## STORM DRIVES FAR INLAND AND RAIN **FALLS IN TORRENTS**

Loss to Cotton Crop in La Salle County Estimated at Quarter of a Million Other Property Damage Light.

tent of its width was more than 250 miles. It appeared that the center of the storm, or at least where most damage was done. was done to property.

At Cotulla the storm prevailed for nearly 20 hours, blowing from the North first and at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, the wind suddenly veered to the East. This was the main storm and the wind came in terrific gusts for more than an hour. when it changed to the South and came from this direction until long after daylight. Rain fell incessantly from ten o'clock Sunday morning till ten ô'clock Monday morning. An accurate measurement was not obtained above 81-2 inches. It is known that much fell but after that the record was lost. It is believed that the actual amount exceeded that figure by 2 1-2 inches Mustang creek wand the Nueces was very high also

Practically no damage was done to property at Cotulia and the storm was not near so severe as the one in 1916, but the damage to the cotton crop in the county will amount to a quarter of a million dollars at the least estimate. All open cotton was blown to the ground and covered up by the torrents of rainfall. . This is a heavy loss to the farmers but there will be considerable more cotton to pick and after next Monday it is expected

The cotton crop will be gotten out early this year which will greatly aid the farmer in preparing for next year's crop if he will take advantage of it. Cotton stalks should be cut up and turned under early. There is going to be a fine season for fall plowing and the earlier the farmer breaks broke early is almost certain of a crop of cotton the seasons are not too wet. Cotton no doubt will be a good price next year, and we hope to see the acreage of La Salle county increased over this year. The fact that we have lost a large per cent of the present crop by storm should make us wou-

tulla but we understand that there are probably no cases on the docket that will require a jury and for this reason not all of the jurprs on the list for the first week have been summoned by the sheriff. 


