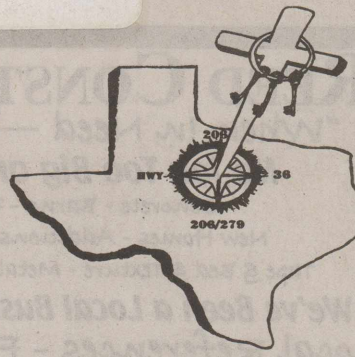

Seniors Waiting For Roof Bid Results

Council Has No Bids in Hand, BFI Tosses Out New Ideas and Two Houses Get Condemned at the June 12th City Council Meeting.

Senior Citizens Representative, **Kathy Anderson** addressed the Council by reading a written statement. The statement in its entirety follows:

At the October council I presented this council with the names of three volunteers willing to sit on the nutrition board. The mayor wrote them down and said that this council would contact them.

At the May Council meeting I asked you Mr. Mayor if you had considered those three individuals. You didn't know what I was talking about. You asked me for those three names again and I gave them to you. You again wrote them down and again said that this council would contact them. Those volunteers are Kim Crockett, Wilma Lawrence and Crystal Davis. They have yet to be contacted.

The common thread that runs through all of these women is the fact that they have demonstrated year after year that they truly care about these senior citizens.

Yesterday at the Callahan County Nutrition Board meeting. It was announced by James Nichols that Debbie Gosnell and Peg Terrell had been nominated by the city to sit on the Nutrition Board.

Peg Terrell's only association with the Senior Center or that group of seniors is when she shows up, usually after hours to sack pet food for another organization.

Debbie Gosnell has done nothing but try to get the seniors out of that building so that the city can sell it. She called it a "burden to the city" at the (nutrition) board meeting yesterday.

The volunteers whose names you have deserve better from this city. They deserve to know why they were stepped over. Two people, one a city employee, (who has done nothing but give us

grief), stated in that board meeting yesterday, that when the seniors were out of that building the City was going to sell it. I reminded her that the Nutrition Board would have to sign for it be sold and she said then it would be allowed by this City to sit until it falls down.

The other nominee expressed her opinion loudly at the December Kiwanis fund-raiser. She thinks it's all about toilet paper and paper towels. I'm here to tell you it's not. It's about people, *elderly people*.

I believe it is in the best interest of all concerned for this City to put a roof on the Senior Center, nominate two individuals to that Nutrition Board who have shown that they care and let's get on with business. Let's stop playing games at the expense of the elderly.

This council promised that they would have estimates in time for tonight's meeting. Debbie informed the board yesterday that she called 3 roofers, 2 weren't interested and 1 needed more time.

Therefore, she said she has no estimates. She also announced that this council was not going to replace the roof. When I questioned her further she began to back pedal. She first stated it as fact and then tried to retract it.

Had this council wanted to get estimates you'd have gotten three estimates. I was able to get an estimate by a reputable roofer, with references and guarantees in a matter of days.

The difference is I care. If this council cared, you would have the estimates, it's been two months since you walked through that Center and looked at the roof.

I have no clue what your motive is. Other cities large and small spend tens if not hundreds of thousands of dollars on their elderly. They fix up buildings, they build new buildings, they pay workers, they buy the food etc. they include the seniors in their city. And you can't go to the trouble to fix the roof on the building that already exists. You can't even get estimates in a timely manner.

It's time to stop playing spiteful games.

I told the Callahan County Nutrition Board at their May meeting that I was blowing the whistle on that building and the condition that this city has allowed that roof to get into and the condition that this city has allowed those Seniors to exist in.

I am asking this council to vote tonight to put a new roof on that building no matter what the cost. You've had plenty of time to get estimates and you chose not to. You've had plenty of time over the years to invest in that building and you've chosen not to. I am asking you tonight to vote to invest in that building and in those Seniors.

City Secretary Debbie Gosnell responded that while she did attend the Nutrition Board meeting, she had said nothing offensive to them, nor had she acted in an unbecoming way. She added that Peg Terrell, James Nichols and Thrennie McCrohan were there as witnesses.

Gosnell addressed Thrennie McCrohan and asked her three times if at any time during the meeting with the Nutrition Board, she had said anything that was offensive to her. McCrohan's first response was, "Well, I guess it depends on what side you're on." Her second reply was, "No, you didn't offend me."

