Kincaid of Ozona, the school is a joint venture of the Texas Education Agency, the Ozona Public Schools and a group of Crockett county ranchmen, Plans for the school were laid here recently at a mass meeting of ranchmen, shearers, shearing capitans and representatives of the Texas Education Agency and the TS&GRA. A committee of local ranchmen named at that meeting worked out details of the school and assisted in recruiting students.

Part of the cost of instruction will be borne by the Texas Education Agency and contributions from local ranchmen will be sought to defray other costs. All shearing students who complete the course satisfactorily will be awarded a mango or shearing head with which he can go to work as a shearer in the spring season.

Rules of the Texas Education Agency require a minimum of 20 hours of instruction.
