Joe North, Ozona Auto Dealer, Is **Drowning Victim**

Business Leader Loses Life In Tragedy On Devil's River

Shocking news of the death by frowning of Joe W. North, 54ear-old Ozona automobile dealer, rumbed all Ozona early Sunday morning when his body was recovered from the waters of Devil's River a short distance from where his boat was swamped and sunk

by high waves twelve hours earlier. The body was found by J. B. Parker and George Bunger, Jr., the latter a nephew of Mr. North's who were among the large number Mr. and Mrs. Ira Carson and of searchers, including Ozona fire dragging the river bed in search of the body.

ARE YOU ELIGIBLE FOR AN FHA LOAN?

Elsewhere in this paper is a news story to the effect that the Farmers Home Administration (F-HA) has again made available loans to "eligible" Texas farmers for the construction and repair of farm houses and other farm buildings, including farmstead water

supplies. What makes a farmer "eligible" under this program of low interest rate loans from the federal government is the interesting part

Interest on the loans will be 4 percent and repayment will be scheduled over periods up to 33 years. This sounds ok, but "the loans will be secured by a mortgaige on the borrower's farm. That's ok too, because you wouldn't expect to borrow money from a fellow without giving him some

But to be "eligible" the farmer must, of course, own his farm and, he must "be unable to obtain suitable credit for dwellings and other buildings from other



FREEDOM IS AN ABSOLUTE

Dan Thornton, former governor of Colorado, had some wise words to say to the Oregon Cattlemen's Association. He urged these producers to reject government subsidies. And he made his big point with a simple question: "Do we wish to remain a free enterprise nation or accept socialism?"

There is no real middle ground between those two extremes. "A little bit of socialism" inexorably grows, like live yeast, until we have a whole lot of socialism. Then the individual becomes a robot, responding to the strings pulled by the bosses - who are the politicians and the bureaucrats.

Groups of people may turn to government to help with some temporary problem. But, after the problem has been solved or has changed, government is still right there with its controls and its regulations and its rulebooks.

Moreover, government aid is always subject to the unpredictable winds of political expendiency as vast numbers of farmers must have learned by now. So far, according to all the evidence, a majority of livestock producers have been adamantly opposed to looking to government for solutions to their problems. They deserve all credit for that — and they will deserve still greater credit if they

Integration of Schools Compared to Prohibition

Senator Robertson says it is now the South's turn to appeal to public opinion.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The present reaction of Southerners to the Supreme Court decision of 1954 prohibiting racially segregated schools has been compared by Senator A. Willis Robertson of Virginia to the reaction of Northern states to the prohibition amendment between 1919 when it was ratified and 1933 when it was repealed.

Robertson States to operate mixed schools instead of requiring separate but Senate Floor answering critour eyes 'sumptuary'."

Explaining that he had en-joyed friendly relations in the Senate with Senator Lehman, although they had differed on economic and social problems, Robertson said it was without rancor or bitterness that he proposed to point out "how inconsistent it is for a distinguished member of this body to make a strong and determined fight on one phase of States' rights and attempt to deny a similar priv-ilege to others who invoke the same doctrine but on a different

The declaration signed by Southern members of Congress, Robertson said, condemned the Supreme Court decision as unwareanted under the division of powers provided by the Constitution and unwise not only because of the effect it would have on public schools but also because of the damage it would do to our constitutional form of government. The declaration advocated only "lawful" means to bring about a reversal of the Court's decision. Robertson recalled that after the Eighteenth (prohibition) Amendment and the enforcement act adopted by Congress had been approved by the Supreme Court in a test case, Senator Lehman's state had refused to cooperate in enforcement of the law. He quoted the U. S. District Attorney for the Southern District of New York as saying repeal of the New York enforcement act was "the hardest blow the enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment had received."

The other lesson is of higher and broader importance, that human progress, that advance along the road of civilization from brutish animalism to the conceptions of justice and charity . . has been made not by compulsion, but by the development of higher standards of conduct and nobler emotions among the people; a lesson that advance in all that is noble and good comes not from without, but from within."


