Contract Signed For Continental Dist. Office Here

Troy Williams To Construct Building For Dist Headquarters

Last doubt as to location of the Continental Oil Co. district headquarters offices in Ozona was removed this week when a signed contract was received by Troy Williams, providing for construction by Mr. Williams of a 3-office building on which the Continental will take a ten-year lease for use as its Crockett District headquarters.

The location of the district offices in Ozona will mean the addition of a number of families to Ozona, many of them already moved in from field camps to residences here. Paul Jacobs, already a resident of Ozona, is the Ozona district superintendent.

The building contract came from the office of R. T. Hanson, assistant Regional Manager of Production in the Southwestern Region of Continental, with headquarters in Fort Worth.

The new building, to be of tile and faced with brick, is to be constructed on the lot adjoining the Williams Motor Co. building, on the west side. It is to be 49 feet across the front, facing north, and 56 feet deep. It is to be completely air conditioned and will have an ample parking space for employe cars on the west side of the building.

As soon as detailed plans and specifications can be completed, Mr. Williams will begin negotiations for a contract for construction of the building.

Angelo Teenagers Win Area Crown In League Playoffs

Big Lake and McCamey Downed By Champs In Series Here

Modern Way Grocery of San Angelo won the area championship in the teenage league playoffs held in Ozona Monday and Tuesday in two closely played contests, both of which drew large crowds.

Dick Johnson, San Angelo catcher, lashed the first pitch over the left field wall in the last half of the last inning Tuesday night to provide the Champs with a 5 to 4 victory over McCamey.

San Angelo jumped into an early lead with a four run outburst in the second inning but had been held in check after that with McCamey staging a three run rally to tie the score in the first of the sixth frame.

Bates Hoffer's long drive over the center field wall highlighted the second innng outburst for San Angelo while a perfect squeeze play which produced the tying run was the highlight of the McCamey rally in the sixth frame.

John Ingram started on the mound for San Angelo and had things pretty much his way until the McCamey uprising in the sixth brought Kenneth Millican back to the mound to get his second win in the two nights of play. Ingram gave up 7 hits, struck out 5 and walked none in his five and one third innings but got shaky support in the form of four errors, two of which produced runs.

Nelson Huffman went the route for McCamey and with the exception of the second inning had little trouble with San Angelo until Johnston unloaded his tie breaking homer. Huffman gave up but 6 hits, struck out six and walked one in the six innings plus he worked but also got wobbly support which contributed to the oppositions scoring.

San Angelo moved in the finals Monday night when they edged Big Lake 3 to 2 on two mental lapses by the Big Lake infield. Bill Loftin hurled great ball for (Continued on Last Page)

January Start For Dam Construction Predicted By SCS

State SCS Head To Visit Ozona in Mid-Aug. For Conference

Actual construction work on the Johnson Draw watershed retardation dams is expected to get under way shortly after January 1. H. N. Smith, head of the Soil Conservation Service in Texas, announced Saturday in Temple.

The Crockett county project won final approval of the United States Congress last week and wheels were started turning immediately looking toward the start of construction.

The SCS received an allocation of \$314,000 Friday, Mr. Smith said, clearing the way for final planning of the project and to pay the federal government's share of the cost of three days authorized in the current fiscal year.

The State Conservationist estimated it will take six months to ready the project for the first letting of contracts, to be done by the Crockett County Commissioners Court and the Crockett Soil Conservation District, sponsoring agencies. He has informed Bob Scott, local conservationist with the SCS, that he plans to meet with local sponsoring agencies and citizens here about mid August to discuss planning and to inform citizens of steps to be taken by the SCS toward completion of the project.

The entire project, designed to prevent flooding of the normally dry wash which passes through Ozona, calls for seven water retaining dams, six of them on the upper watershed of Johnson Draw and one on Gurley draw which joins Johnson in Ozona. There is a possibility that Ozona's water needs for the future may be guaranteed by construction of additional storage on the Gurley draw dam to provide a stand-by water (Continued on Last Page)

Survivors include the husband and one son, J. L. Hicks, Jr.; two brothers, Arch and Tom Cook of Ozona, and three sisters, Mrs. D. C. Ratliff, Mrs. George Senne and Mrs. Ida Mae Yancy, all of Ozona. Mrs. Hicks was born in Brackettville but lived most of her life in Ozona.

