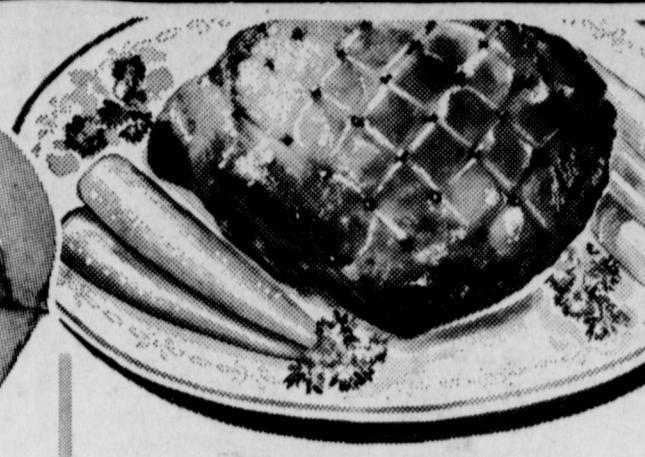
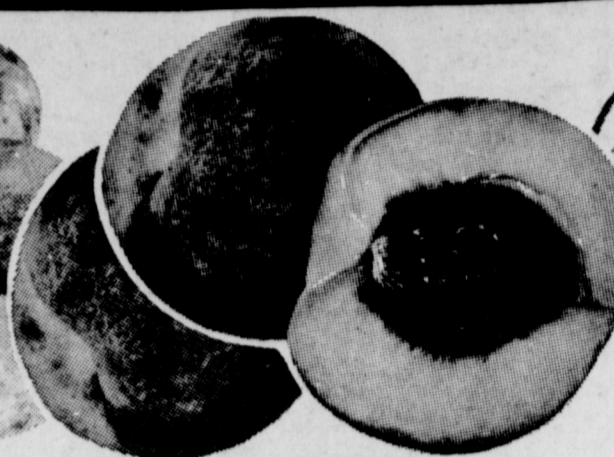
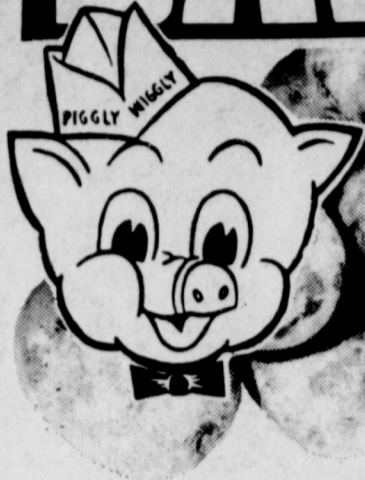

Preservation Demonstration Given By Miss Kilgore

A preservation demonstration by Miss Hattie Kilgore has been set for June 5, at 1:30 p.m. in the County Activity Building Banquet Room in Morton. Please note the change of time. The demonstration will last about one and one half to two hours.

The demonstration will be the actual canning of a vegetable, tomatoes and fruits, showing the recommended procedure for preparation and processing of the products.

Emphasis will be placed on the proper selection, preparation and processing of vegetables, fruits and tomatoes. Also, the do's and don'ts of canning as well as answers to many canning questions and problems.

A vegetable will be canned, using the hot and cold pack methods of preparation and the important steps in processing in the pressure cooker.

Tomatoes and one or two fruits will be canned using the Boiling Water Bath Method of processing. Emphasis will be given to this method and reasons why it should be used for fruits and tomatoes.

The Open Kettle Method will be discussed; why it is not recommended for canning tomatoes and fruits and points to be remembered when using this method for jams, jellies and pickles.

There will be a limited discussion on freezing as to selection.
