\$12,000 GIN IS NEARING COMPLETION.

Cotulla's new gin, erected by W. W. Terry of San Antonio, is nearing completion. Mr. Halliday who has had charge of the work since it was begun six or eight weeks ago, stated to the Record this week that the plant would be ready for operation by the middle of the coming week, if nothing interfered with the work.

The gin is a three 70-saw gin, modern equipment, and has been erected at a cost of approximately \$12,000. It is expected that cotton from about ten thousand acres will be brought here to be ginned this season and no doubt it will be necessary for the gin to run day and night during the height of the season. Indications are there will be quite a few buyers here all the season and top prices will be paid. This will induce much cotton to be brought here that otherwise might go to other gins.

Dry Weather Improves Crop.

According to the Devine News the dry weather which has prevailed for the past two weeks has greatly improved conditions of the cotton crop in that section. Because of the continuous rains in July boll weevil became plentiful and the outlook for a cotton crop looked gloomy, but prospects are now improved and if the weather continues favorable there will yet be considerable cotton made.

Harriss Farm Raises Enormous Corn Crop.

The largest amount of corn ever shipped off a single farm in La Salle county will be shipped the coming month off the Harriss Bros., Farm at Harriss Valley. They expect to sell approximately 15,000 bushels and will then have sufficient left for feeding their work animals next year. The farm had over 500 acres in corn, and an exceptionally heavy yield was made. The land is black and very fertile and it is doubtful if a better yield was made anywhere in Texas.

The farm has 1200 acres in cotton this year and a fair yield will be made. Boll weevils have appeared in some of the oldest cotton but the continued warm weather will have a tendency to check his operations. Work has just begun on the erection of a gin at Harriss Valley, which is intended to take care of the crop on the Harriss Farm.

Prohibition Fever Growing Along Border.

Mexico City, July 1.—Thirty residents of the United States who hope to find an oasis in Mexico may be disappointed. A cabinet member whose influence will be felt in the drafting of "dry" regulations was recently quoted in the Excelsior as saying: "It may be necessary for the Mexican government to establish a dry zone at least ten kilometers deep along the entire length of the United States boundary."

Intimation was also given that the government is prepared to move immediately against persons who are reported to be selling liquor to Americans, using Mexican territory as their base of operations.

A question which is said to be giving officials here much concern is whether United States brewers and distillers shall be allowed to transport their plants together with their stock of goods to Mexico. No official action has yet been taken on that phase of the question.

Prohibition as a nation wide measure is commencing to attract attention. General P. Elias Calles, governor of the state of Sonora, recently re-enacted several dry laws and announced that they would be enforced. These regulations provide severe punishment for persons convicted of the illegal sale of liquor. The legislature of the State of Campeche has discussed dry measures for some time, but it is improbable drastic action will be taken inasmuch as Governor Joaquin Mucal has asked that instead of a bone dry law there be enacted measures regulating the manufacture and sale of intoxicants.

MILLETT GINS FIRST BALE NEW COTTON.

The first bale of the 1919 cotton crop was ginned at Millett Wednesday evening. This cotton was raised by S. F. Moffett, on his farm several miles West of Millett.

The bale was shipped to San Antonio by express and was on exhibition at the San Antonio Cotton Exchange Thursday morning. It was the first bale of the new crop to appear in San Antonio. It weighed 540 pounds.

The cotton crop in the Millett section of the county is reported to be excellent and all of the farmers have prospects to make a fine yield.

In the Cotulla section several farmers have begun picking and it is expected two or three bales will be out the coming week. Inside of ten days picking will become general if weather conditions continue as they are now. Another week of dry weather has been added to the situation which makes two weeks of sun shine today, and it has worked wonders with the cotton crop. A fair crop is now made all over the county, but of course if continuous rains should set in again much damage would be done and the crop materially cut down.

PICKING SCALE AGREED ON BY FARMERS.

Corpus Christi, Tex., Aug. 7.—A uniform scale of \$1.25 per hundred for picking cotton was recommended as the price to be paid by farmers of South Texas at the meeting of the South Texas Cotton Growers' Association held here yesterday to discuss the problem of gathering the 1919 crop. The meeting was attended by more than 500 farmers of the fifteen counties comprising the district, representing a production of over a half million bales.

