Department stores are among the largest and most consistent of newspaper advertisers.

The typical small city department store spends more than 75 per cent of its advertising budget for newspaper space. In many instances, the amount exceeds 90 per cent.

A study of advertising practices of department stores in cities with population under 40,000 was recently completed by Prof. Joseph L. White of Delta State College.

Among other things, Mr. White attempted to learn why the stores gave preference to various advertising media. Typical among the answers received from the department store managers were:

"There is only one local newspaper and it is read by everyone."

"The newspaper reaches the people we want to reach, who have good credit and can afford quality goods."

"Because people look for our ads."

"People pay more attention to newspaper advertising."

"In this particular city, people watch the paper for specials. What they see means more than what they hear."

"Retention."

"Proven customer response."

"It is the shopping medium of the upper income group."

In summation, the statements all really mean the same thing: The newspaper brings in the best customers at the least cost. And, perhaps even more significantly, according to Mr. White's findings, the stores which spent a higher percentage of gross income on advertising did relatively more business than stores which spent proportionately less on advertising.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WORK PROGRAM TO GET UNDERWAY

In a Director's meeting Monday morning, with 13 Directors present, projects were discussed for study and action in 1967.

It was suggested a Retail Committee be appointed to coordinate retail activities, and a steering committee was appointed by President Godfrey composed of Ray Black and Clifton Burfield. The Committee was charged with setting up a meeting of all retail merchants, in the immediate future, to determine a program of some positive and cooperative effort to bring attention to Baird as a shopping center and publicize goods and services offered by local merchants.

The urgency of improving the present hospital facility and possible expansion was discussed, and the President was authorized to appoint a Committee to meet with Hospital and County officials regarding the start of planning and determination of financing for this project. The Committee is composed of Curtis Sutphen, Margie Ray, Bess Driskill, James Eubanks and Dick McNabb.

The Board urged the cleaning and clearing of vacant lots and

delapidated structures over the city, and pledged their support of our City Council in the investigating and carrying forward this important project.

Judge Jim C. Langdon Guest Speaker For CofC Banquet

Guest speaker for the Baird Chamber of Commerce Banquet, March 24, at 7 p. m., will be Judge Jim C. Langdon, Texas Railroad Commissioner. Living in Austin at the present time, he was born Dec. 14, 1914 at Stephenville. He attended public schools at Stephenville and Cleburne, also attended John Tarleton College and the University of Texas.

He received his law degree in 1940, and in August of the same year became a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, serving both in the United States and South America. In 1943, Judge Langdon obtained military leave from the FBI and entered the U.S. Navy. He served in both the Atlantic and Pacific.

Judge Langdon began his legal career in 1946, when he began practicing law in the West Texas town of McCamey. In 1954 he was appointed Judge of the 112th District Court and was thereafter elected for a two-year term, but resigned as District Judge on Jan. 1, 1959, to accept appointment as Chief Justice of the El Paso Court of Civil Appeals. Two years later he was elected without opposition to a six year term on that court, where he served until being appointed to the Railroad Commission in May, 1963. In 1964, he was elected to the office over two opponents and is now serving his first elected term in that office.

He is married and has five children, four sons and a daughter.

Large Crowd Attend Banquet

A large crowd of Young People and Intermediates attended the Annual Sweetheart Banquet held at the First Baptist Church in Baird last week.

Roman Holiday was theme for the banquet, and Fellowship Hall took on the effects of a sidewalk cafe.

Master of Ceremonies was Eric Lovell. Gary Franke gave the acknowledgements. Vocalist Sheila Wise, sophomore student at Hardin-Simmons University, sang a number of songs in Portuguese. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wise, missionaries in Brazil.

Speaker for the evening was Rev. Carroll Green, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

An out-of-court settlement was reached by representing attorneys Wednesday morning in two damage suits, which were combined, and tried before a 42nd District Court jury here, involving a Dec. 11, 1965 wreck in which Mrs. D. M. Cogdell, wealthy Snyder Philanthropist, was killed.

Testimony in the case began Monday and continued until Wednesday morning before a settlement was reached, and the jury was dismissed by Presiding Judge J. R. Black.

