## Tom Windham To Participate in Calf Scramble at Houston

Tom Windham, Baird 4-H Club member, has been selected to participate in the World's Greatest Calf Scramble at the Saturday, March 4th, 1:30 p. m. performance of the Houston Livestock Show Rodeo in Houston's famed Astrodome.

Contestants come from every county in the state and are selected by the 4-H and FFA leaders in each area. The boys are guests of the show at the performance in which they participate. Dates of the show are Feb. 22 through March 5.

When the Houston show held its first scramble in 1942, 24 calves were awarded. It was not dreamed that the project would result in putting some 4,000 boys into the cattle business in the next 25 years.

In 1944, 112 boys scrambled for 56 calves in 5 contests. Each year the calf scramble activities increased, and more and more sponsors stepped forward.

When the calf scramble contestant wins, his work has just begun. With his cash certificate he purchases the best animal he can find. He must then care for the calf, furnish monthly records to the Houston Livestock Show and his sponsors, and return his animal to the show the next year.

## "WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

**WITH MALICE TOWARD NONE**  
"Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice."  
—Ephesians 4:31

On September 7, 1864, a group of Negroes visited Abraham Lincoln at the White House. They gave him a copy of the Bible. He said, "In regard to this great Book, I have but to say, it is the best gift God has given to man to use." A man who used scripture as frequently as Abraham Lincoln did must have been an ardent reader of the Bible. The second inaugural address was probably his most notable so far as scripture use is concerned. The statement, "With Malice Toward None," has much biblical background. Here is what Lincoln said in that address:

"With malice toward none; with charity for all; with firmness in the right, as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in; to bind up the nation's wounds; to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his orphans and widows, - to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves, and with all nations."

1. HE URGED THAT ALL MALICE BE PUT AWAY. Malice is jut over against charity, over against firmness in the right, over against the truth that God gives us to see the right. We have gone through two wars world-wide since that day, and Lincoln's emphasis has even more weight today. The air-waves and headlines are fraught with malice every moment. Our prayer should be that God will give us eyes to see the firmness of the right in our modern world.

2. LINCOLN PLEADED TO BIND UP THE NATION'S WOUNDS. He meant caring for those who borne the battle. They are the ones who suffer the most, the widows and orphans, and wounded. There are many even today who are wounded

because of malice and disregard for right and righteousness.

3. HE URGED THE ACHIEVEMENT OF A JUST AND LASTING PEACE. Look at the foresight of the man. Though it was an internal war, a just and lasting peace "among ourselves and with all nations." Is not the need of the world today just as great, that God will give to see the right, avoid malice, and seek the truth of God as revealed in Jesus Christ, our Lord. Let us so make our prayer.

Celebrate 91st

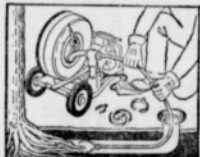

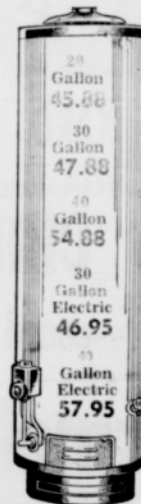
