"The Miracle of an Obedient Heart at the I-35 Bridge"

The following is a very special account of a miracle that happened the day of the recent bridge disaster in Minnesota. This is the testimony of a young man named Matthew who is not a stranger to the voice of God. The part of his story that is most remarkable was the fact that his obedience to God ended up saving the lives of many others, who otherwise could've just ended up another statistic in this tragedy.

Matthew's account made me wonder: do we ever stop to think of the lives that are affected by our obedience to the Lord? Not just our own-though we know the Bible says blessings come with obedience to God-but also the lives of those around us. Every one of us is affected by another's actions...but can we actually save lives (even unknowingly) just by doing what we know God has asked us to do?

meeting on August 21st, the Athletic Code of Conduct was approved. It was stressed that, "Playing sports at Cross Plains ISD is not a right, but a privilege".

High Standards

This year, the expectations of student-athletes will be held to a higher standard than the general district standards and policies. The Athletic Code of Conduct states, "Student-athletes should conduct themselves in such a manner that brings credit to themselves, their teammates, their family, their community and to Cross Plains ISD. Athletes should never engage in an activity or action that can be construed as inappropriate for a Cross Plains athletic team member."

Student-athletes will be subject to random drug testing. If found in violation of drug or alcohol use, there will be 1st, 2nd and 3rd

offense consequences. These These higher standards allow the range in severity from extended hours of community service, local drug/alcohol rehabilitation, suspension from extra/co-curricular activities, to not being allowed to travel with, or even be on the sidelines of games.

Running 'halos' is another consequence. One 'halo' consists of the athlete running one complete trip from goal post to goal post and back to starting point, while carrying a tire above his head in 2 minutes or less. Athletes caught using tobacco products will be required to complete 25 'halos' within one week from the time of the infraction.

And finally, if the athlete persists in violating the drug and alcohol policies, the penalty will be removal from the Cross Plains ISD Athletic **Program for life.**

The Code affirms, "Athletes are to be held to higher standards.

(Brooklyn Park, Minnesota) ----Wednesday, August 1st, seemed to be a day like any other in the St. Paul, Minneapolis area. But at 6:05 p.m.—in the midst of rush hour traffic-the busy Interstate Bridge that joined I-35 with the city of Minneapolis suddenly broke apart and fell into the Mississippi River.

There have been many accounts already, which have pointed to the grace and protection of God in the midst of such tragedy...due to the construction on the bridge, the traffic was not at the normally full flow, or speed.

There was a train riding underneath the bridge at the time, which may have stopped some of the collapse. And then the school bus, filled with 50 childre that rode the concrete on the way down during the collapse, and didn't tip over-all the children were saved.

And then there is Matthew's testimony of God's protection. What happened to Matthew (last name withheld) on the day of the bridge collapse is nothing short of miraculous and amazing!

"God told me to 'STOP!"" (I was 100 feet away from the bridge).

"He said, 'You need to stop right there.' I said, 'Lord, there are cars behind me.' (There were about 100 people in the line of traffic behind him, and many had begun honking their horns at him.) waiting, thanking the Lord, because it could've been me on that bridge. Then people came up to me and said, 'Thank you.'" "I got out and looked from the side (at the collapse)...it was traumatic seeing what happened. And the police told me to go back


in my car and turn around." Editor: I asked Matthew what he was thinking at the moment he saw the bridge begin to break... "I was realizing that the Lord is awakening (His people) and saying, 'Listen to Me, you need to listen to Me. 'I realized that if I (hadn't) listened to Him, I would've gotten on that bridge and took a ride."

"After that, I called my friend and told him I couldn't pick him up because the bridge broke through. Then I went to the Holy Spirit conference (that was happening nearby) and worshipped the Lord!"

