## FETERITA: A NEW FORACE PLANT

Within the last year or so the United States De partment of Agriculture has brought into favo a new forage plant that is of great value as a grai
producer, especially in the dryer sections of th country. This plant is known as feterita and i many respects resembles kaffir and milo; th heads are white, stand upright, and are shape like milo heads. but the grains are larger an softer than milo or kaffir. Like milo, the stalk have a tendency to sucker and to grow new head
after the main head has ripened or has been cu The forage is sweeter and juicier than milo an equals that of kaffir.
Feterita can be grown upon alm ost any soil th will produce the other grain sorghums and ceeding value is fully equal to them. It is plant and handled in the same way that kaffir or $m$ is cultivated.
The soil upon whichit is planted should be br in the fall or winter, or early enough in t
pring to becom firm. It may be planted wit) cring planter or in the same way that such o
 ame width as for corn. In the dryer seetions ${ }^{\prime}$ olants should he from eighteen to twentyinches apart in the drill. In those sections hav a larger amount of rain the distance can be red ed to ten or twelve inches. Where greater sp ing is practiced, it will take about two pounds ced to plant an acre; if planted more closely,
out three pounds will be required. Cultivation should begin required.
Cuws above ground, and should be similar feter cultivation given to corn. When the plant has ome up a smoothing harrow run diagonally acros he rows will be of much benefit. Feterita does not require quite as much cultivation as corn, b well repays good treatruent.
Harvesting can be done with Harvesting can be done with a row binder hand. The grain will absorb moisture from ir , and is apt to heat when first harvested placed in piles, and for that reason when the hea re to be stored, it is advisable to place them on alternate layers of straw. By miking t necessary adjustments an ordinary thresher m be used in threshing feterita, but if threshed a ored, care should be taken to prevent heatin convenient way is to place burlap sacks ha of the threshed grain.
Feterita stalks are rich in food value and th makes the crop an excellent one for ensilage forage. When grown for forage purposes, it ca we left from four to five inches in the row and th rows can be somewhat closer together.
