

RESENTS IMPLIED DISCOURTESY TO WOMEN.

Mrs. James M. Loving of Austin has issued the following appeal to the women voters of Texas who are Democrats:

Senator Bailey, in the discussion of suffrage, has permanently spoken of those whom he terms as 'she men' and 'he women'. Taken in connection with the subject discussed and its relation, he means by the term 'he women' those women who believe in and advocate and those will avail themselves of equal suffrage. If he meant others. such use of the phrase 'he women' would not be germane to the subject discussed, would be foreign to the matter in hand, and would have no place in the fulmination of so great an academic debater as is Senator Bailey. Thus it is seen that he applies this term, 'he women' to all women who will participate in the August primaries.

"In this application of this term to the women of this state does he mean it as a compliment or does he mean it as term of reproach? If he applies it as a compliment, it does not follow that the women of the state should vote for him. But if he means it as a term of reproach, or a wholesale denunciation of all those women who are exercising a right to differ with him, it does follow that all the women who do vote should vote against him, and that all the men who believe in a Democratic government and love and respect womanhood should vote against him; first, because he violates the fundamentals of Democracy as declared by Jefferson when he denounces the right of fuffrage being conferred upon women, and he violates every rule of chivalry, courtesy, kindness and decency when he delivers this general denunciation against the women of this state who believe in and would exercise the right of suffrage.

"To establish the first proposition, it is only necessary to quote Mr. Jefferson, the highest of all Democratic authority, when he said in the Declaration of Independence: 'Whenever any orm of government becomes destructive of these the right of the people to alter or d to institute new government, lays fou lations on such principles and organr its powers in such form as to them shall

ness.' "If the people can 'alter' or 'abolish' this government,' they would therefore have the RIGHT to confer suffrage upon women, and women would have the RIGHT to ask it and to exercise it when conferred. If they are ALL exercising a right, why denounce them? Why not decently and logically challenge the wisdom of exercising that right instead of having unmanly recourse to abuse womanhood? Is to abuse womanhood an attribute of a 'he man?' If it is, then Senator Bailey is category of his 'she men.'

"A 'she man' is a man with feminine attrib tes and is in nature a misfit, is crosswise with nature -is out of harmony with nature.

"A 'he woman' is also a misfit, is crosswise with nature-is out of harmony with nature and with her sex. Therefore if Senator Bailey's terminology is correctly applied, there is no more grotesque and revolting creature in nature than the woman who believes in or exercises the right of suffrage. If his terminology is incorrectly applied then no grosser libel was ever uttered against a whole body of women, no grosser insult was ever offered to a body of women than is embodied in this phrase of Mr. Bailey's.

"The womanhood of this state when it goes to the polls in August will resent this gross and brutal language of this unjust and ill-bred man; and we appeal to the manhood of Texas to resent this language by repudiating this gross and uncouth man at the primary on the 28th of this