Gosnell said her response to the question from the Nutrition Board about whether the City wanted to sell the Senior Citizens building was, "I said I would sell the building..." "Not without our permission!" interrupted Kathy Anderson." Gosnell continued, "It is our desire to be out from under this building." Gosnell reported that in the event that the Seniors agreed to go to the American Legion building, that the Center would be put up for sale. "I told them we love the Seniors and wanted what was best for them, but this building was a burden." Gosnell added, "We're trying to save costs, we're not trying to sell it out from under them."

Commissioners approve order prohibiting fireworks in unincorporated areas of county

Callahan County officials approved an order prohibiting the use of fireworks in unincorporated areas of Callahan County.

At the June 11th meeting, Commissioner Bryan Farmer made a motion to approve an Order Prohibiting Certain Fireworks in Unincorporated Areas of Callahan County. Commissioner Harold Hicks seconded and the motion passed with a 4-0 vote.

The order follows:

ORDER PROHIBITING CERTAIN FIREWORKS IN UNINCORPORATED AREAS OF CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS

A. A person commits an offense if he or she intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly detonates, ignites, or in any way uses fireworks on a county road or in the right-of-way of a county road.

B. If the landowners' permission is obtained prior thereto, persons may detonate, ignite, or use fireworks on private property in unincorporated areas of the county, as long as:

1. The person using the fireworks is not intoxicated as defined in Vernon's Act. Civ. St. Art 62011-1 (a) (2),

2. Reasonable precautions are taken concerning proximity to structures and flammable vegetation,

3. Children are adequately supervised by adults,

4. Water is readily available for extinguishing fires.

C. An offense under this order is a Class C Misdemeanor punishable by fine up to \$500.00.

Community Blood Drive scheduled for Tuesday, June 26th

A community blood drive will take place in Cross Plains on Tuesday, June 26. The Meek Blood Center Bloodmobile will be parked at First Baptist Church from 1:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m.

Meek Blood Center will bring technology to the blood drive which will allow some donors to give two units of red blood cells. Red blood cells are the blood component that is transfused most often and are needed most to prevent a blood shortage. This procedure takes approximately 20 minutes longer than a whole blood donation and uses a smaller needle. The length of time between donations is 16 weeks rather than 8 weeks.

"Those who give blood, whether it is a whole blood or a double red cell donation, will

make blood transfusions possible for patients in 15 area hospitals. These patients are totally dependent on volunteer donors to give them the gift of life. There is no artificial substitute for human blood," Baker continued.

Blood donors must be at least 17 years old and weigh a minimum of 110 pounds. There is no upper age limit. There are some restrictions regarding certain medications, medical conditions, and some travel areas outside the U.S. Those who have questions may call Meek Blood Center at 325-670-2798 or visit the website at www.meekbloodcenter.org.

Donors will receive a T-shirt and a complimentary total cholesterol test. Cholesterol results are usually available three days after the blood drive.

It was stated that trees are still available to those who are eligible. Contact Eva Fleming or Julene Franke.

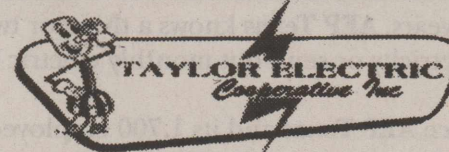

Seniors Waiting

Kathy Anderson asked Debbie if she had called the builders and gotten the bids. Gosnell responded that she had called, but hadn't gotten any bids. She added that one company had contacted her, but wasn't prepared to give her a bid at this time. She added that they said they'd have it by the next meeting.

Anderson told the Council that she had spoken with a contractor and had gotten a bid of around \$28,000 to replace the roof on the Senior Center. At that point Councilwoman Peg Terrell asked Anderson, "Did you say you'd come up with \$15,000?" Anderson responded, "No I didn't."

The bid of 28K would include taking down all the old trusses and putting up new ones. (Trusses usually include the frame work of roof rafters, bracing and ceiling joists). The bid includes a metal roof.

Mayor Ray Purvis asked if the building was strong enough structurally. Anderson answered that the contractor told her it was. Terrell told Anderson she wanted to see the bid. Anderson responded that she wanted to see what the City comes up with before she releases her bid for them to see.

Kathy Anderson asked the Council if they were going to vote then on replacing the roof. Mayor Purvis explained that they couldn't until they got bids. "When will you get them?" Anderson inquired. Purvis answered, "We were expecting to get them tonight."

