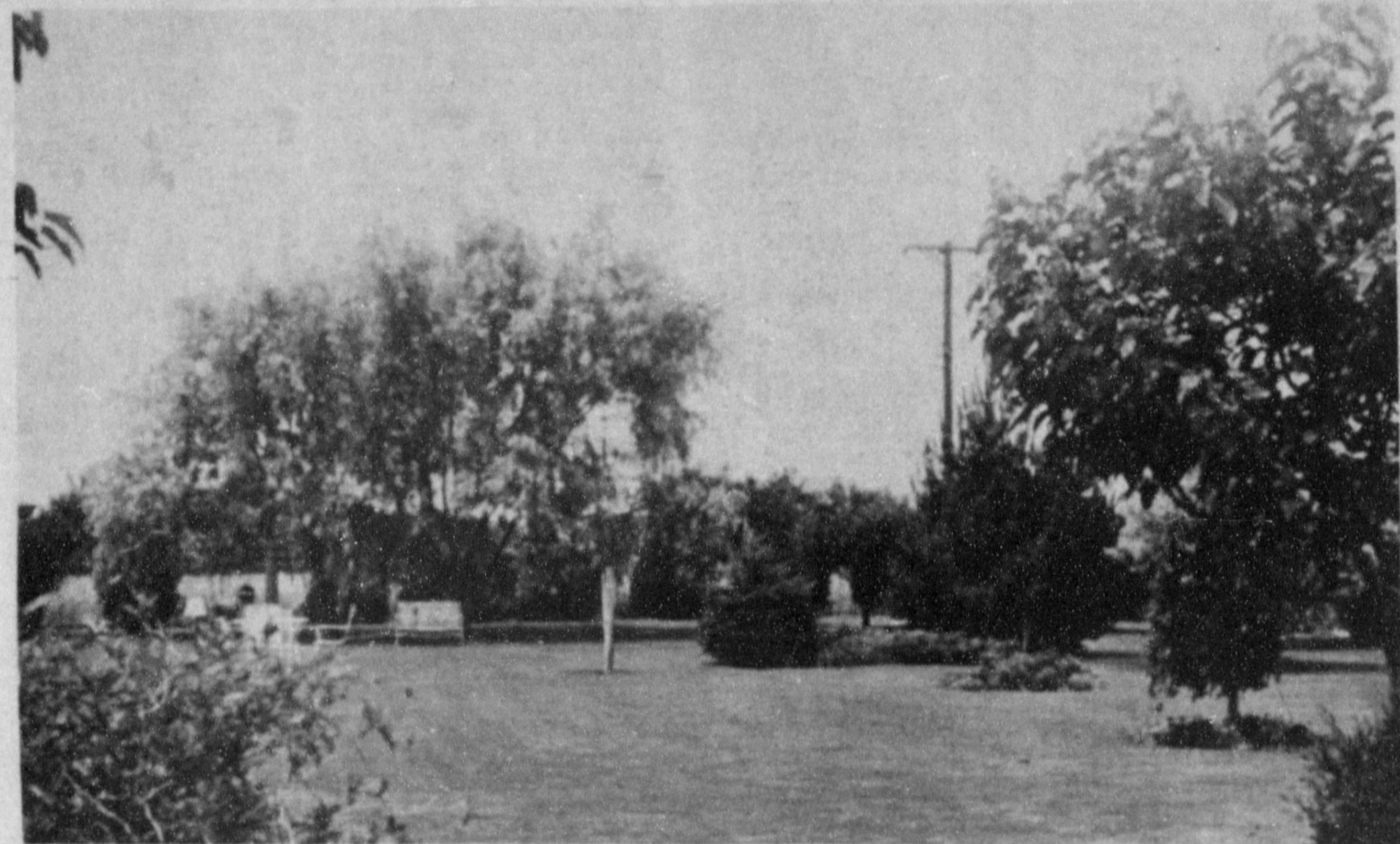

Sen. H.J. (Doc) Blanchard of Lubbock has released the following statement to the citizens of Senatorial District 28 giving his personal account of the steps voters may take to change the liquor control laws in Texas.

"As your Senator, I believe it is important for you, as conscientious voters, to know exactly what has happened to date in the Legislature and what will be required to happen in the future if liquor control laws are to be changed in Texas so that liquor may be sold by the drink in the state.

"You, as a voter, have complete power and will make the final decision as to whether liquor by the drink is sold in your precinct ever."

"To begin with, the Texas Senate and House of Representatives have this session passed Senate Joint Resolution 10. This resolution provides that an amendment to the constitution will be submitted to the voters on Nov. 3, 1970.

"This amendment would au-

thorize the legislature to pass legislation that would amend the present Liquor Control Act (existing law) so that mixed alcoholic beverages could be sold on a local option election basis.

"Those three words 'local option election' are the secret of your authority. Only after a local option election in your

Astronaut Answers Petition

Earlier this year after the completion of the Apollo VIII flight around the moon, adverse comments were registered with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration with respect to the reading of the bible verses by the crew.

