

Six Contractors Submit Bids For **Dam Construction**

Frank Montgomery, Midland, Is Low On Bid Of \$76,916.55

Six contractors submitted bids for construction of Johnson Draw flood control dam No. 5 when bids were opened Monday by the Commissioners Court.

Frank Montgomery of Midland, who did paving work in Ozona under contract with individuals and the county, was the low bidder of the lot with his bid of \$76,916.55. There was a spread of nearly \$32,-000 between the high and low bids on the project. Merrill & Baker Construction Co. of Hurst, now completing work on the No. 2 dam site for the bonding company of the first contractor on that project; submitted the high bid of \$108,-156.70.

Other bidders on the project were O. C. Shellemburger Construction Co. of Sherman, \$84,380.-28; Strain Bros., Inc., of San Angelo, \$90,510.96; Crownover Construction Co. of Corsicana, \$93,-885.68; and F. A. Seidel & Sons of Ballinger, \$94,896.40.

The Commissioners Court, and Soil Conservation Service engineers are now making an investigation of the assets and equipment of the Montgomery firm and if the investigation is satisfactory, the contract will be awarded.

WAY TO ECONOMIC RECOVERY

Any lingering doubt that the need for income tax rate reductions had reached the full-blown status of critical urgency was dispelled at the 24-day House Ways and Means Committee public hearings.

A parade of witnesses - representative of all facets of the nation's economic life - offered strong evidence that the current business recession is due largely to oppressive personal and corporate tax rates and that reform of these rates is vital to recovery,

It should encourage Americans that the majority of those who testified on the need for general rate reform strongly urged the quick enactment of the Sadlak-Herlong bills.

Introduced by two members of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee - Rep. Antoni N. Sadlak (Rep.-Conn.) and Rep. A. S. Herlong, Jr., (Dem.-Fla.) - the identical bills provide for the first broad-gauge reform of the income tax structure since the rates began their upward spiral 26 years ago.

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



Hurry-Up Or Queue-Up Advice to Those Who've **Not Had Cars Inspected**

With less than two months left in which to have motor vehicles inspected, Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, urged motorists to obtain their 1958 inspection stickers immediately. In doing so, he said that 64 per cent of the registered vehicles in Texas have not been inspected for the current year.

"At the present rate of inspection it looks as though the usual ten per cent who wait until the deadline for inspections will be waiting in line on April 15. With crowded inspection stations on this deadline date immediate service cannot be rendered and car owners will suffer an unnecessary loss of time and inconvenience.'

Nearly half of the vehicles already inspected have required some adjustments or repairs which require more time for both the owner and the inspection station and can be handled better when not rushed.