In outlining the object of the meeting, President Fred Roberts emphasized the fact that the association was without power arbitrarily fix the wages to be paid for picking cotton and that any action taken by the association was to be construed in the light of a recommendation only, and that it was up to the individual farmers to determine the practicability of adopting the suggestion. He also stressed the fact that the primary object in fixing of a tentative scale for cotton picking was not so much a question of the amount of wages involved as it was of insuring an equitable distribution of labor. A uniform price for pickers, he contended, would prevent congestion of labor in some counties while other portions of the district were suffering from a lack of workers, and would prove beneficial both to the army of pickers needed to gather the present crop and the farmers.

FAMILY OF SNAKE CHARMS.

Women Have Peculiar Power Over Reptiles Which the Ordinary Person Holds in Dread.

Possibly nowhere else is the art of snake charming brought to such a pitch of perfection as at Mount Popa, Upper Burma, India, and strangely enough by women. Here two famous sisters, whose fame is a byword throughout Burma, make their home. At special requests they will descend to bring their proteges down to the towns for exhibition of their skill, but as a rule they prefer the vicinity of their mountain. This particular family has carried on their profession for many years past, keeping their secret always within their own circle.

The snakes they use are the deadly hundred or nala bungarus (nala ophiolagus), the king cobra. The task, possibly, would not appeal to many, as these reptiles are the most dreaded of their kind. Measuring up to 12 feet in length, they possess a deadly poison in their fangs, and an alarming speed. It is said of them, also, that they are the only snake who will attack a human being on sight, closing him for miles until one or the other is bound to give in.

The snakes are fed on fowls, and appear amenable and tame to handle. The origin of the family and their work is probably unknown, lost in the dim passages of years, but their zeal is not one whit less today than it has been since the profession was first heard of. How long they will continue to carry it on is a matter for conjecture, but undoubtedly they stand for one of Burma's chief curiosities, and a mark for the enterprising tourist who cares to scale the mystic heights of Mount Popa.

GETS WRONG VIEW OF LIFE

Person of Undecisive Character Can Hardly Be Brought to See Things in Right Light.

A person of undecisive character wonders how all the embarrassments in the world happened to meet exactly in his way, to place him just in that one situation for which he is peculiarly unadapted, but in which he is also willing to think no other man could have acted with facility or confidence. In the case of things as they are, he is often employed in vain speculations on some different supposable state of things, which would have saved him from all this perplexity and irresolution. He thinks what a determined course he could have pursued if his talents, his health, his age, had been different; if he had been acquainted with some one person sooner; if his friends were, in this or the other point, different from what they are; or if fortune had showered her favors on him. And he gives himself as much license to complain as if all these advantages had been among the rights of his nativity, but refused, by a malignant or capricious fate, to his life.—Rev. John Foster.

Holy Days in Dutch Land.

What is religion? It is not the observance of forms and feast days. We have only nine national holidays in America. Only two of our holidays, namely, Thanksgiving and Christmas, may be called even quasi religious. The others celebrate the birth of some great man like Columbus, Washington and Lincoln; or some great achievement like the birth of independence on the Fourth of July or the new birth of liberty on Memorial day.

Germany, on the other hand, in its nineteen holidays, has only two, namely, Christmas and New Year's which have not a distinctly religious significance. Among them are the Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Annunciation, Good Friday, Ascension, Corpus Christi, Assumption, All Souls' day and All Saints' day. These formal celebrations of sacred events, have apparently not made Germany more saintly.—Better Farming.

Creative Ability.

