Spring has officially arrived and grass and weeds have begun to grow. The City reminds its residents that the nuisance ordinance restricts the height of weeds to a maximum of 12" and must be kept under that height.

In the past the City has either mowed these lots or hired them mowed and charged the citizens the cost of the mowing. However, in the future, any lots the City has mowed, there will be a cost of \$350 for this service. If this cost is not paid, a lien will be placed against the property.

To avoid these costs, property owners should keep their yards and lots mowed to the required height. If you have questions concerning this matter, please do not hesitate to contact City Hall at 254-725-6114.

The City also would remind the citizens that the Junked Vehicle Ordinance also restricts keeping Junked Vehicles. The Ordinances lists a junked vehicle as follows: Junked Vehicle means any vehicle that is designed to be self-propelled and:

a. does not have lawfully affixed to it

mendation of Dr. David Lakey, Commissioner of the Texas Department of State Health Services, and in consultation with Texas Education Agency Commissioner Robert Scott, the University Interscholastic League is altering its schedule of events due to the outbreak of the swine flu in Texas. Effective immediately, all UIL interscholastic competition is suspended until Monday, May 11th.

"The health and safety of our student activity participants is of the utmost importance," said UIL Executive Director Dr. Charles Breithaupt. "Taking every possible precaution to prevent the further spreading of this disease is an important contribution to the welfare of our great state, and altering the schedule of our events is a way to keep our participants safe." As this is a fluid situation, the UIL tentatively releases the following schedule for UIL regional and state events affected by this

situation. Academic State Meet

The UIL Academic State Meet. originally scheduled for May 7th-9th, will be rescheduled at a later date. The Conference 4A and 5A One-Act Play competition will continue as previously scheduled on May 15th-16th. All other conferences competing in One-Act Play will be rescheduled. A schedule of the

The Texas State Wind Ensemble Festival, originally scheduled for May 9th, has been cancelled. The UIL staff will consult with the 16 participating schools to determine whether or not to reschedule the event at a later date.

Regional Track Meets

All UIL regional track meets originally scheduled for this weekend, May 1st-2nd, have been cancelled. The state track and field meet will be extended to a three-day format to include semifinal heats. The meet is tentatively scheduled for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, May 14th-16th. Semifinal qualifiers will be based on the district track meet results. Each region will be represented at the state meet by the top four performances in each event for all conferences. Hand-held times will be converted to fully automatic times as defined by the National Federation of State High School Association rules. A revised track and field state meet schedule will be posted on the UIL web site no later than Friday, May 1st. Qualifiers to the UIL state track and field meet will be posted on the UIL web site on Wednesday, May 6th.

You may catch the flu from your sick hunting buddy, but there's no evidence that you will catch it from domestic or wild hogs, according to the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC). There is no evidence that the new strain of H1N1 influenza is in domestic or wild hogs. This disease is being spread from person to person.

"We are prepared to test hogs, if a human/animal Grandparent disease link is identified. To date, there has been no indication that swine are involved," said Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas state veterinarian and head of the TAHC, the state's livestock and poultry health regulatory agency. "We are participating on all calls with health and emergency officials, are monitoring the situation, and are consulting with local officials, but so far, there is no disease spread." "Several hunters have asked about the safety of hunting wild repeat, there is no evidence that wild hogs are involved in this flu outbreak. Always, hunters to protect themselves against potential exposure to swine brucellosis, a totally different disease that is not related in any way to the flu. We know from test results that

about 10 percent of wild hogs carry swine brucellosis, a bacterial disease."

"When processing or butchering a wild hog, hunters should protect themselves against the blood and bodily fluids of wild hogs," he said. "When the wild hog meat is cooked, any swine brucellosis bacteria is destroyed by the heat."

Trappers who catch wild hogs and owners of domestic swine also should practice good biosecurity to prevent spreading the flu to pigs. "Don't get around swine if you become ill, and avoid having visitors near your pigs," said Dr. Hillman. "Have someone else feed the animals if you become ill with flu-like







First of all I would like to say that even though registered voters within the city limits are the ones that have a vote, decisions made or not made affect many more people. In my 37 years of living in the community, inside and out of the city limits and my 16 years of being employed with the City of Cross Plains I have considerable knowledge and understanding of the working of the City. Now, on the outside looking in, I realize even more how truly <u>blessed</u> we are to be a part of the City and Community.

