Thanks to an Energy Star sales tax holiday May 24-26, Texans will not only pay less for items designed to use less energy, they will also enjoy the cost-saving benefits of lower utility bills. The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) encourages all Texans to take advantage of the compounded housing costs. <br> Energy Star appliances translate into lower housing costs," said Michael Gerber, TDHCA Executive Director. "The Energy Star sales tax holiday will help Texans save money by lowering the costs of energy efficient appliances as well as lowering their monthly energy costs." <br> The Energy Star Sales Tax Holiday applies to the following appliances and household equipment: air conditioners priced less than $\$ 6,000$, ceiling fans, dehumidifiers, dishwashers, incandescent and fluorescent light bulbs, programmable thermostats, refrigerators priced less than $\$ 2,000$ and clothes washers, but not clothes dryers.
