## Weather Prophet Says Moisture Good

For the 47th consecutive year, J.W. Crim held his Indian weather forecast on his home farm northwest of Clay's Corner. A good representation braved a cold northeast wind to hear the annual forecast Sunday morning at sunup.

The weather prophet said the forecast looked better than any forecast since 1947. The trend will be for adequate moisture and hard winds. No damaging hail was predicted by Crim as he watched the smoke from the teepee-shaped bonfire. He commented that a northeast wind indicates a good year for the farmer. There should not be a great run on irrigation in the spring, he added, and farmers can clean up their irrigation motors and leave them shut off

much of the time. Crim said he has held the weather forecast in the same spot for the last 47 years and the comment was added that during that time, he has missed the actual forecast only two times.

Being a weather prophet is an art, according to Crim, and he learned the method many years ago from the Indians. According to Crim, his father learned the method and it was passed on to him while he was a young man.

Although the prophet lives in Muleshoe following his retirement from actual farming, his son lives on the 'home place' and the weather forecast is still held annually at that location.

A shy senior who suddenly found himself converted from running back to quarterback midway through the 1969 football season was named 'Most Valuable Player' by his teammates at the annual athletic banquet Monday night.

Dennis Beene was tabbed by his team mates for this honor, then doubled up with an additional honor when he was named 'Best All Around Athlete.'

Lionel Patterson was chosen 'Most Valuable Basketball Player' for the 1969-1970 basketball season and Ann Douglass was named recipient of the 'Most Valuable Basketball Player' for the girls.

More than 300 people, including high school athletes, their dates, parents, teachers,

coaches and sports enthusiasts attended the banquet at 7:30 p.m. in the Muleshoe High School cafeteria.

Ben Gramling was an efficient master of ceremonies and introduced special guests and the speaker Dan Reeves, running back for the Dallas Cowboys. Reeves said he had heard of Muleshoe because he was an avid golfer and knows Terry Dill, professional golfer from Muleshoe.

Much of his talk was concerning segregation and integration and the problems of youth today. Reeves commented that you read too much about the bad things done by the young people, and seldom read about the good things they do.

He gave much of the credit for his way of life to his par-

ents and said he had a mother and daddy who cared enough to teach him right from wrong. Emphasizing that most parents didn't care enough to lead and guide their children he told of speaking at Gatesville to 870 boys from eight to 17 years of age in the reformatory.

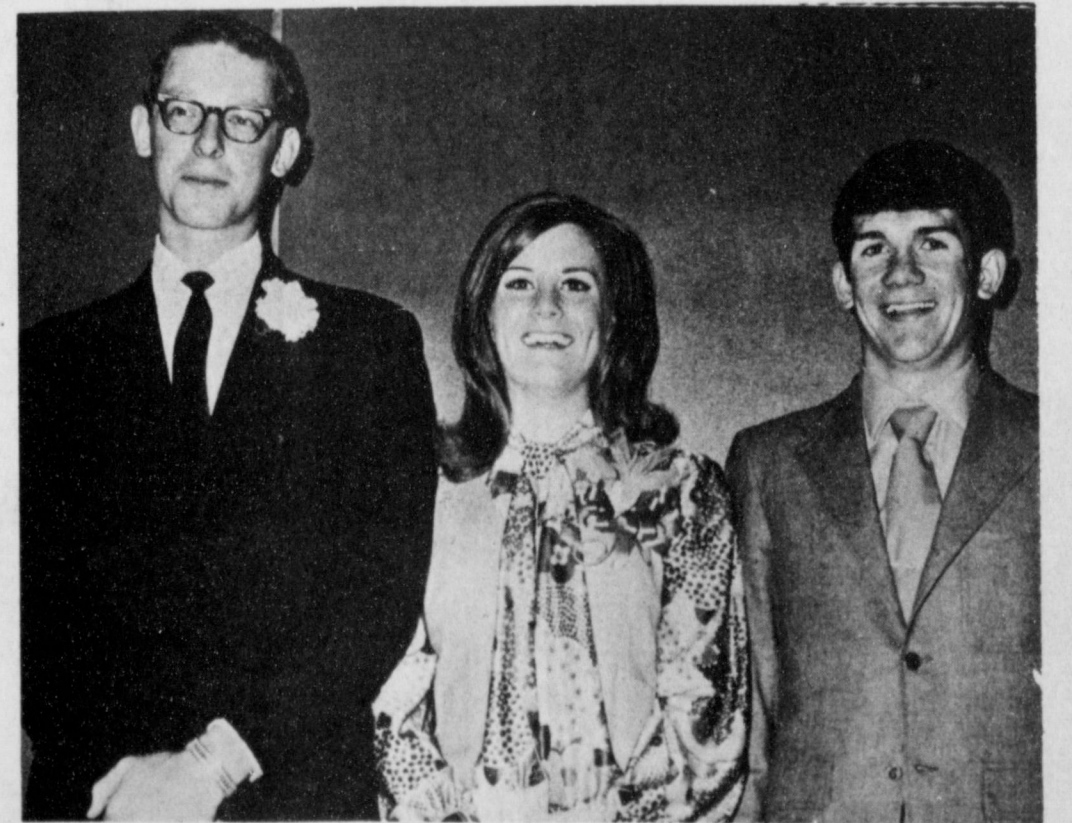
He was told that 87 percent of the boys at the reform school were products of broken homes, or from the home of parents who provided no guidance for their son.

