Museum Material Being Catalogued For Early Display

Historical Society Committee Arranging New Quarters

The Crockett County museum, sponsored by the Crockett County Historical Society, will soon be ready to open its door to those who wish to view its collection of historical data, mementos of the pioneering age, Indian & basketweaver artifacts, and interesting collections of guns, household articles and tools of a bygone age.

A committee named by the Historical Society, headed by Mrs. R. A. Harrell, has been at work the past several weeks putting the museum and its materials in condition, repairing display cases, replacing broken glass and cataloguing the display pieces. Other members of the committee are R. A. Harrell, Mr. and Mrs. Jake Miller and Mrs. Early Chandler. Members of the original museum committee of the Historical Society, Wayne West, W. R. Baggett, Mrs. B. B. Ingham, Sr., and Mrs. S. M. Harvick are serving as an advisory committee in setting up the museum in its new quarters.

The county made available a room in the basement floor of the courthouse annex to serve as a museum. Materials which have been kept for more than twenty years in a room on the third floor of the high school building have been moved to the new quarters and are being arranged for display by the committee.

When the work is completed, the museum will be open to the public at stated intervals, a schedule yet to be worked out, Mrs. Harrell said. All materials, some of its on loan to the museum by owners, will be kept strictly under lock and key, Mrs. Harrell said, and the rooms will be kept locked except on occasions when the materials will be open to the public with an attendant on hand.

When the museum is finally in readiness for opening to the public, sponsors hope that many additional articles will be donated or loaned for display, especially now that they are to be kept in a safe place.

Cam Longley, 78, retired West Texas rancher and former Ozonan, died last Thursday of pneumonia while on a vacation trip to Hermiston, Ore.

The body was sent by train to Del Rio where funeral services were held Wednesday from the First Christian Church.

Mr. and Mrs. Longley had gone to Hermiston to visit a son, Col. Cam Longley, Jr., and his family when he became ill. A native of Killeen, Mr. Longley ranched in the Ozona area for a number of years. At the time of his death he owned three ranches, two north of Del Rio and one near Pumpville.

Mr. Longley was married to Miss Josephine Young of Beeville in 1903. Survivors include the widow, three sons, Col. Lions Back Home, Meet Sanderson Eagles Fri. Night

Season's Finest Game Unrehearsed For Fans On Rankin Field

The Ozona Lions will face the Sanderson Eagles at Lions Stadium Friday night in an effort to find their fourth win of the season against a ball club that has vastly improved since last year.

Kickoff for the contest is slated for 8 p. m. and mark the first appearance at home for the Lions in almost a month.

Sanderson coach Carlton Smith, a former Ozona boy, will be hoping his single wing team can upset the Lions who won an easy decision in Sanderson last year.

Smith's hopes will largely ride on the able shoulders of David Graham, a flashy back who has made the Sanderson single click since Smith decided to change to it last fall after the Ozona game.

Sanderson will bring a good record to Ozona Friday night, having won three of their four games, their lone loss coming at the hands of the strong Rankin Red Devils and by a narrow margin at that.

For the Lions it will be a first look at the single wing formation which is used by Sonora even though the two teams are reportedly to use the formation quite differently.

For Coaches Pete Hickman, and Sonny Cleere, the problem of adjusting to a new formation offensively will call for some new defenses.

The Lions emerged from the Rankin contest without any serious injuries but a number of bruises and bumps have kept several regulars sidelined during much of the rough work during the week.

B. B. Ingham, Lion center and defensive tackle, is the most seriously injured even though he is expected to be ready for duty Friday.

The Lion runnng game was at its best cry of the season last week but the team passed sparingly since it held a lead and did not wish to run the risk of losing the ball as long as they could move on the ground.

David Sikes, who was converted to the quarterback slot this fall after Johnny Jones was sidelined with a broken foot, seemed to be coming into his own during the Rankin contest as he coolly faked and pitched, here and there adding a fine run to the Lion attack. On a number of occasions Sikes was hit before the play could develop but still managed to get the ball away.

Ozona CAP Planes Participate In Search For Missing Odessans

The Ozona Civil Air Patrol unit sent five planes to assist in the areawide search for two missing Odessa business men whose plane is believed to have crashed somewhere in the rugged terrain between Alpine and Presidio. The men were last heard from more than a week ago, when they took off from Presidio after surveying the Rio Grande flood damage.

