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Rankin Tourney Consolation To Ozona's Cagers

Jake Young Wins All Tourney Honors; McCamey Champions

The rapidly improving Ozona Lions bounced back from a poorly played loss in the opener and rapped Imperial and Crane to cop consolation honors at the Rankin Tourney last weekend.

The Lions dropped a 40 to 35 decision to the host Red Devils when they connected with but 14 of 60 shots from the floor and missed 21 of 28 free throws. Even with miserable shooting the young Lions hustled all the way and pulled into a third period tie before Rankin was able to ice the game away.

Saturday morning the Lions bumped Imperial from the consolation title hunt with a 44 to 36 victory that saw Jake Young and Rodney Franklin lead the Lions to victory. Young poured in 19 points and rebounded well despite an upset stomach which sidelined him twice during the contest. While Young was out Franklin took up the slack hitting from the field six times and rebounding effectively.

The win from Imperial sent the Lions into the consolation finals Saturday night against the towering Crane Cranes. The Lions flashed a rugged defense and some classic rebounding as they rallied to go ahead in the first quarter and led all the way for a 40 to 29 victory.

Jake Young and Jerry Jacobs provided the needed punch as they counted 15 and 13 points respectively.

Young, Franklin, and Jacobs did a fine job of rebounding against a trio that measured 6'5" at the post and 6'3" at each forward as compared to Ozona's tallest Rod Franklin who measures 6'1".

The Lions continued to miss from the free throw line as they connected on a mere 9 shots out of 30 tried.

In the finals McCamey downed Iraan for the title and Rankin slipped past Grand Falls for third place. Jake Young was chosen all-tourney.

Lions Barely Edged By Lyles And Iraan Braves Tuesday Night

The Ozona Lions faltered in the final period Tuesday night and dropped a hard fought 41 to 38 loss to the Iraan Braves at Davidson Gym.

Lindy Lyles, one of the outstanding players in the area, dumped in 25 points to give Iraan the win even though it was not until the final minutes that the Braves were able to sew up the contest.

In Iraan about two weeks ago the Braves easily crushed the Lions 53 to 33 and at one point led 16 to 0 but such was not the case Tuesday night as the Lions were in an 11 to 11 tie at the quarter led 24 to 23 at the half and trailed by only one point at the third quarter mark.

The Lions hit for 11 points in the first period, 12 in the second period and 10 in the third period before trailing off to a mere 4 points in the final frame.

Jake Young and Bobby Vargas each contributed 11 points to the Lion attack and Stanley Williams did a fine job of rebounding along with Jake Young and Rod Franklin to keep the Lions in contention.

The Lions, despite coming so close, still had a very poor shooting average counting on but 23 per cent of their shots, a normal 30 per cent would have probably won the game easily.

The Lions did show improvement on their free throws as they counted 8 of 17 times which, while not good, is much better than the Lions have been doing.

The Lions will close out pre-Christmas play in Big Lake tonight as they meet the region's outstanding class A club. The Lions are assured of an even break on pre-Christmas play as the record now stands at five wins and four losses.

\$57,000 Worth Highway Work In Crockett Slated

Big Lake, Todd Field And RM 33 Roads To Get New Seal

Highway improvement work estimated to cost \$57,000 and affect approximately 32 miles of highway in Crockett county is scheduled for work by the State Highway Department early next year, according to an announcement from the State Highway Department at Austin.

The Crockett county program was part of a state program planned by the Highway Department for the calendar year of 1957. This new program is especially designed to protect the investment already made in the state system of roads.

J. A. Snell, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at San Angelo, announced that the following state highway and roads in this county are scheduled for work under this program.

RM 865, the Ozona-Big Lake cut-off road, intersecting State Highway 163 two miles north of Ozona is scheduled for level asphalt surface and seal coating from the intersection of Highway 163 to the intersection with RM 33, a distance of 17.3 miles. Estimated cost of this project is \$25,000.

RM 1946, the Todd Field road intersecting RM 865 to the north, a distance of 4.5 miles, is due for an asphalt seal coat at an estimated cost of \$6,000.

RM 33, the Midway Lane road from Big Lake to Eldorado, crossing Highway 163 fifteen miles north of Ozona, is to be widened, leveled and a seal coat of asphalt surfacing applied for a distance of 10.8 miles from the intersection with Highway 163 east. Estimated cost of this project was set at \$26,000.

It was announced that work will begin on these projects just as soon as final planning is completed.

Slow Wintertime Rain Brings Quarter To Half Inch Moisture To Area

Slow-falling wintertime rain, the kind that could cure what ails West Texas and most of the southwest if it could last ten to fifteen days without a let-up, covered a big part of this West Texas area Tuesday night.

The rain resulted from a cold front moving into the area. Some thunderstorm activity accompanied the weather disturbance and reports of rain up to .9 of an inch in the Sanderson area were brought here. The fall was from a quarter to a half inch over most of this county. Ozona's fall was measured at a little over a quarter inch.

