The local retailer of 1967 is selling to a public entirely different from the public of 1950. More than fifty per cent of the population in the United States today is under 25 years of age. While old customers have changed their buying habits, moved away, or died, the retailer is faced with a new public.

The new public of young people has no fixed loyalties. The established retailer is faced with the problem of continuously re-establishing himself with new customers.

Because of the importance of the new consumer, numerous market researchers have attempted to learn how, why, what, and where he buys. The studies generally reach the same conclusions:

The new consumer is concerned with prestige. He prefers a well advertised 'brand name'. He prefers to buy in a store which is highly regarded by his group. He is more inquiring and quality conscious than past generations. He is suspicious of over-statement.

What his parents regarded as luxuries, the younger consumer takes for granted. Or, as one advertising executive stated: "He begins adult life thinking in terms of TV's, several radios, multiple baths, air-conditioning, two cars, sun lamps, and long distance telephoning at the twirl of a dial."

The local retailer sees the challenge of the new market in not only consistent advertising but also additional advertising specifically slanted to an ever-changing public.

In their efforts to obtain a central heating and cooling system for Callahan County Hospital, members of the Hospital Board and Baird Chamber of Commerce met Wednesday with Max Gill, Air Conditioning Representative of Lone Star Gas Co., Abilene District, and Bob McKennon, local Lone Star Manager.

In explaining advantages of installing a gas central system at the hospital, Mr. Gill stated that the operating unit would be located outside the hospital building, eliminating a fire hazard by having all flames for heating, etc., located outside.

He also said that a 25-ton unit would be needed to meet the hospital's needs, and that the unit would have a life expectancy of approximately 25 years. At present, some of the hospital rooms have neither air conditioning or heating facilities.

To install the system, the hospital board will have to raise \$3,500 to cover the cost of installation and insulation, with the unit itself being paid for by the hospital at the rate of \$160 monthly.

At present, the board does not have the \$3,500 necessary to install the unit, due to recent remodeling of the hospital and additional equipment being bought to meet Medicare standards.

A fund raising campaign is now underway to raise the \$3,500, with the Callahan County Tuberculosis Association making the first donation of \$976.59.

Several people in the Baird, Clyde and Cross Plains areas have stated they would be willing to make a donation to have such a system installed in the hospital.

Also, donations are expected from various clubs and civic organizations in the area.

It is hoped by the hospital board that organizations and individuals planning to make a contribution give their pledge by Monday, April 10, as the Commissioner's Court meets on that day, and purchase of the unit would have to be approved by both the Commissioners and the Hospital Board.

Installation of the air conditioning system needs to get underway as soon as possible. The entire project is expected to take approximately 60 days and needs to be completed before the hottest summer months arrive.

Contributions may be sent to the Hospital Board, in care of County Judge Roy Gilbreath, or given to any of the following: In Baird - Jerry Loper, Curtis Stuphen or James Eubanks; in Clyde - The Peoples State Bank or George Yantis; and in Cross Plains - Sterling Odum or County Commissioner Duke Mitchell.

During the course of Wednesday's meeting, it was suggested that a plaque inscribed with all donors names be erected in a prominent place at the hospital.

An organizational meeting for the Fund Raising Campaign has been set by the Board for Friday, April 7, at 2:30 p. m. at Baird City Hall. Anyone wishing to help in this campaign or wanting to make a pledge to the Board, is urged to attend this meeting.

REGISTERED GIRL SCOUTS TO RECEIVE CAMP FOLDERS

Camp folders, announcing information for local Girl Scout day camps as well as sessions and registration procedures for Camp Wood Lake, will be received by all registered Girl Scouts and leaders this week.

Ginger Owens, local camp chairman, urged all parents to be on the alert for the folders and to see that they are saved, as registration forms for local day camps, as well as for Camp Wood Lake are included in the folders. "Purpose of mailing the folder to each registered Scout," Mrs. Owens said, is to acquaint all parents with the camping opportunities available to Girl Scouts in the Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council.

Registration for Camp Wood Lake, the Council's resident camp on Lake Brownwood, opened April 1st and continues through May 15. A STUDY IN FRIENDSHIP

"Behold, I stand at the door and knock; if any man hear my voice and open the door, I will come in unto him and sup with him, and he with me." Rev. 3:20.

Christ takes the initiative in friendship. It is difficult for some of us to realize that this

is so and how it is so. In many areas of human life and in many avenues of human activity it seems necessary to force a way, to demand an entrance, to become a go-getter! We ourselves rap at so many doors, and so vigorously that we begin to think that Christ Himself attends to him who makes the loudest noise. Some of us may have hopes of entering the Celestial City by pounding at its gates. Yet this is not the manner of Christ.

He stands at the door and knocks. He takes the initiative. On the night before His crucifixion He reminded His disciples, "Ye did not choose me, but I chose you." We love Him," wrote John, "because He first loved us."

Christ shows the courtesy of friendship. There is no forced entrance, there is no banging of doors. No rattling of the door on its hinges. He knew that God's greatest gift to man was personality. The greatest discourtesy would be the invasion of that holy place. "If any man hear my voice," these words can be read as though they express the patience of the visitor; "I'll just keep knocking until he is less busy, then he will hear me."

Christ entered the gift and take of friendship. "I will sup with him and he with me." That give and take led to ultimate giving. He said "All things I have heard of My Father I have made known unto you." T. R. Glover comments, "He let them share to the utmost His full experience of God, grasp with Him the hand of God, and live with Him in the love of God."

By this they became great souls, great minds, great hearts. Of course the very ultimate giving was in the giving of His life. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." Ultimate receiving follows ultimate giving. Some 1966 Workers May Be Eligible For S. S. Benefits

Social security beneficiaries who worked in 1966 may still receive some payment even if their earnings went over \$1500 by several hundred dollars last year, R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager of the Abilene office said today. To claim those benefits a beneficiary must file an annual report of earnings for 1966 on a form provided by the Social Security Administration.

Tuley stressed that beneficiaries who earned more than \$1500 in 1966 should file an annual report if:

- their actual earnings are less than original estimates, which would allow some benefits to be paid;
- they earned less than \$125 in any one month as employees;
- as self-employed persons, substantial work was not performed in one or more months.

Beneficiaries who believe they might qualify for payment based on one of these conditions should not delay filing an annual report, Tuley said. The deadline for filing annual reports has been extended two days beyond the usual date of April 17. Filing later than April 17, he cautioned, may result in the loss of benefits.
