Construction Begins On 3.49 Mile Segment Highway 163

Work began Monday on a 3.49-mile section of Highway 163 from a point 11 miles south of Ozona to .8 of a mile from the intersection of 163 and RM 1973.

Allan Construction Co. of San Antonio, is the contractor on the project. Allan Construction was the low bidder when bids were received May 27 at the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

A pre-construction conference was held in the office of W. F. Dixon, resident engineer, State Highway Department, in Ozona last Thursday with representatives of the Allan Construction Co., the Department of Public Safety

and the Highway Department present.

The purpose of the conference is to secure closer cooperation between the contractor, the DPS and the Highway Department engineering personnel concerning the safety and convenience of the traveling public through the project while it is under construction. A review and discussion of all signs and barricades called for by the governing specifications and plans was held.

Leslie Massey of Allan Construction Co. told the group that his plans called for immediate erection of the barricades, with clearing of

the right of way to begin June 29. A structure crew will begin their work on or about July 12, with the earthwork crew to begin their operations around July 20. The base and surfacing operations will follow as progress develops.

Due to construction procedures, the traveling public will encounter short detours and delays in their travel, Dixon said. These will be kept at a minimum, however, the engineer said, and the public is requested to cooperate by complying with all warning signs and respecting all barricades.

In-depth training in junior leadership was conducted for all delegates attending the camp. Accompanying the 4-H members to the camp were 4-H adult leaders Mrs. Ruben Whitehead, Mrs. Pete Zapata and county agent Pete Jacoby.

Board Approves Unification Of Ozona Elementary Schools

To comply with requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1965, the Board of Trustees of Crockett County Consolidated Common School District approved in a recent meeting the unification of the system's elementary schools.

The unification plan was initiated following the March visit by officials from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and a return visit in May.

Under the terms of the unification plan, the two present elementary school plants will divide pupils according to grades and the names of the schools will be changed.

Beginning with the 1970-71 school year, all pupils in grades, kindergarten, first and second will attend the South Elementary school, henceforth to be known as the Ozona Primary School.

All pupils in grades three, four, five and six will be housed in the North Elementary school, which will then become the Ozona Intermediate School.

It was not necessary to make any changes in the Ozona Junior High School nor the Ozona High School, Board officials said.

HEW officials who visited the Ozona schools to check on civil rights compliance, were highly complimentary of the system's operation and the planned changes as outlined in the school board's action has been approved by HEW.

June Goes Out With Slow Rains

After an extremely dry beginning, the month of June went on its way dripping. The rainfall total for the entire month was 1.27 and .82 of an inch of that was recorded in the final three days. Most of the moisture came from blustery early morning thunderstorms with the south part of the county recording by far the largest amount of rainfall. Some portions reported up to 2 inches.

Mrs. Bud Sessoms reports from the old Frank Friend ranch, located down Taylor Box draw in the south part of the county, a fall of 3 1/2 inches in the past four days.

Ranches in the extreme western section of the county reported rain nearly all night Monday night and Tuesday morning.

Ozona recorded .32 of an inch Tuesday morning and light drizzle fell until mid-morning. Most of the county received some moisture from the Tuesday rainfall.

Extremely dry conditions prevailed throughout June and grass fires were becoming frequent before the rains began to fall.

Premature Dynamite Explosion Injures Water Dept. Workers

Juan Castellanos is recovering from facial injuries suffered last week when a shot of dynamite was detonated prematurely.

Castellanos, an employee of the Crockett County Water District for the past ten years, was rushed to a Sonora hospital last week when he was injured while shooting a rock ditch with dynamite.

Joe Reblez, who was standing directly over the charge of dynamite when it exploded, miraculously escaped injury. He was tossed straight up and out of the ditch and landed on his feet. A package of cigarettes in his shirt pocket was blown apart but Reblez was unhurt. Lupe Fierro, stand near the ditch, received painful but minor injuries from small pebbles which peppered his neck.

The men got their signals mixed and the detonator went off before the shot was properly covered. Three other employees, who were as near to the blast as Castellanos, miraculously escaped injury.

Mr. Fierro died Monday morning of an apparent heart attack. He was dead on arrival at Crockett County Hospital.