Bank Will Adopt Saturday Closing Plan January 12

Open Until 5 Fridays, Fewer Holidays New State Bank Plan

Effective Saturday, January 12, Ozona National Bank will adopt a five-day work schedule, with the bank closed all day Saturday and open until 5 p. m. on Friday afternoon to take care of the week-end needs of customers.

Lowell Littleton, active vice president of the bank, this week announced the bank's decision to take advantage of enabling legislation enacted by the Texas Legislature in 1955, which permits the five-day work week for banks in Texas.

The change in banking hours will result in a net loss of one hour of banking time each week for customers, but the plan has worked successfully in several hundred banks which have adopted the schedule since the law was amended, and local bank officials feel that the plan will work no inconvenience for customers once the plan is in operation and the public becomes accustomed to the schedule.

The local bank will open at 9 a. m. and close at 3 p. m. each day Monday through Thursday and on Fridays the work day will be extended in the afternoon to 5 o'clock instead of 3, thus giving customers an added two hours in late afternoon to get their banking business completed.

Under the new work schedule, banks here and in all of Texas will reduce the number of holidays observed from a former 14 to 6. The new holiday schedule will include observance of New Year, San Jacinto Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas as holidays.

Banks in a number of area towns have already adopted the new schedule and San Angelo banks will go on the new schedule the same day as the Ozona bank has set. Mr. Littleton said that patrons have made the adjustment to the five-day week in other industries, and he feels the shorter banking week will not create inconvenience to customers here.

Jackie Womack Wounded In Gun Accident On Hunt

Accidental Discharge Of Rifle Wounds Ozonan In Legs

Jackie Womack of Ozona suffered gunshot wounds in both legs early Saturday morning in a hunting accident on a ranch south of Ozona.

Womack was wounded when a hunting rifle in the hands of a companion, Jack Gillitt, was accidentally discharged. The two men were walking up a hill. Womack in front, when Gillitt stumbled and his gun discharged. The bullet is thought to have struck the ground near Womack's feet, splinters from the exploding bullet piercing both his legs.

A small bone in Womack's right leg was broken and he suffered flesh wounds in the other leg. Several small slivers of the bullet were removed at the hospital here.

Gillitt carried his wounded companion up the hill and to their car and rushed him to the hospital here. He had lost considerable blood and several blood transfusions were given at the hospital. At last reports, however, Womack was well on the road to recovery.

FFA Commercial Lamb Show Planned Here For February

31 Members Have 119 Lambs On Feed For Grading Day

A committee to select a show date in February for the annual Commercial F. F. A. Lamb Show was appointed Tuesday morning at a regular meeting of the Ozona F. F. A. chapter by Chapter President Erby Chandler.

Plans are being perfected by the chapter and its sponsor, M. A. Barber, vocational agriculture teacher, for the annual lamb grading day. This year 31 F. F. A. boys have on feed 47 crossbred, 53 fine-wool and 19 shorn finewool lambs. These 119 lambs will have been on feed 110 to 115 days by the time of the February commercial lamb grading show.

Everett, Clayton Friend, Chris Hagelstein, Bill Holden, B. B. Ingham, III, Tooter Malone, Jess Marley, Mike Miller, Howard Mock, Bill Petty, L. C. Poindexter, Joe Boy Pierce, Roy Glen Sutton, Mark White and Jim Williams.

Feeding shorn finewool lambs are Wayne and Melton Allen, Chris Hagelstein, Bill Holden, B. B. Ingham, III, Tooter Malone, Jess Marley, Mike Miller, Howard Mock and Jim Williams.

"Again this year, the FFA chapter members have tried to feed their lambs as cheaply as possibly for desirable gains," Mr. Barber said. "At the commercial grading show, each lamb will be graded and the owner given a ribbon and awarded a premium for the feeding job done by the boy during the feeding and fitting period."

Lambs will be graded prime, choice, good and feeder, with ribbons and cash premiums awarded on the first three grades. At the market, slaughter lambs are graded prime, choice, good, utility and cull, while stocker feeder lambs are grades fancy, choice medium common and inferior.

Texas Delegation To National Wool Growers Go By Special Train

Four special Pullman cars will be provided by the Santa Fe Railroad at San Angelo to carry delegates to the National Wool Growers annual convention in Las Vegas, Nev., January 20-24. T. A. Kincaid, Jr., president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn., said here yesterday.

Sixty-four persons have signed up for the trip to date, the president said. The train will leave San Angelo January 19 and will be available for the return trip. Rooms are still available at the Sahara Hotel in Las Vegas, Mr. Kincaid said, and urged that anyone wishing to attend the convention get in touch with the Association secretary, Ernest Williams, in San Angelo at once and make reservations.