He also stated that he was from a community which cared for Dan Reeves as an individual, not just an athlete. Where he lived, college education was stressed for success and that depended upon a good background.

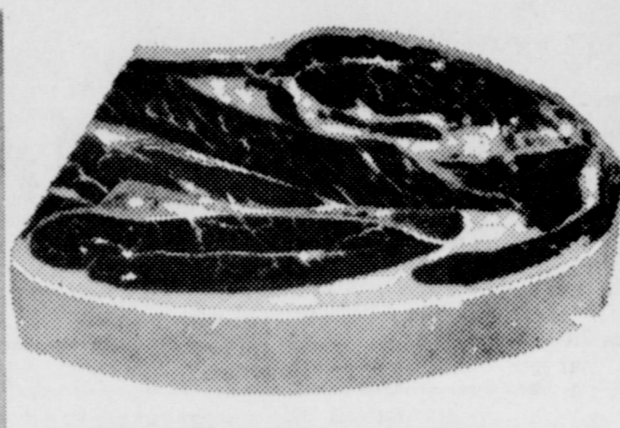

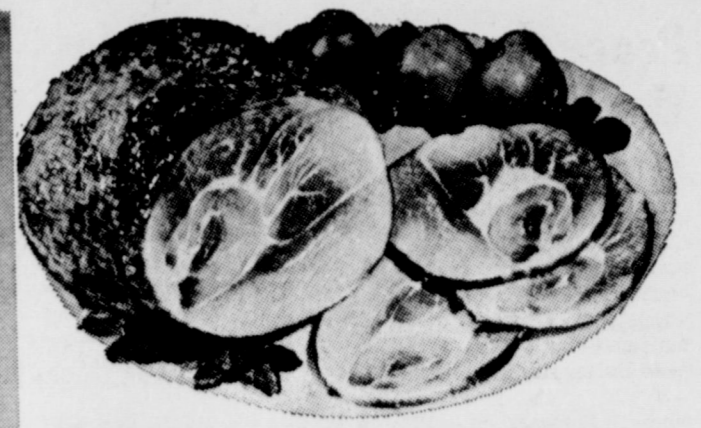

### Peace Justice Morris Nowlin Attends School Embargoed Mail Released By Post Office

COLLEGE STATION—Morris Nowlin of Muleshoe was among 80 members of the Texas Justice of the Peace and Constable's Association attending the three-day school at Texas A&M University this week. Nowlin is the Justice of the Peace, Precinct One, Bailey County. He was awarded a certificate of completion by the Plice Training Division of the Texas Engineering Extension Service during closing ceremonies Wednesday.

The justices, who date their position to the first magistrate appointed in 1327 in England, took part in studies of changes and procedures in Texas law. A highlight of the meetings was a presentation calling for certification of JPs under a bill to be introduced during the 62nd Legislature.

The bill would require Texas' 946 justices to complete an educational program within one year after taking office. Educational funds are available through the Texas Criminal Justice Council.

A&M's Police Training Division has committed itself to the training program. Certification would be under the Texas Commission for Law Enforcement Education, which already certifies Texas' law enforcement officers.

Easter 1970 is here. And if you have children young enough to enjoy hunting Easter eggs, here are some tips for you in getting ready for the hunt.

**COOKING:** Easter eggs will taste and look best if they are hard cooked instead of hard boiled. Cooking eggs at a lower temperature means more tender egg whites, less dark coloring around the yolk and less cracking of shells during cooking. Here's one way to hard cook eggs without boiling: cover eggs with cool water and bring to a boil in a heavy covered saucepan. Set pan off heat and let eggs set for about 20 minutes in hot water. If you must hurry the process simmer (but do not boil) for 10 minutes. Immerse cooked eggs immediately in cold water.