Anderson stated that if the City really wanted to get bids on the roof in time for this meeting, they would have called 30 people and not just let it go because 3 people they did call didn't respond.

At that point Mark Norris asked to speak. In defense of the City's efforts to help the Senior Center he said, "Contrary to what Ms. Anderson has to say, I know how much the City has spent year after year. They have put a lot into that building, and no one can say they don't care."

By general consent the subject of the Senior Citizens Center was tabled until the meeting on July 10th.

*Allied Waste's (BFI) representative, Cynthia Dove presented the Council with a packet and requested 3 things from the City of Cross Plains. The 1st was an increase of 23%, which would make the sanitation rates jump from \$10.14 to \$12.47 per residential rate, effective August 1, 2007.

The 2nd was for the City to consider going to a Poly-Cart system instead of staying with the rear-load system. The 3rd request was for the City to take over operation of the Convenience Station.

The fact that Cross Plains residents have been receiving poor service was brought up. Ms. Dove agreed that this has been a very contentious issue. She acknowledged that there have been days where all trash was not picked up. She stated that when the trucks are full, they leave town to drive back to dump the load. Drivers have to come back an additional day besides their regular route days to collect all of the extra garbage that won't fit in their trucks.

Dove also stated that for some reason, Cross Plains has consistently had much more trash to dispose of than other cities its size. She said that the City of Comanche with a population of 4482 had disposed of 72 tons of trash per week, while Cross Plains with a population of only 1068 had 32 tons of trash in the same week. (These figures do not include the weight from the Convenience Station.)

*Dove stated that if the City would go to the Poly-Cart system, the service would improve. The downside would be that residents would be able to throw out only as much as the Poly-Carts would hold each week. If some residents needed to throw away more trash on a regular basis, they would have the option of purchasing additional

carts for a fee of about \$6.00. The upside is that the first cart is free and residents who have less trash will pay less than those who have a lot.

*The concern over the excessive amount of trash being dumped at the Convenience Station was then addressed at length. Because of the unusual amount being left there each week, Allied Waste is wondering if contractors are using the site for their disposal. If that is the case, it is against the law because that type of refuse makes it an "illegal transfer station", instead of a "citizen's convenience station". It was stressed that the need for better monitoring is a must and Allied Waste feel that the City of Cross Plains can do a much more efficient job by monitoring the site themselves.

Questions were asked by Ricky Carouth about what contractors were supposed to do about the waste they acquired. Dove explained that the State of Texas has set rules in accordance with environmental standards. Contractors are asked to use a "Roll-off" container to put that type of waste in.

Gosnell told Carouth that the City is looking into purchasing a "Roll-off" container so local contractors can have a safe place to dispose of their waste. This option would save them the cost of the rental and delivery fee.

Ms. Dove asked the Council to please go over the rest of the packet and consider making these changes. A decision will be made at the next meeting.

*Debbie Gosnell relayed the feedback she received from Tom Mann of the Council of Governments, as well as other officials she had contacted regarding the Cottonwood Control Unit's request to be given jurisdiction over acreage that falls in Cross Plains jurisdiction. It was reasoned that it would not benefit either Department and would actually end up harming both Fire Departments. The unanimous consensus was that the idea would not benefit either town and the idea was dropped.

*In Fire Chief Ricky Carouth's report he said that because of rising fuel costs and increased calls, the Department may well be over their budgeted expense for the year. In 2005 they responded to 39 calls and in 2006 they responded to 54 calls. In 2007 they have already responded to 54 calls, and the year is only half over.

The Fire Department is now running 2 trucks instead of 1 for calls. Carouth explained that even though more fuel is required, the fires are out in half the time and re-calls are less. He went on to say that since using the 2-truck system, the biggest grass fire they have had was 50 acres. He added that a fire will double in size every minute past the first 5 minutes, so it is urgent that they respond as fast as they can and use 2 trucks.

*Debbie asked the Council for Code Enforcement against 2 house structures in Cross Plains. She showed pictures of the houses and asked that both of them be condemned. It was stated that the dilapidated condition of the houses was a concern both as a health hazard and as an eye sore. The 1st house located at 717 N. Ave. A is across the street from the Housing Authority where children play. Both doors stand wide open with easy access. Evidence has been found at this location indicating people going in and out of the house. The brush and undergrowth at the rear of the property is a harbor for all types of rodents, pests and other vermin.

The 2nd house is located at 416 N. Ave. A and is in the same rundown condition. It was stated that both houses devalue the neighborhood and are potential hazards.