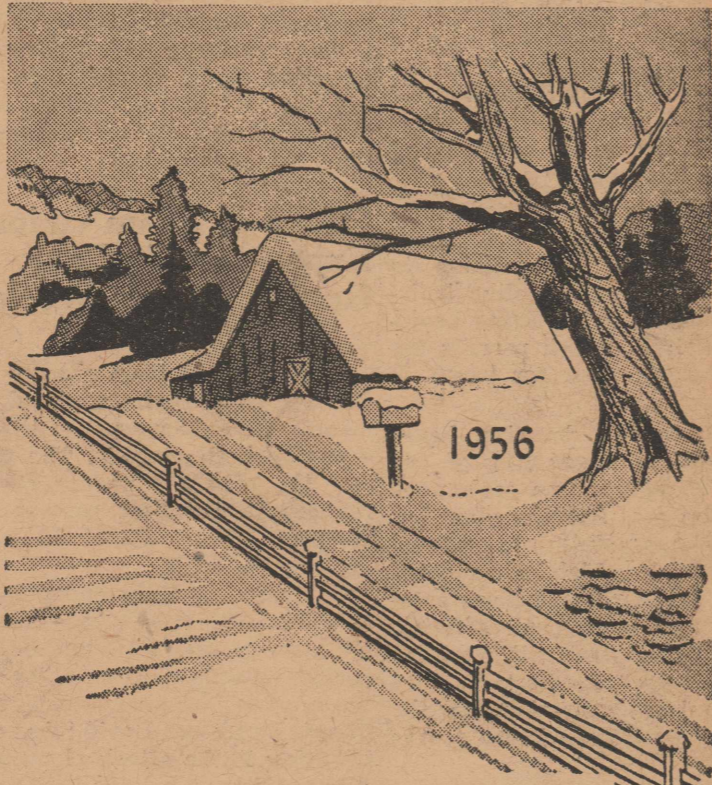
and His words to one who was sinking into a stormy sea "O thou of little faith, wherefore didst thou doubt?"

From State Capitol**

Austin, Texas — Christmas has come to the Capitol, and all the traditions are being observed.

A mammoth 40-foot tree with hundreds of lights centers the rotunda. State employees, from the youngest clerk to the top man, gather 'round the huge tree once each year to sing Christmas carols.

For the first time, Gov. Allan Shivers and his family will spend Christmas in the Mansion. In the past they've gone to Sharyland, their Rio Grande Valley home. But this year they're staying here to get ready for moving — to make room for Gov.-Elect Price Daniel who takes office on Jan. 15.

Sen. Daniel is working against time to get legislative and inauguration plans settled before the first of the year. Then he must go to Washington to serve two more weeks as senator.

But between being senator and getting ready to be governor, the Daniels hope to sandwich in a simple family holiday at their Liberty ranch home.

"Better government" Bills — An extensive legislative program designed to prevent recurrence of state scandals has been unveiled.

Sixteen "better government" bills were formulated in the attorney general's department under sponsorship of the Texas Press Association. TPA's legislative committee approved the measures and has called on Texas newspapers to work for their passage.

Bills are aimed primarily at secrecy in public affairs. They outlaw closed meetings of governmental bodies, force publication of official transactions and impose penalties for suppression of public records. Insurance companies would be required to publish financial statements at least twice a year. Names of veterans applying for land under the veterans land program would be publicized.

Committee members also endorsed creation of a special Travis County grand jury for state affairs.

Daniels backs water plan — Gov. Elect Price Daniel will submit as emergency legislation the proposed \$100,000,000 water development fund.

Daniel said he will support this and other objectives of the Texas Water Resources Committee's program. But he said he wants to study further before making a tax recommendation.

According to committee members, the \$100,000,000 revolving fund would not require a special tax. It would be used to extend credit to local governments for

water conservation projects.

However, the committee did suggest taxes to buy water storage space in federal reservoirs. Proposed levies would increase fishing licenses 50 cents and place a five per cent excise on pleasure boats and motors.

Drought Aid Extended — U. S. Dept. of Agriculture has extended from Dec. 31 until March 15 the emergency program to help livestock owners in drought areas buy feed.

Gov. Shivers commended this decision and asked that USDA also extend grazing privileges under the soil bank program. He requested railroads to continue reduced rates on freight for hay shipments to drought areas.

Cameron and Willacy Counties have been added to bring the total drought-hit counties in Texas to 238 out of 254.

