Injunction Denied By Dist. Judge In **Dump Ground Case**

Judge Says No Nuisance Will Be Tolerated At Dumping Site

District Judge Steve Preslar, who ascended to the 112th district court bench on January 1 after having been elected to the post in the general election last November, ruled in favor of Crockett county at a hearing of a suit for injunction to restrain the county from use of a property on the south edge of Ozona for a dump ground.

The suit was brought by a group of residents of the Latin-American section of Ozona as individuals and on behalf of the United Parents Organization. The suit was originally brought in the name of three individuals but when these three persons withdrew from the suit, an amlended petition was filed naming eleven other residents of the area as plaintiffs. Goldberg, pinpointed the aircraft, which by then was wobbling and smoking from unknown causes and directed the plane to Carswell AFB, where it landed safely.

During the year the Sector's Aircraft Control and Warning Squadrons averaged about 350 assists to aircraft each month. These Jr., Menard, Texas. Although not classed as emergencies, these problems might become dangerous if not solved with the help of the men at the scopes on the ground.

There was a bonus thrown into the "budget" report too: 44 people flying in the crippled aircraft came safely through the emergencies without an injury.

It cost some 40 million dollars during 1960 to operate the system 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 366 days of the year. Four operations crews work around the clock at each radiar station, and at sector headquarters on Oklahoma City Air Force Station.

Classed as "saved" aircraft are those whose pilots ask for help by "Squawking Mayday" on their radios. "Mayday" is Air Force jargon for an aircraft emergency.

The 732nd Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron of Ozona Air Force Station is proud to be a member of the Oklahoma Air Defense Sector, Sgt. Hall concluded.



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

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Notes From The County Agent's Office

Far Western Crockett

By Pete W. Jacoby

A defhiled review of reserach and extension programs dealing with sheep and goats, wool and mohair has been completed. The review was held at Texas A&M College, January 4-6, and resulted from a common desire of industry, research extension leaders in Texas for an appraisal of present programs and to develop new directives to meet the needs of a rapidly changing industry.

Participants in the review were 9 technical and industry consultants, 18 ranchmen, and 29 staff members of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Extension Service. Results of plast work, current work and future work needed were considered by the group in analyzing each area stu-

The major areas of research and extension studied included reproduction, selection, nutrition, diseases, market expansion and marketing efficiency.

.In general, the consultants expressed satisfaction with present programs, but believed that more reserach is definitely needed in the many areas in order for the industry to keep pace with present economic growth without government subsidies and aid. Greatest emphasis on research advancement was placed in the areas of tangora goat mutrition and management, and production economics, financing, and marketing efficiency for sheep and goats, wool and mohair.

The consultants expressed satisfaction with present Extension Service Sheep and Goat programs, but felt the specialist staff needed more manpower and should miske greater use ofpractical research for a more effective educattional program. They see a need for the industry to support the research lefforts and serve as leaders in carrying out educational programs. T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Crockett county ranchman and past president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raiser's Association, served on the review committee.
