Sorority **Announces** Tour of New Set Homes for May 12th



Childress Answers Critics, McCutchen Inspires Crowd, Tennison Submits Goals and the "Teacher of the Year" School Board Meeting.

*Fifty-plus people crowded into the High School Library for the recent School Board Meeting. Even with extra chairs brought in, people stood packed, shoulder to accusations hurled by Mr. Monty Richards at the last meeting and subsequent 'Letter To The Editor' that appeared in the March 1st issue of the Cross Plains Review.

Childress could answer, Mr. Richards once again demanded to know why and where taxpayer money was spent, and questioned specifically about attorney's fees. Mr. Childress answered that he indeed had a written statement, and if Richards would just be patient, he would get to it.

*Mrs. Susan Holland asked if she might have the floor. She began, "There are ex-School Board members questioning as to how taxpayers money is spent." Then she addressed Mr. Richards, "That's funny. It's different





Isn't it interesting how the percentage for "chance of rain' went up from 20% to 30% to 50% to 80% — actually, to 100% reality?! I said just last week that I wished that God would bring a rain cloud out of nowhere and show the weather forecasters who's really still in charge! I was thinking of the Old Testament happening, I Kings 17-18. There had been a 3-year drought, proclaimed by God's prophet (prophet, I say, not "predictor" or "forecaster"), Elijah (17:1), mainly to show sinful King Ahab "a thing or two"! Then came the time that Elijah told Ahab, "Go up, eat and drink; for there is the sound of abundance of rain" (18:41). Elijah told his servant "go, look and see" — and there was nothing — seven times! Then, "There is a cloud, as small as a man's hand, rising out of the sea!"