Mills Upsets Incumbent For Sheriff's Post

Mahon, Jones, Smith Re-elected In Record Primary Ballot

Billy Mills, for four years a deputy on the staff of Sheriff V. O. Earnest, emerged victorious in a race to unseat his former boss in the Democratic primary here last Saturday, which, incidentally, set a new total vote record of 1,324 for this county.

Mills won nomination by a margin of 190 votes, polling a total of 754 votes to 564 for Earnest.

In another hotly contested race for county office, incumbent Co. Attorney Dixon Mahon won the nomination for a second term in the office over his opponent, Howard Lemmons. The vote was 710 for Mahon and 584 for Lemmons.

County Commissioner Ralph Jones won renomination for the Precinct 1 commissioner post over two opponents without a runoff. Jones polled a majority over Doyle Perdue and Hubert Baker. Jones received 220 votes to 102 for Perdue and 90 for Baker.

Another incumbent Commissioner, Rusty Smith, won a new term over Elmer D. Graves. Smith polled 250 votes to 130 for Graves. Smith is Commissioner from Precinct 3.

Crockett county, as expected, went strong for Congressman J. T. Rutherford in his bid for a second term as congressman from the 16th Texas district. Congressman Rutherford almost single-handedly pushed the Johnson Draw watershed project approval through the Washington maze and saw it to final approval three days before adjournment of Congress.

Congressman Rutherford won a five-to-one margin over his opponent, William W. Blanton of Odessa. Rutherford was approved by Crockett County voters 922 to 183 for Blanton.

In the state races, Crockett Co. voters followed the pattern of the state as a whole, placing Senator Price Daniel in first place, and Ralph Yarborough in second, with Pappy O'Daniels a close third. This is the order in which they finished in the state and Daniel and Yarborough will battle it out for final nomination in the run-off primary on August 25.

For Lieutenant Governor, Ben Ramsey was a big favorite, West Texan John Lee Smith of Lubbock rated second. In the attorney general's race, voters here reversed the standings of the run-off contenders, Will Wilson, who was the leader in the state, placing second here behind Tom Moore of Waco; who will oppose Wilson in the run-off. State Treasurer Jesse James, Land Commissioner Earl Rudder, Agriculture Commissioner John White and Congressman-at-Large Martin Dies, all winners in the state, were favored by local voters.

On the referendum on racial issues, local voters, as they did over the state, approved the measures, in this county by a margin of about three to one in all cases.

A. O. Fields, Crockett county Democratic chairman, was renominated for that office with a whopping 1,054 votes. Precinct chairmen nominated by the voters include Chas. E. Davidson, Jr., for Precinct 1, Charlie Black, Jr., in Precinct 2, Jeff Owens in Precinct 3 and Peery Holmesly in Precinct 4.

Texita To Drill Two Half Field Offsets

Texita Oil Co. will drill two step-outs to the Half field of Crockett County, four miles northwest of Sheffield.

Both projects will be drilled with rotary to 2,500 feet.

The No. 2 H. L. Bair, one location west-southwest, is 330 feet from the south and 1,290.3 feet from the east lines of 51-1-I&GN. It is on a 280-acre lease.

The No. 2-A C. W. Meadows, one location south, is 1,877 feet from the east and 1,456.8 feet from the north lines of 1-50-Jim Moore survey (Wm. Green on some maps.)

Funeral services will be held at 11 o'clock Saturday morning for Mrs. Howard B. Cox, former Ozonan and wife of a pioneer West Texas ranchman, who died late yesterday afternoon at her home in San Angelo.

Services will be conducted from the Episcopal Church in San Angelo, with burial to follow in Fairmount Cemetery.

Mrs. Cox was born Alma Meadows May 8, 1882, and married Mr. Cox Aug. 10, 1910, in Comanche. The couple resided in Ozona for many years before moving to San Angelo in about 1930.