The City has sent out letters asking the owners to secure the houses, mow and clean up around the properties. No response had been received, so Councilman James Nichols moved to

condemn both properties.

The owners will be notified and given an opportunity to remove the structures themselves. If they don't, the City will begin proceedings to have the structures removed. A lien will then be placed against the property for the full amount of the cost. If the owners do not pay the amount, the property can then be sold. Audrey Purvis seconded the motion and it carried.

*Billy Bell requested that the Council consider allowing him to put a 14' X 56' mobile home on his property. His former home was destroyed in the firestorm of 2005. A stipulation in the City Ordinance regarding the placement of trailer houses states that anyone who lost a trailer home to the fire can replace that home with the same size or larger. His former house was 12' X 60'. It was also pointed out that Mr. Bell will be eligible to apply for a grant to build a new home. Bell has agreed to remove the mobile home from his property when the new home is built. The Council agreed for this to take place.

*Royce Marriott was granted his request to put a double gate on both ends of Ave. G, next to his property. He acknowledged that the street is a designated City street, but is not open to traffic at this time. *Gosnell said that a copy of the Consumer Confidence Report will be sent out to every resident concerning the safety of Cross Plains drinking water.

*In Open Forum Era Lee Hanke reported on the recent Barbarian Festival that took place in town and thanked everyone who supported the event.

*After Executive Session, it was reported that Doug Dugger and Stuart Sowell received their licenses in Water and Wastewater respectively. Dugger received his "D" license and Sowell his "C" license. A raise of an additional \$100.00 per month was approved for both employees.

*By General Consent, the Council agreed to set a "Special Meeting" to discuss open bids for the Add-on to City Hall. This meeting will be held on Thursday, June 21st, at 6:30 p.m.

Texas Legislature Funds Round V of the Texas Historical Courthouse Preservation Program

AUSTIN, Texas — Funding for Round V of the Texas Historical Commission's (THC) Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program is included in the appropriations bill passed in the recent legislative session. The 80th Texas Legislature included \$62 million in bond funding for the Texas Historical Commission's nationally recognized Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program. Funding will be made available after a November bond election subject to approval by voters.

The much anticipated Round V funding will permit additional Texas counties to participate in the highly successful program that restores the grandeur and architectural integrity of these historic landmarks, while also upgrading their operational systems to meet modern requirements, making them both beautiful and functional.

Since its inception in 1999, the program has assisted in the full restoration of 35 county courthouses with an additional 29 projects under construction or having finished a phase of work toward complete restoration. Established as a unique partnership, the state has contributed \$145 million and county governments have matched more than \$62 million to restore these Texas icons.

"The revitalization of these architectural treasures benefits both local and state economies," said THC Executive Director Larry Oaks.

"The courthouse restoration activity has resulted in reinvigorated downtowns and an increase in construction and other related business. These communities become desirable destinations for heritage tourists. We are grateful to the Texas Legislature for their support of this important economic development program."

A timeline with specific dates for submission of applications, deadlines for construction plans and specifications as well as new master plans from counties not previously participating in the program will be posted in late July on the THC website at www.thc.state.tx.us. The final timeline will be established by THC commissioners at their quarterly meeting in July. The THC expects to begin accepting applications this fall.

Restored courthouses throughout the state will be assured of maintaining their renewed appearance through the Texas Courthouse Stewardship Program which provides training workshops, site visits and consultations with THC architects and other professionals. The program is made possible through a generous grant from the Texas Land Title Association.

The Texas Historical Commission is the state agency for historic preservation. The agency administers a variety of programs to preserve the archeological, historical and cultural resources of Texas.

It all began about 8 years ago, soon after we moved here. I noticed the old Buy Rite building across the street from the high school and mentioned to Ellen that it would be a perfect place to open a pizza parlor with a couple of big screen TVs and a pool table or two—a place for the youth to hang out after school and on weekends.

Ellen wasn't really on-board with the idea at first. She figured she'd served enough food and cleaned enough tables in her days of waitressing in nearly every restaurant in Taylor and Callahan counties.

But slowly she warmed to the idea, agreeing that there was "nothing to do" in a small town like this and a youth center would actually be a great addition to Cross Plains.

In fact, almost everybody we shared this idea with—and believe me, we shared it with EVERYONE we talked to thought it was a good idea. So now, with Ellen in favor of the idea we began to do more than talk about it...we started actively pursuing the dream. (Truth be told, if it wasn't for Ellen, I'd be talking about this idea for the rest of my life, but Ellen got tired of the talk, took the idea and ran with it.)