The Ozona CAP planes flew a total of more than 70 hours and consumed 550 gallons of gasoline. The air search covered an area of approximately 100,000 square miles in the U. S. and in addition a strip of approximately 50 miles wide and 300 miles long in northern Mexico.

Southern California Gas Co. has arranged a trip to its underground gas storm area project at Playa del Rey, to Marineland for shows, dinner, etc. Union of California will sponsor a trip through Old Santa Fe Springs oil field to modern Sansienia field concealed drilling operations, to its research center at Brea for a tour and luncheon and then a visit to Knott's Berry farm.

Unbeaten Rankin Falls To Lions' Slashing Attack

Test Against Single Wing Attack Faced By Locals

The Ozona Lions used a slashing running game and an alert defense to hand a group of hard fighting Rankin Red Devils a 28 to 12 defeat in Rankin last Friday night.

The hitherto unbeaten Red Devils showed the Lions some fleet hard running backs and a big bruising line which fought to the very end before an intercepted pass broke the game wide open in the final period.

The game was a crowd pleaser from start to finish and kept both stands in an uproar with long runs, intercepted passes and jarring tackles.

The Lions broke into the scoring column in the second period after both teams stood each other off in a scoreless first quarter.

Late in the first quarter the Red Devils found themselves unable to move and Bill Lewis got off a 43 yard kick to David Sikes, who returned the kick to the Lion 17. From here the Lions cranked up an 83-yard scoring drive which carried into the second quarter before marking the points on the scoreboard.

Billy Bob Holden, Bobby Sutton, David Sikes and Jimmy Freeman all contributed good yardage in the drive Holden got the Lions off and running with a 27 yard sprint up the north sidelines but two plays later the Lions got a 15-yard penalty and it looked as though the drive might pay out.

Soph Jim Freeman came through with a 17-yard gainer and then Sikes bootlegged the ball 23 yards to the Rankin 16 yard line to wipe out the Rankin road block.

Bobby Sutton set sail from the 16 and was finally hauled in on the five and then after drawing the defense in on one play, a pitch from Sikes to Holden sent the Lion fullback over untouched. Sutton kicked the point after touchdown and the Lions had a 7 to 0 lead.

Rankin was not long in getting back in to the contest as a Lion pass, one of the few tried all night, went astray and Wayne Windham picked the shot out of the air and raced 78 yards for the score with a fine screen of downfield blocking paving the way.

Al G. Kelly and Miller Bros. Now Largest Tented Circus

Because Ozona happened to be a convenient stop-over point enroute to its winter quarters in Arizona, the Al G. Kelly and Miller Bros. Circus, now conceded the largest tented circus entour, will present afternoon and evening performances at the Crockett County Fair Grounds, Friday, October 17.

Arthur W. (Art) Miller, general representative of the circus called at the Stockman office last week to confirm the scheduling of the one day engagement here.

This famous wild animal show is making its 36th annual tour. The advertising cars, comprising six motorized units, with a crew of 28 advertising and publicity men, will arrive soon to place the usual colorful posters here and in surrounding communities. Newspaper space, TV and radio time plus mailings and airplane broadcasts are planned to publicize the event to bring a huge crowd of visitors here in addition to home folks to see the show.

This will mark the first appearance of a big circus here in more than 30 years and undoubtedly the first to bring such outstanding and unusual animals as giraffes, hippopotamus and rhinoceros.

In addition, the show boasts a herd of 21 elephants and more than 200 other animals including lions, tigers, pumas, leopards, many species of monkeys, apes and baboons, black, grisly, Himalayan and polar bears, hyenas, baby gorillas, Kangaroos, mandrills, gnu, emu, llamas, seals, sea lions, wart hogs, Indian water buffalo, zebu, bison, Persian white deer, camels, tapirs, dromedary, birds and reptiles, and 127 head of horses, ponies, kylo, yak and donkeys. Methodist Congregation To Hear Dr. Geo. Crawford Sunday