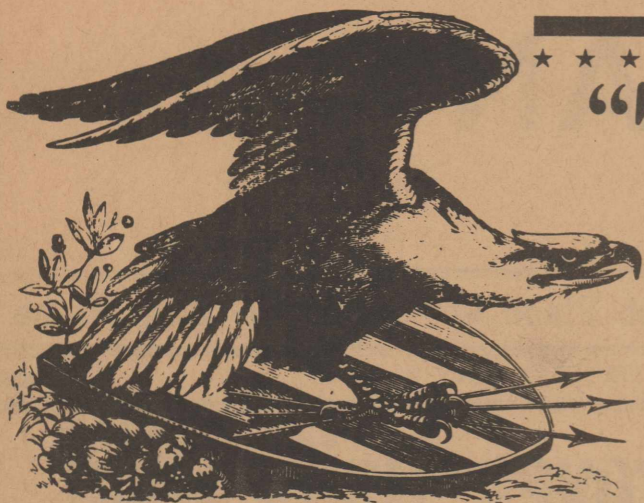
He was born July 6, 1915 in Mexico. He was a ranch labor contractor and had lived in Ozona most of his life.

FORT LANCASTER visitors' center, complete except for final finishing touches, came a step nearer completion with announcement of approval by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission of master plans for reshaping five abandoned frontier forts into historical parks, the list including the far west Crockett county fort site. The master plans call for restoration and addition of facilities such as visitors centers, archaeological excavations and marking of paths for visitors. The

visitors center pictured above is built of native stone with shake roof and heavy beams. The building is in the shape of a cross with a center section extending to form a porch. The center reception room is flanked on the left by a room which will ultimately be used as a museum, displaying artifacts and historical data relating to the frontier fort. The rooms on the right contain offices for administrative personnel and service facilities, rest rooms, etc.

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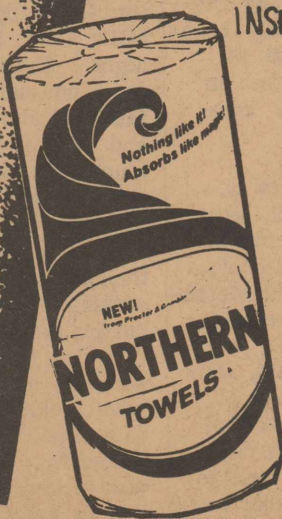

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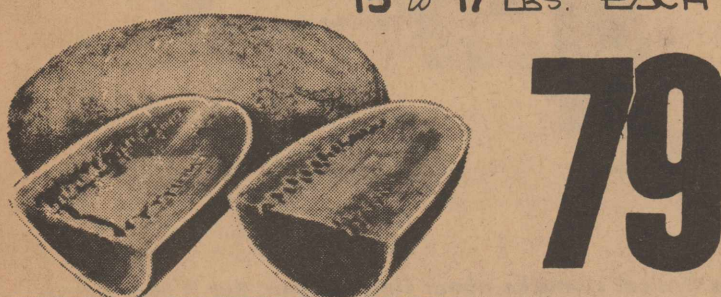

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Graves Of Confederate Veterans Due Markers

Official Texas Historical Grave Markers, honoring two of the Confederate Veterans buried in Cedar Hill Cemetery here, have been awarded by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, it was announced this week by Mrs. R. A. Harrell of Ozona, chairman of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee.

The markers, to be placed in the cemetery will honor Sam T. Smith and Pharis Hurst.

The inscription on the Sam Smith marker reads as follows:

SAMUEL THEODORE SMITH
(Sept. 7, 1846-Dec. 26, 1925)

A confederate Veteran of 18th La. Cav. Bn., Civil War. Born in Louisiana, came to Texas in 1872; to Ozona, 1891. Built city's first school, first courthouse, Baptist Church, other structures.

Married Alice Crim, March 1, 1876
Had Three Children
Recorded 1970

The inscription on the Pharis Hurst marker reads as follows:

PHARIS HURST
(1840-1927)

U. S. Army Veteran of Civil War, discharged after loss of arm, Siege of Vicksburg. Born in Pennsylvania, came to Texas after war. Was a farmer, teacher, Postmaster. Wives: (1) Melinda Beal; (2) Zilla Parker. Had 4 children. Lived in Ozona 1917-1927.

Recorded 1970
The marking of graves of outstanding pioneer Texans is one part of the general marking program of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. Among the graves that have been recognized are those of former Texas governors and statesmen, heroes of the Texas Revolution, veterans of every major war in which the United States has fought, frontier doctors, school teachers, buffalo hunters, and ordinary citizens who were in the vanguard of settlers who migrated to Texas in the early 19th century.

