CONCEIVED IN HASTE

Some supporters of the labor reform bill, in the form in which it passed the Senate, have been extremely critical of business spokesmen and others who have opposed the measure. This opposition, in the view of the bill's most fervent advocates, practically amounts to sabotage.

Actually, no one denies that the bill contains good and necessary provisions, aimed at flagrant abuses that have been practiced by both labor and management. But it also contains features that could breed diseases as bad or worse than those it is supposed to cure. For instance, one section has to do with the "influencing" of workers by employers, and provides heavy criminal penalties for violations. But just what does and what does not constitute "influence" is not

defined. The way the section is worded, "influence" could be construed as anything from free coffee to softball equipment or to a wage increase.

On top of that, the bill was pushed through the Senate in just one week, at a time when all manner of pressing matters demanded Senatorial attention. It is only reasonable to suppose that few Senators had the time or opportunity to study and evaluate it.

Finally, the bill was not given the public hearings which should always accompany the framing of major legislation. Only in this way can the merits and demerits of any important law be disclosed and analyzed.

We certainly need a labor reform bill. But we don't want one that is conceived in haste, and is confused or vague in basic provisions.

"FIFTH" WHEELS

What happens to a labor boss after the Senate rackets committee proves he's cheating his own members and intimidating the public? We've seen many of these Fifth Amendment wheels of the labor movement swat briefly on the stand, then disappear from public view.

These men go right back where they came from and resume the business of cheating and intimidating. Honest employers are required by law to sit down and "bargain" with the crooks.

The reason is that the twin evils of legal immunity and compulsory unionism have not been dealt with by Congress. The Kennedy-Ives bill didn't even mention these things.

So the exposed labor bosses rule on, shielded by laws and court decisions put into effect years ago to shelter the then infant unions. And the bosses are made absolute rulers by laws that allow them to force men and women to join their unions or go without jobs.

4 Live, 11 Videotaped S'w. Conference Games Shown On TV This Fall

To celebrate its 25th year as sponsor of Southwest Conference football broadcasts, Humble Oil & Refining Company is adding a new feature to this fall's football presentations. It is a videotaped "Game of the Week" to be presented each Sunday afternoon season with Kern Tips narrating.

Live telecasts include the Baylor-Texas Tech game, October 18; the SMU-Georgia Tech game, October 25; the Rice-Army game, November 8; and the TCU-Texas game, November 15. These four games, selected by the Conference, will be telecast over a network of 24 TV stations.

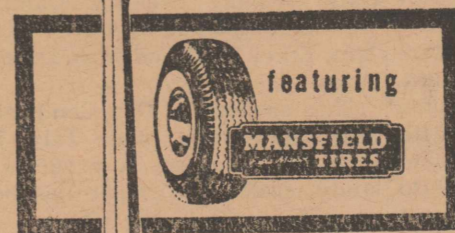

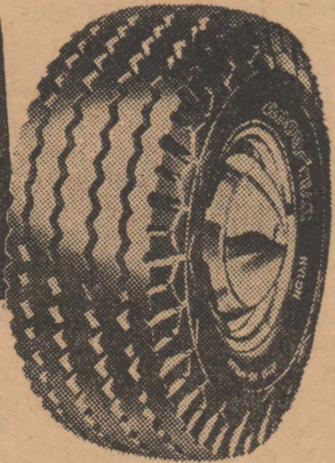

CAP Local Cadets Attending Encampment At Sheppard AF Base

Cadets 1-class Buddy Anderson and Tommy Fields, both of Ozona, found that it was all military for Civil Air Patrol Cadets as they arrived at Sheppard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls, Texas, for a two week encampment.

The Ozona cadets had hardly been unloaded from one of the many Air Force planes transporting cadets before they found themselves being processed, issued bedding and assigned a bunk in one of six available barracks.

Salutes were filling the air as the Ozona cadets and all the other cadets, all between 14 and 21, settled themselves to a concentrated taste of air education, military style.