In the larger of the two suits, two North Carolina truck drivers, J. B. Adams and Charles Braswell, and the McGee Trucking Service of Raleigh, N. C., were suing the Cogdell Estate and the Porter-Horton Construction Co. of Longview for damages totaling about \$135,000 before settlement for an undetermined amount was agreed

upon by attorneys in the case. Settlement is to be paid by the Longview firm and Floyd West Insurance Co., with whom Mrs. Cogdell's car was insured.

In the other suit, Mrs. Cogdell's daughter, Mrs. Jonisue Bowden of Snyder, executrix of the Cogdell Estate, was suing the Longview firm for damages totaling \$19,000, and received a judgment against that firm for \$1,500 as a result of the settlement.

The Cogdell Estate was represented by James Paul Shanks of Baird, Bob Hanna of Abilene and Bill Griffis of San Angelo. Bryan Bradbury of Abilene represented the North Carolina interests, and Marvin Spain, also of Abilene, was attorney for the Longview firm.

The wreck, which occurred 1 1/2 miles west of Putnam on U. S. Highway 80, involved the North Carolina truck, which was east-bound, and the Cogdell car which Mrs. Cogdell was driving and in which Mrs. Bowden was a passenger, and a truck of the Longview firm, both of which were westbound.

During trial testimony, the Cogdell Estate alleged the Longview truck struck the rear of the Cogdell car, forcing it into the North Carolina truck.

Ruben Fletcher Beck, 37, who was driving the Longview firm's flatbed truck-trailer from Dallas to El Paso, said he overtook the Cogdell car while driving about 35-40 miles per hour, and followed the car for about two miles.

Beck said that suddenly the car swerved into the North Carolina refrigerator van truck, then bounced back into his truck, which in turn knocked it back into the North Carolina truck.

Beck's testimony was repudiated by Dr. William H. Tonn, Jr., a Houston consulting engineer specializing in auto accidents, who said that the condition of the wreckage of the three vehicles led him to conclude the car was hit from the rear and knocked into the North Carolina truck. He estimated the speed of the Longview truck was 5-10 miles per hour faster than the car at the time of impact, and that the impact was straight on.

He further stated that the North Carolina truck would have been out of the way by the time it was supposed to have been hit a second time by the Cogdell car, as testified by Beck.

Mrs. Bowden said she was asleep at the time of the mishap.

Funeral was held at 3 p. m. Sunday in the Eolion Church. Burial was in Battle Creek Cemetery.

She married J. H. McKelvain Dec. 6, 1888 in Oklahoma. They farmed in Stephens County until his death in 1932.

Carry Your Check Book; Checks Required To Carry Magnetic Ink

Federal Reserve officials in Dallas have announced that, effective September 1, 1967, the Reserve Banks will no longer process checks which do not carry the magnetic ink symbols of the writer's bank. They pointed out the 86 per cent increase in check volume since the start of the Magnetic Ink Character Recognition Program eight years ago and to the fact that more than 1.1 million checks are being handled daily at the four offices of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas.

High-speed computers are being used to sort checks at more than 60,000 per hour, but these computers require the magnetic ink symbols in order to function. Fed officials point out that checks without the symbols must be handled on low-speed machines and that only 1,500 per hour can be accommodated on such machines.

Of prime importance to the general public is the proposed withdrawal of counter checks and changed checks. Banks are cooperating fully in reprinting their Transit symbols on checks they provide for their customers. However, some super markets and drug and department stores, as well as churches and other organizations, provide counter drafts which bear no magnetic ink symbols.

The new restriction on handling nonreprinted checks will mean slower collection for this type of check and a much more costly collection process. In effect, the nonreprinted check will be handled as a noncash collection, meaning that credit cannot be given the receiver of the check until it has been completely processed through the drawer's bank.

Federal Reserve officials with the cooperation of commercial banks, are mounting a special campaign to educate the general public on the need to carry their personalized or preprinted checks. The program is also aimed at requesting stores to

withdraw all counter checks and to encourage stores to refuse to cash checks which do not have the magnetic ink symbols.

The Dallas Bank officials indicate that the Eleventh Federal Reserve District has the lowest reprinting ratio of the twelve Federal Reserve Districts and that the problems this creates are especially acute in the Southwest. They are appealing to the public and businessmen throughout the area to support this campaign to eliminate counter checks, changed checks and nonreprinted items of all types. The general public will benefit by the more efficient collection of checks, not only by fewer changes for processing, but also by more rapid and effective payments. Stores have long known that their largest check losses come from counter checks, and a recent move by one company to refuse counter check handling cut such losses by more than 80 percent.

