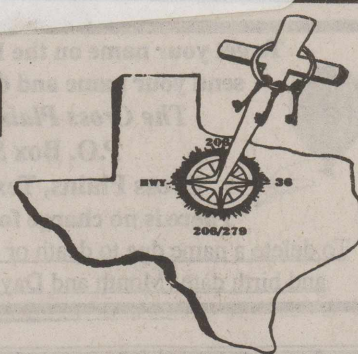

## Another New Business Awarded Grant from EDC/City of Cross Plains

**Hardwick Nursery Coming to Town, "Senior Village" Water Lines, Wastewater Permits Discussed, the Baseball Lease gets Pitched Back One Last Time and the New Fire Chief is Named at the January 11th City Council Meeting**

\*Dannes Turner from the Cross Plains Economic Development Corporation, Inc. (EDC) met with Council members to present Hardwick Nursery's proposal to open a garden center at the corner of Highway 36 and Main Street in the former TNT Auto Care Building.

Hardwick intends to remodel the building, putting in a "saloon-type" front, with an open-air fruit and produce stand facing east and a greenhouse on the west side. Hardwick Nursery has an existing operation in Rising Star on Highway 36, just east of town.

Turner advised the Council that the EDC has approved a grant of \$10,000 to Mr. Hardwick, providing that his business offers at least 80 hours of employment per week, for 2 years. Practically speaking, this could mean 2

full-time employees or a few part-time workers. If this stipulation is not met, the grant will become a loan and must be paid back with interest.

The EDC also offered to loan Hardwick the extra money he needed, but it was respectfully declined, as he has already looked into getting a loan elsewhere.

The Council unanimously approved the proposal for this new business.

\*Mark Norris gave an update on the Water and Wastewater project to the EDC property, located east on First Street (the Old Pioneer Highway). The "Senior Village" is proposed to begin construction in the near future and will need new lines reaching that property.

The estimated costs of running both water and wastewater lines are \$161,312.00. These costs do not include the looping back into the City's existing system. That will incur an additional \$56,875.00.

If the City and EDC opts to flush the dead-end lines instead of looping them, they can save some money, but have to maintain a rigid flushing regimen to avoid

gasses that ultimately may build up, causing a potential foul odor, but posing no threat.

It was brought out that because it will be seniors who will be occupying the housing, they most likely will be more frugal with water and other utilities, and not actually run enough water to diffuse the buildup of gasses.

If the housing unit put in sprinkler systems, this would help not only with keeping the landscapes from drying out and a means of fire protection, but also help with the dispersing of gasses. However, sprinklers are not an option being considered by those in charge of building the "Senior Village" at this time.

\*Mr. Norris also discussed the fact that the current Wastewater Permit needs to be amended from a "Discharge Permit" to an "Irrigation Permit" due to testing requirements. There have been some snags with the amendment process however, and it was decided it would be better to wait until the permit renewal in 2009 to make those changes. At that time a new amendment to the permit will be requested.

Judging of the rabbits and poultry will begin at 5:30 p.m. on Thursday, January 18th with Scott Anderson of Brownwood Extension office doing the judging. All participants must be checked in by 5:00 p.m. on the 18th. Judging will begin at 8:00

a.m. on Friday, January 19th, with the Breeding Swine Show followed by the Market Barrow Show. Colby Christie, of Haskell will be judging the Swine Show. At 1:30 p.m. on Friday, January 19th, Joe Raff, of Wichita Falls, will start judging the Market Lambs followed by the Boer Goats and Meat Goat Show. On the Afternoon of the 19th from 3:00-5:00 p.m. all steers and heifers will be classified and weighed. Lee Standley, of Weatherford, will get the judging of the Beef Cattle underway at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday morning, January 20th with the heifer show. Mr. Standley will also judge the steer show starting at 9:00 a.m.

The Premium Sale will begin at 1:00 p.m. The Awards Presentation of all the trophies for the champion animals will be held prior to the premium sale auction.

## Texas Running Dangerously Short of Electricity

AUSTIN, TX—Texas is running dangerously short of electricity, according to a new report released today by the Clean Coal Technology Foundation of Texas, giving the Texas Legislature a historic opportunity to address this critical problem by developing a comprehensive state energy plan.

"With top power officials warning publicly that Texas' supply of electricity could drop below safety margins as early as this year, or by 2008, at the latest, it is clear the state must take a hard look at Texas energy needs and develop a comprehensive plan to meet those needs," said Foundation Administrative Director Donna McDonald.