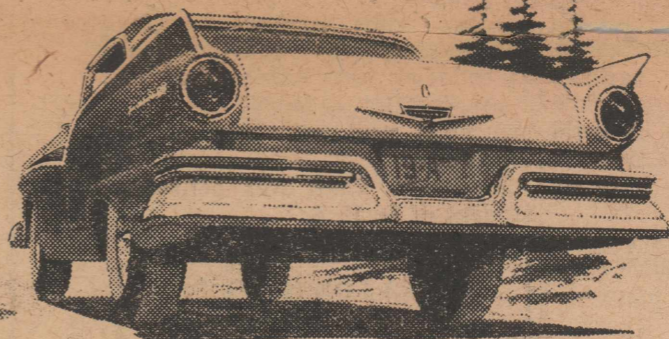

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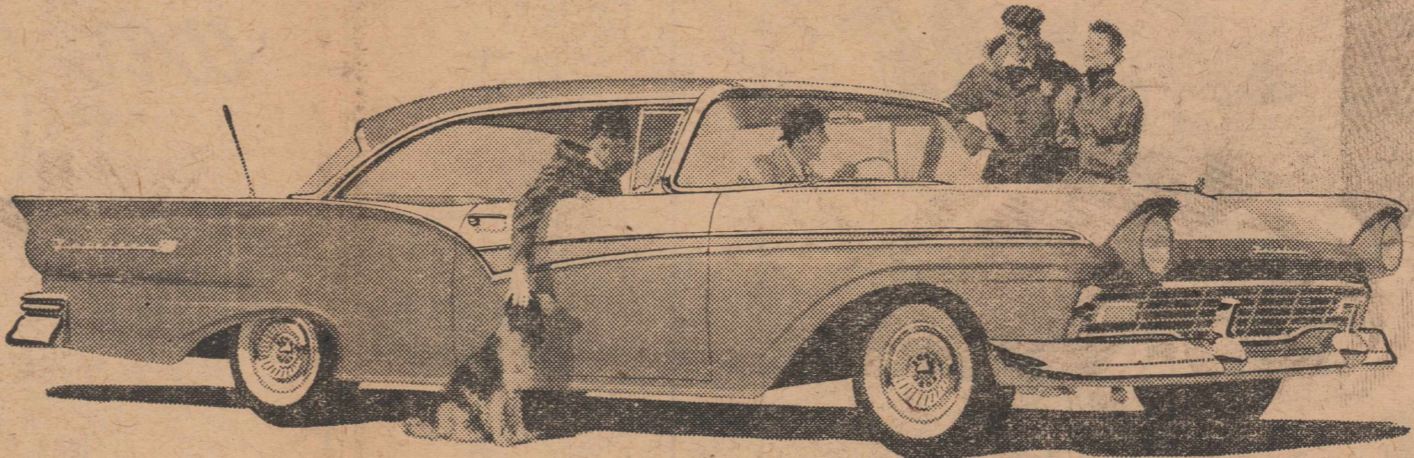

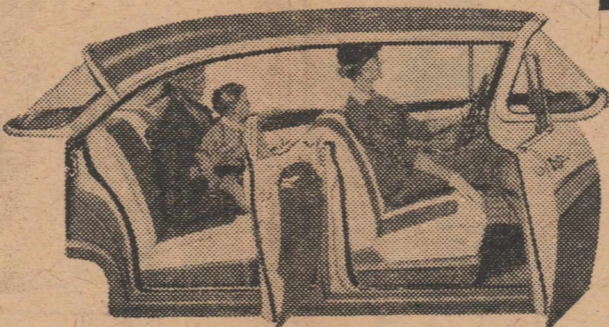

CHRISTMAS IN OTHER LANDS

In Scandinavian countries the "Jul" or Christmas, celebration starts on Christmas Eve and lasts thirteen days, ending with a Twelfth-Night party. Cakes or loaves of bread, baked in the shape of a boar, recall the ancient feasts when a real boar was eaten. Comical little straw goats are a reminder of the old custom of saving the last sheaf of the harvest for the magic powers it was supposed to have. In many places even the animals are given a treat; the cows and horses get special feed in their stalls, and the birds find sheaves of nuthreshed grain fastened to poles or placed on window ledges for them. The Christmas tree is decorated with gold and silver stars, strips of colored paper, and perhaps with flags of many nations. On Xmas Eve, the family gather around the lighted tree.

Perhaps they will be visited by the "Tomate" (Also called "Tomatar") who are kindly gnomes, like the brownies. One, as an old man, has a long white beard, wears a red cowl, and rings a bell; the other, as an old woman, carries a basket of presents. Then come games and songs, with a grand supper at nine or ten o'clock. The chief dish is "lutfisk", which is dried fish that has been buried in ashes or soaked in lye water for days.

Desert is a porridge of rice containing an almond or a plum, the person who finds this special morsel in his portion it to be lucky for the following year. On Christmas Day country people go to church while it is still dark. Some go on foot, carrying blazing torches. Others ride in sleighs with jingling bells. The torches are piled outside the church to make a bonfire. After the services, the worshipers rush home, for the first to arrive is said to be sure of reaping his grain first in the next summer's harvest.

All Germany gives itself up to joy during the Christmas season. The festivities generally begin on Saint Nicholas Day. (December

6th). For weeks before, the cities and villages have gay bazaars, at which toys, sweets, and Christmas plants are sold. Most business places close for three days, the day before Christmas, Christmas Day, and the day after.

Where old customs still prevail, a man dressed like Saint Nicholas goes from house to house on the eve of Saint Nicholas Day and asks the children how they have behaved during the year. The good children are to receive gifts, and the bad children switches. But the big time for most German children is Christmas Eve, when the family gathers around the Christmas tree to sing kristluder and to exchange presents. Perhaps Kriss Kringle arrives to distribute the gifts. Beside the tree, there may be a "Bethlehem", or manger scene. The figures for these are carved with infinite skill and care by peasants who devote their lives to wood-carving and making toys.

In churches and homes carols are sung, always including the beautiful "Silent Night, Holy, Night!" In Soest, Westphalia, boys sing from the church tower in

the light of colored lanterns; and in northern Germany trumpet choirs play from the church towers.

