It will soon be 100 years since the end of "The Great War" on November 11, 1918. News of the wars end reached Washington at 2:30 a.m., that day the "the Armistice has been signed. It was signed at 5:00 a.m., Paris time and hostilities will cease at 11 o'clock this morning Paris time."

Why 11 o'clock?? Did a chef diplomat crave to complete the eerie triad of the 11th month, 11th day and 11th hour as the moment when a four year bloodbath would end??

History shows that on the morning of November 11th, meeting in a railroad car at Compiegne, France, Allied and German representatives took eight minutes to sign the armistice. Marshal Ferdinand Foch, the Allie's supreme commander, suggested an official signing time of 5:00 a.m., and a cease-fire six hours later. He'd been up all night and wanted to end the meeting quickly. He felt six hours would be enough time to get work of the cease-fire to troops on the front lines. Word took longer to reach Africa and German troops fighting there did not surrender until November 23rd. Sadly, in an act of revenge,

Armistice was celebrated on November 11th each year until 1954, when the U.S. Congress changed the observance to Veterans Day in order to honor American Veterans of all wars. While you're shaking the hand of a Veteran and extending





Excited About Deer Season

Hunters Are Not the Only Ones

Another hunting season is here. With archery season coming to a close, many more hunters will join the ranks when November 7 ushers in the general hunting season for white-tailed deer.

However, there are many people who will never participate in the hunt, but are just as excited about the potential results it brings. Food banks, pantries, soup kitchens, shelters and other food assistance providers hope to benefit from hunter's generosity this season through the Texas Hunters for the Hungry program. Last hunting season, hunters

donated 192,040 pounds of meat to the Texas Hunters for the Hungry program, with more than 90 food assistance agencies receiving and distributing the venison to their clients.

In Callahan County, donations totaled 1,683 pounds. For the 506. 2009-2010 hunting season, hunters and food assistance agencies alike, anticipate exceeding last year's efforts.

Interested hunters can take legally harvested deer to a participating meat processor, who will process and package the meat for a nominal fee to help cover basic

costs. Meat processors make arrangements with local food assistance agencies to distribute the meat to people in the community who need food. In Callahan County, deer can be donated at Cross Plains Frozen Food in Cross Plains and Lone Wolf Wild Game Processing in Clyde.




Whitetail deer season begins in Callahan County Saturday

EDITOR'S NOTE: Callahan County Game Warden James Brown provided this information about the upcoming whitetail deer season which begins on Saturday, November 7th in Callahan County and throughout Texas.

Hello, Callahan County from Texas Game Warden James Brown. Thank goodness it's time for another good hunting season. Saturday, November 7th, 2009 is the beginning of general whitetail deer season in Texas. With the recent rainfall, the deer crop looks good. One big change in Callahan County's regulations is that now a licensed hunter is allowed to harvest 2 bucks and 3 antlerless whitetail deer compared to our previous season which allowed 1 buck and 2 antlerless.

Don't forget, if you were born on or after September 2, 1971 you will need your hunter education certification. For more details on this and other laws, you can log on to our website at www.tpwd.state.tx.us.

Hunting is a unique and important part of Callahan County. Thanks to law abiding, conservation conscious hunters, they help contribute to a healthy ecosystem. Approximately one million hunters across Texas will participate in some type of hunting activity and that will help make a positive impact in our area. 


Pumpkin Decorating Contest Winners This year Disability Resources,

The Doctors Prescription for Health

The Methuselah Factor

Would anyone like to know how to live longer, be healthier, and greatly decrease the odds of needing chronic medical care and medication?

Most folks that I know would just as soon not have to go to the doctor. Many younger people are concerned about whether they will even be able to afford medical care as they get older. Well, just as the farmer plants seeds to reap a harvest, we must plant health seeds to reap a health harvest as we grow older.

So, what can we do? It is expensive? How do I plant health seeds for a harvest of good health? Let us examine some simple approaches to good health as we grow older. Whether we like it or not we must look at obesity. The statistics tell us that in 1998, we saw that 9.1 percent of total U.S. expenditures were attributed to obesity. In 2002 the dollar amount was \$92.6 billion U.S. dollars. The good news is this...the majority of things increasing our health future will usually lead to a significant decrease in obesity. What all is obesity known to

play a casual role in? Obesity is an important factor predicting the development of coronary artery disease, type 2 diabetes, elevated cholesterol and triglycerides, cancer (uterine, breast and colon), high blood pressure, stroke, liver and gallbladder disease, sleep apnea, and of course,

osteoarthritis. So, what will help fight obesity, and also decrease our odds of needing lifelong medication and treatment for chronic health problems?

To the extent that one is physically able exercise for 30 to 45 minutes for 3 or more days per week, has some significant positive results. And, the 30 to 45 minutes of exercise does not have to be all at once. Studies have proven 10 minutes of exercise three times per day is just as good as one 30 minute episode. So, swimming, a brisk walk, or riding a bicycle are all excellent methods of accomplishing the goal.

