The Cross Plains ISD's Property Values Increase by **Over \$7 Million**

Property values for 2007 in the City of Clyde, Clyde CISD and Callahan County saw large increases over 2006, according to Callahan County Chief Appraiser

Barry presented the 2007 property value totals for the seven taxing entities appraised by the Callahan County Appraisal District late last week.

Callahan County reported 2007 property values stood at \$451,800,258, an increase of \$52,479,298 over 2006 property values. He said 2006 property values in the county totalled \$379,320,960.

Barry said the increase in property values can be attributed to housing values, personal property increases and higher oil and gas values this year. Barry said the price of a barrel of oil in Callahan County was valued at \$65 per barrel and natural gas was valued at \$8.00 per BTU.

Barry said the county will not receive any increase in property values associated with the Lone Star Wind Farm until the 2008

Barry reported the City of Baird had \$37,934,900 in taxable value in 2007, an increase of \$3,277,660 over 2006. He reported the City of Baird had property values of \$34,657,240. Barry said the higher property value in the City of Baird was associated with the T&P Industrial Park where the new FedEx building is located.

Barry reported the City of Clyde had taxable values of \$103,365,170 in 2007, an increase of \$11,259,140 in property value. The chief appraiser said the City of Clyde's taxable value in 2006 was \$92,106,030. Barry said the City of Clyde's increase in property values is

Peg Terrell asked if the City did help, would it come out of the City's Fund. Gosnell replied, "We will donate time and equipment, we own them that. Porcious (Potter) can have fund-raisers for the materials."

The City Council voted unanimously to supply the equipment and manpower, but will not supply any additional money for

the project or the cleanup. *In Open Forum, Meals on wheels volunteer, Kim Crockett asked to speak. She praised the Meals on Wheels program as a wonderful service to the Senior Citizens and expressed that she very much enjoyed being a part of their lives. She continued with, "I want to present to you some questions regarding the repairs of the Senior Citizens building, that I think need answers."

She said she realized that they couldn't answer all of the questions at that time, but to please consider responding at a time in the near future. The pointed inquiries about the fate of the Senior Citizens building follows: *What is the hold up in fixing

the roof of the building? *What is the reason behind not

fixing the building? *Have you presented your reason to the Callahan County Nutrition Board and the citizens of Cross Plains?

*Are there decisions being made behind closed doors that have to do with this building?

*Are there alternative plans

He replied some sewage had already in the works for this building?

> *Is some potential business pursuing the selling or use of the building?

*Does the EDC already have plans for this building and trying to push the program out of that building?

*Does the City Council and the City Mayor have any idea what your City Manager is doing?

*Can you honestly say that you (City Council, Mayor and City Manager) are conducting yourself in a manor that is trustworthy?

Crockett concluded with, "If these questions are not answered soon, then the people will put their own answers to these questions. It is time for each Council member to speak up and vote: your voice and not do what the person next to you tells you to do. I want to know the facts, and so do the people of this Community." Crockett thanked the Council for letting her speak.

*Judy Luter then addressed the Council. She said that the day before, at the Callahan County Nutrition Board, Peg Terrell and Debbie Gosnell proposed that a new metal building be built on the parking lot adjacent to the Senior Citizen Center.

"The Seniors want to remain in the building that they're currently in. If they're forced to move because the City chooses not to repair the roof, I think a Committee comprised of 5 citizens chosen by the Senior Citizens and 5 chosen by the City Council would be the best solution to honor the Senior Citizens." She suggested that the building be completed within 1 year and that none of the people on the Committee should be related to, work for or be an officer of the City or the Nutrition Board. Luter's proposed contract can be seen at City Hall.

Marshall Stroope got up to speak. He was on the agenda to speak later when they got to item #9, but jumped ahead of his assigned slot. People there noted that he was speaking out of turn, but the Mayor agreed that he

could go ahead and speak. Stroope stated that there was some concern about possible asbestos being under the tile floor at the Senior Center. He went on to elaborate that if this were the case, special asbestos abatement teams would have to be brought in to handle and dismantle the floor. Mayor Purvis volunteered, "Asbestos is very expensive to

Stroope also mentioned that the AC unit and lighting needed to be taken into consideration. He stated that the Callahan County Nutrition Board had considered dropping Cross Plains from its Meals on Wheels program because of lack of funds, the building itself and concerns over the liability of the ceiling tiles falling out and hitting the Seniors. Stroope asked, "How much can the City stand (spend) on that building to make it right?"

Senior Citizens Advocate, Kathy Anderson asked, "Who said there was asbestos in the building?" Stroope shot back that she had. Anderson countered that somebody had brought up the question, but she certainly didn't







*Shane Arrington from Therm-O-Tech gave an informative presentation that included a bid packet with customized brochures and several close-up shots of the roof and its problems. He stated that each rain we had ran essentially straight into the building. Anderson asked if the roof structure was ok. He answered, "The structure is actually fine. I was on the roof today and looked all over the building.'

Arrington explained the advantages of using this space-age polyurethane material that was developed by NASA and used on the space shuttles. "We put it on over the existing roof structure. It fills the roof like a shower pan. It fills all holes and cracks," stated Arrington.

It is applied with a big paint pump and had a rubberized white topcoat that keeps the sun off of the foam. He added that it's lightweight, only 4 oz. per square foot, so it doesn't add weight to the roof structure. It's not flammable and won't sustain flame. Arrington affirmed, "This can restore a building that would typically be done away with." He thanked the Council and left samples.