I do not believe that anyone can be honest and say that there haven't been vast improvements in the Streets, Parks, Fire Department, EMS, city equipment, city infrastructure, and businesses. I am amazed at what has been accomplished in the last 20 years without taxes. It speaks very highly of how the money has been managed. In being a part of the budget process while at the city, I saw the City Administrator, City Council, and Employees be mindful of the citizen's water and sewer rates and to be good stewards of the funds available. For many years water sales funded almost everything. This limited the city's ability to address the aging infrastructure (water & sewer system). Due mainly to the lack of city taxes the city was unable to receive any government grants to replace aging lines. We must lay aside the mindset that these lines will last forever or at least until "I" die and lay hold of planning for the near and distant future.

As a member of the Cross Plains Economic Development Corporation, the Planning and Zoning Commission, a business owner within the city and former employee of the City, I have seen the need for City taxes for many years, not just to spend more money as some may say, but to maintain and improve infrastructure and provide services without spending the city reserves. There are those who believe the city's reserve should be spent first and then implement taxes.

It is my strong opinion that this is poor judgment. Is that how you operate? The City needs to continue to keep reserves for emergencies as it has done in the past. When the city has a emergency such as the 1994 tornadoes or the 2005 wildfires, it is vital to have reserves available versus waiting on the Federal government. After the wildfires, it was over a year before the city was reimbursed for just a portion of its expenses.

In my many years of attending water utility schools where hundreds of cities were represented, all but one had city taxes, small or no reserves, more employees and large bond indebtedness. This tells me we are blessed to have the management we have had. So contrary to what Mr. Nichols, Mr. Parson, and Mr. Lichty has stated, We Do Need Taxes. Not for our own gain, but for the betterment of Cross Plains.

In closing, I would like to say that the City Council and Committees who have worked tirelessly to research the different possibilities of raising revenue and have made tough decisions concerning the future of Cross Plains, THANK YOU. To the citizens I would like to ask you to recognize that we have had great management to accomplish what has been accomplished, but...some major areas have been neglected due to the lack of funding, both through grants and taxes, or the desire *not* to raise rates. We cannot continue to expect more out of the city without their ability to have more funds available to use in accomplishing these tasks. I encourage you to vote on Saturday, May 9, 2009 and

several cases of swine flu gives us the opportunity to look at several areas of maintaining our health during these times. The "swine flu" itself is a variation strain of the common type-A influenza virus. This variation strain happens to affect pigs as well as humans. A good perspective on recent news is that, based on the numbers of the "swine flu" outbreak of 1976 in the USA, we see that one person died of the infection itself, as opposed to a much larger number.

By contrast, the entire world, some 3,000 people per day die of malaria. The numbers are not meant to make anyone ignore potential health threats, but rather, apply common sense and not panic. The great flu epidemic of 1918 killed 20 million people worldwide, so we can gain a better perspective on the issue of danger that is present. The total swine flu number on May 1, 2009, was 363 cases worldwide and ten deaths.

What are the symptoms that mean a person should be tested for the "swine flu"? Symptoms include lack of appetite, fatigue and excessive tiredness, joint aches, severe headaches, cough, fever, over 100°F, runny nose, possible sore throat, and often vomiting and

cases have been mild in nature. Typically, a patient becomes infected a day before symptoms occur and remain a source of infection to others for up to seven days after symptoms

begin. The key to preventing the wide spread occurrence of any disease is early detection. IF you, or anyone you know, have the symptoms mentioned-GET TESTED ASAP! A test available in most physicians" offices will detect influenza A, such as "swine flu"

Fortunately, two medical treatments exist for influenza such as the "swine flu". Tamiflu and Relenza, of which Tamiflu is more commonly used, represent pharmaceutical treatments available. Success depends on beginning the medicine as soon as possible. So, optimally, how can we prevent the "swine flu" from spreading?

Number one, if you have any of these symptoms, stay away from everyone you can, until you are tested.

Since "swine flu" spreads by coughing, sneezing, or touching contaminated objects, those are areas requiring your attention.

If you must cough or sneeze, do so into your arm, not hand,

or into the open air. Just as with most illnesses, frequent washing of the hands

with soap and water is highly effective in halting the spread. Drink plenty of water and get plenty of rest.


Certain supplements are known to be beneficial. Since over half of Americans are deficient in vitamin D, this is a good supplement to take. Actually, a lab test can check to see if your vitamin D levels are adequate. Researchers have suggested that a good course of action is to take Vitamin D, 50,000 I.U. for 3 days during an acute infection.

Since we have strong reason to believe that sugar decreases the immune system, especially when ill, leave this out of your diet at that time.

Vitamin C, garlic, echinacea, and olive leaf extract are used in many countries to boost the effectiveness of the immune system.

Whether dealing with the "swine flu" or any other hazard in your life, be sure and get as many facts as you can. When one has a good grasp on the facts, a much better decision regarding the course to take for their family and themselves will occur.