"There is no time to waste because current projections show that by 2009 existing Texas power plants will be unable to meet demand. The state should act quickly to develop an energy plan so regulators and utility companies have a clear picture of how to proceed and

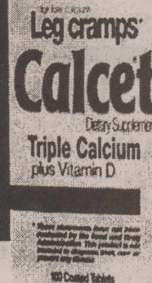

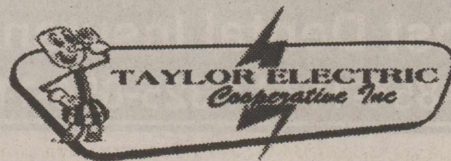
The scope of Texas' electricity predicament is detailed in *Power Outage 2007*, the Foundation's most recent report on energy and air quality issues. The report is based on data, comments and projections from the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Electric Reliability Council of Texas, North American Electric Reliability Council and U.S. Department of Energy. "Texas is walking a very fine line. The Texas Legislature should take action to ensure that new sources of power come online as quickly as possible. Otherwise, the

reliable electric system that we have taken for granted for decades will be in jeopardy," McDonald said.

State regulators have said new coal-fueled and nuclear plants are key to addressing the looming power crunch, noting that natural gas is expensive and its price volatile, and solar and wind energy are incapable of reliably delivering power when customers need it the most. Nuclear plants, however, can require a decade to permit, build and become operational.

## Texas unemployment insurance tax rates decrease for most employers in 2007

AUSTIN — The Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) has announced employer tax rates for Calendar Year (CY) 2007. As announced by Gov. Perry in October 2006, some 360,000 qualifying Texas employers will receive a tax credit during 2007. Thanks to strong economic conditions in the state, the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund has a \$320 million surplus. All experience-rated employers will be eligible to receive the benefits of the Surplus Tax Credit. The surplus will be credited to Texas employers who paid into the system.

Most Texas employers will see a decrease in their tax rate, compared to last year, as the economy continues to improve. Texas Unemployment Insurance (UI) tax rates are down more than two-tenths of a percentage point, on average, and initial claims for UI have declined by more than 24 percent over the last 12 months.

Sixty-seven percent of Texas' 400,000 employers will pay the minimum tax rate of 0.29 percent for CY 2007. This low rate is a result of the proactive measures undertaken in 2003 by TWC to issue bonds in order to sustain the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund.

The average tax rate of 1.30 percent for CY 2007 is down from 1.51 percent in 2006, while the average experience tax rate of 1.13 percent for CY 2007 is down from 1.37 percent in 2006. The experience tax rate is the

sum of the general tax rate, the replenishment tax rate and the obligation assessment tax rate for the year.

The components of the CY 2007 tax rate are:

- The obligation assessment rate — to collect the amount needed to repay the bond obligations due next year. It is experience-rated, based on an employer's 2006 tax rate.

- The general tax rate — based on claims against an employer's account. If TWC has paid benefits to former employees who were laid off or separated through no fault of their own in the past three years, then those employers will pay a general tax.

- The replenishment tax rate — charged to all employers to cover unemployment claims not charged to a specific employer. This tax tends to rise following economic slowdowns when claims increase and businesses close.

- The employment training assessment — charged to all employers who are eligible for a computed tax rate to finance the Skills Development Fund and the Texas Enterprise Fund. The Employment Training Assessment calculation is a separate line item on the Employer's Quarterly Tax Report.

The 79th Texas Legislature (2005) changed the way the Skills Development Fund is financed. The Skills Development Fund provides new and incumbent workers customized assessment and training in response to the needs of Texas businesses. This program is funded by a flat rate assessment, called the Employment Training Assessment, and is a component of the unemployment tax rate.

TWC is dedicated to finding ways to lower the financial impact of unemployment on the employers of this state. The agency has instituted initiatives to ensure program integrity in several areas, and to increase UI fraud detection and prevention. Through the use of increased work-search verifications, improved automated processes and database cross matches with other agencies, TWC has seen a reduction in UI overpayments since January 2004. TWC pledges its continued efforts in helping to keep taxes as low as possible and mitigating the effects on Texas employers.

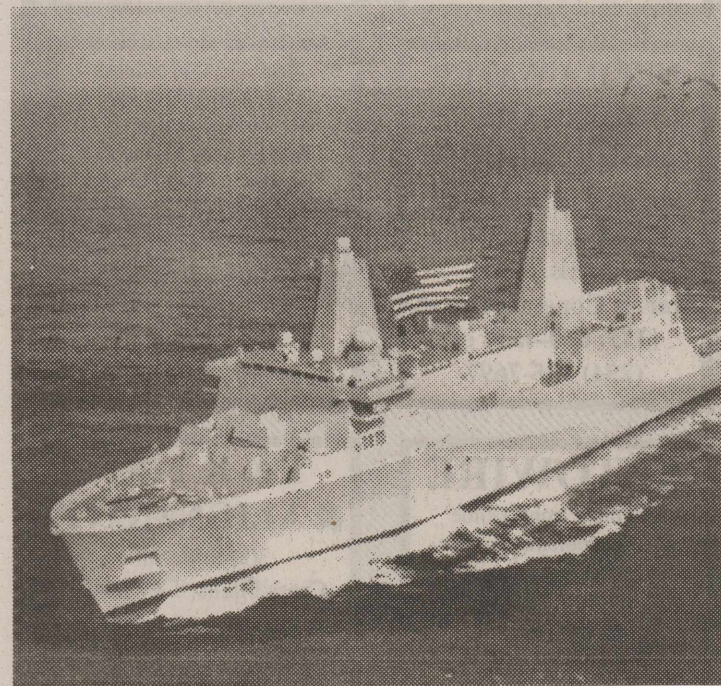

## Winter Storm Preparedness Check List

CORPUS CHRISTI, (January 12, 2007)—AEP Texas is preparing for severe winter weather in parts of West Texas over the weekend.

