
QUILTING TODAY **By Barbara Powell**

If you want your life to be a bowl of cherries, then live your life and raise your family and conduct your business towards others in a very special way like that veritable bowl of cherries.



Sacramento, CA-Small businesses in Shackelford County, Texas, and the neighboring counties of Callahan, Eastland, Haskell, Jones, Stephens and Throckmorton may now apply for low interest disaster loans from the U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA). "These loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by drought, excessive heat and high winds beginning January 1, 2006," announced Alfred E. Judd, Director of SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center - West.

Small businesses may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) of up to \$1.5 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses which could have been met had the disaster not occurred. "Eligibility for these loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 4%, a maximum term of 30 years, and are restricted to small businesses without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship," Judd said.

By law, SBA makes EIDLs available when the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture designates an agricultural disaster. Secretary Mike Johanns declared these disasters at the request of Governor Rick Perry.

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are ineligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency (FSA) about the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) assistance made available by the Secretary's declaration. However, in drought disasters nurseries are eligible for SBA disaster assistance.

Mail completed applications to the U.S. Small Business Administration at 14925 Kingsport Road, Fort Worth, TX 76155.

The deadline to apply for these loans is August 14, 2007.

#### A BROTHER'S LOVE

Like any good mother, when Karen found out that another baby was on the way, she did what she could to help her 3year-old son, Michael, prepare for a new sibling. They find out that the new baby is going to be a girl, and day after day, night after night, Michael sings to his sister in Mommy's tummy.

Karen and her husband contact a local cemetery about a burial plot. They have fixed up a special room in their home for the new baby, now they plan a funeral.

Michael, keeps begging his parents to let him see his sister, "I want to sing to her," he says. Week two in intensive care. It looks as if a funeral will come before the week is over. Michael keeps nagging about singing to his sister, but kids are never allowed in Intensive Care. But Karen makes up her mind. She will take Michael whether they like it or not. If he doesn't see his sister now, he may never see her alive.

Karen tows Michael to his sister's bedside. He gazes at the tiny infant losing the battle to live. And he begins to sing. In the pure hearted voice of a 3-year-old, Michael sings:

"You are my sunshine, my only sunshine, you make me happy when skies are gray." Instantly the baby girl responds. The pulse rate becomes calm and steady. Keep on singing, Michael. "You never know, dear, how much I love you, Please don't take my sunshine away-

The ragged, strained breathing becomes as smooth as a kitten's purr. Keep on singing, Michael. "The other night, dear as I lay sleeping, I dreamed I held you in my arms ... "Michael's little sister relaxes as rest, healing rest, seems to sweep over her. Tears conquer the face of the bossy head nurse. Karen glows.

The girl is well enough to go home! Woman's Day magazine called it "The miracle of a brother's song." The medical staff just called it a miracle. Karen called it a miracle of God's love. A few weeks later, Michael's little sister was baptized at the Panther Creek Church.

President Bush IRAQ announced Thursday that "an Iraq that can govern itself is a noble goal." But soldiers say that possibility doesn't make them lose sight of their mission. Families of soldiers here in Iowa and across the nation wonder if the announcement means their loved ones might soon come home from Iraq. But soldiers remain dedicated to their service.

Major Shannon Richardson of the Iowa National Guard's 1st Battalion 133rd Infantry, says, "You don't see soldiers with their heads hanging down. They're proud of what they've been doing.

Since April 2006 the 560 Iowa soldiers in this battalion have driven more than one million seven hundred thousands miles across Iraq.

Richardson says, "Pretty much driving the equivalent of Davenport to Council Bluffs, Iowa (1,000 miles one way) everyday all while searching for friends are invited to attend. IEDs, snipers and other types of enemy activity."

Since the group was deployed, five soldiers have been seriously injured. Two were killed. Those who remain say the support and gifts they receive from Iowa push them every day-especially now during the holidays.

Richardson says, "It's starting to look a little festive. We've got Christmas trees up, and there's some lights decorated around the camp."

He also says he looks forward to returning to his engineering job in Manchester, his wife and his seven kids.