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



Improve TAKS scores across the system in Grades 3-11. We made great strides with TAKS scores this year. The elementary was Recognized and Secondary was Acceptable. Overall as a district our Reading/ELA scores rose 6%, while our Writing scores improved 21%, Social Studies improved 1%, Mathematics improved 8%, while Science improved 3%. At the elementary campus, Reading/ELA improved by 3%, but Mathematics declined by 4%. At the secondary level, Reading/LEA improved 9%, Writing improved 9%, Social Studies improve 1%, and what I am the most proud of is Mathematics improved 16%. We need to work very hard on the secondary Science where we had a 4% decline. Mr. Loyless and I have already discussed this issue and discussed this issue and discussed improvements. Our special education students improved, also. The district wide results showed an improvement of 12%, but the secondary improved 28%. I think we are now headed in the right direction. 4.) Improve the attendance in * all grades. With the employment of Mrs. Harrison to work directly on attendance and PEIMS, I feel attendance will improve. If attendance improves by 1% we will see an increase in our ADA of 4 students. 5.) Have a shared vision to involve parents and community in the total education and overall development of each child. With the development of the new Student Development Committee and other means of involving parents, we will have better communication with the community. Not only will we be


able to communicate better to the public, but also the public will

communicate better with us. 6.) Implement a highly competitive curriculum based on the needs of all students. Separating the high school English classes into AP and regular English will help all students. We have started Reading classes at the Junior High level for slower students that might be lacking reading skills.

The Math labs in Junior High seem to be working well, so we will continue the use of these labs. We have added a Career Investigations class in the 8th grade curriculum. This will allow students to have a better understanding of what classes they need to take in high school to pursue their career choice. 7.) Expand the curriculum to include more dual credits and AP classes. Mr. Loyless and I have discussed with Cisco Junior College about new dual credit offerings and also how they will present the classes to the students. In the master schedule, we have added several new Pre-AP and AP classes from Junior High through High School. 8.) Continue to improve existing facilities and the possibility of adding new features. We have made tremendous improvements on our facilities from adding new flooring in all buildings, painting most of the classrooms and offices, to adding a new surface to the track facility. There are other areas, which have been studied for improvements, such as the tennis courts, parking lots, bus shed, and several small items. At the present time a construction firm is gathering information on the construction of a band hall facility between the high school and elementary. This is a free service that will provide valuable information for us to make future decisions. 9.) Expand testing program for non-TAKS grades including 2nd grade. As mentioned earlier, I have requested in the new budget a program "Waterford" for elementary. This program will be for K-2 students. The program will prepare students for the 3rd grade TAKS test and provide testing at an earlier age.





Disaster Assistance available for small businesses in Callahan, surrounding counties

Small, non-farm business in 64 Texas counties may now apply for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small **Business** Administration (SBA). These disaster loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by adverse weather conditions throughout the state, announced Alfred E. Judd, Director of SBA's Disaster Field **Operations** Center-West.

Small business in the following primary and neighboring counties may apply for working capitol loans to offset economic losses that are attributable to the impact of the following weather condition and incident dates in each disaster.


Primary Counties: Callahan, Concho, Dawson, Lubbock, Pecos, and Upton.

Neighboring Counties: Borden, Brewster, Brown, Coleman, Crane, Crockett, Crosby, Eastland, Ector, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Glasscock, Hale, Hockley, Howard, Jeff Davis, Jones, Lamb, Lynn, Martin, McCulloch Menard Midland Reagan, Reeves, Runnels, Schliecher, Shackelford, Taylor, Terrell, Terry, Tom Green, and Ward. Incident type: Excessive snow, freeze, and frost. Incident date: 4/6/2007 through 4/8/2007. Deadline: 3-31-2008

Small business may qualify for Economic Injury Disasters Loans (EIDLs) of up to \$1.5 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expense which could have been met had the disaster not occurred. "Eligibility for these loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 4%, a maximum term of 30 years, and are restricted to small business without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship," Judd said. By law, SBA makes EIDLs available when the 4.S. Secretary of Agriculture designates an agriculture disaster. Secretary Mike Johanns declared these disasters at the request of Governor Rick Perry.

Business primarily engaged in farming or ranching are not eligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural. enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency (FSA) about the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) assistance
