Here two famous sisters, whose fame is a byword throughout Burma, make their home At special requests they will conde scend to bring their proteges down to the towns for exhibition of their skill, but as a rule they prefer the vicinity of their mountain. This particular family has carried on their profession for many years past, keeping their secret always within their own circle

The snakes they use are the deadly hamadryad or nala bungarus (nala ophiohagus), the king cobra. The task, possibly, would not appeal to many, as these reptiles are the most dreaded of their kind. Measuring up to 12 feet in length, they possess & deadly poison in their fangs, and an ng speed. It is said of them, aiso, that they are the only snake who will attack a human being on sight chasing him for talles until one or the other is bound to give in.

The snakes are fed on fowls, and appear amenable and tame to handle. The origin of the family and their is probably unknown, lost in the dim passages of years, but their zenl is not one whit less today than It has been since the profession was first heard of. How long they will continue to carry it on is a matter for conjecture, but undoubtedly they stand for one of Burma's chief curiosities and a mark for the enterprising tourist who cares to scale the mystic heights of Mount Popa.







Senate Joint Resolution No. 20. reposing an amendment to Section of Article 8 of the Constitution of tion is any one year, for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works, improvements of cemeteries and other permanent improvements, providing for the levy of a maintenance tax by countles, or political subdivisions thereof, not to oxeced sixty cents on the One Hun-dred (\$100) Dollars' valuation, apon a majority vote of the qualified property tax payers voting at an election held for that purpose, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 9 of Article

and the Constitution of the State of

of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended that the same will hereafter read as follows:

Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirtyfive cents on the One Hundred Dol-lars' valuation; and counties, cities and towns are authorized to levy not exceeding thirty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding thirty cents for roads and bridges and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the One Hundred Dollars valuation, exclusive of taxes levied for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1883; and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, waterworks, improvement of cemeteries, and other permanent im-provements not to exceed fifty cents on the One Hundred Dollars' valua-tion, in one year, and except as in this Constitution otherwise provided and the qualified voters, who have been assessed or paid property tax, of any county or sub-division thereof now existing or that may hereafter be defined by the Commissioners' Court, may at an election called in accordance with the law authorizing the levy of a special road tax, by a majority vote levy a special tax of not exceeding sixty cents on the One Hundred Dollars' valuation on all property, for the further improvement and maintenance of public roads; proand maintenance of public roads; provided that this provision shall be self enacting and that no part of such tax shall be available to pay an indebtedness incurred prior to the current year for which said tax is collected, except to pay indebtedness now existing, and provided further that such levy may be voted off or changed at any time by majority vote of those qualified to vote under this provision. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of public roads and lighways, without the local notice required for mental or local laws.

Bec. 2. The furging constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held for that purpose on the fourth day of November, A. D. 1919; at said election the vote shall be by official ballot which shall have printed or written thereon the words

All ballots cast as above provided shall be counted as cast for or against this proposed amendment; and if a majority of the votes cast shall be for the amendment, it shall be de clared adopted; if a majority of the votes cast shall be against the amend ment said amendment shall be lost.

The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the neces sary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws




HORSES IN ANCIENT BATTLE

In the old days when the Romans and Greeks fought furious battles, the charioteers drove their cars in all directions, hurled their javelins, and he din and clatter of horses and wheels commonly threw the ranks of the enemy into disorder. and, making their way among the squadrons of the enemy's cavalry, leaped down from their chariots and fought on foot. The charioteers then withdrew, little by little, from the fight, and placed their charlots in such a way that if they were hard pressed they could readily retreat to their own mobility of chvalry with the steads ness of infantry. Daily practice enabled them to pull up their horses at full speed when on a steep slope, or to run out on the pole and stand on the yoke, and to get nimbly back into the chariot.
