Deadline Soon For Transfer To Local School

1,474 Ballots Cast During Saturday Vote

Long lines marked the intense interest Saturday, May 16, as 1,474 people cast votes in the Hospital District and Bond election in Bailey County. The election carried 877-597 for Proposition One, which was for the creation of the Bailey County Hospital District and 846-597 for Proposition Two which was for the passage of a bond issue in the amount of \$950,000 to match with a \$900,000 Hill-Burton grant for construction of the hospital.

The proposal was soundly defeated at Needmore where 339 persons cast their votes. Boxes Four, Five and Six voted at the Needmore community building and the proposals were turned down 62-277.

In the Muleshoe box where boxes One, One A, Two and Three were consolidated, and the absentee ballots which were cast in the office of Bailey County Clerk Hazel Gilbreath, Proposition One was 815 for and 320 against; Proposition Two was 784 for and 325 against the proposition.

Controversy surrounded the final phases preceding the Saturday election. Members of the Bailey County Hospital District Board conducted a series of meetings throughout the county in an attempt to explain why a new hospital is necessary.

Controversy surrounded the consolidation of voting boxes in the county with a segment of the county vocally objecting to the hospital issue.

DL School Slated At Center In June

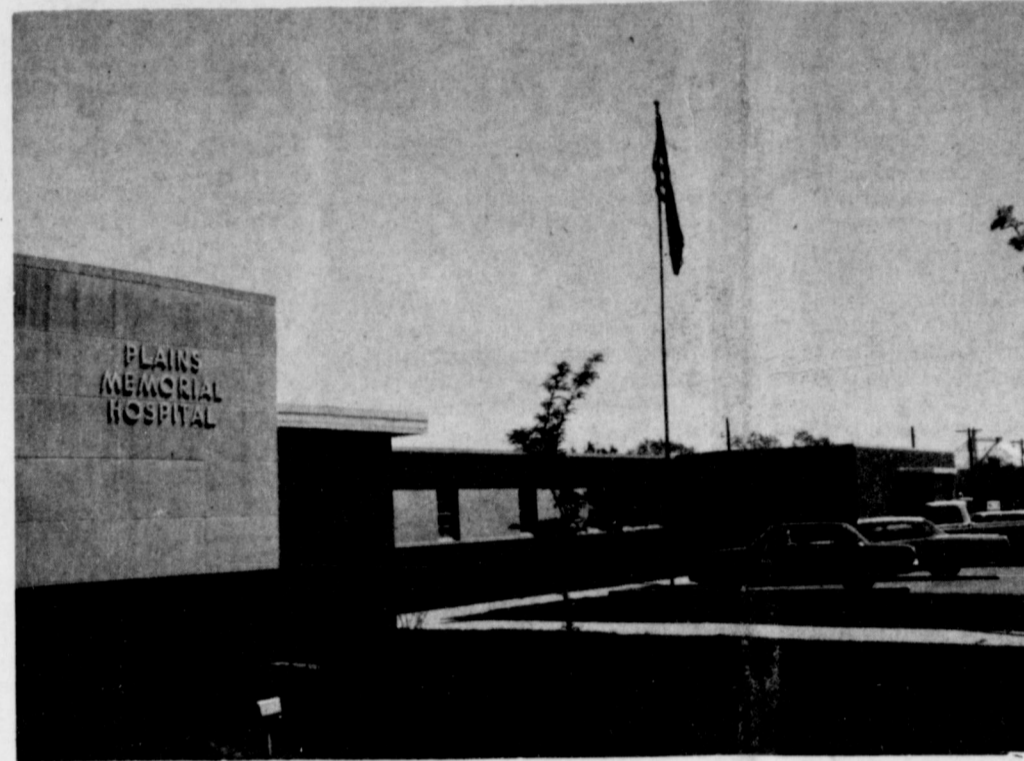
Brian Maconi, chairman of the Bailey County Community Action Committee, announces that a drivers' license school will be held in the Center at the former Hilltop School during June.

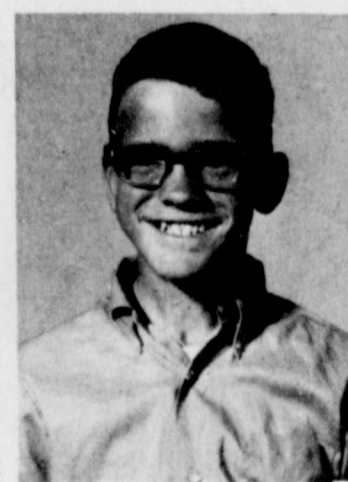

Muleshoe Brothers Killed In Cave-In

Double tragedy struck a Muleshoe family Saturday afternoon when brothers, David and Floyd Gough, son of Mr.

and Mrs. Cecil Gough, lost their lives in a cave-in of a sand cave south of Muleshoe.