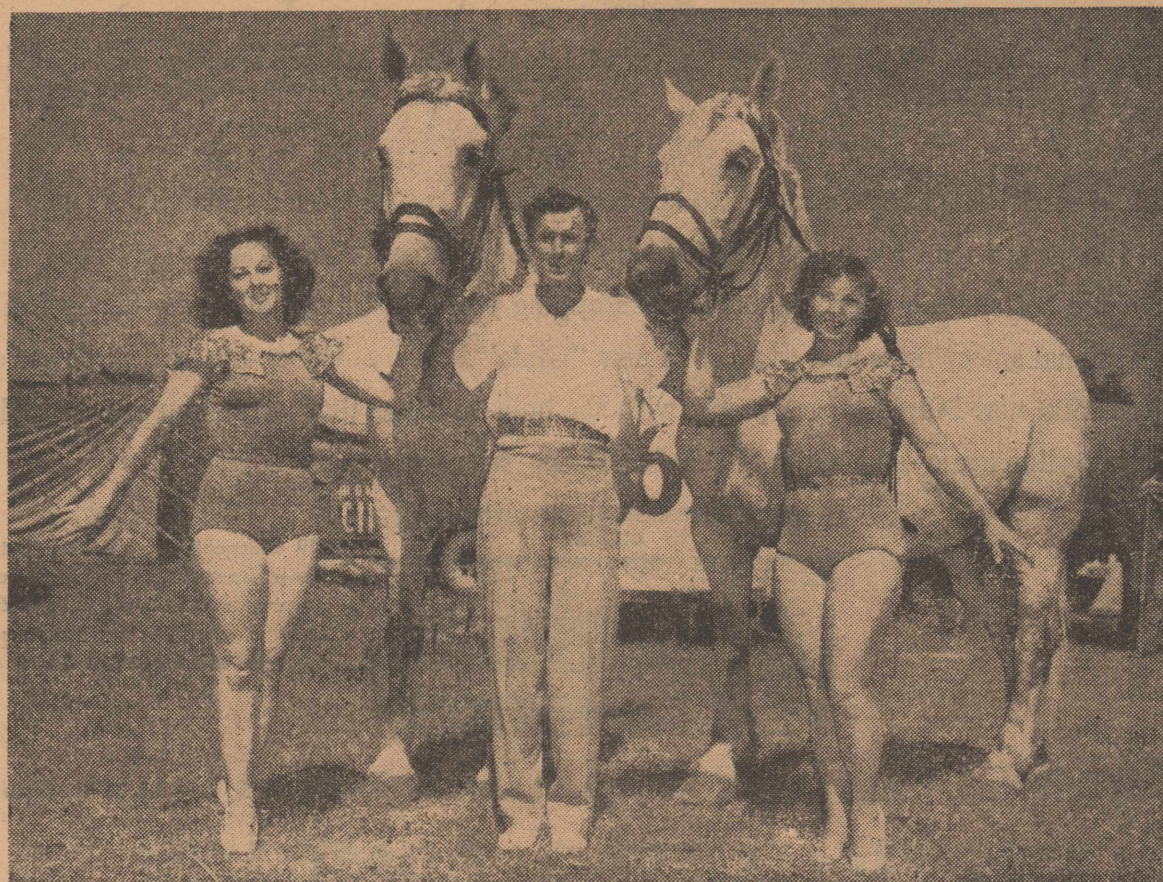
Dr. George Crawford, a Physicist from the University of Texas, will be the special Laymen's Day speaker for Ozona Methodist Church next Sunday, at the 11:00 a. m. Worship Service, the pastor Rev. Morris Bratton announced this week. His subject will be "The Moral Dilemma Caused By Hydrogen and Atomic Developments."

Dr. Crawford is well qualified to speak on this issue. He received his PhD in physics in 1951 from the University of Texas. He was a research physicist in the optical research lab of the University from 1949-1951. From 1951-1955, he was Associate Professor of Physics at Clemson College in South Carolina. Since 1955 he has served as assistant director of the Texas Petroleum Research Committee of the State of Texas and Assistant Professor of petroleum engineering in the University of Texas.

As assistant director of T. P. R. C., it is his task to direct the research efforts of a staff of 14 men to increase the total recovery of oil from the oil fields of Texas. As assistant professor of petroleum engineering, he directs graduate research for many of the graduate student working toward a degree in petroleum engineering.