Many other old customs are still practiced. In Bavaria persons representing the Holy Family give pageants on the highways, and tiny lighted trees are placed over the graves of children on Christmas Eve.

In western and southern Germany, young boys dressed as the Three Wise Men tell the Christmas story from house to house. In the highlands of the south people fire guns on Christmas Eve to frighten away evil spirits. In some parts, both the people and their cattle fast the day before Christmas and then enjoy a hearty meal after the midnight service.

Christmas in Holland and Belgium is devoted almost entirely to church services and quiet family gatherings. In some villages in Holland the young men gather in the market place before dawn on Christmas morning to sing carols. The leader carries a pole on which gleams a lighted star representing

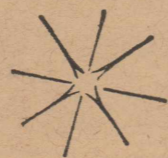

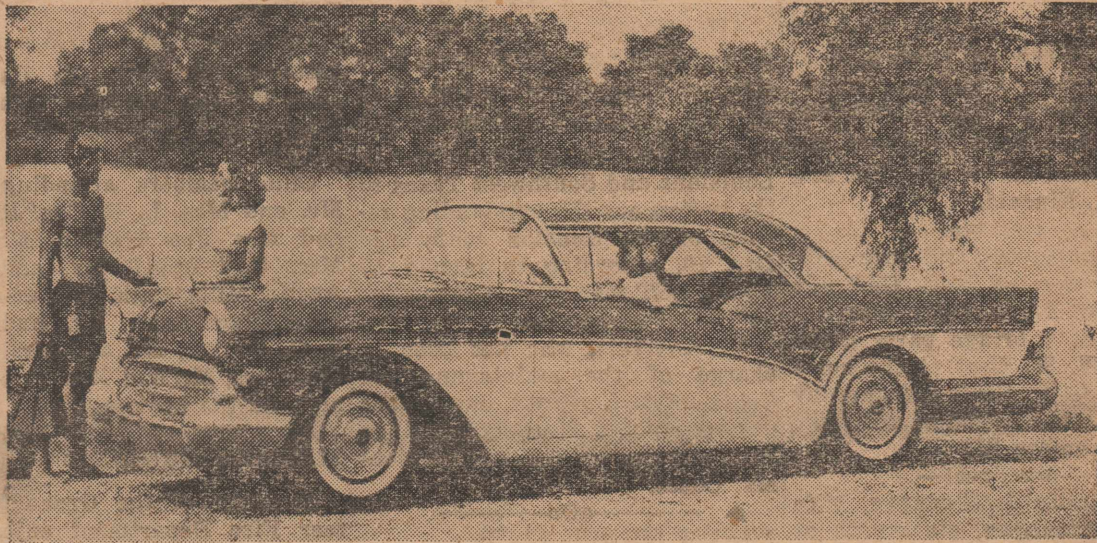

Rutherford Back Early To Washington To Get Ready For Congress

Congressman J. T. Rutherford of the 16th District has arrived back in Washington to await the opening of the 85th Congress early in January.

Except for a tour of active duty with the Marines in the middle east in the early fall, it is the first time Rutherford has left West Texas since the 84th Congress adjourned last July. Since that time he has visited all counties in his District and talked with many people about their wishes and their problems.

Rutherford will spend the next few days in getting his family resettled in Washington, and in preparing several bills for presentation when Congress convenes. Included are re-drafts concerning flood control conditions in West

Texas, and a bill calling for channelization and salinity alleviation works on the Pecos River.

Rutherford will also utilize the time between now and the opening of Congress to press for action on a number of pending projects in West Texas. These include possible postal improvements, conferences relating to radar stations in West Texas, matters concerning the State Department and the Immigration service, and taking up a number of individual cases with Governmental agencies in behalf of West Texas residents.

"I regret that I cannot spend the holidays in West Texas," Rutherford said, "but I felt I could best utilize the time before Congress convenes by being in Washington to personally look into various matters concerning the 16th District."

Rutherford predicted that once the Committee assignments are made and the Congress or-

ganized, action will begin at a rapid rate due to world conditions and a number of recommendations Congressional leaders and the Administration intend to present to the Congress.

Rutherford said that he and Mrs. Rutherford "send warmest Christmas Greetings and best wishes for the New Year" to all West Texans, and he thanked the people for their co-operation during the two years he has served in Washington.

Bulls Higher, Fed Cattle Lower Monday

Fort Worth — Fed cattle were numerous again around the major marketing circle, and prices weakened at all points. At Fort Worth fed steers, yearlings and heifers were 50 cents to \$1 per hundred lower. Similar declines were reports at most points across the country. Cows were steady, and bulls opened the week at 50 cents higher prices. Stocker trade and slaughter calves was about steady.

Comparative prices: Slaughter steers and yearlings \$10.00 to \$18.50; fat cows \$9.50 to \$12.00; canners and cutters \$6.00 to \$9.50; bulls \$8.50 to \$13.00; good and choice fat calves \$14.00 to \$17.00, some over 600 pounds to \$18. Lower grade calves \$8.00 to \$13.50; stocker steer calves and stocker steer yearlings \$13.00 to \$17.50.