Through physical activity and healthy eating, type 2 diabetes onset was reduced by 58% in folks at risk of developing this disease. By comparison, the drug Metformin reduces the onset of type 2 diabetes by 31%

Brisk walking for 30 minutes most days of the week lowers the risk of stroke by 20% and the risk of cardiovascular disease similarly. Interestingly the small amount of exercise we are talking about lowers the risk of cancer by 36%. High blood pressure is also reduced.

So, we see that exercise does not have to be complicated or expensive. What about how we eat?

One can find almost as many diets out there as people. Therefore, for anyone to eat a proper diet, we know this must be simple, easy, not too expensive, and perhaps most of all, not too complicated.

The clear cut winner of diets is the Mediterranean diet.

The Mediterranean diet consists of fruit, vegetables, whole grain breads, cereal, beans, nuts, seeds, fish.

poultry, and minimum amount of beef and pork, and olive oil as the source of fat. These make up the major components of the Mediterranean diet.

The resulting decrease in disease and death attributable to the Mediterranean diet is phenomenal.

Death due to all causes was decreased by more than 50%. Coronary artery disease deaths were reduced by 39%. Cancer related death by 39%.

Stroke was reduced by 6% for each serving of fruit and vegetables eaten per day. A 3-5 ounce serving of fish 1-3 times per week reduced the incidence of stroke in men by 43%

All of these tremendous decreases in the diseases occurred without medicine.

Knowing how significant that proper eating and exercise is to predicting one's future health state is great. Now, in a sense, you become your own doctor. By writing yourself this "prescription" for a healthy way of living, your visits to the doctor's office and pharmacy will likely be greatly diminished in the not so distant future.

Be a good "doctor" to yourself. You will be glad you did.

Pros/Cons of Recent Rainfall

There is no doubt that we needed the rain, but could the rain and cool weather help spark problems with armyworms and feral hogs? Even with the delayed planting and the risk of the growth of pest populations, I doubt that anyone would wish away the rain. With this being said, weather has a big impact on feral hogs and armyworms across the state.

The cooler weather across Texas has delayed armyworm maturation. This will help slow or stop the development of the adult moths and the amount of eggs they lay. Cool conditions can also produce many different ages of armyworms that might require multiple treatments to control. Remember that armyworms are relatively easy to control if they're detected early. When the worms are large, they can be hard to control. So, keep an eye on your crops throughout the year.

Although the cooler temperatures might help with armyworms, the real downside to the cool wet weather is that feral hogs seem to "flourish" in it. Feral hogs become more active and increase damage to crops during these weather conditions. For most parts of the county where feral hogs are a problem, this is not good news. But, just keep in mind that your hog populations did not increase in the last few weeks, it is just that they are more active.



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

ATTENTION **Horse Owners Tick-Transmitted Horse Disease Detected on South Texas Ranch**

A tick-borne disease known as equine piroplasmosis has been confirmed on a ranch in South Texas. Additional testing is being conducted to determine the extent of infection. Horses on the ranch are quarantined to their premises, and a thorough disease investigation is underway.

Equine piroplasmosis can affect horses, donkeys, mules or zebras and cause clinical signs common to many diseases, including poor appetite and weight loss. Death losses can occur. Some infected equine animals may exhibit few or no signs of disease. Those animals that survive the acute phase of infection may continue to carry the parasite, which has been identified as Theileria equi (formerly known as Babesia equi), for long periods of time. 'Although equine piroplasmosis is not considered to be endemic in the U.S., cases have been detected on occasion," said Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas state veterinarian and head of the Texas Animal Health Commission, the state's livestock and poultry health regulatory agency. "In June, equine piroplasmosis was detected in Missouri, with a related case found in Kansas. In 2008, the infection was detected in Florida. These cases have been closed." "As many as 15 tick species are capable of carrying and transmitting the blood parasite responsible for causing equine piroplasmosis," Dr. Hillman explained. "At this time, we do not know which species of tick is responsible for transmitting infection on the South Texas ranch. Additional blood and tick samples are being collected and will be submitted for analysis to the National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL) in Ames, Iowa." Dr. Hillman said there is no vaccine for equine piroplasmosis, and treatment generally is not effective against this tick-borne infection. To avoid spread of the disease, it is important to eliminate contact with ticks and to prevent the transfer of blood from one equine animal to another. "Equine owners may want to consult with their veterinarians for recommendations on preventing tick infestation," said Dr. Hillman. "If equine animals exhibit signs of illness, a veterinarian should be contacted, so appropriate samples may be collected for laboratory testing. Currently, we have no indication that this tick transmitted disease has occurred at other sites in Texas, but maintaining vigilance for this blood parasite is necessary . in determining the extent of this disease situation.