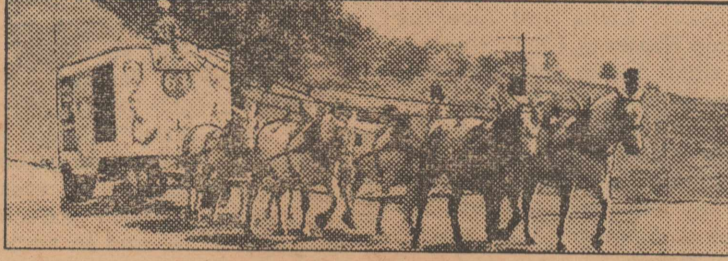

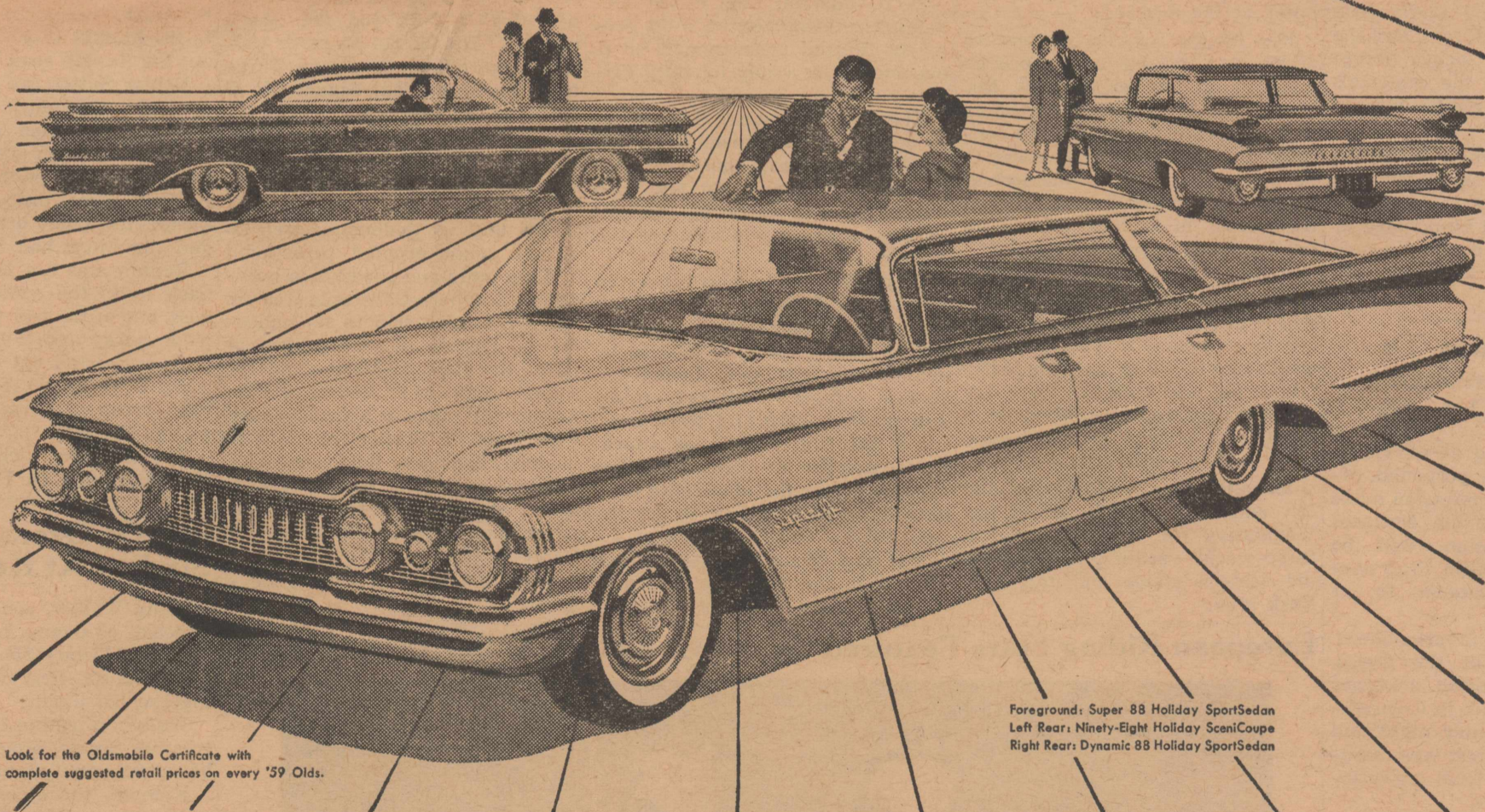

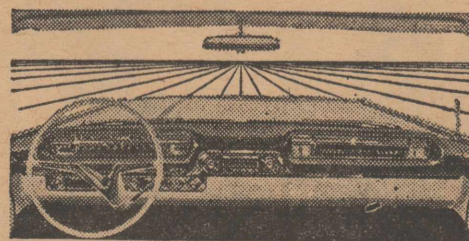

From State Capitol**

AUSTIN, Texas — Into and out of the State Supreme Court flow many of the most controversial issues of the day. Public officials, large corporations and important persons often are involved in the cases, and the lives of many less-celebrated persons frequently are affected by the decisions.

After a two-months summer recess the high court reconvened this month and waded into a stack of disputes. Among interesting cases, either decided or due to be decided are these:

Water Rights are involved in a case filed by Southern Canal Co. of Houston against the State Water Board. Southern Canal wanted a permit to take 280,110 acre feet of water per year from the Trinity River for industrial use in the Houston area. Water Board refused the request, and the company appealed to the courts.

Upstream cities such as Dallas and Fort Worth had opposed the Houston company's request when it was before the Board. Oral arguments were centered on whether the courts have the right to review Water Board decisions. Supreme Court's ruling will have implications for every person interested in the course of Texas' water development.

Keeping Roomers and setting up a church in a residential area were the cause of contention in two cases from Houston. In both cases certain property owners in university neighborhoods argued that other property owners were violating deed restrictions.

Lower courts ruled in favor of the room renters and church builders. Supreme Court agreed to review the roomers' case and denied a motion to force the lower court judge to move the student religious center.

Office-Seekers had their inning in the usual contests arising out of the year's elections. George Parr, a familiar figure in the courts, won the right to a new trial in his effort to be certified winner in a 1956 election for Duval County

sheriff.

Laredo Attorney William Wright lost out in an attempt to force Sec'y of State Zollie Steakley to place his name on the general election ballot as a Constitution Party candidate for district judge. Steakley had refused on grounds Wright voted in the Democratic primary.

Myron Love, choice of Houston liberals, won out in a dispute over the legality of his selection as Democratic nominee for district judge. Harris County Executive Committee had ruled that no candidate field in time for this office, and Love was nominated by the one-man District Executive Committee. Conservative forces had contested this method.

