

Lions Do Or Die In Game Friday Against Menard

Locals Must Win To Claim Tie For District Title

The Ozona Lions downed the stubborn Sonora Broncos last Friday 55 to 23 in Ozona and then dropped a 63 to 48 decision to the Del Rio Wildcats in Del Rio Tuesday night to set the stage for the crucial Menard game here Friday night.

Menard downed Eldorado and Sonora to wind up their first half play with a record of four wins and no losses as compared to the Lions three wins and one loss.

A Menard victory in Ozona would just about clinch the title for the Yellowjackets while a Lion win would push the Ozonans into a tie for first place.

Menard downed the Lions 48 to 34 in Menard earlier this year and will be favored over the Lions again this time, but the Lions expect to be in better shape than was the case before and Coach Pelto's cagers have had a way of coming up with what was needed when needed in the past six years.

Sonora played stubbornly in the first two periods against the Lions but were never really in serious contention after the first five minutes.

Jerry Jacobs was the game's leading scorer, accounting for 19 points, most of which came in the final two periods and broke the Broncos' back.

Neville and Fields led the Bronco attack which found the Lion's man-to-man defense too tough to crack, particularly after the first quarter.

The Del Rio Wildcats got revenge for a defeat at the hands of Ozona last month by virtue of a hot first half Tuesday night in Del Rio.

The Lions played listless basketball through the first two periods but came strong in the final two periods to make a contest of the game.

Jerry Jacobs and Jakey Young led the Lions with 16 and 12 points but R. J. Patterson dumped in 32 points and Densil Moody added 16 to provide Del Rio with their margin of victory.

In B games played during the week, the Ozona B team walloped Sonora in a rather one-sided contest as Humberto Cervantez and Johnny Cooper led the scoring attack. Coach Pete Hickman used every man suited up in the contest which saw the Lion Cubs leading 13 to 0 at the end of the first quarter.

Tuesday night the Ozona B team crushed Del Rio's B's 39 to 24. The game was more one sided than the score would make it appear as whistle happy officials called a total of 56 fouls in a contest that saw Ozona jump into a 17 to 1 lead in the first quarter and then play the last quarter with only four men.

Johnny Cooper scored 12 points to lead both teams as player after player on both teams went to the bench with five fouls.

Despite the huge number of fouls called, the game was not unusually rough even though the action with Del Rio attempting to press at times became rather wild. Failure on the part of the B's to hit their layups was about all that kept the game from becoming a complete rout.

The Ozonans playing four against Del Rio's five never at any time seemed likely to lose the contest.

Highway 290 East To County Line To Get New Surface

New, Wider Bridge On Johnson Draw Slat- ed Next Month

The State Highway Department has advertised for bids, to be opened on Feb. 18, for constructing 14.817 miles of flexible base and surfacing on U. S. Highway 290 from the intersection of Highway 163 in downtown Ozona to the Crockett-Sutton county line.

The highway will be widened approximately two feet the entire distance. R. E. McCulloch, senior resident engineer for the State Highway Department at Sonora, declared.

A new and wider bridge over Johnson Draw in Ozona, designed to permit the effective flood control channel improvement work contemplated by the Soil Conservation Service as a part of the Johnson Draw flood control project, is in the Highway Department's plans for next month, Mr. McCulloch said. The Department is expected to advertise for bids next month on this project for which an appropriation of \$70,000 has been made by the Highway Commission.

In connection with the construction of the new bridge, surfacing of a section of the highway from the intersection to the bridge and a block west will be done at the same time. The present bridge will be wrecked and a completely new bridge constructed on the site. The new bridge will be wider and longer than the present bridge, eliminating a present traffic hazard and at the same time conforming to the Soil Conservation Service channel improvement plan.

Traffic will be re-routed two blocks north and back in the highway at the Silver Spur Motel corner while the new bridge is under construction, Mr. McCulloch said.