**DYEING:** Wipe shells thoroughly with a moist cloth, then allow to dry. Eggs that have limy shells will dye with tiny white spots. Blow eggs out of shells or hard cook eggs before tinting. Eggs dye best when they are hot, and hot water dyes are fastest.

Prepare the dye according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Immerse the eggs until they become the shade you want them. Let them dry and then you and the children can use your imagination in decorations.

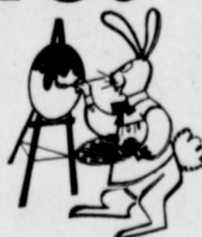

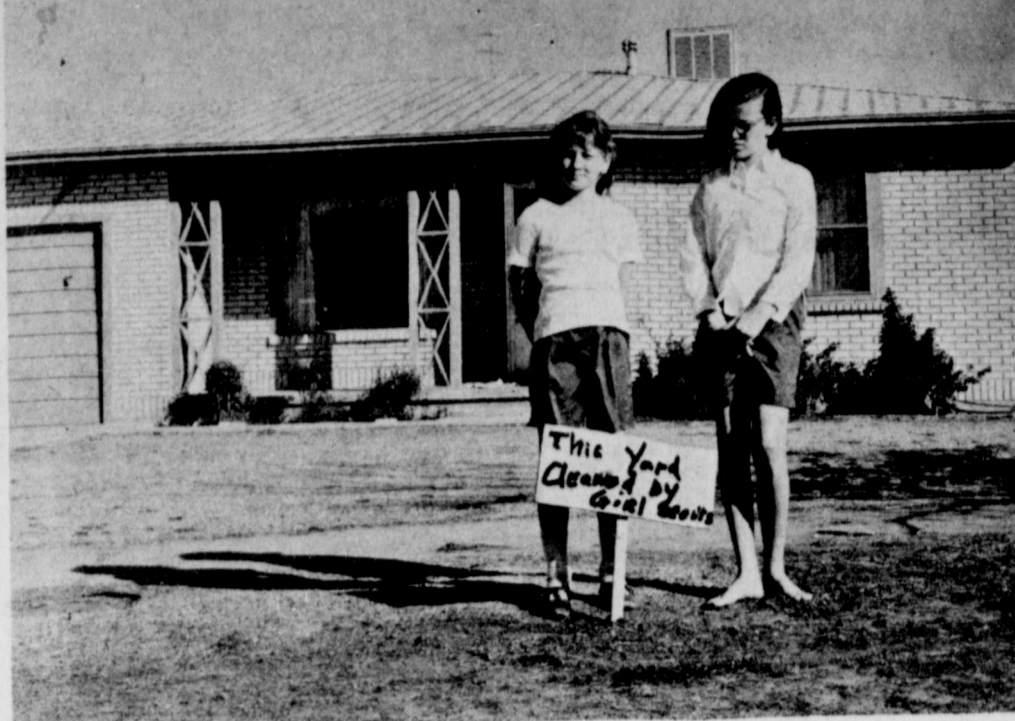

## Plainview Slated To Host SPD Meet

A conference designed to focus on the swine production industry of the South Plains will be held at the Hale County Agriculture Center in Plainview on Thursday, April 9, announces County Agricultural Agent J.K. Adams.

The conference will begin at 2 p.m. and will be sponsored by the South Plains Development (SPD) program and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Conference moderator will be James Rogers, general manager of the Plainview Production Credit Association and chairman of the Plainview Chamber of Commerce Agriculture Committee.

A slate of topnotch speakers will be on hand to discuss various phases of swine production. They include F.V. Wallace of Amarillo, newly elected president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce; Dr. T.D. Tanksley, associate professor of animal science and Extension animal husbandman at Texas A&M University; Dr. Gilbert Hollis of Lubbock, area Extension swine specialist; Dr. William Thomas, Extension animal husbandman at Texas A&M; Paul Gross of Big Spring, Howard County agricultural agent; Roy Poage, Lubbock Swine Breeders, Inc.; and R.A. (Dick) Hurley of Plainview, manager, Jimmy Dean Meat Co.

Wallace will express some views on how the West Texas C. of C. looks at pork production while Tanksley will discuss the long range outlook for pork production on the South Plains. The use of existing facilities by

small farm operators in producing swine will be the subject of Gross' talk.

