I Phone Fire gnal System Is ade Ready Here

Dial 2-2626 To Ring 3 Different Phones To Report Fire

The knotty problem of how to report fires under dial phone system soon to be in operation here, has been solved through efforts of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department with the cooperation of the

With the present telephone sys- installed at the April meeting. tem, fires are reported to the telephone operator who in turn sets off the fire alarm and simultaeously notifies the fire station of the location of the fire. From there volunteer firemen take over, those not going directly to the station calling the operator to get location

on duty when the new dial system is put into operation, it will be necessary to call a number. And to be sure that somebody would be near the telephone at any hour the fire department and telephone company worked out an extension phone plan which will ring three phones simultaneusly, one at the fire station, one at the sheriff's office and one in the county jail. Such a plan will make it almost certain that somebody will be at hand to answer the call and get the location of a fire.

The number to be adopted for reporting fires, when the dial system goes into operation, is 2-2626. The three phones will ring when this number is dialed and switches ill be made available at each





Garden Club Reminders

Lawn fertilizers should be applied in early spring and again in plaques, hanging baskets, straw- instruction. mid-summer for best results. Apply 4 to 5 pounds to each 100 square feet of lawn and water deeply. Never apply fertilizer to wet grass blades or fail to water after application. Always water your lawn deeply so that grass roots will grow down deeper and deeper and come into contact with more soil area. This makes for drought resistance. Water in the early morning if possible so that grass and bordering plants have plenty of time to dry before nightfall thus preventing many fungus attacks. Aerate your lawn with spading fork or power machine if possible.




