get the agreement in writing, according to a Texas A\&M AgriLife Exten sion Service law specialist. Tiffany Dowell-Lashmet recently gave an overview of grazing leases at the 2015 Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association Convention in Fort Worth
"Sadly, the most common situation is two guys in a pasture who come to an oral agreement", she said. "Some of you may not think you
need a written lease, but you will wish you had one if there is ever a problem. Additionally, in order to be legally enforceable, any real estate lease for a year or more has to be in writing."
Lashmet advised to have limits in a lease. For example, if you lease property, Dowell said be clear on what you are leasing.
If the lease is for grazing and you want to reserve hunting rights,
