The purchase of quality merchandise rather than shoddy substitutes can often be attributed to advertising.

Every experienced salesman knows that many consumers automatically exclude the possibility of buying highest quality goods, even when a high quality purchase may be more economical.

The reasons why many consumers reject a good product in favor of a poor one may be due to a false assumption in the differences in costs. Often it is caused by a lack of knowledge of a long range savings involved.

A frequent cause of the delay of purchase, or the buying of makeshift goods, is the fact that a potential consumer does not realize that he financially is able to buy needed products. Actually, if he knows the full story on prizes and terms of purchase, he may learn that he can buy immediately, and even save money by not delaying the purchase.

Providing the consumer with information which tells the conditions of a purchase is an essential service of good advertising. When he realizes that a high quality product, which will serve better and last longer, may be obtained for a slightly higher monthly payment, the consumer may give up the idea of living with shoddy goods.

Or, as often happens, the person who has been postponing the purchase of a badly needed product, may buy quickly as he learns that payments are actually within his means.

Advertising which tells the consumer how he can buy and why he should buy is often of more service than any other kind of shopping information.

Plans Made For Girls State Track Meet To Be Held in Abilene

It was announced this week by Supt. L. B. Howard, president of the Texas Girls Track Association, that more than 100 high schools will send 1,000 or more contestants to Abilene to participate in the state track meet, to be held next week.

The meet will be held May 12 & 13 at Abilene Christian Col-

lege, with a minimum of 2,000 persons expected to visit in Abilene during the two-day meet.

Howard said the State meet would offer outstanding girls' track competition and he expected a number of state records would be broken during the meet. Last year, the meet was held at Waco Midway.

An effort is being made by the Association to select Abilene as the permanent site for this annual meet, Howard said, until participation becomes large enough to become a University Interscholastic League program.

He said 96 relay teams of four girls would be participating this year, in addition to the contestants in other track events.

Teams will begin arriving in Abilene about 1 p. m. Friday, May 12, Howard said, with the preliminary events to be conducted Friday night, and the finals Saturday afternoon. Finals in the field events will be Saturday morning.

Headquarters for the meet will be at the Thunderbird Lodge in Abilene. Admission to the meet will be 50c for adults and 25c for children.

This is the third year the Association has conducted the State competition. About 100 schools sent contestants to last year's meet.

Many of the nation's leading cowboys are riding and roping for an estimated \$6,000 in prize money and entry fees in the 19th Annual Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo, May 4-6.

Included among the entrants are two reigning world champions, Junior Garrison of Marlow, Okla., and Paul Mayo, of Grinnell, Iowa.

Garrison, 29, is the 1966 calf roping titlist, and Mayo, 25, was last year's national bareback bronc riding champion. The two cowboys indicated earlier this week they would be on hand to compete here, according to the professional Rodeo Cowboys Association in Denver.

The R.C.A. also said others on the entry log would include Jim Bob Altizer, Del Rio, who heads calf roping charts for 1967; Jim Houston, Omaha, Neb.; Myrtil Dightman, Houston; Bill Kernell, David Glover and Carl Nafzger, all of Clarksville, and Dallas Chartier of Benkelman, Neb.

Also, Shawn Davis, Whitehall, Mont., the current saddle bronc leader; Dicky Cox, McKinney; Hugh Chambliss, Albuquerque, N. M.; Clifton Smith, Tell; John Edwards, Cheyenne, Wyo.; Bobby Seals, Justin; Ron Sewalt, Chico; Don McLaughlin, Ft. Collins, Colo.; and Bill Rinstine, Nara Visa, N. M.

Jim Houston, Kernell, McLaughlin, Altizer and Shawn Davis, have all won national rodeo crowns in past years.

An overall 179 entries were logged in the 1966 Sheriff's Posse Rodeo, with lion's share of a \$6,024 payoff going to Bobby Goodspeed, High Ridge, Mo. He bested 44 other calf ropers to pick up \$672.

As one of more than 500 such cowboys contests approved annually by the R.C.A., competition in the Sheriff's Posse Rodeo is conducted under nationally recognized rules.

Prize money won by contestants will be credited to their individual standings in the race for 1967's national rodeo titles, Dr. M. C. McGowan, rodeo committee secretary, said.

Bible Thought: "Whosoever therefore shall confess me before men, him will I confess also before my Father which is in heaven. But whosoever shall deny me before men, him will I also deny before my Father which is in heaven."

(Matthew 10:32-33)
 A covenant is an agreement between two or more people. In reality, conversion is a solemn agreement between an individual and God. The apostle Peter said, "Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord." (Acts 3:19).

One thing that distinguishes Jehovah from every god invented by men is that He is a covenant God. With Israel He entered into a covenant at Sinai. To Israel He pledged His steadfast love and the land of Canaan. From them He asked love and submissive obedience to the Law. Israel pledged to keep the covenant. They failed. The Hebrew writer said, "For finding fault with them, he saith, Behold, the days come, saith the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and with the house of Judah." (Hebrews 8:8).

In Christ God gave a new covenant, not to Israel alone, but to all nations. The promise of a new covenant was given by the prophet Jeremiah. He said, "Behold, the days come, saith the Lord, that I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel, and with the house of Judah; Not according to the covenant that I made with their fathers in the day that I took

them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt; which my covenant they brake, although I was an husband unto them, saith the Lord." (Jeremiah 31:31-32) This prophecy was fulfilled in the New Testament in that the Hebrew writer quotes the prophet Jeremiah and applies it to the Will and Testament of Jesus Christ. (Hebrews 8:6-13). And it is further written, "Then said he, Lo, I come to do thy will, O God. He taketh away the first, that he may establish the second (Hebrews 10:9). This New Covenant offers forgiveness of sins and eternal life. It asks submission to the Gospel -- faith (Hebrews 11:6); repentance (Acts 17:29-30); confession (Romans 10:10); baptism (Acts 2: 27-28, 22: 16); and total commitment of life to God's purposes (Revelation 2:10; II Timothy 4:6-8).

When Philip revealed the covenant (preached the gospel) to the Ethiopian (Acts 8:30-39), he accepted the terms (faith), gave up old relationships (repentance), pledged allegiance (confession), and committed himself to the new covenant relationship with God (baptism). Each element is essential to a valid covenant. Conversion is covenant. Confession of one's faith is a pledge of allegiance to the Great and Gracious King, Jesus Christ.