Damage Suits, labor-management controversy also commanded judicial attention. A gas explosion in the basement of Dallas' Baker Hotel, back in 1946, is the basis for one suit in which 83 petitioners ask some \$1,000,000 for deaths and injuries. High court sent it back to district court for new trial.

In Houston 311 workers of the AFL-CIO Office Employees Union picketed a construction project to protest the firing of one man. A lower court granted an injunction against the picketers, and the Supreme Court refused to interfere.

Better Traveling Days Ahead —

Holding promise of better traveling days ahead is the 1961-62 interstate advance planning program announced by the State Highway Commission.

Commission authorized the preliminary engineering studies for 285 miles of new interstate highways, consisting of 45 projects in 22 counties. Included in the advance planning will be completion of the gaps in the interstate highways between Dallas and Houston, Dallas and Texarkana and from Denton to Fort Worth to Hillsboro.

Cost of the program is foreseen as \$36,500,000 for land purchases and \$166,500,000 for construction.

Water Safety Law Due — Some 280,000 Texas boat owners will have to obtain licenses for their craft if a proposed Uniform Water Safety Act is enacted by the 1959 Legislature.

Representatives of sportsmen's organizations, trade associations and safety groups drafted the measure. It is to be introduced by Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas.

State Highway Department

would have responsibility for registering boats. Enforcement of safety regulations would be the job of the state's various peace officers and game wardens.

Zoning — the restriction of skiing, racing, fishing, etc., to various areas — was omitted from the bill.

Republicans Jockey for Position — Texas Republicans got no help from Secretary of State Steakley in their efforts to break into the first column on the general election

ballot.

In the past the Secretary of State's Office has sent out the list of certified nominees, to counties, with the Democrats listed in the first column. GOP protested, demanded a drawing for position.

Steakley said he was not authorized to set up such a procedure. His office mailed out ballot forms this year, without comment. Democrats were in the first column on the forms.

go ahead in an attempt for two points but Jerry Jacobs picked off the pass rather easily to leave the score 7 to 6 in Ozona's favor.