The dispatcher at the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center received a call from Frank Ellis of Singleton Funeral Home at 4:47 p.m. that two boys had been buried in a cave-in.

In retracing the events immediately preceding the call from the funeral home, it was found that the two dead boys and their brother, Harlan, around 13 years of age, had been digging into a sandbank in the draw just south of the Muleshoe city limits.

After the sandbank caved in on David and Floyd, their brother, Harlan who was with them at the sand cave, ran to the family home on West Avenue B to get their father. He was

unable to free the boys immediately, so called for help. By the time officers and ambulance service reached the cave-in, it was too late to save the boys.

They were taken to West Plains Memorial Hospital where they were pronounced dead on arrival.

Both boys were students at Mary DeShazo Elementary School where they attended the special education class.

David Eugene Gough was born September 14, 1957 and Floyd Winston Gough was born October 11, 1959.

Funeral services for the two boys were held at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday in the Turriffine-Jackson Funeral Home Chapel at McKinney with burial in the

Demos-GOP Hold Conventions; Name Delegates

The following resolutions were adopted by the Republicans at the convention:

It is resolved that Bob Price be commended for his patriotic statesmanship and conservative stand on the issues confronted with which he has been

confronted. It is resolved that Nixon be commended for his stand on pursuing the enemy into Cambodia to halt the hit and run attacks on our troops. It is recommended that Nixon use the force necessary to terminate the Viet Nam crisis with a decisive victory rather than appeasement in order to restore purpose to American citizens and fighting men.

It is recommended that the sales tax and other state tax increases be prevented by increasing controls over future state spending and a more critical look at present spending.

It is recommended that proper authorities should be allowed to use whatever steps necessary to keep order in our schools and other public places being ravaged by civil disorders and to prevent personal injury or damage to property.

It is resolved that J. Edgar Hoover be commended for his dedicated service and forthright

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built of remodeled barracks buildings from the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp, moved onto the present hospital site in 1947.

The cooperative had to borrow money from its chief physician, Dr. R.E. Cogswell, to remodel and equip the buildings, and stayed on thin ice financially for years.

Finally, members of the cooperative could bear the financial burden no longer, and offered the hospital to the county.

On March 28, 1953, the county's residents passed a bond issue enabling Castro County to purchase the land, buildings and equipment, putting the medical facility under public ownership under the new name of Castro County Hospital.

As the years went by, the asbestos-sided, frame hospital became obsolete. Finally, it wasn't even recognized as an adequate hospital by the state health department.

The county called a bond election for \$290,000 to build a new hospital. But the county's residents voted "down."

In 1960 the county called a second bond election, this time for \$225,000, with the provision that the bonds wouldn't be issued until matching Hill-Burton funds could be obtained, which would give the county a \$450,000 hospital.

On July 9, 1960, the county's voters approved the \$225,000 provisional bond issue—but it was two more years before the county could wade through the red tape of state and federal agencies to get approval for Hill-Burton funds. Federal funds finally were granted Sept-

ember 10, 1962, and construction of the new hospital started May 8, 1963.

While the hospital was being built, county officials did a little sharp-pencil work on the tax system that supported the hospital—and made a major discovery that was to save the county's taxpayers almost half a million dollars.

When a county collects property taxes, the funds have to be shared with the state, improvement districts and special funds. If the county was to pay

The library building committee will work with the architect and city officials in the future building of the new library in Muleshoe.

Also established during the meeting were summer water rates for Muleshoe. Rates for the summer will be \$3 for the first 4,000 gallons and 20 cents per thousand for the next 45,000 gallons. Winter rates are 30 cents per thousand above

the first 4,000 gallons.

Councilmen discussed the appointment of several persons to the regular library board; a survey on a park site in northeast Muleshoe; a minor complication in beginning improvements in the new city park on West Avenue D; amending the budget to allow for a slight increase in the amount used to remodel the fire station and the recent cave-in which took the lives of two young brothers just immediately outside the city limits of Muleshoe.

off the hospital's bonded indebtedness and continue to subsidize it, then it would have to collect \$1.50 to \$1.60 for every dollar needed to do the job.
A separate hospital district, though, would be able to levy its own taxes and get a dollar for every dollar levied. Thus came the formation of the Castro County Hospital District, after a constitutional amendment and local approval.