We went in several directions, and with every step and every turn, we seemed to run into a dead end or a detour. But we kept going. We really believed in this idea. Other than having no roof and no back wall, and a makeshift front wall, it seemed perfect. Ellen and I knew this was the place. April Wheeler not only agreed to sell it and the adjoining property to us, she held it for us for over a year, until we finally got the money to buy it.

Almost immediately after buying it, we had the opportunity to buy Gozzy's Pizza Place—an other detour—and we took it.

So that's where we stand, with a pizza parlor, a couple of big screen TVs, a bunch of board games and half a dream waiting to become a reality in the building next door.

Slowly but surely we are turning into a youth center. During the school year we hosted Monday Night Youth Bible studies. Kids stop by and play Rock-em Sock-em Robots and Twister and watch "MythBusters" on the Discovery Channel.

We've started a movie night on Saturdays. The first movie night wasn't real successful—Bronc Dillard, my son Kiefer and I were the only ones who attended. But

attendance has increased greatly with the last two movies. Bridge to Terabithia will be showing this Saturday at 7:00. Admission is FREE, so come on by.

And hopefully, as a taste of what the future offers, we will have an air-hockey game in-house very soon.

The kids and a lots of adults are (and have been for a long time) genuinely excited about the youth center. They like what we have so far, but can hardly wait for the other building to open. A lot of people have pitched in to help—painting, cleaning, hauling, etc. Some worked for free, others for a pizza and Dr. Pepper. And Ellen and I can never truly express our gratitude for all who have helped.

So why articles about the Pool House two weeks in a row? We wanted to inform ya'll as to what we're all about and what we hope to be about in the very near future. With that in mind, on July 7th we will be hosting a Grand Opening/Fund-raiser at both buildings. A Grand Opening for the restaurant side, and a fundraiser for the game side.

Stop by for some food, drink, like music and entertainment, or just to visit. Come see and hear for yourself what's happening. You won't be pressured into donating to the fund-raiser.

We just want you to come by and see what we can all do for our kids. Main Street Pool House & Surf Shop is not about Greg and Ellen. It's not all about pizza. It's not about making money. It's about our youth. It's about a place for our young people to go; be welcomed, encouraged and loved. It's about dreaming big and living bigger. We ask fervently for your support and prayers.

Callahan County Man Sentenced for 2006 Drug Case

Kelly McLaughlin of Baird, was sentenced for a drug offense which occurred August 11, 2006. On that day, Baird Deputy Marshal Bo Semmler executed an arrest warrant on McLaughlin and found him to be in possession of 2.77 grams of methamphetamine as well as three loaded firearms. On April 5, 2007, McLaughlin entered a guilty plea to the charge and asked the court to assess his punishment. A sentencing hearing was held in Baird on May 30, 2007. 42nd District Judge John Weeks presided over the sentencing hearing. McLaughlin faced up to 10 years in prison or 10 years of probation. McLaughlin's punishment was set by the court at 6 years deferred adjudication probation with a fine of \$2,500.

The Old Farmer's Almanac: 2007 to be Another Wild Hurricane Year

JUNE 12, 2007—With the hurricane season upon us, The 2007 Old Farmer's Almanac is predicting another summer of wild storms on the East Coast.

According to The 2007 Old Farmer's Almanac, North America's oldest continuously published periodical, above-normal rainfall is predicted for the Southeast (predominantly Georgia and North and South Carolina) and Florida, especially in June and July. The Almanac also predicts that "a major hurricane" will threaten the Northeast, including much of New England as well as the area from Boston south to Richmond, Virginia (the Almanac's Atlantic Corridor region) in late September specifically, during September 27th-30th.

"Conditions indicate that we will have an active hurricane season: The Atlantic and the Gulf of Mexico are warm, the atmosphere over the Atlantic is free of volcanic ash, and the winds are favorable," says Janice Stillman, editor of The Old Farmer's Almanac. "A lot will be determined by the strength and timing of La Nina. History suggests that hurricanes are stronger and steer toward the East Coast when La Nina is present."

Protect yourself when selling and buying a car or truck

YOU'RE EN-TITLED
Here are some tips to help keep you safe:

In a private sale, BOTH the seller and buyer should go to the county tax office to transfer the vehicle title. Why?