But a group of cadets being marched to the mess hall for noon meal turned up one noticeable contrast to accepted military life. Male and female cadets were marched in the same group, ate together, stood in lines together, and Lt. Col. Ben Lowell, Encampment Commander, says that all cadets will study together.

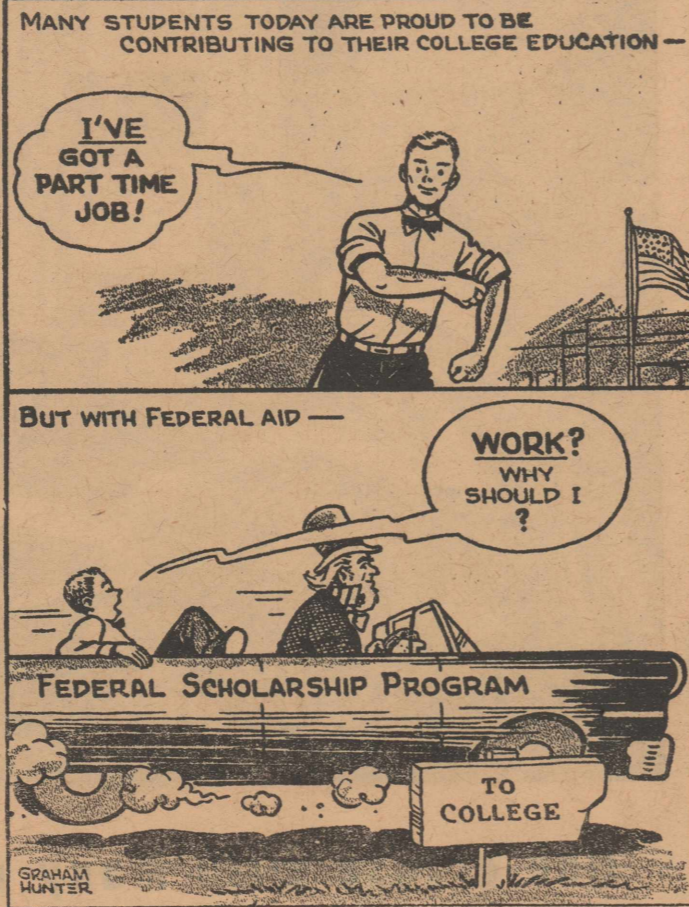
"The cadets will all receive the same training," Colonel Lowell said. "The girls join with the boys in all training operations."

Fifty-nine female cadets from Texas, thirteen female cadets from Arkansas, and three hundred male cadets representing some fifty Civil Air Patrol Squadrons in Texas were on hand for the encampment. The female cadets from Arkansas were invited to the Texas Encampment because Arkansas provided opportunities for young men only.

Then senior officers and men from various Civil Air Patrol Squadrons are on hand to act as advisors to the cadets.

The cadets from Ozona and all the other cadets at this encampment will receive their training from Sheppard Air Force instructors. Most of the cadets will undergo regular military camp boot training, but some ninety members, veterans of previous encampments, will receive advanced training in electrical repair and aircraft jet engine mechanics.

A dance is planned for the cadets at the encampment for the night of August 22nd, the last day of the training, and following the official graduation exercises. The next day a special airlift will be bringing the Ozona cadets and each of the other cadets to their homes.

Law Enforcement Jobs Open To Young Texans

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, made another offer to day to young Texans interested in a career of law enforcement.

Col. Garrison announced that the DPS has openings for patrolmen in four of its law enforcement services. He said entrance examinations will be given to applicants in major cities throughout Texas during September.

The positions offer many personal benefits to young men 21 to 35 years of age who have a high school education, and who have been a resident of Texas one year. Applicants must be between 68 and 76 inches tall and weigh not less than two pounds, or more than three pounds, per inch of height. These young men must be of good moral character and free of a criminal record.

Court Candidate Urges Run-Off Vote In Lone Undecided State Race

The leading candidate for Place One Supreme Court in the first primary has issued a statement urging all voters to take a personal interest in the runoff election to be held Saturday.