According to County Judge Raymond E. Wilson, formation of the county-wide hospital district--with its separate taxing authority and dollar-for-dollar tax income--will result in a saving of approximately \$450,000 to the county's taxpayers during the original 16-year bonding period.

The compact, single-story brick hospital was dedicated in May 1964 under the original name of Plains Memorial. The new hospital had the most modern equipment money could buy, and received envious praise from professional people associated with the area's outdated hospitals--especially those huge, old metropolitan complexes that defied modernization.

But in a day when both the scope and specifications of the hospital were undergoing radical changes, even the new

Plains Memorial couldn't remain in the top-rated bracket long.

It had first-rate facilities, but not enough of them to meet the requirements for a high rating. It had no recovery room, no intensive care unit, no medical records library. New personnel were added as they were

required by Blue Cross and Medicare--which call most of the shots on rates and services--but there was no answer to the shortage of physical facilities but more construction. The hospital was rated 7-C, putting it in the majority of the lowest-rated hospitals because of its lack of specialized

facilities. Also, the hospital was packed full of patients more than once in the mid-1960s, and consistently hovered around the 90 percent occupancy rate, leaving no room for epidemics or disasters.

In April, 1968, the hospital district authorized a bond issue

of \$135,000 as the local share of a \$275,000 addition and remodeling project. Again, Hill-Burton funds provided half the amount.

The project called for a new 20-bed wing with a classroom for the hospital's vocational nursing school (taught by Mrs. Mary Baldrige, R.M., supervisor of nurses), a second nurses' station, extra storage rooms and power generating room.

In addition to the new wing being added, the hospital's central complex was remodeled to provide a two-bed intensive care unit and recovery room, family prayer room, lunchroom and gift shop, larger administrative offices, medical records library and more storage space. The laundry was scrapped in favor of a professional uniform and linen service, providing space for part of the remodeling.

The hospital immediately moved up a notch in the ratings to the middle group, 7-B, which is about as high as a small-city, public hospital can hope to climb.

With its new wing, Plains Memorial Hospital now has 46 patient beds, complete facilities for its vocational nursing school (now training its third class, with most past graduates now employed at the hospital), two-bed intensive care unit (which doubles as a recovery room), an ultra-modern business of-

rice equipped to cope with the flood of paperwork that is a part of everyday life in today's hospital, and--again--the finest equipment money can buy, including color-coordinated room furniture and fixtures.

The intensive care unit alone is a marvel of modern electronics. Once a patient is "hooked up" in the intensive care unit, electronic "readers" record his vital functions while a wall-mounted TV camera keeps him under constant surveillance. Both the readers and camera relay their signals to the central nurses' station, where a TV monitor, electrocardiograph and other sophisticated needles and dials give a constant, remote picture of the patient's condition. Should the patient's heart stop beating, the push of a button at the nurses' station will start electrical stimulation while the registered nurse on duty starts her 20-step trip to the intensive care room, where piped oxygen and emergency medication are handy at the patient's bedside.

Plains Memorial Hospital showed off its new wing and new facilities at an open house Sunday, May 17, as an observance of both the hospital's original birthday and National Hospital Week.

The original \$225,000 bond issue for Plains Memorial Hospital will be paid off by 1978, and the \$135,000 bond issue is scheduled to be retired in 1980. Usually, public hospitals lose money. But last year Plains Memorial showed a profit--thanks partially to the new Migrant Health Program, which provides (1) a separate health center for out-patients treatment of migrant workers and (2) payment of half the hospitalization costs for migrants and their families.

During the fiscal year just ended, Plains Memorial

operated at a deficit again. But the current hospital tax rate of 60 cents per \$100 assessed valuation is expected to make up the deficit and keep up the payments on the hospital district's bonded indebtedness.

A community hospital is what you want it to be, and what you're willing to pay for the convenience of local, broad-spectrum medical service. Many government planners are ready to write off the small community hospital in favor of "receiving clinics" to relay patients to metropolitan hospitals--which, themselves, are looking at this idea with a jaundiced eye.

But the people of Castro County decided a quarter-century ago that they wanted a good community hospital, and they've restated their desire twice in the last decade with \$360,000 worth of bond elections.

Police Active

Stepped up activity in law enforcement agencies found several persons "on the wrong side of the law" during recent days.

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Time Lapse Short n Tractor Accidents

COLLEGE STATION, April --Seven-tenths of a second isn't very long. But, seven-tenths of a second is all the time available to a farm tractor operator whose unit has started to rear backwards under

full throttle, says Henry O'Neal, Extension agricultural engineer.