Seller: Accompany the buyer to the county tax office to protect your good name and vehicle record. The vehicle remains in your name until a new title is applied for and processed by the county tax office. If the buyer fails to transfer the title, you may still be charged for parking fines and toll violations issued against the vehicle.

Buyer: Avoid unwanted surprises about your purchase by having the seller accompany you to the county tax office. The county tax office representative can tell you whether the title being signed over to you is correct or if it has legal or salvage issues.

Whenever you trade in a vehicle or do not accompany the buyer to the tax office, ALWAYS fill out a Vehicle Transfer Notification (FORM VTR-346).

Seller: By sending the transfer notification form to the Vehicle Titles and Registration Division, you are making sure the title record shows the date you sold the vehicle. When you do this, the buyer becomes the presumed owner of the vehicle.

Double-check the REQUIRED paperwork, especially the Application for Texas Certificate of Title, and

make copies of all documents.

Buyer/Seller: Carefully fill out and complete the Application for Texas Certificate of Title (VTR Form 130-U). Buyer will fill out most of the form but seller MUST fill in the vehicle sale price and sign the form.

Seller: You must provide the buyer with a properly signed title, which includes filling in the date of the sale and odometer reading. Keep a written record that includes the name and address of the buyer, date of sale, and full vehicle information (including VIN).

Buyer: Besides the title, ask the seller to provide you with the vehicle's Texas registration receipt, and any other supporting documents related to the vehicle, such as a release of lien or power of attorney. Keep a written record that includes the name and address of the seller, date of sale, and full vehicle information (including VIN).

TxDOT's Vehicle Titles and Registration Division oversees the titling and registration of vehicles in Texas and wants to help you protect yourself when buying and selling a car or truck.

Many sellers simply sign the back of the title and hand it over to a buyer. It's convenient but we want you to be aware this convenience comes with certain risks. Unfortunately, too many buyers fail to retitle the vehicle, leaving the seller as the recorded owner. Should the buyer engage in criminal

activity or run up parking fines, the seller is still the official owner of record and responsible for paying the fines (even if the vehicle was sold years earlier).

Remember:

- The only way the state, including law enforcement, can know who owns a vehicle is if you tell us. Simply signing the back of the title in a driveway does not change the record of ownership for the vehicle.

- Sellers need to submit a Vehicle Transfer Notification (Form VTR-346) to make sure the state record shows the car or truck was sold. You must have the name and address of the buyer to complete the form. Submitting this form is important even if you sold or traded your vehicle to a dealer.

Buyers also need to be careful. Unless you buy a new car or truck, you may not know whether the title that was signed over to you has any legal or salvage issues.

The best advice we can give both buyers and sellers is to go into the local county tax office together to transfer ownership of the vehicle. Otherwise, make sure you, the seller, file the Vehicle Transfer Notification. The little extra time it takes can provide you with a whole lot of protection.

Texas law requires buyers to title the vehicle within 20 working days of the date of sale.