Robert W. Hamilton, who led the ticket by more than 160,000 votes in the first primary, said: "Each voter should decide for himself which candidate is best qualified, then be sure to take time to vote on Saturday, remembering that the Supreme Court has a greater potential effect upon our rights as individuals than any other office in our state or nation. Texas is one of the states which allows its citizens the privilege of voting upon members of its Supreme Court and each Texas voter should express his preference in this selection even though in some cases this will be the only race on the ballot."

Hamilton is a veteran jurist now serving as Chief Justice 8th Court of Civil Appeals; just one step in rank below the Supreme Court post for which he is candidate. He has 31 years experience in general practice, as county and district attorney, district judge, and including five years as Chief Appeals Justice.

Justice Hamilton was selected as the preferred candidate of Texas lawyers in a secret vote conducted by the State Bar and he led the field of three candidates with a

total 476,799 votes in the first primary, less than seven percent short of a majority which would have given him a victory without a run-off.

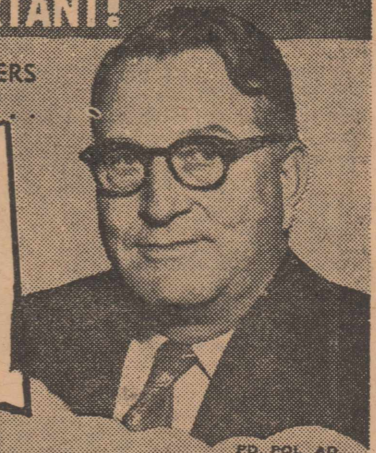

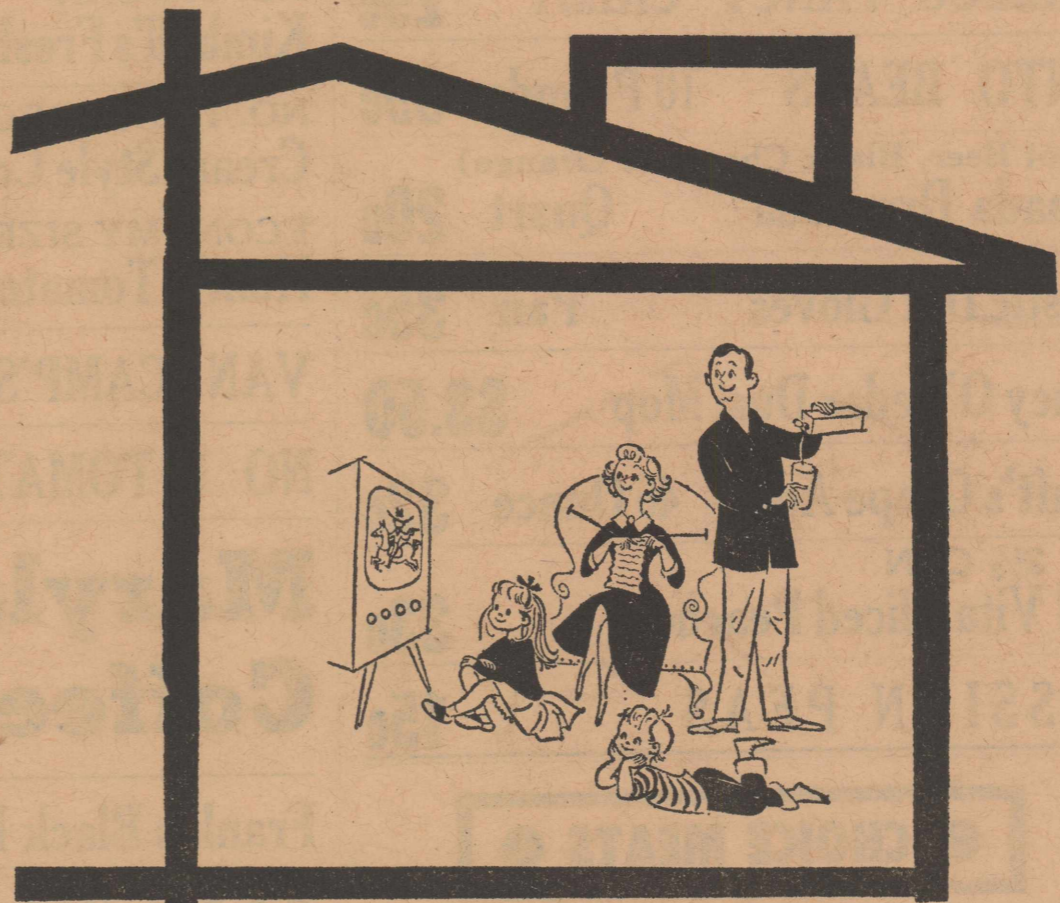

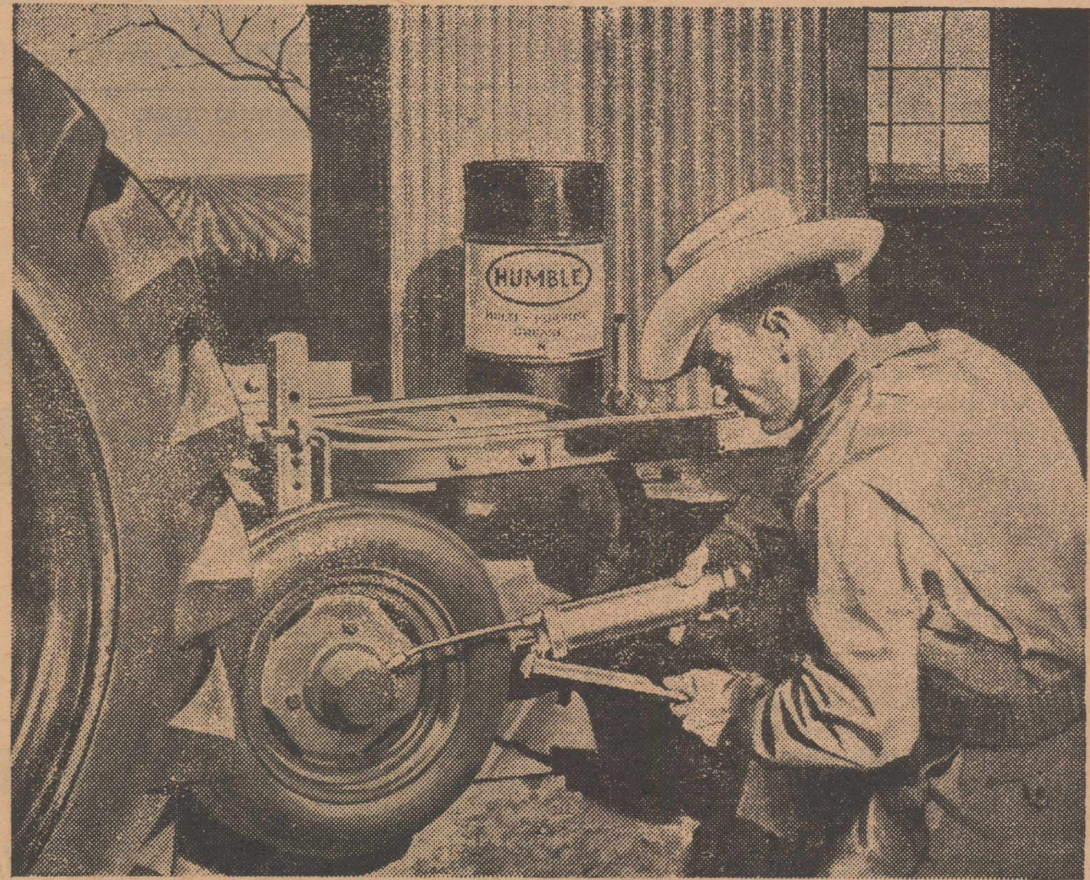