Within that time, he can still de-throttle the engine to stop the rearing, he explains. Beyond that fraction of time, there is no stopping the rearing and ultimate upset. And unless the operator is thrown clear, or can possibly jump clear, he is pinned or crushed to suffer serious injury or death.

Or maybe he was one of the lucky ones whose tractor was equipped with a roll bar. "Of a national annual toll of about 1000 lives due to tractor accidents, some 600 are credited to tractor overturns," says the engineer.

"Many could be prevented through the exercise of sensible driving practices," he adds. Sideways upsets occur when tractors are driven too close to ditches, holes or embankments. Backward flips occur when tractor - implement hitches are set at a point higher than the center of the rear axle, or when the load exceeds the tractor's power to move it.

At such times, the tractor employs its own power to create the rearing and backward flipping motion.

A roll-over bar, sometimes called a protective frame, can be designed to serve as a crush-resistant cab to provide operator comfort. But its primary purpose is to protect the operator from serious injury in the event the tractor tips.

"Many a capsized tractor was prevented from tipping more than 90 degrees because a roll bar was there to stop it and many a tractor operator was spared serious injury because he was strapped into the tractor seat when a roll bar

Records Show County Accident Rate Lowers

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Bailey County during the month of April, according to Sergeant Thur-

man Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed, one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$2,475.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1970 shows a total of 12 accidents resulting in no persons killed, seven persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$9,583.00.

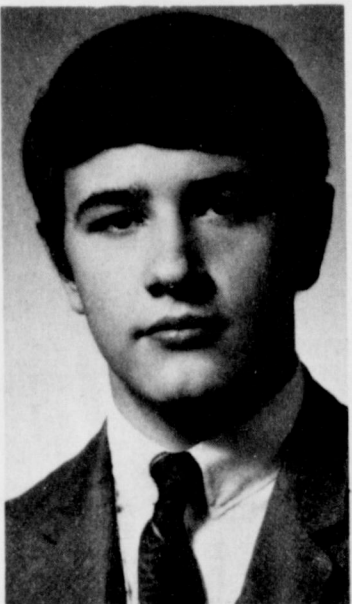

A keynote dinner was held at convention headquarters with Lewis Timberlake, Austin, speaker.

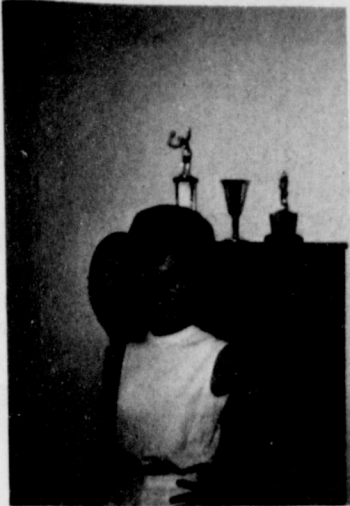

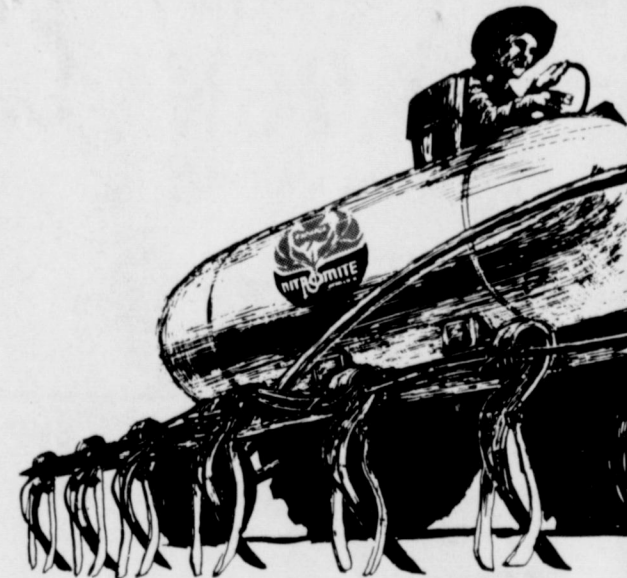

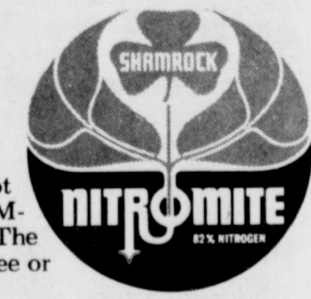