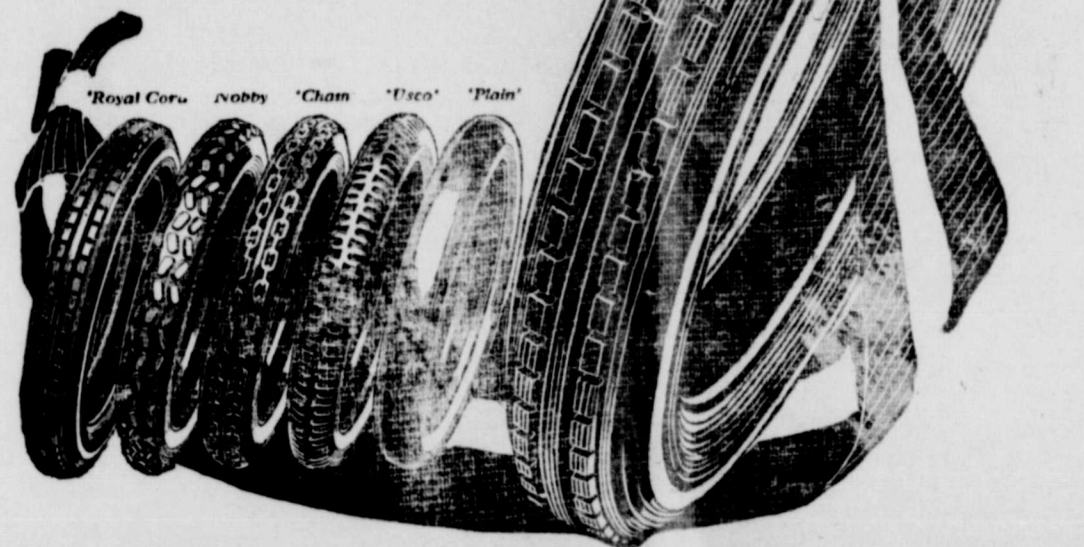

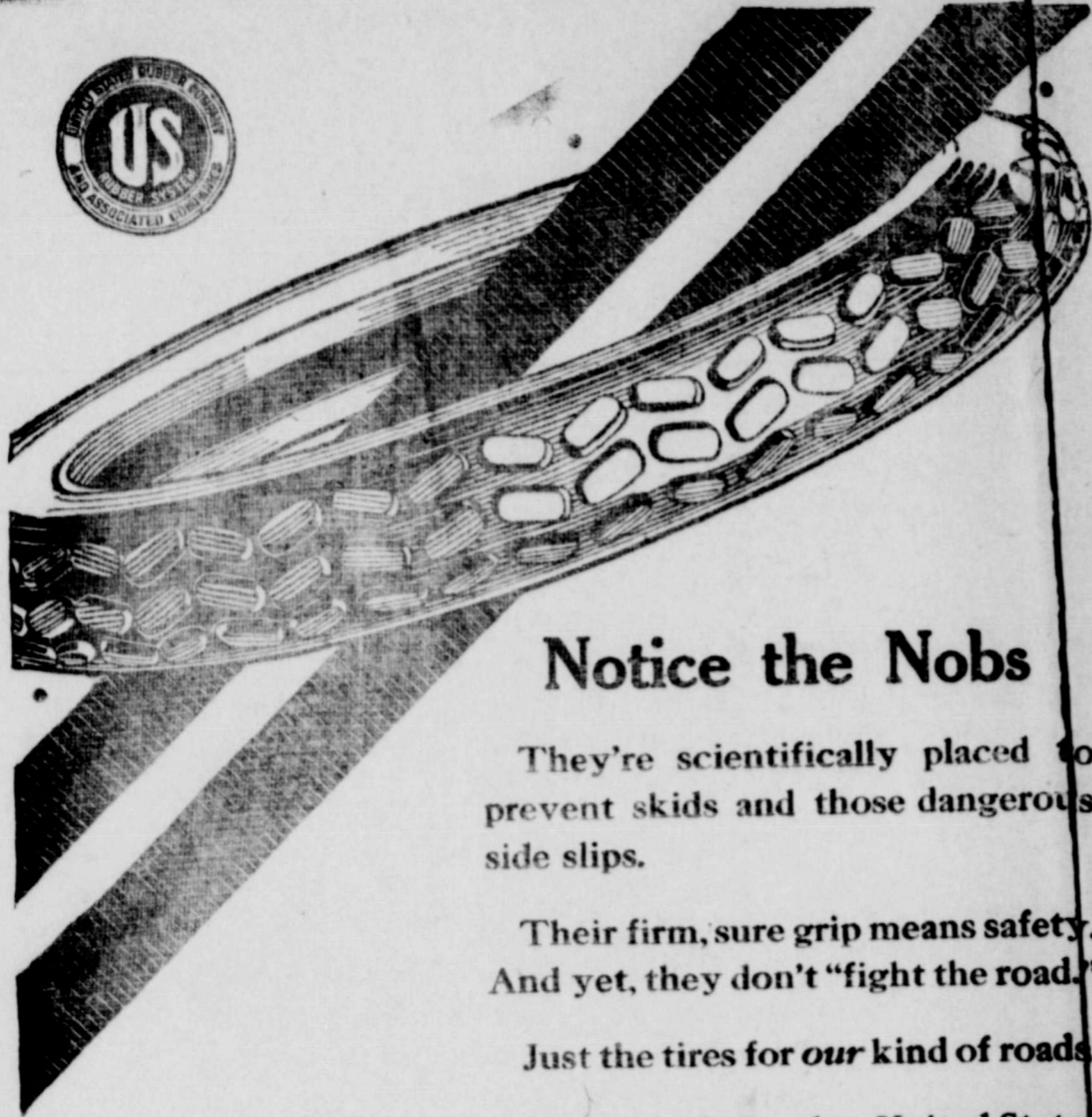

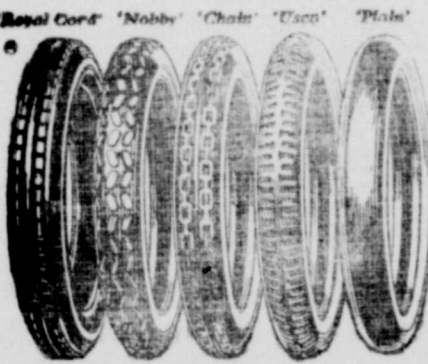

Where "Loot" Originated.

HORSES IN ANCIENT BATTLE

Seem to Have Been Little Used Except to Carry the Infantry Into the Fight.

In the old days when the Romans and Greeks fought furious battles, the charioteers drove their cars in all directions, hurled their javelins, and by the din and clatter of horses and wheels commonly threw the ranks of the enemy into disorder, and making their way among the squadrons of the enemy's cavalry, leaped down from their chariots and fought on foot. The charioteers then withdrew, little by little, from the fight, and placed their chariots in such a way that if they were hard pressed they could readily retreat to their own side. Thus in battle they afforded the mobility of cavalry with the steadiness of infantry. Daily practice enabled them to pull up their horses at full speed when on a steep slope, or to run out on the pole and stand on the yoke, and to get nimbly back into the chariot.

With the introduction of cavalry in the later iron age came larger horses, but their use was restricted to isolated areas. There is no doubt that the west German tribes, as late as the campaign of Caesar in Gaul, used only the shaggy pony. It is said in cavalry actions they held it disgraceful and slothful to use any kind of saddles, and instead of charging in squadrons they dismounted and fought on foot. As far as England is concerned, the art of riding seems to have been introduced by the Normans. The Saxons appear to have been but indifferent horsemen.

SPECIALISTS IN HUMAN ILLS

Some More or Less Sage Reflections on the Subject of Diseases and Their Treatment.

Why, then, one is inclined to ask, do we have specialists? If the functions of the body, instead of being a system of such complete entanglements and inter-relations from head to foot, were really divided up into watertight compartments, then specialistic treatment would indeed be indicated. In that case each specialist