## Commissioners discuss disaster grant repairs

Callahan County Commissioners held a brief meeting Thursday, January 15th to hear information concerning disaster repairs from Mary Alice Smith of Grantworks Incorporated.

Also attending the meeting was Callahan County Disaster Coordinator Jan Windham.

The commissioners' court discussed amendments to contracts with the state and federal entities, including the Office of Rural Community Affairs and the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The county will receive two grants in the amount of \$350,000 and \$228,132 for disaster assistance associated with two separate disasters in the county. The \$350,000 grant was for flooding which occurred in March 2008, while the \$228,132 grant was from flooding which occurred in August of 2007.

The \$350,000 grant application included repairs to 8 flood/ drainage areas, while 11 county roads are included in the repair work. All construction repairs must be completed by June 21,

No action was taken by the commissioners' court.