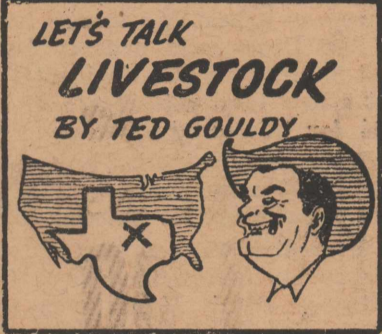

Stocker & Feeders Remain Active and Prices Strong

At Fort Worth Monday the trade in stockers and feeders with quality was again strong in the cattle and calf divisions. Slaughter steers and yearlings were steady, and slaughter calves were steady to weak. Cows and bulls were weaker.

Comparative prices included: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings \$16.50 to \$21.50; common and medium kinds \$10 to \$16.50. Fat cows \$9.50 to \$11.50; and canners and cutters \$6 to \$9.50. Bulls \$9 to \$12.50, odd head \$13.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold from \$15 to \$17.50, some fancy around 600-pounders to \$18. Lighter weights under 400 pounds stopped around \$16. Plain and medium butcher calves \$11 to \$14, and cull and common kinds \$8 to \$11.

Stocker steer calves of good and choice quality \$16 to \$19.50 and heifers 17 down. Steer yearlings sold from \$18 down.

Lambs Strong to \$1.00 higher

Good and choice fat lambs topped at \$20 to \$22 at Fort Worth Monday, the best performance in some weeks for the class. Medium and lower grades sold from \$12 to \$17. Stocker and feeders were quoted from \$12.50 to \$16. Slaughter yearlings sold from \$17 down.

Wethers sold mostly from \$8 to \$12.50, some choice old wethers and two-year-olds to \$13.50.

Slaughter ewes drew \$4.50 to \$5.50.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment to be voted on at an election to be held on Nov. 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows: "Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, with the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Ellenburger Discovery In Northeast Crockett To Be Offset By Pure

The Pure Oil Co. has filed application to drill the No. 2-D University as a ¼-mile southeast offset to the firm's No. 1-D University recently completed Crockett County Ellenburger discovery, 8½ miles southwest of Barnhart.

It will be drilled to 9,250 feet with rotary.

Location, on a 343.8-acre lease,

is 1,690 feet from the north and 1,047 feet from the east lines of 11-44-University.

The discovery was completed July 13 for a daily flowing potential of 208.5 barrels of 47.2 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 583-1, through a 24-64-inch choke and perforations between 9,028-386 feet.

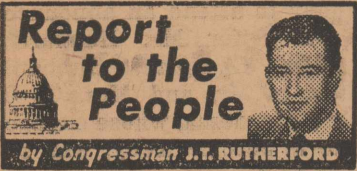

As always this time of year, topic "A" in the Nation's Capitol concerns the approaching adjournment of Congress. The leadership hopes to be through with business before you read this, although a few skeptics doubt if the deadline will be met. But in an effort to make that deadline, Congress is burning near-midnight oil.

A feeling of expectancy hover Capitol Hill as each adjournment approaches. There is little time to take stock of what has gone before as the ever-present problem is to complete current business. But a pause to glance back at the actions of the 84th Congress in its dying hours reveals the major legislation listed below as having been passed in the last 18 months: Highway bill, setting off nation's most extensive road-building program in history. Bill to get the Federal Government out of business, especially in rubber plant and tin-smelter industries. Water Pollution Act, providing funds to make a good start on cleaning up the Nation's streams. Narcotics Control Law, with stiffer penalties and improved policing. Soil Bank Program, aimed at helping farmers caught in the price squeeze. Civil Service and Railroad Retirement legislation. Bills to extend Salk polio vaccine program and School Milk program. Natural Gas Bill, exempting gas producers from Federal Control, but vetoed by President. Increase from \$25 million to \$125 million in Small Business funds to assist distressed business. In addition, many appropriations bills have been passed. Still pending, but expected to come up shortly after this is written: Housing Bill for 1957, Hell's Canyon measure, Social Security extension bill.

For the statistical-minded, I submit the following: Through July 24th, 1956, the 84th Congress had passed 752 bills into public law. Taking the House and Senate individually, the House had passed a total of 2,660 bills and resolutions, while the Senate had passed

2,825 bills and resolutions. The House had been in session 227 days, or 734 hours. The Senate had met 221 days, or 1214 hours. In addition, many, many hours were spent in Committee by each Congressman, who also had local projects to work on and much correspondence to handle. Long-time observers call the 84th Congress one of the hardest-working bodies ever to convene in Washington.