would have his own compartment to look after, with a sign upon the membrane which marks the entrance to his domain. "Trespassers will be prosecuted." But what are you going to do with a body in which nephritis is directly caused by an ulcerated tooth which the dentist hasn't discovered, and the legs swell up and become useless because there is an unlocated intestinal kink? It would really seem that before a man is fitted to operate as a specialist on any part of the body he must have specialized a while over every other part of it—so that the East side doctor's sign, "Specialist in All Diseases," need not be regarded as so absurd after all. The first qualification of a good specialist is to be an all-around physician.

But at present the dentist has the advantage over all other specialists. Give him a chance to pull out every tooth in your head and you will be delivered forever from Bright's disease, rheumatism, pleurisy, liver complaint, neuritis, pyelitis, and virtually every other kind of disease. But what will the dentist do when he has drawn every body's teeth?

It's the time of year when birds and flowers will give greeting on the way.

The Mangrove.

The mangrove tree, specimens of which are in the Arnold Arboretum, the tree museum of Harvard university, has a very interesting method of sending its seeds or fruits into the world. Growing as it usually does in shallow water, it is necessary for the young fruits actually to begin growing before they leave the parent plant. The fruit, which resembles a large inverted berry, sends out large leaves at its upper end and a long root, sometimes 18 inches in length, from the lower end, while yet attached to the parent plant. Then as if by magic, the parent plant drops it into the mud where the plant already growing begins to develop into a larger plant and soon is firmly established. If it were not prepared immediately to begin to grow in the mud it would probably be washed away. A single mangrove is oftentimes able to start a small island by its manifold roots and arms.
