



All farms with acreage allotments for cotton, wheat, peanuts, rice and tobacco, or base acreages for corn, are eligible to take part in the Acreage Reserve of the Soil Bank. Farmers who participate will reduce their 1957 acreage of one or more of those crops below the allotment or corn base. All farmers who wish to participate in 1957 should work out their plans with the County Agricultura Stabilization and Conservation Committee. tee, the U. S. Department of Agricultura Stabilization and Conservation Committee, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announces. Payments will be made to compensate farmers for loss of net income resulting from crop acreage reduction. These payments will be based on normal crop yield for the reserved land, as determined by the County ASC Committee. Farmers may leave this land idle, or apply soil or water conservation practices on it. This land cannot be cropped or cut for hay during 1957 calendar year, and may not be grazed unless the Secretary of Agriculture determines an emergency exists. Farmers also may participate in the Soil Bank's Conservation Reserve for which all farm land regularly used to produce crops is eligible.