Lambs Continue Come-back; Top \$17.50 At Ft. Worth
Good and choice slaughter lambs topped at \$16.00 to \$17.50 at Fort Worth Monday, lambs at the higher figure usually carrying No. 1 or Fall shorn pelts. Cull to medium killing lambs drew \$10 to \$15.50. Stocker and feeder lambs cashed at \$13 to \$16.50, while old ewes sold from \$4.50 to \$6.50. Old bucks drew \$4 to \$5.

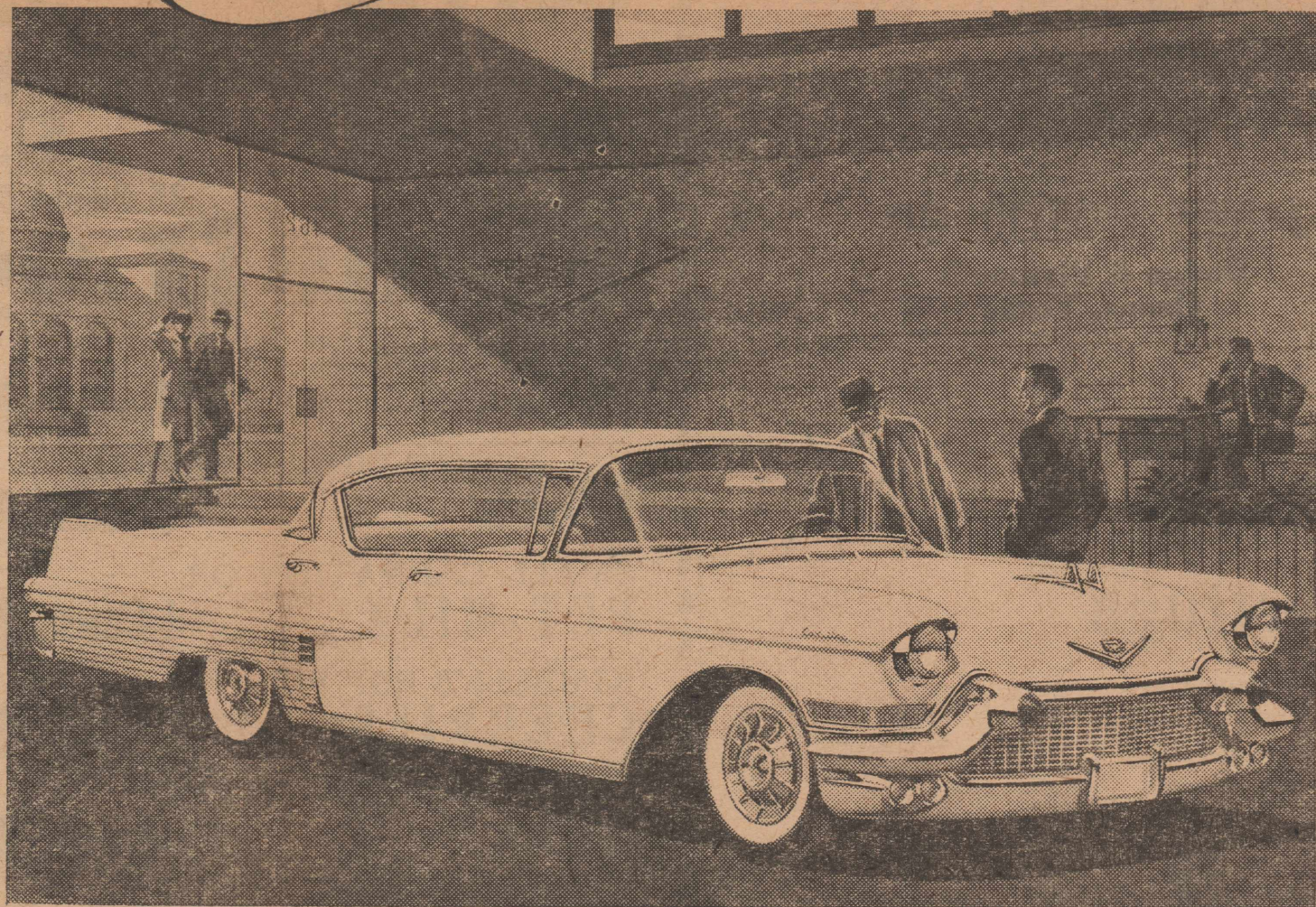

Garden Club Reminders

Shrubs make lasting Xmas gifts. Shrubs make long-lasting gifts for a young couple just starting out or for anyone on your list who enjoys adding plants to the landscape. You will find a wide variety of ornamental shrubs to select from now at your local nursery — Also, native shrubs of ornamental value are found in all parts of Texas, according to Sadie Hatfield, extension homestead improvement specialist.

Native plants found near your home will be especially well adapted to the soil and climate of the area. They may take less care than introduced plants. Examples of ornamental native shrubs include the ceniza and agarita or algerita which grows in the southwestern area; native hollies, bayberry, cherry laurel, and Indian cherry in East Texas. Evergreen sumac or kiniknik, mountain laurel, Texas madrona, Texas arbutus and cedars are found growing wild in Central and West Texas.