The name and location of these markers will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers." As of 1970, the Survey Committee had erected more than 5,000 markers throughout the state.

Sandwiches, that old summer favorite, need not necessarily be a bore and the same old thing. Try these for variety.

Chicken-Cheese Club Sandwiches

8 tbs. cottage cheese
2 tbs. chopped pecans
1 tbs. chopped dates
9 slices white bread, buttered
Sliced chicken breast
Mayonnaise
Lettuce leaves
Sliced smoked tongue

Combine cheese, pecans and dates and spread on three slices of buttered bread. Lay second slice of buttered bread on top and cover with

sliced chicken, a little mayonnaise, lettuce, tongue, and more lettuce. Lay a third slice of buttered bread buttered side down, on top to close the sandwich. Cut the three sandwiches in triangles or quarters. Serves three. Double recipe for six.

Cream-Cheese-Bacon Sandwich Filling

3 slices bacon, cooked crisp and crumbled
3-ounce pkg. cream cheese
1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1/2 teas. Worcestershire sauce
2 tbs. light cream
1 scant teas. chopped parsley or chives

Blend well and use as sandwich filling. Very good on oatmeal bread.

Egg and Watercress Sandwiches
1/2 cup finely chopped watercress (stems removed)
1/2 cup coarsely chopped walnuts
4 ounces cream cheese
2 hard-cooked eggs, sieved
Salt to taste
Thin slices of nut bread
Butter or mayonnaise

Mix the filling ingredients gently but thoroughly. Spread the bread with butter or mayonnaise, then with the filling, cover with more buttered bread, trim off crusts and chill an hour or so. One cup of filling.

People sometimes make cynical remarks about flag-waving. But it sure beats flag-burning.

Our belief in this nation is something far deeper than mere patriotism. It is the expression of honor and respect for the institutions and blessings we possess as Americans.

One of those institutions is a church independent of state control. One of those blessings is the right to worship according to the dictates of conscience.

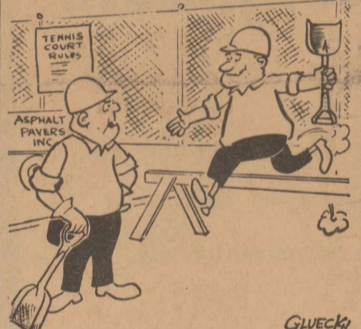
FORMER PEGGY HARVICK WINS BIG IN ART SHOW IN MINN.