Crockett Total Voting Strength Will Top 1,100

189 Poll Tax Receipts Issued Last Day Of Eligible Period

Thanks to a last-day surge of applications, Crockett county's 1958 voting strength topped the 1,100 mark, a drop of 250 from the last presidential election year but an increase of more than 200 from last year's total.

A total of 189 poll tax receipts were issued the final day of the period, January 31, Mrs. Gertrude Perry, chief office deputy, reported. Regular polls totalled 1,086, with exemptions of 23 and six aliens, the latter not eligible to vote. In addition to this total voting strength of 1,109, there are a number of over-age exemptions which will push the probable total to near 1,200.

Last year, only 872 regular polls were issued, with 14 exemptions, while the year before the total reached 1,359 regular polls and 46 exemptions.

Funeral Services For William N. Hallcomb Held In Lubbock Mon.

Funeral services were held at 10 o'clock Monday morning at City Cemetery in Lubbock for William Nathaniel Hallcomb, 84, retired West Texas trapper and pioneer cowboy, who died at 12:50 p. m. Sunday in Baptist Memorial Hospital in San Angelo following an eight-day illness. Cody Funeral Home of Ozona was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Hallcomb was born in Runnels county July 27, 1872, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Monroe Hallcomb. He had made his home in Sanderson since his retirement.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Asa Robertson, and a brother Paul Hallcomb, both of Ozona.

Final New Producer In Crockett Noelke Field

The Noelke (3,250-foot) field of Crockett County gained its second producer and a 3/8-mile north extension with completion of Rex W. Ramsey and Mills Duncan of San Antonio No. 1-A Bouscaren, re-entered project, 4 1/2 miles southeast of Iraan.

It was finalized for a daily pumping potential of 81.34 barrels of 37 gravity oil, plus 3 per cent water.

Production was through perforations between 3,160-208 feet and 3,217-317 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing seated at 4,150 feet, the total depth. Plugged back depth is 3,330 feet.

The project was formerly Ledge Petroleum Co. No. 1-A Bouscaren. Location is 350 feet west from the southeast corner, thence north

The discovery, Rex W. Ramsey, et al. of San Antonio No. 2 W. T. Noelke, was finalized in November, 1957 for a daily flowing potential of 139 barrels of 40 gravity oil, no water, through a 1/2-inch choke and perforations between 3,256-278 feet. It also was a re-entered project originally drilled by Ledge Petroleum Co. to 4,250 feet.

Hoffman Bros. of San Angelo will drill the No. 3-A C. W. Meadows as a 1/2-mile northeast outcrop to the Half field, eight miles northeast of Sheffield.

The project will be drilled with combination tools to 2,500 feet. Ground elevation is 2,376 feet.

Location, on an 80-acre lease, is 1,650 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of 35-GG.

Deep Wildcat On Ingham Ranch Is Spotted By Jones

New Test Southwest of Devonian Gas Discovery Well

J. E. Jones Drilling Co. et al, Midland, has filed application to drill an 8,000-foot rotary wildcat in Crockett County, 10 miles east of Sheffield and 1 1/4 miles south west of the firm's No. 1 Ingham, opener and lone producer in the Ingham (Devonian) gas field. It will be the No. 1-B Ingham.

Location, on a 640-acre lease, is 2,310 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the west lines of 37-I-I&GN.

The discovery was finalized in November, 1957, for a daily, absolute open flow of 15,000,000 cubic feet of gas, with gas-condensate ratio of 119,300-1, through perforations between 7,488-548 feet.

Bids Sought For Construction Of Fourth Flood Dam

Open Bids Feb. 24 On Contract For Site No 5 Structure

Bids will be received by the Crockett county Commissioners Court at 2 p. m. on February 24 for construction of the fourth in a series of seven dams to be constructed on the Johnson Draw watershed for control of flood waters on this normally dry wash.

Plans and specifications having been completed by Soil Conservation Service engineers, the local sponsoring agency, the County Commissioners Court, will award contract on Feb. 24, if satisfactory bids are received, for construction of the dam at Site No. 5, on the W. R. Baggett ranch north of Ozona.

