visiting area museums before they stopped at the Howard House. What a day the young boys had experienced-from Dr. Pepper to Conan!



He served as police chief in Brady until 1978 when he moved to Brown County and became the police chief at Early. He served in that capacity until his retirement in 1998. When he started at the Early Police Department, it was a one man department and he saw it grow to four full-time officers.

During his long career, he attended numerous schools and accumulated over 1,500 hours of training on file with the Texas Law Enforcement Commission in Austin. He also studied Criminal Justice at Cisco Junior College and held advanced certification and also was certified as a licensed police instructor.

Legislature renews commitment to Texas **Historic Courthouse Preservation Program**

AUSTIN, Texas-A stoic dome surrounded by winged eagles, these are some of the prominent architectural elements that dominate the recently rededicated Harrison County Courthouse. This J. Riely Gordon building is one of numerous historic county courthouses that have benefited from the Texas Historical Commission's (THC) Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program. Renewing its commitment to these significant structures, the 81st Texas Legislature recently included \$20 million in bond funding for Round VI of the nationally recognized program, which will assist additional counties interested in preserving their historic courthouses. The THC's Texas Historic

Courthouse Preservation Program was announced in June 1999 and provides partial matching grants to Texas counties for the restoration of their historic county courthouses. Since its inception, the program has awarded \$207 million to counties and local governments have matched this with more than \$130 million. Courthouse

restorations have generated more than 7,750 jobs throughout Texas and more than \$17 million in local taxes. Additional historic county courthouses that anticipate of rededication in 2009 include Brooks, McCulloch, Newton and Rains counties.

The Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation 313 Program's work has garnered national and international 9C attention, with honors from the sal National Trust for Historic sg Preservation, the Association itio for Preservation Technology and the Texas Society of

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Sun safety tips for infants, babies and toddlers

New York, NY (July 2, 2009)-Just one blistering sunburn in childhood more than doubles a person's chances of developing melanoma later in life. According to one US study, 54 percent of children become sunburned or tanned in their second summer, versus 22 percent in their first.

"Children should not be getting sunburned at any age, especially since there are a range of very effective sun protection methods that can used," said Perry Robins, MD, President, The Skin Cancer Foundation. "Parents need to be extra vigilant about sun protection all the time."

Many parents don't know the best ways to protect their young children. Below are The Skin Cancer Foundation's recommendations.

Infants-0-6 months: Infants under 6 months of age should be kept out of the sun. Their skin is too sensitive for sunscreen.

An infant's skin possesses little melanin, the pigment that gives color to skin, hair and eyes and provides some sun protection. Therefore, babies are especially susceptible to the sun's damaging effects.

• Use removable mesh window shields to keep direct sunlight from coming in through the windows of your car or invest in UV window film, which can screen almost 100 percent of ultraviolet radiation without reducing visibility.

•Take walks early in the morning before 10 AM or late afternoon after 4 PM and use a stroller with a sun-protective cover.

• Dress baby in lightweight clothing that covers the arms and legs.

• Choose a wide-brimmed hat or bonnet that protects the baby's face, neck, and ears. A baby who wears a hat during the first few months will get used to having it on.

Babies-6-12 months: It's now safe to use sunscreen on babies.

• All the protection methods explained above still apply, however now sunscreen use should be incorporated. · Apply a broad-spectrum,

SPF 15+ sunscreen to areas left uncovered such as baby's hands. Many companies have tear free formulas that won't sting baby's eyes.

 Most importantly, sunscreen must be applied 30 minutes before going outside and reapplied every two hours or after swimming or excessive sweating.

Toddlers/Pre-School Age Protecting toddlers from the sun requires a little more thought and effort. It is important to educate your child and caregivers.

 Make sure your child seeks the shade between 10 AM and 4 PM. Check the outdoor area where your child plays to make sure there is adequate shade.

• Make sure toddlers are covered. Long-sleeved, unbleached cotton clothing is cool and comfortable, while also highly protective. Clothing with an Ultraviolet Protection Factor (UPF) listing on the label offers extra security. The Skin Cancer Foundation recommends clothing with a UPF of 30 or higher.

• Don't forget hats and sunglasses. Choose a widebrimmed hat that protects face, neck, and ears.

sunscreens are a good choice for toddlers who won't sit still. Look for sunscreens with an SPF 15 or higher with some combination of the following UVA ingredients: avobenzone, ecamsule (a.k.a. Mexoryl), oxybenzone, titanium dioxide and zinc oxide.

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

One of the most common reasons for developing back pain stems from improper lifting technique. Always squat to lift. Do not bend over at the waist when lifting. Also, the closer you have the object being lifted to your body, the less stress will be placed on

that good posture over a period of years will greatly decrease the likelihood of developing back pain.

Another way to prevent back pain and injury is to have a habit of routinely stretching. We know that when the hamstring muscles are too tight, the pelvis does not move in a normal fashion. The result of restricted pelvis movement is low back pain or injury.

Diet can have an impact on the development of back pain. A diet that is extremely low in carbohydrates, will cause the body to develop a chemistry that has too much acid. Additionally, calcium can be leached out of the bones. These can both contribute to the developing of back pain.



AUSTIN, Texas-Over the past year, counties throughout Texas have experienced the benefits of the Texas Historical Commission's (THC) County Historical Commission (CHC) Outreach Program. May marked the one-year anniversary of the program, designed to assist CHCs by promoting awareness through training to increase preservation activity at the local level and to influence public policy concerning preservation. THC staff makes field visits, responds to queries, sponsors workshops, offers educational opportunities and recognizes outstanding volunteer work with annual awards. This program also evaluates strengths and challenges of CHCs in order to provide recommendations to empower these important preservation partners.

The success of the program is evident in the accomplishments of Runnels CHC. Under new leadership in 2008, Runnels CHC began to work with the CHC Outreach program and attend events sponsored by the THC. Using recommendations and tools provided by the Outreach Program, Runnels CHC worked diligently to complete an inventory of all historical markers in the county. This task led to the discovery that one marker was physically missing, as well as, reacquainted the CHC on the depth of history interpreted by the historical markers.

Other accomplishments achieved through the CHC Outreach Program include making site visits to 53 counties and partnering with other THC programs such as Military Sites and Visionaries in Preservation to assist counties.