A petition was circulated around Muleshoe which stated that "We the undersigned, appreciate and commend NASA and the crew of Apollo 8 for the reading of the first verses of Genesis during the orbit of the moon on Christmas Eve. We don't claim they should be required to pray or read the Bible, but believe they have every right to express their religious feeling and further feel that there could not have been a more appropriate time or place to read of the creation of our 'Great Earth'."

The petition was sent to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration Manned Spacecraft Center, Houston. A reply to the petition has been sent to Bratcher Motor Company; Dear Friends; Many thanks for your congratulations extended on the successful completion, on Page 2, Col. 4

location could liquor by the drink be sold and only if the majority approved.

"All of Texas will vote on the constitutional amendment Nov. 3, 1970. The ballot submitted to each qualified voter will have printed on it the following words for voter approval or disapproval.

"Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

"If the majority of voters approve this amendment, the Texas Legislature could pass legislation amending the Liquor Control Act to provide for sale of liquor by the drink on a local option election basis.

"However, just because the amendment is passed in the general election, does not mean that the Legislature must pass a bill to change the present liquor control laws. The amendment is not self-enforcing and it is not mandatory. The Legislature could decide not to approve a bill that would change the present law.

"The amendment on the general election ballot provides the people of Texas a method of expression. Passage of the amendment would tell the members of the Legislature that the majority want a change in liquor laws and would give the Legislature authority to act.

"Voting on the amendment would be step one in a three-step voter procedure.

"Step two would be the Legislature writing a bill that would simply change the present Liquor Control Act to provide for sale of mixed drinks on a local option election basis. The Legislature meets in regular session, on Page 2, Col. 7

Any child who has moved into the Muleshoe I.S.D. since January 1, 1967 and whose parents are employed in agriculture or a related processing activity is eligible to attend.

Preschool children must be six years old on or before September 1, 1969. Other students may be in grades one through eight.

Bailey County 4-H Horse Show will be June 7 in the Muleshoe Roping Club Arena starting at 10 a.m. Entries are open to any youth up to 19 years of age.

Entry blanks may be picked up at the County Agent office at 306 West Second Street.

All horses must be owned by contestant or his immediate family.

Rules are as follows: No stallions will be allowed to compete; entry fees will be \$3 per contestant; all horses must be shown at halter and contestants may use only one horse in all events; registered and grade horses will be shown together at halter; state rules set forth by Texas Agricultural Extension Service will apply to all events; Judge's decision will be final; entry blank must be signed by parent or guardian; and contestants cannot be over 19 years of age.

The Bailey County 4-H Horse Show will have the following events: halter classes, Mares both boys and girls, all ages; Gelding, both boys and girls.

Performance events: Western pleasure, -all ages boys and girls; reining, all ages, boys and girls; pole bending, all ages, boys and girls; barrel race, all ages boys and girls.

Trophies will be awarded first place in Halter and Performance events. Ribbons awarded second through fifth place in each event.

A trophy will be awarded to the club accumulating the most points in the entire contest.

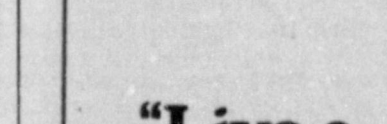

Watson left Tuesday morning with a group from Canyon to attend the training camp at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma this summer.

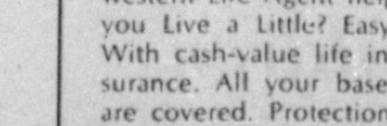
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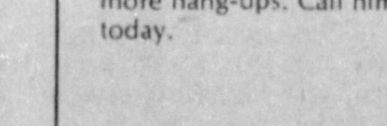


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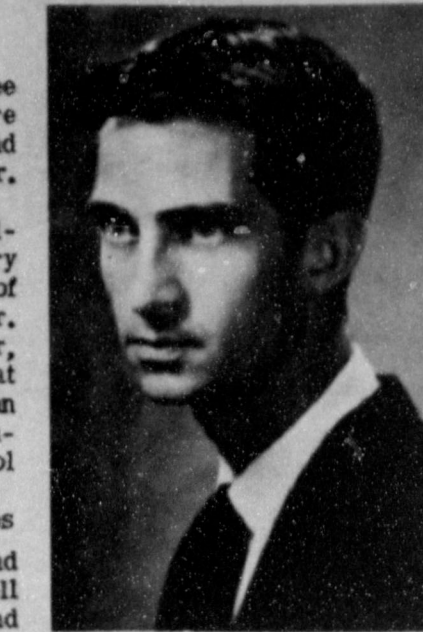

Capital Credit Checks Returned by Co-op

The Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association returned \$139,105.27 in capital credit checks to member users May 29th.

There were 2400 checks totaling \$107,014.22 which went to people who were members of the organization and used its services during 1957. Then 2762 checks in the amount of \$23,091.05 which is 1/4 of the net margins of operations for 1966, went to members taking service that year.

State chartered - Internal Revenue Service approved - Electric Cooperatives, being non-profit corporations, do not make a net profit for their organization. Any money taken in over and above the cost of operations, belongs to the members, and is assigned back to them according to their prorated usage each year. The member is issued a capital credit certificate for his share of this money. The capital is held in a reserve fund for emergencies or to insure the continuance of operations. Then when the Board of Directors determines that the cooperative is financially able, the members capital is returned to him.