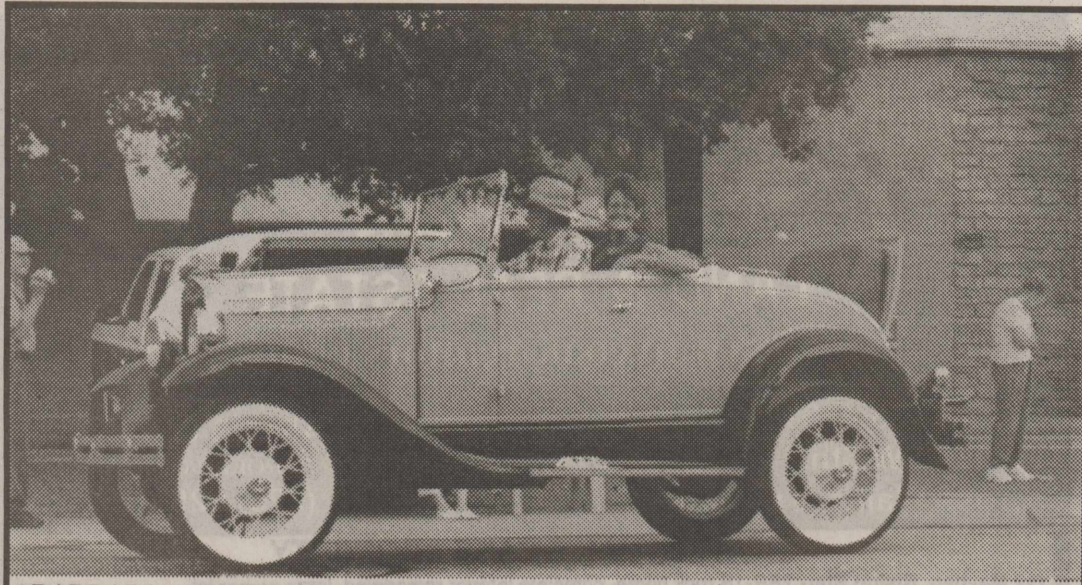

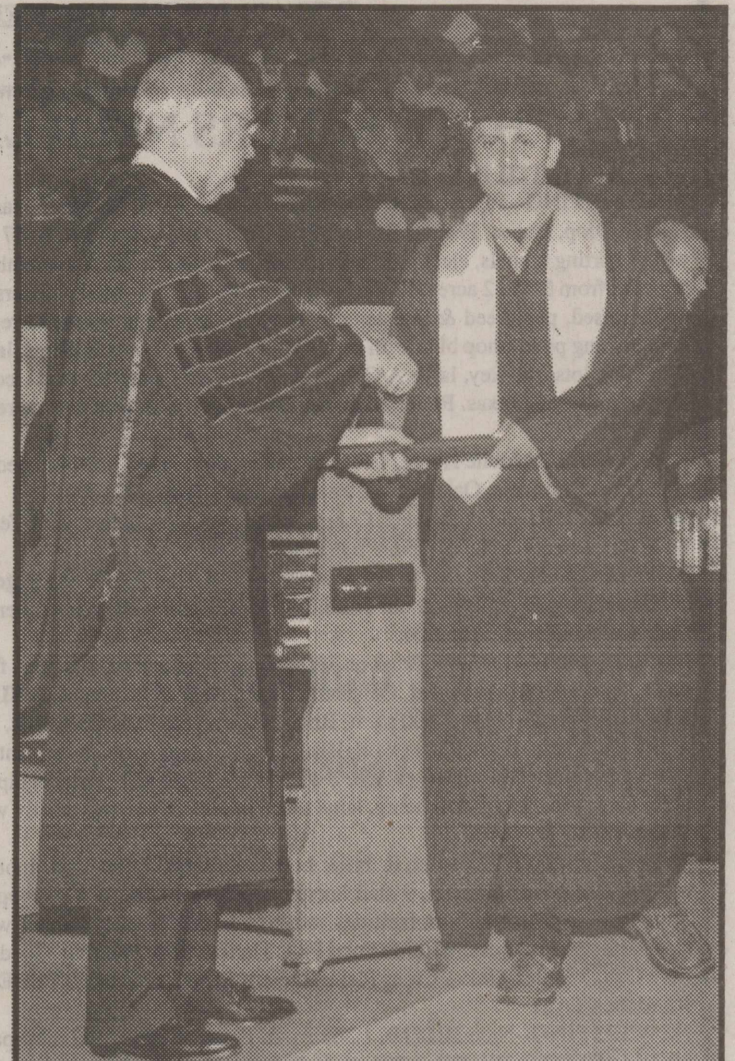

Woman sentenced for injury to a child

A Callahan County woman was sentenced for her part in causing bodily injury to a child back in September of 2003. Rebekah Hawkins was tried before a jury in March of 2007, and convicted of causing bodily injury to Terri Silas, a child. Evidence presented at the trial revealed that Hawkins and the girl's mother, Dezireigh Gideon, attempted to cut an infection out of the seven year old girl's leg, and dig the infection out. Testimony revealed that the girl never regained consciousness and died soon after at Cooks Children's Medical Center in Fort Worth. Gideon had previously pled guilty with a plea bargain that required her to testify against Hawkins. Hawkins claimed to have had no part in the procedures performed on Silas, even though it took place at her residence and under her supervision. According to testimony at trial, Hawkins was regarded as an herbalist and healer within her community. According to evidence presented for consideration during the punishment phase of Hawkins' trial, she had been removed from Hendrick Hospital for interfering with the treatment of some of their other patients during September of 2004. After being convicted of injury to a child, Hawkins faced a possible sentence of up to ten years in prison. Hawkins elected to have her punishment assessed by the judge rather than the jury, and on May 31st, the court pronounced her sentence. 42nd District Judge John Weeks sentenced Hawkins to three years probation.