In your own self-interest, as well as the interests of a more effective financial system, the banking officials are asking that you carry your own checks, do not ask for counter checks, do not borrow a friend's personalized check, and refuse to cash checks which do not have the "funny numbers" on the bottom.

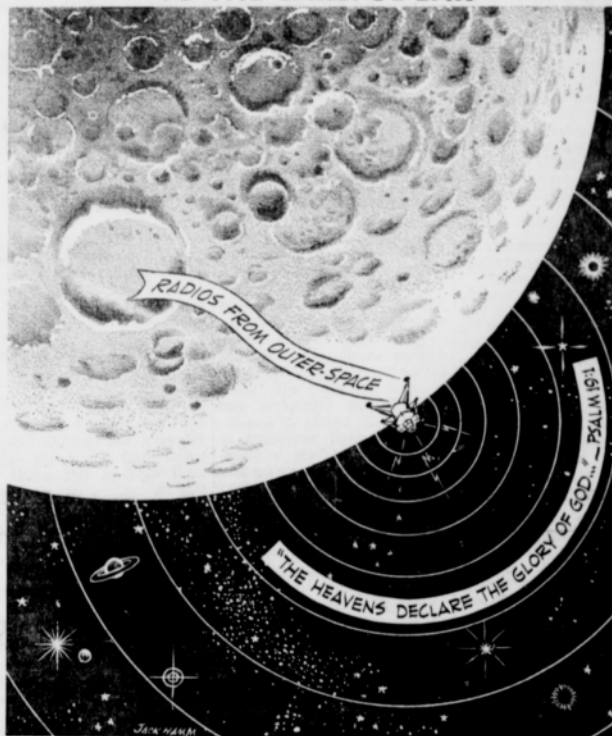

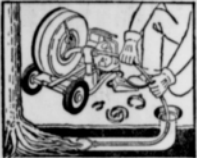

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"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

Bible Thought: "Knowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law, but by the faith of Jesus Christ, even we have believed in Jesus Christ, that we might be justified by the faith of Christ."

(Galatians 2:16)

Abraham is a good example of justification by faith. Our Bible thought shows that Christians are justified by faith in Jesus Christ. "Faith" is a noun, "Believe" is a verb, but they refer to the same attribute (Matthew 8:10-13). In its narrow sense faith is belief in action. In its broader sense it is absolute confidence in God, Christ and their Word. "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." (Hebrews 11:1). "Substance" means the basic material; "evidence" means that which furnishes proof. So the Bible teaches that faith is the solid ground-work of things we hope for; it is the proof of unseen realities. "By faith Abraham, when he was tried, offered up Isaac; and he that had received the promises offered up his only begotten son, Of who it was said, That in Isaac shall thy seed be called: Accounting that God was able to raise him up, even from the dead; from whence also he received him in a figure." (Hebrews 11:17-19). Had Abraham refused to comply with God's request, even though he believed in the existence of God, his faith would have been little or dead, and he would not have been justified.

James, as a result of a misunderstanding, wrote concerning the difference between a dead faith and a saving faith. He said, "Thou believest that there is one God; thou doest

well: the devils, also believe, and tremble. But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without works is dead? Was not Abraham our father justified by works, when he had offered Isaac his son upon the altar? Seest thou how faith wrought his works, and by works was faith made perfect? And the scripture was fulfilled which saith, Abraham believed God, and it was imputed unto him for righteousness; and he was called the Friend of God. Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only." (James 2:19-24).

Without faith or trust in God it is impossible to please Him. (Hebrews 11:6). "Real faith must lead to obedience to Christ just as Abraham's faith led him to do just what God told him to do. Such faith will lift us up when we fall. It will overcome fear and faint-heartedness. It will drown doubt. If we can use our "faith faculty" as Christ teaches us, then we can be what God wants us to be. True faith in Christ and His Word will never lead one to a rejection of any command that Jesus has given. "Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of God." (Hebrews 5:8-9).

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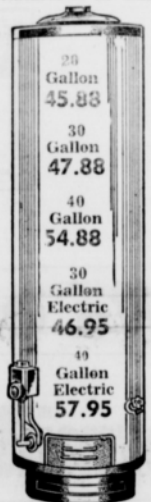