Rose plants make fine gifts, too. There are many different types to choose from — Best varieties for Texas are listed in "Roses for Texas", by A. F. DeWerth, head, department of Floriculture and Landscape Architecture, Texas A&M College System. Reprints of this article are available from your county extension office.

LONGER LIFE FOR CHRISTMAS PLANTS — Proper care will keep those Christmas plants looking lovely longer . . . Here are some pointers suggested by A. F. DeWerth, head of Texas A&M Department of Floriculture and Landscape Architecture.

Avoid drowning or waterlogging plants by watering too often. On the other hand, remember that indoor atmosphere dries plants quickly. Follow directions for watering given with each plant. Drainage is important, too. If the pot is wrapped in metal foil, it may be necessary to cut a small hole in the bottom of the foil cover.

A potted cyclamen will bloom for several months if kept at a temperature of 65 to 68 degrees where it can get morning light. Never allow soil to dry out completely while the plant is blooming. When it starts to lose leaves, allow the soil to become drier than in the growing season — but not powder dry. Some moisture must be present to keep the corm from drying up completely. Store in a cool dark place to carry it

over a second season. African violets need a sunny window during the middle of winter but can be put in the shade about the last of February. Let the soil get dry before watering, and then use water several degrees warmer than room temperature.

Primroses need abundant light in winter and do best at about 65 degrees. Too much watering rots them, but they should not be allowed to dry out completely.

The Jerusalem cherry and ornamental pepper like cool temperatures, high humidity and plenty of sunshine. Smoke or gas in the room will cause leaves to drop.

Poinsettias will stay attractive for most of January if kept at temperatures around 65 degrees. Let them dry down gradually and then plant outdoors.

the star that guided the Wise Men. After the singing the company gathers at some home for supper. The children's special day is the Feast of Saint Nicholas, December 6th. On the eve of his feast Saint Nicholas, wearing his red bishop's robe and peaked cap, calls at each home to ask about the conduct of the children. A white sheet has been spread on the floor and his arrival is announced by a shower of sweets on the sheet. As the children scramble for them, Saint Nicholas enters accompanied by his black servant, who holds an open sack in one hand and a rod in the other, both intended for naughty children. After speaking a word of warning or of praises as it is merited, and perhaps listening to the children recite a verse, Saint Nicholas leaves, promising to return later. Then the children set their wooden shoes in the window or fireplace or hang their stockings or, in some places, set out baskets to receive Saint Nicholas's gifts. And in shoe, basket, or stocking they leave food for the saint's white horse. While the children sleep, Saint Nicholas returns and crams the stocking or shoe of each good child with gifts. France makes a great festival of the Christmas season. Booths along the streets display sweets, toys, and novelties for weeks before Christmas, but Christmas trees are still rare. On Christmas Eve, the children expect either the Christ Child (Petit Noel) or Father Christmas (Bonhomme Noel), who looks much like Santa Claus, to fill their shoes with candy and toys, but the grownups exchange gifts on New Year's Day. Almost every family has its "creche", or manger scene, and so has every Catholic church. In some villages, the children carry a little candle lighted creche through the streets while they sing carols and gather pennies. Many districts have plays depicting the nativity, little changed from the form in which they were given in the Middle Ages. Midnight mass is celebrated

Christmas Eve, and afterwards many make merry all night at family gatherings called reveillons. Where the old customs are kept up, a big party is given on Twelfth Night. The King or queen of the evening is the person who has found in his pastry a tiny doll, a little wooden shoe, or a bean.

As I walked out of the high school one day last week, I noticed several of the juniors and seniors huddled on the steps talking. All I heard was the words, "Meet here at 4:15." Well, I decided to tag along and was I glad I did. It seems the group Jrs. and Srs. had taken the title Deck the Halls seriously. 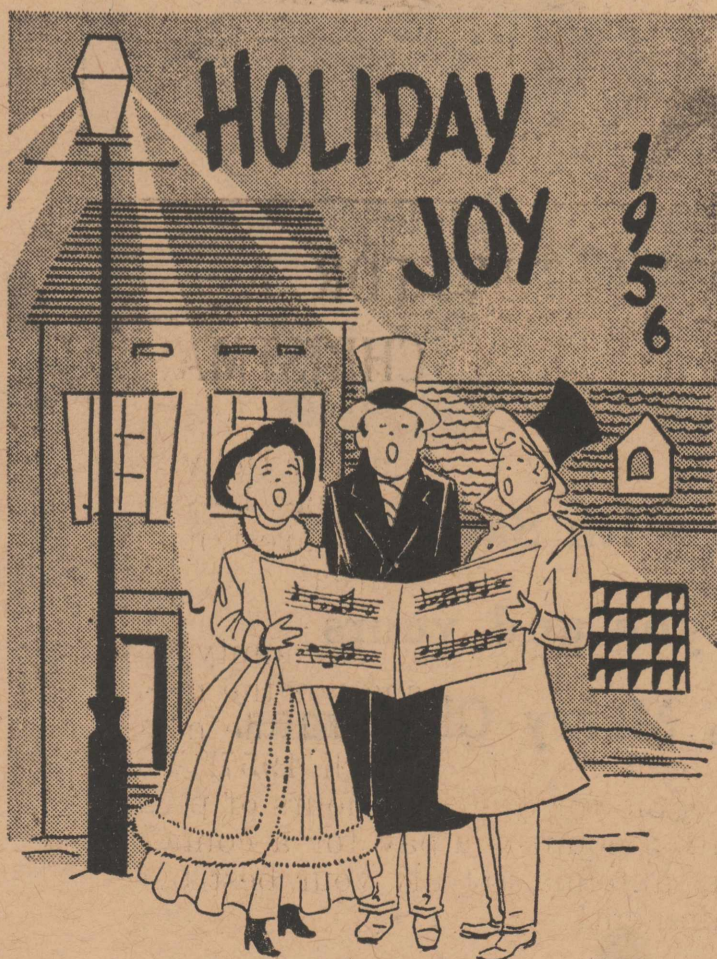

