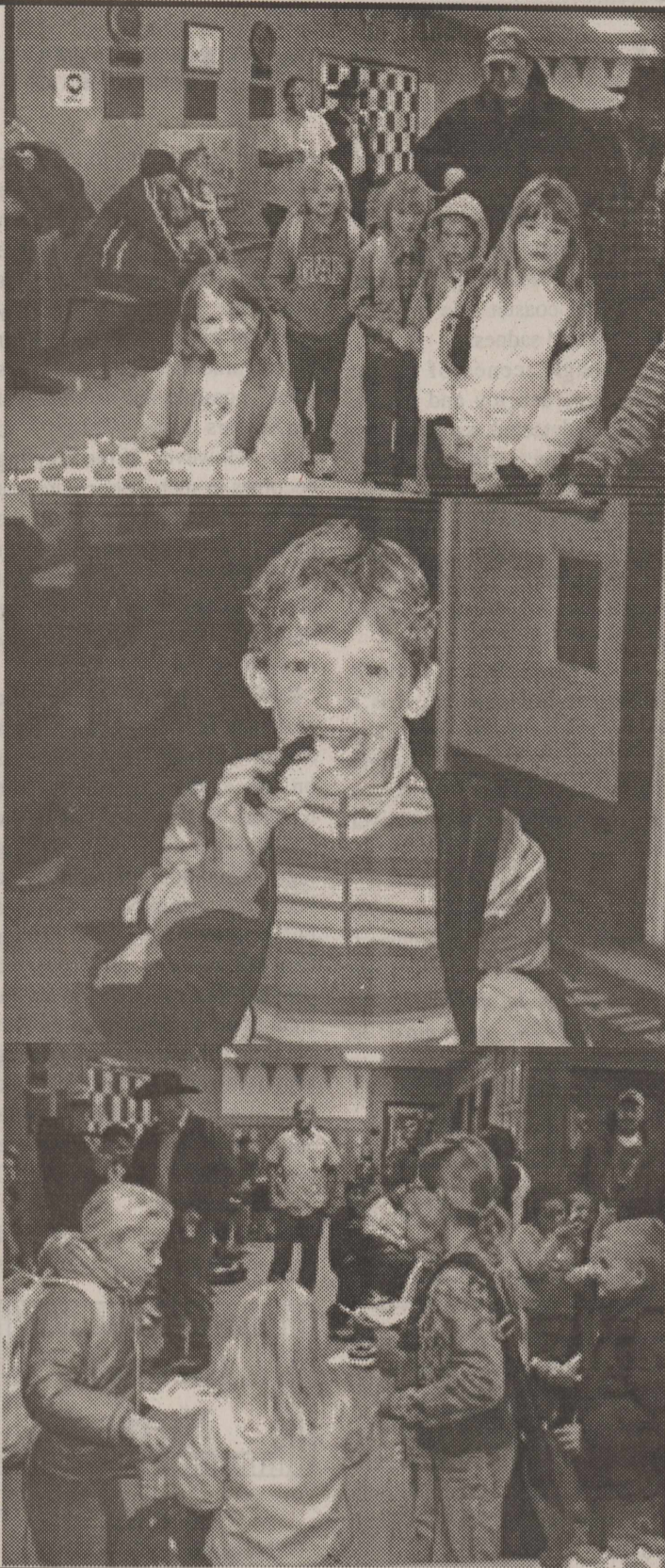
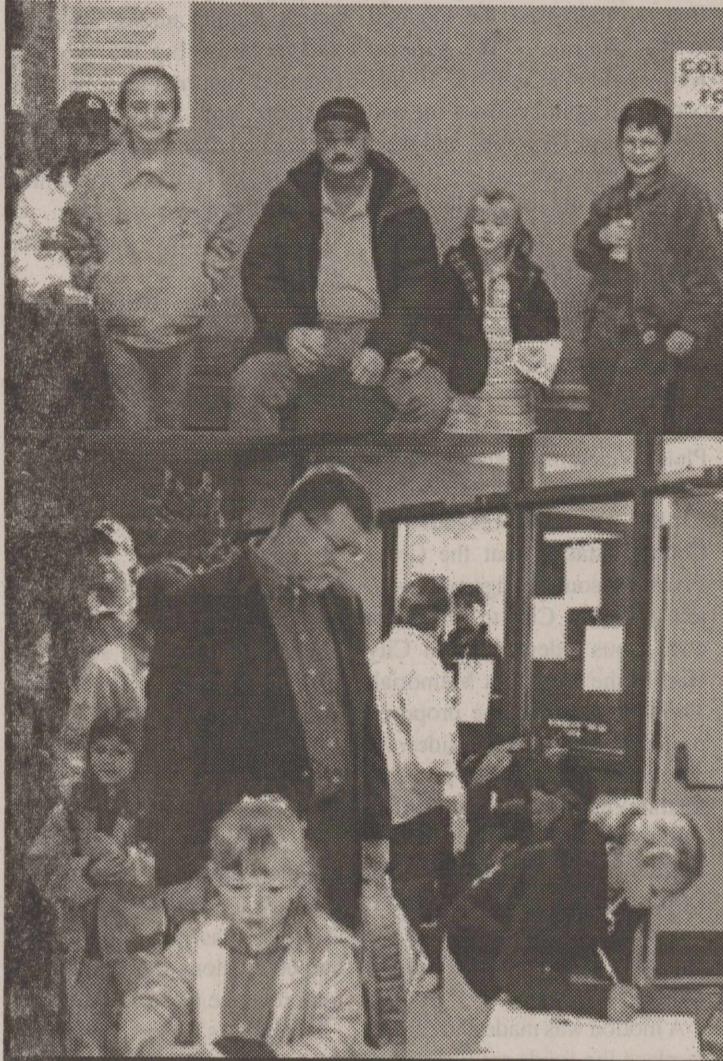