The dam will contain 162,600 cubic yards of earth, with excavation of the sedimentation pool involving the removal of 38,200 cubic yards. The dam, one of the smallest in the series, will be on what is known as Rattlesnake draw, a tributary of Johnson draw, the site just north of the Bill Baggett headquarters. It will be approximately 2,500 feet long and 36 feet high. The flood detention capacity of the dam will be 1,661 acre feet, taking care of a maximum of 5.01 inches of run-off from 3,978 acres of land. The permanent or sedimentation pool will be a maximum of 66 acre feet of water.

The next dam scheduled for contract letting will be that at Site No. 6, on Needle draw, just south of the Big Lake cut-off road. Plans and specifications are in the final stages of preparation and are expected to be ready in the next two weeks for a call for bids from contractors. Dams at Site 4, on the main Johnson draw north of Ozona, and Site 7, on Gurdley draw east of Ozona, will be the last of the dam construction. Field work has been completed on both these sites and plans and specifications are in process of preparation.

LENIN'S GHOST HOVERS OVER CAPITOL

President Eisenhower has demanded of Congress that it extend his authority to cut tariffs — which will otherwise die on June 30 — by passing a five-year extension of the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act. This is "essential", he indicated, "to enable us to meet the latest form of economic challenge to the free world presented by Communism."

"This challenge in the economic field," says the President, "cannot be ignored without the gravest risk to our way of life. This fact alone makes it imperative that previous positions be reexamined, and that particular interests be reappraised in the light of overriding national needs."

Certainly the Congress could have no better advice — in the main. In the light of history and current events, it can hardly be expected to swallow the recommendation without reexamination. Long ago, Lenin perceived that the easiest way to destroy America was to goad her into destroying herself economically. Since that time American taxpayers, through blindly globalist leadership in both parties, have given away the inconceivable total of \$160 billion. That we shall continue the giveaways seems almost inevitable.

In the meantime the living standards — and the supporting wage scales — which have made

possible such worldwide largesse, have been deprived of the traditional protection of due process to depend instead on the attitude of an Administration preoccupied with the welfare of foreign nations. Industry after industry has suffered the onslaught of low-wage foreign competition as tariff barriers were lowered. And those who have achieved some measure of relief, received it as a generous gesture of the Executive Department, not through the functioning of representative government.

With the Presidential request for five years more of this arbitrary power over our economy, comes word from the Secretary of Labor that he does not expect unemployment to exceed four-and-a-half million in February! We also learn that the Administration has pledged \$261 million more to France, and a niggardly \$10 million for improved communications in the Baghdad Pact countries.

Let the Congress do some reexamining indeed, as the President asks, and most definitely "in the light of over-riding national needs." We can think of no national need quite so grave as continued solvency.

Elaborate Precautions were taken at Pearl Harbor to prevent embarrassing reminders of the Day of Infamy when four Jap warships paid their first courtesy call in nineteen years. The visiting ships fired their salutes when a mile from the harbor, were answered by howitzers at the harbor entrance. The crews stood at attention as the ships passed some distance from the sunken USS Arizona — in tribute to her 1,102 dead. It would have been less embarrassing, we think to have put off the visit another 19 years.