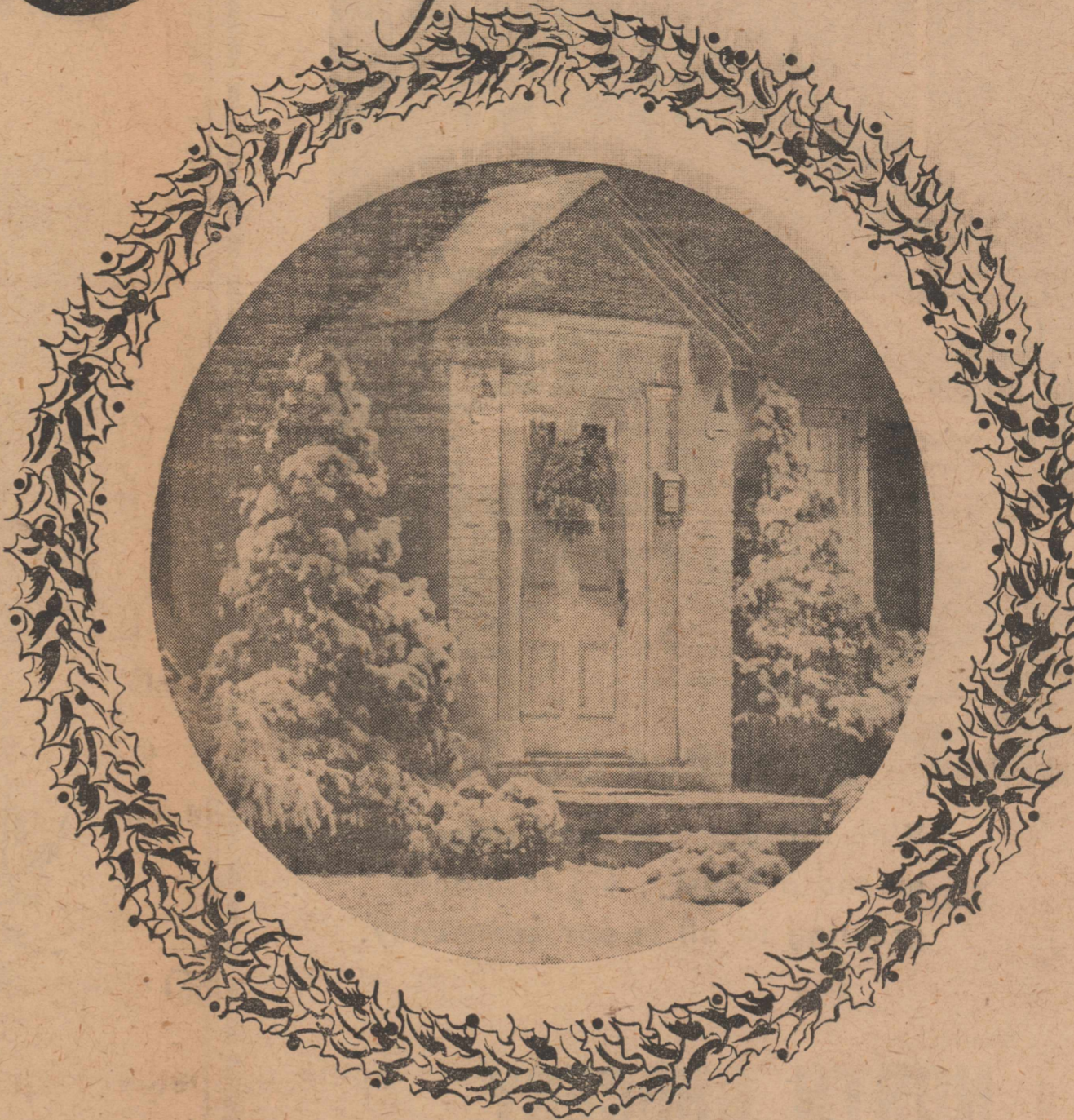

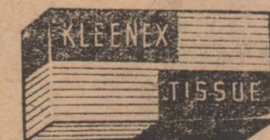