Qualms About Prom Will the Prom be Moved?

Will the Prom journey to Abilene? FFA Outshines 5 Other Schools, Dads and Donuts Exceeds Expectations and Banning Outside Food and Drinks are discussed at the November 16th School Board Meeting.

A lively and lengthy discussion took place about whether the upcoming Junior/Senior Prom should be held in Abilene or not. Various parents and students showed up to participate in the spirited debate. Prom is usually held at the gym or the Community Center in Cross Plains, but students expressed their desire to have it possibly in the ballroom at the Grace Museum this year.

Several quandaries arise if this is to happen. Transportation may be a sticky situation. Some want to rent limousines, while others may want to drive or otherwise cannot afford a limo.

The question of liability arises, as Board members are concerned about sanctioning students to go to Abilene, and the chance of accidents are an issue. The possibility of kids leaving the Prom and missing the limo back is also a concern.

Time is of the essence, as other schools are already booking places. Frankie Hyles and other School Board members wanted to know how parents feel about it. Susan Schaefer stated that, "I'm for it, but we need to hear from other parents first."

It was suggested that letters be sent out to parents ASAP. Students and parents need to talk and come to an agreement rather quickly so arrangements can be finalized.

There will be a Special Called Meeting on Tuesday, November 28th at 6:00 p.m. at the High School Library to discuss and take action on this Prom issue. **Parents are urged to participate in this discussion.**

Mr. Cearley reported the results of the FFA District Leadership Contest, held at Cisco Jr. College on Nov. 13th. Forty-two students, both male and female from CPISD participated in this event.

Cross Plains went up against 5 other schools and won outstandingly in the **Overall Sweepstakes** with the **highest score of 90!** Cisco scored 64, Jim Ned 61, Coleman 58 and Merkel 48.

In **Public Relations**, Cross Plains placed 2nd. In **Radio and Job Interview**, they came in 3rd. In the **Quiz** for overall knowledge, Seniors scored 1st, with Juniors coming in 2nd. In **Chapter Conducting**, Juniors scored 1st, with Seniors coming in 4th. In **Creed**, both Juniors and Seniors placed 5th. In **Skills**, the Seniors scored 2nd. First and Second place teams advanced to Area Contest on Nov. 18th at Tarleton University.

*Smiles abounded at the recent "Dads and Donuts" event. Margie Sowell reported it was the biggest group of Dads (and important others) ever, with lines out the door, waiting to experience this day with their kids. She, along with the teachers, shared the expression of appreciation for such an enormous participation.

*In an effort to curtail food being brought in from outside sources to the gymnasium, signs will be posted stating that no outside food or drinks will be permitted inside the gym. As food and drinks are regulated, it greatly diminishes the possibility of alcohol or other unknown substances being consumed on school property.

*The outcome and impact of House Bill 1, passed by the Texas Legislature was discussed. It will affect the school in some of the following ways:

*A study will be conducted by Superintendent Tennison to see if the school will require extra classrooms next year. A couple of factors to consider will be enrollment, as well as the adding of 2 more years of mandatory math and science requirements, starting in 9th grade in school year '07-'08.

*The earliest the next school year can start is Aug. 27th, which may mean mid-term finals will be after Christmas break, and there will be less days off during the school year.

*In agreement with Board

President Scott Childress, Burlie Taylor suggested that they look for ways to improve student achievement. Taylor stated that, "High expectation is the key to student achievement. It starts with the principal and goes outward, and as a Board member, I want to contribute something to that climate."

Mr. Childress explained that one objective is to have all the teachers use the same terminology when teaching, such as using the word "subtract" consistently when explaining math, instead of using the words "minus" or "take-away". If this verbal alignment was used, then teachers in the next grade level know what has been taught in the previous grade and what the students identify with. It lowers the possibility of confusion and misunderstanding.

Pursuing this venture will require Board members to participate in training from the Texas Association of School Boards. In the final analysis, Kim Crockett and Jackie Tennison voiced their agreement for training, but there was no vote, and it was tabled until the next meeting.

*Questionnaires were to be filled out regarding any School Board member or spouse that conducts business with the school.

*No action will be taken on Mr. Tennison's evaluation until next month.

*The Board went into Executive Session but did not relay what was said.

Melissa Crawford (sister of bride) served as Matron of Honor and Candice Bailey (sister of groom) served as bridesmaid.