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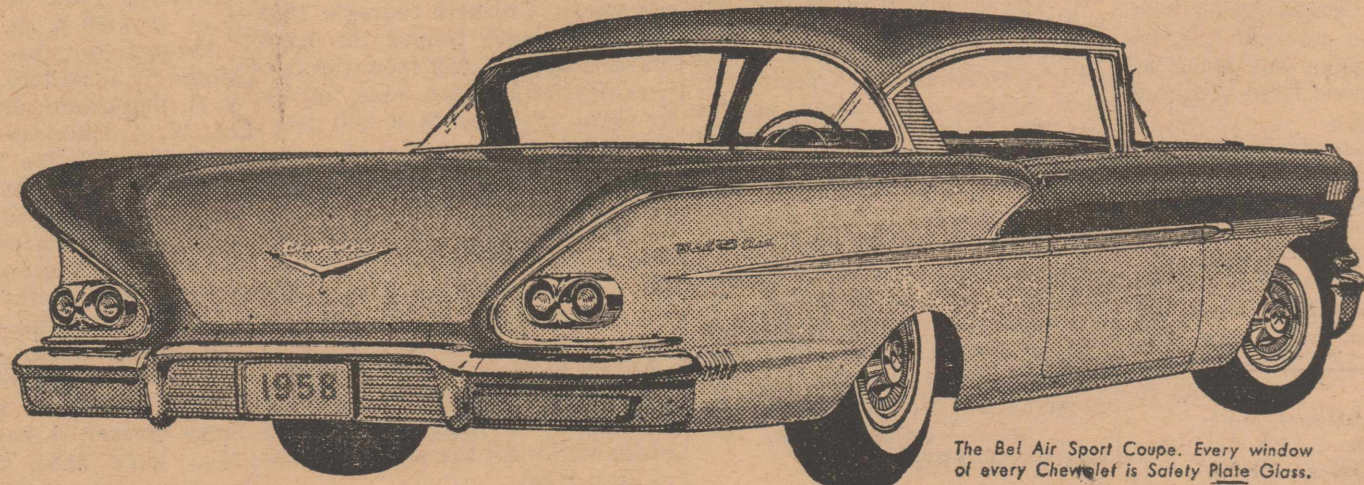

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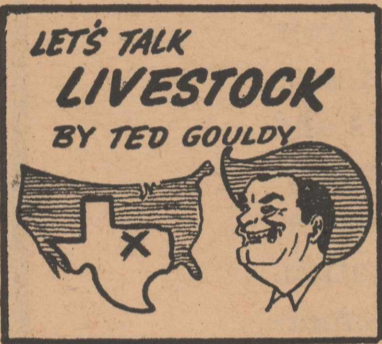

Cattle and Calves Again Weak to 50 Cents Off

FORT WORTH — Trade on slaughter classes of cattle and calves again reflected weakness at Fort Worth Monday, as reports from major dressed meat centers indicated the resistance to recent

high meat prices was slowing down clearances of meat out of coolers. At the close prices of most slaughter cattle and calves were weak to 50 cents lower.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$21 to \$26, a load of choice 1,110-pound steers at the higher figure. Common and medium offerings cleared at \$14 to \$21.

Fat cows cashed at \$15 to \$17.50, and canners and cutters drew \$9 to \$15.50. Bulls scored \$14 to \$19. Good and choice slaughter calves, of all weights, sold from \$21 to \$25.50. Common and medium offerings sold from \$15 to \$21, and culls cashed at \$12 to \$15.

Good stocker steer calves cashed at \$24 to \$27.50, and similar heifer calves ranged from \$25 down. Stocker steer yearlings drew \$18

to \$24.50. A small lot of stocker heifers topped at \$24, and a few medium to just fairly good stocker cows sold for \$16 to \$18.

Sheep and Lambs Again Show Weakness

Most classes of sheep and lambs sold on a weak to unevenly lower basis, and slaughter lambs were fully in line with the low close of last week at Fort Worth Monday. Other slaughter kinds of sheep and lambs, which were not represented in the receipts in the closing sessions late last week, shared the downward spiral. Feeder lambs also sold unevenly lower. Slaughter sheep, and feeder lambs, averaged 50 cents to \$1 under midweek last week.

Goats sold steady at \$7 on

slaughter varieties.

Good and choice slaughter lambs cashed at \$22 to \$23, most sales \$22.50 downward. Some good heavy lambs of over 110 pounds stopped at \$20. Choice yearlings cashed at \$21 down, and some good aged wethers sold from \$13 to \$14.

Old ewes sold from \$8 to \$10, some at the higher figure apparently having stocker possibilities, despite age. Medium to good feeder lambs were reported from \$18 to \$20.