Even though the scoring was over in the first half the thrills were not as the Red Devils threatened the Lion goal line for the remainder of the quarter but were unable to do any damage other than shaking up the Ozona fan's nerves.

The Lions pushed further ahead in the third quarter with such rapidity that fans were few in the grandstands who knew what had happened.

Ozona kicked off and the Red Devil halfback was in deep trouble by the time he got hold of the ball, a criss-cross effort by the halfbacks led to a fumble and the Lions Jim Doran was first to the ball just over the line for a Lion touchdown. Sutton once again kicked the point after touchdown and the Lions had it 14 to 6.

The Lions gave the Red Devils an opportunity to score mid-way of the quarter and the Red Devils did not waste it as Jimmy Little, the Devil's outstanding 200 pound left tackle, pounced on a Lion fumble on the Ozona 37.

Riding the heels of a hard running Leslie Young the Red Devils pushed to the Lion four yard line where Wayne Windham dived in for the second score. The Red Devils thought so much of the play they tried it again for two points but this time the Lions had it figured and the try was no good. The score Ozona 14, Rankin 12.

The Lions and the Red Devils sparred evenly for some five to ten minutes before the Lions stole a page from the Red Devil book and sewed up the game.

Rankin quarterback Frank Boyd dropped back to pass and was rushed hard as the Devils tried a screen pass which had worked twice before during the night. This time, however, Jim Williams had worked his way into the screen and made a nice catch of the flat zone toss, racing untouched into the end zone some 30 yards away. The Red Devils found time fast running out and so took to the

air in an effort to get back into the contest but once again Jim Williams went high to haul down a pass and this time the Lions sewed up the contest.

Holden circled right end to the 16 and then Sutton exploded up the middle for 16 yards and the final score. This time Sutton faked the kick and pitched easily to Jacobs in the end zone for two points.

The Lions missed a score early in the third period when Sutton unreeled one of his best runs of the season only to see it called back on a holding penalty.

The Lions rolled up 303 yards rushing on 42 tries for the night in one of their best offensive shows of the season, seventeen more came from passing to make the total read 320 yards. The Lions amassed 14 first downs to the Red Devils 11 and intercepted two passes during the night's activities.

Rankin pounded the Ozona defenses for 167 yard running in 43 tries and added 28 more by passing to run up a total of 195 yards. The Rankin defense also hauled in two Lion aeriels.

Billy Bob Holden was the Lions' leading rusher with 123 yards but the offense was well spread out with Sutton getting 86, Sikes 52, and Freeman 42 for the night's work.

The Lions quarterback David Sikes had his best night of the season as he faked and pitched with precision as well as adding some key runs to the Lion attack.

Up front, Kenneth Deland, B. B. Ingham, Dizzy Reeves and Billy Bob Holden along with Butch Albers and Johnny Cooper were standouts in a game that found the Lions feeling that they had just beaten one of the best clubs they have played this season.

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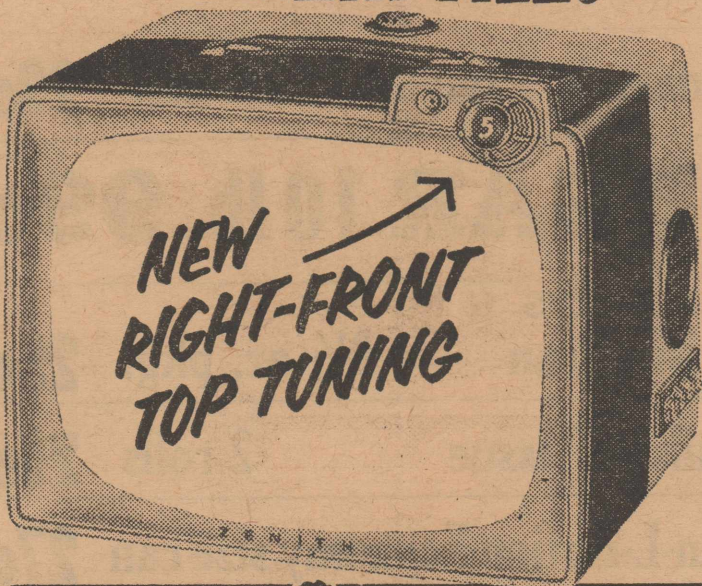