According to Adams, Poage will discuss facilities for a commercial pork production operation. Hollis will give some survey results on the most profitable steps for a beginner in producing pork while Thomas will discuss low cost rations for maximum profit. Hurley will round out the program by discussing his experiences in marketing more than 10 pigs per litter from 400 sows.

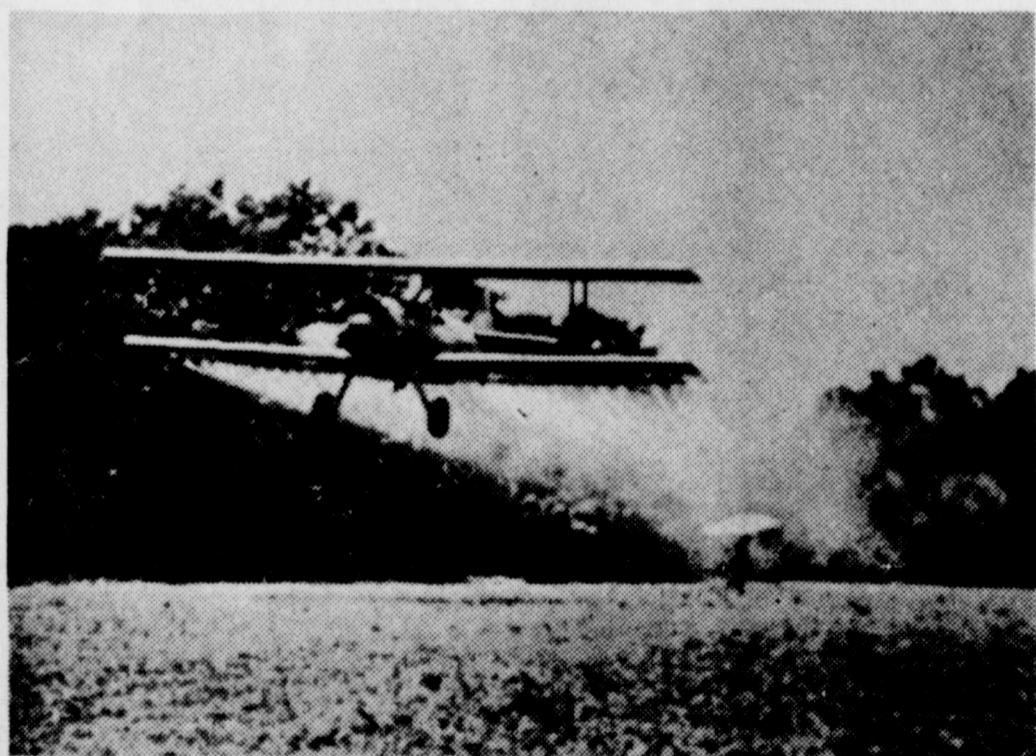

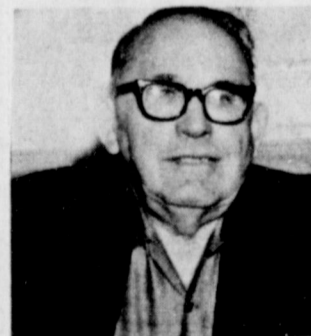

#### From Congressman BOB PRICE

Panhandle Congressman Bob Price hailed House passage Wednesday of legislation creating an International Livestock Quarantine Station as opening a major avenue of improving livestock quality.

"The bill, which incorporated all the features of a bill I introduced in 1969, authorizes the Department of Agriculture to establish and operate a quarantine station where livestock being imported into the United States can first be checked for disease," Price said.

In remarks on the House floor, Price noted that as a life-long rancher he is well aware of some of the benefits that will accrue to both the rancher and consumer if the bill becomes law.

"Some of the specific changes possible are increases in weaning weight and in post-weaning growth. A decrease in carcass waste, improved fertility and calf survival are other possible benefits," Price said. "These benefits and others will create cost savings which could be passed on to the final consumer; they will also dramatically increase the supply of good red meat available for the American housewife," he added.

"While I certainly agree that the Federal Government has the responsibility to see that our nation is not infected with foreign animal disease, it is also responsible for assisting farmers and ranchers in improving their ability to feed 200 million, and what is soon to be 300 million Americans."

"The livestock industry can meet the challenges of the future only by the full use and benefit of hybrid vigor. The activities, the research and the experiments of an international quarantine station will allow every American to enjoy a greater variety of high-quality livestock products at a reasonable cost in the future," Price said.