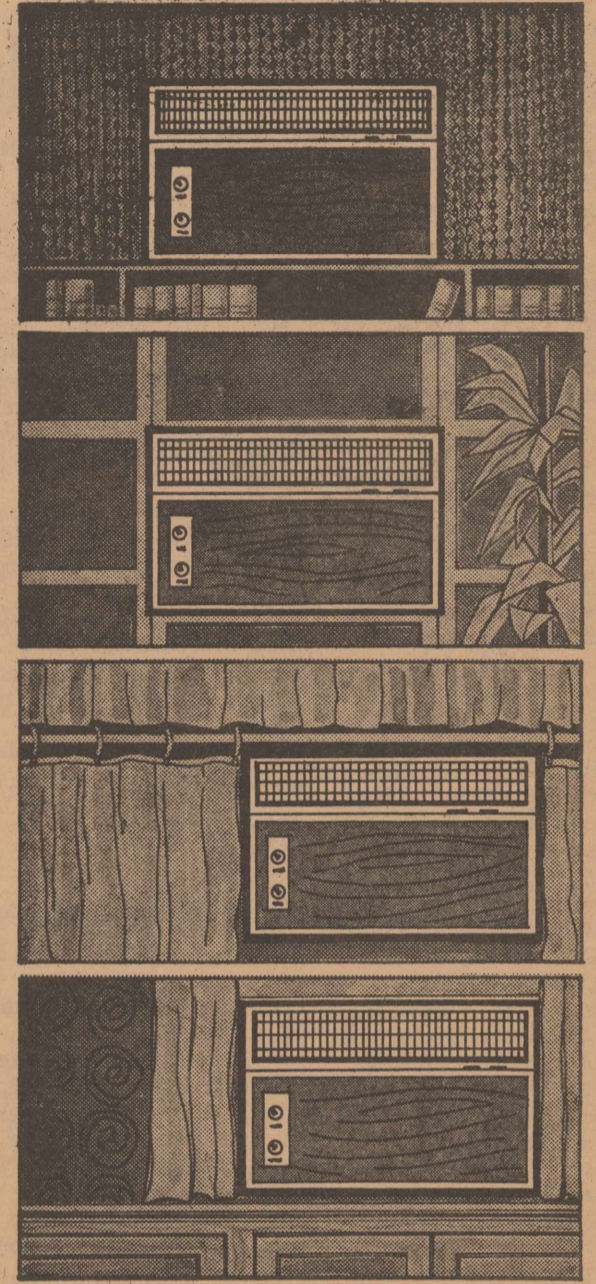

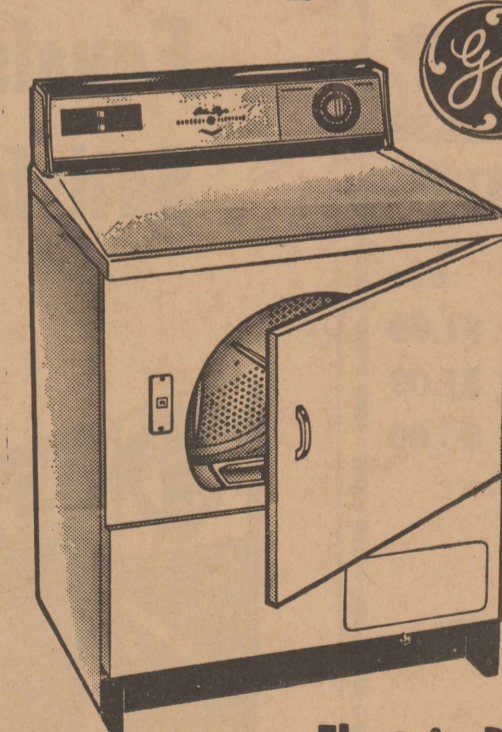

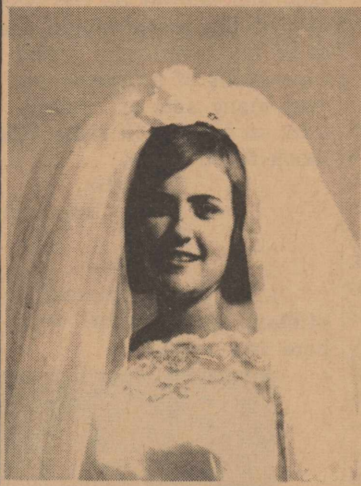
Sat. Ceremony Unites Susan Reed, Mr. Gunnels

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

The refreshing showers of last week and this were most welcome and of course, we hope they will continue throughout the summer. They make gardening so much easier and more enjoyable.

One of the most attractive ways to display flowers or foliage plants in the summer is to plant or buy hanging baskets to place in convenient places or use as a focal point for an area. An open breeze-way, porch, trees, entrance way, attached brackets to wall or fence are ideal spots to use these hanging miniature gardens. These baskets can vary in size and many different materials may be used. Plastic stays moist longer than some, but the homemade interwoven wire and chicken wire baskets are quite satisfactory. Plants can be placed along the sides and soon cover the whole basket. They may be lined with peat moss or light weight plastic material with holes punched in the bottom for drainage. Plants may be placed in the peat moss lined baskets or a good mixed soil. These plants should be fed every two or three weeks to keep them healthy and growing and do not forget to water each day. Be sure the hangers of hooks, wire, chain or rope are firmly fastened to prevent them from blowing down in strong wind.

Mrs. Bill Cooper exhibits several unusual baskets in her most attractive and well-groomed garden. Bill is the handyman who made the wire baskets and the focal point of interest is an originally designed corner water fountain with a background of beautifully

placed rocks and well-grown plants. Some of the most popular plants used for baskets are ivys, ferns, sedums, vinca, lantana, ivy geranium, petunia, shrimp plant, cascade mums, fuchsia, artillery plant, and others you may want to use.

It is now time to start dividing irises and spring blooming perennials. Order peonies iris and day lilies for fall delivery. Mulch peonies to keep the soil cool.

If snapdragons have grown tall and stringy, cut back to 8 or 10 inches and they will put on new growth for new blooms.

As the leaves brown on your spring flowering bulbs, they are ready to separate and transplant. Daffodils should be replanted every two or three years to avoid crowding and the blooms becoming smaller.

When fertilizing, check the moisture in the soil, for if there is a shortage, plants may be injured. If dry, water thoroughly and wait a day to apply fertilizer.