If major outages occur, AEP Texas responds first to dangerous situations such as fallen wires or sparking equipment. - Prepare your family by keeping flashlights and portable radios on hand.

- If you use a portable generator, DO NOT plug the generator into your circuit box. Portable generators "back-feed" electricity up the line and risk the lives of repair workers and the public. Plug appliances directly into the generator.

- To report an outage, call the number on your electric bill. If you have trouble getting through by phone, please be patient and try again in a few minutes. With widespread outages, thousands of customers call at the same time.

- Be extremely careful when using any alternate forms of heating, cooling, cooking and lighting.

- If an outage occurs, unplug or turn off major appliances and electronic equipment like televisions, VCRs and computers. Turn them on one at a time when power is restored.

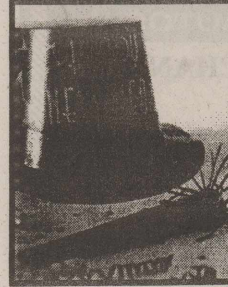

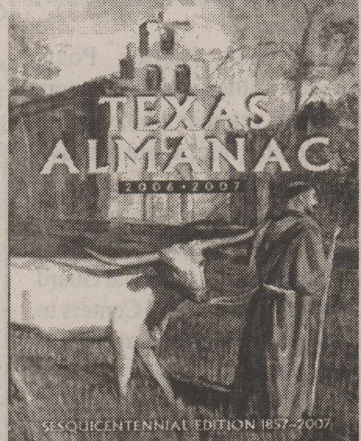

Ag. Producers can gain a better understanding of futures and options, and how to effectively use them as marketing tools at a January 23 marketing seminar.

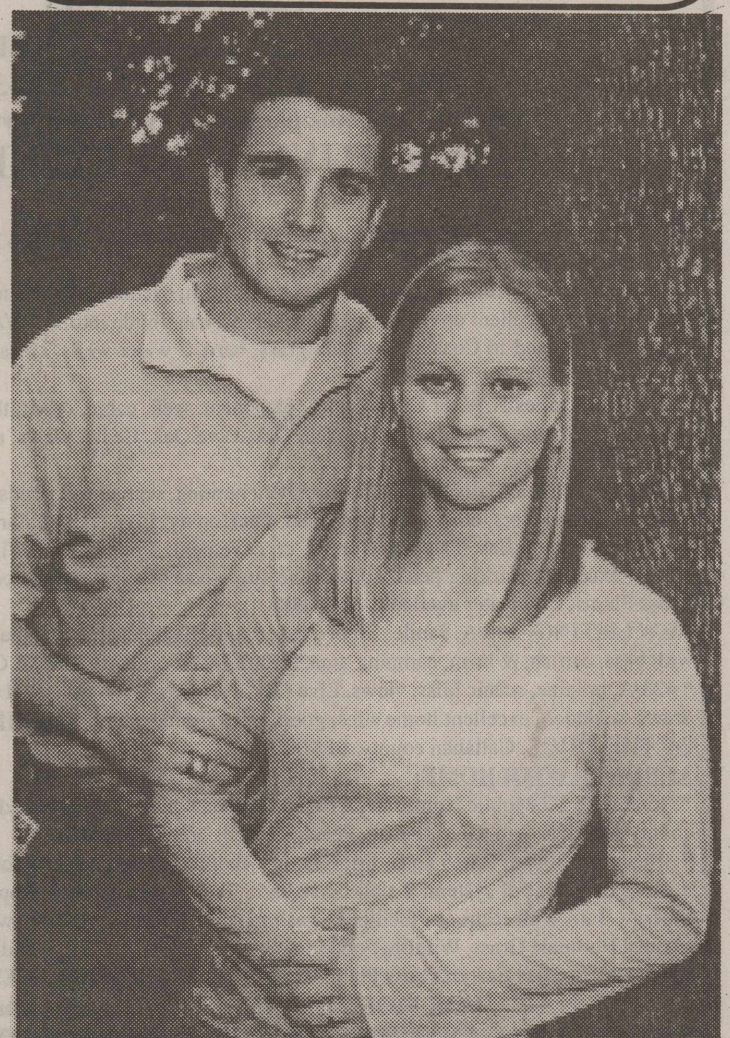