Wonder why the Senate met almost twice the number of hours the House did? Senate has unlimited debate, encouraging lengthy speeches, debates, discussions and delays. House is restricted in debating time by parliamentary law.

Newspaper men who have been on the Washington scene for a number of years find a paradox in the actions and attitudes of the 84th Congress compared to the type of legislation it has considered. They point out that more bills of controversial nature have been submitted to the 84th Congress than to any Congress in recent years.

Yet, they have commented on the lack of real ear-splitting disputes and, even, fist-fights. It has not been altogether uncommon for Members of Congress to join in actual fistic battle during heated debates in other years. Only one near-fight occurred this Congress and both would-be combatants seemed relieved not to have to go through with the match. Some hard-hitting speeches have been heard, but according to old hands, they lacked the fire of years gone by. Observers say this is even more unusual since this is Presidential election year, and usually the clue for all sorts of arm-waving, lung-expanding bellows.

Members of Congress who witnessed the House of Representatives shooting episode a few years ago jumped noticeably recently when, during floor debate, a lady in the visitors gallery climbed to her feet and shrilly announced that the gentlemen did not know what they were talking about. Us-hers removed her without trouble, but a few oldtimers kept a weather eye out for firearms.

The house approved shortly before adjournment a bill to elimin-

ate 10 percent Federal tax on amusements in cases where admission is 90 cents or less. This was a war-time tax and has been fought since the end of World War II.

With adjournment at hand, this will be the final Report To The People of the current session. The Report will be resumed at the beginning of the 85th Congress next January. I would like to thank the newspapers, radio stations, and T-V stations in West Texas for bringing the report to the people of West Texas during the 84th Congress. My appreciation also to the many persons who have been kind enough to write me of their approval of the Report. Its purpose is to bring you information not available through regular news outlets, and to give you a personal report of highlights and sidelights of the Washington scene, and to better acquaint you with your government in action. As I have stated before, this is an after-hours job and time does not always permit the Report to be a model of journalistic perfection, but I am nonetheless gratified at the reception it has received.

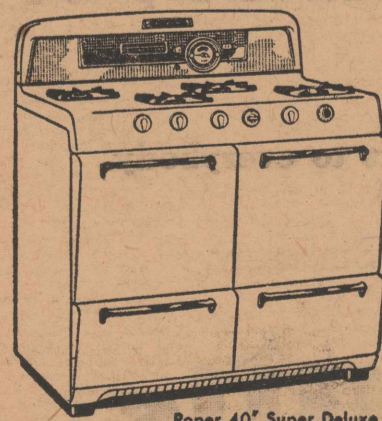

The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From Stockman Aug. 4, 1927

Formation of a statewide, general organization of all branches or groups of those engaged in the different lines of agriculture will be proposed at a meeting to be held in San Antonio Aug. 20 at the call of R. M. Kleberg, president of the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Assn., according to a letter received here by T. A. Kincaid, president of the Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn. of Texas.

All four amendments to the state constitution, submitted to the voters of Texas Monday, were swatted six to one by Crockett county voters and lost heavily all over the state, the general average being three to one against them.

An organized effort on the part of a group living in the Mexican suburb of Ozona to break quarantine rules invoked by the county following the recent outbreak of smallpox was squelched by officers who threatened to fire on the rebellious group if an attempt was made to break through the quarantine lines. If no new cases develop before the end of this week, the community may be released from quarantine, Dr. G. L. Coates said.

Nine new locations for oil tests have been made recently in Crockett county, four of which have been spudded in within the last week. In addition to these new locations, swapping of leases has been active and development in the county looking up generally.

An organized fight to elect United States Congressmen and Representatives who are in favor of a just and equitable protective tariff policy on products of the farm and ranch is taking form over Texas under the leadership of the Texas Tariff Clubs in preparation for the 1928 elections.

Raymond Bennett, who bought out the Ozona Barber Shop a year ago, has closed a deal for sale of the shop to Arthur Patton of Buda. The consideration was not made public.

Despite the hot weather of the past few weeks, Ozona golf fans are braving the sunshine for a round on the course every day and some of the erstwhile dubs are working up good form and turning in some good scores.

Time In Seven Years**

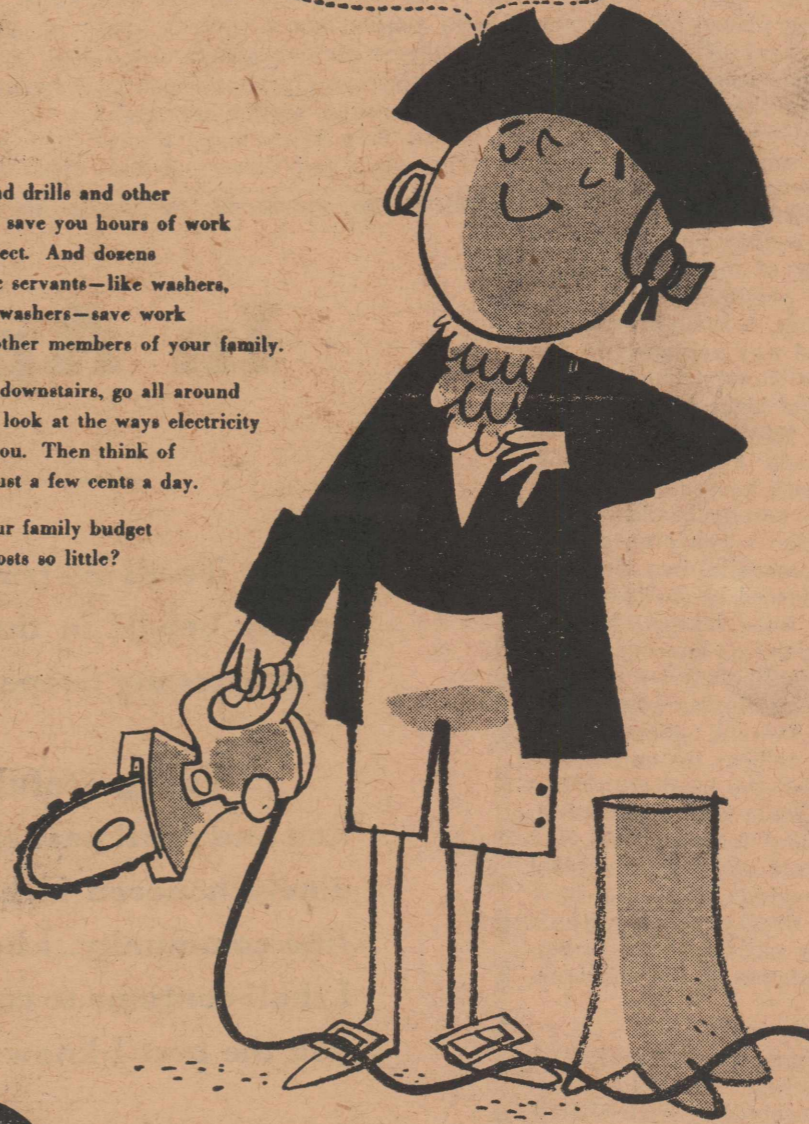

supply in case of failure of the city's well or their pollution. The Crockett Water Control has placed a \$25,000 item in its planned budget, provided for in a proposed \$250,000 bond issue to be voted on later this month, to furnish the estimated additional amount necessary to provide this added storage.

The seven-dam project is estimated to cost a total of \$1,617,803, according to information from Mr. Smith's office. This amount includes values placed on land preparation, a part of the soil conservation measures over the 101,760-acre watershed area easements and right-of-way, in addition to the actual construction cost. The actual construction cost is estimated at over \$800,000.

Crockett county put \$25,000 in trust for use of the SOS in speeding up the preliminary planning and surveying. A little over \$4,000 of this fund was returned to the county. The county has voted a \$200,000 bond issue to finance its part of the total cost. Fate of an amendment to Public Law 566, passed by both houses of Congress at the recent session but last heard as headed for a conference committee to reconcile two versions of the bill passed by the two houses, has not been learned here in sifting information concerning the hundreds of bills hurried through Congress in its closing hours. This amendment would obligate the government to bear the entire construction cost, the local cost-share being made up in land preparation, easements and maintenance. Had the bill passed and been approved by the president, it would have meant that Crockett county would not have to sell its bonds to finance the balance of the construction cost.
