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THE STAMP OF GREATNESS

Among the signs of Washington's response to grass-roots patriotism is the announcement by the Postoffice Department that General Douglas MacArthur will be honored with a commemorative six-cent postage stamp in the near future. Postmaster General Winton M. Blount said that "there has been an intense demand that a MacArthur stamp be issued. I am both honored and gratified to be in the position of complying with these requests." The design and date of issuance of the MacArthur stamp will be announced later, the Postoffice department said.

We join with millions of Americans who will applaud the decision by Postmaster Blount. General MacArthur will go down in world history as one of the truly exceptional great Americans. One unusual feature of his brilliant military record was that he was the hero of not one, but of two generations of Americans. In World War I, as chief of staff and later commander of the Rainbow Division in Europe, he was described by Secretary of War Newton D. Baker as the greatest frontline general of World War I.

At West Point he was cadet captain and graduated No. 1 man in his class of 1903. By 1917 he was a colonel and the following year was promoted to brigadier general. When he was named Army Chief of Staff in 1930, he was the youngest man ever to hold that post. General MacArthur retired in 1937. But he "kept his hand" in military affairs by reorganizing the Philippine army, as a field marshal.

For most men, one honored lifetime as a national hero would suffice. But a new generation was born in America—and a new war. When he was recalled to service in 1941, General MacArthur was 61 years of age and had already put in 37 vigorous years of work. But, less than three years after he escaped from Corregidor, he was back in the Philippines; and on Sept. 2, 1945, he accepted the Japanese surrender at Tokyo Bay. World War II Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson described MacArthur as the principal architect of victory in the Pacific. Then followed five years of occupation of Japan, during which time he enjoyed a respect from the Japanese people which is all but unprecedented in the history of occupying armies.

Perhaps the outstanding feature of General MacArthur, however, above and beyond his military genius and leadership, was his example of a sterling character as a man; his adherence to the highest principles of integrity, of loyalty, of dedication, and of his acknowledgement of the providence and benevolence of God. While the butt of many jokes about what has been described as his haughty manner, there was never at any time the slightest doubt in MacArthur's mind but that he walked with God. And that was perhaps his most outstanding stamp of greatness.

THE OPPRESSED STUDENT

Dean Clarence Manion took some time off between his broadcasts No. 818 and No. 819 from South Bend, Indiana to ruffle a few pages of a new Houghton Mifflin book, "Push Comes to Shove." Noting that the book was written by Steven Kelman, 21, a Harvard Student, Dean Manion wasn't quite sure what he would find. But what he did find produced a few surprises for him, and maybe for you too. Among many other things, Harvard student Kelman reported:

"The university sanctuary is a protective womb that shelters us from the natural shocks outside, in what we call on campus 'the real world.' The laws against liquor and drugs do not apply to us. Only visionaries could conceive of the leisuristic

future society where the general population could enjoy the 'work week' we have.

"Students sleep most mornings till 10 a.m. Sixty-five per cent of those in our age group have begun . . . a dulling job in the non-professional sectors of the economy or are off in Viet Nam. (But) we students are, at a cost of approximately \$15,000 of our parents' money, enjoying the longest period of prolonged irresponsibility the world has ever known.

"Students are today's idle rich. Being idle, well fed, and generally satisfied gives us a chance to do a great deal of solitary thinking and 'soul-searching'—a term which has literal significance for us. And many of us, like Hamlet, end up thinking too precisely on the event.

"The oppressed student class can't talk to anyone over 30 because older people are no longer idle, have no more time to brood.

"When the member of the oppressed student class gets swept along on the New Left's red flag, it is on the basis of a misunderstanding. For the alienated would be the most desperately unhappy of all people in the regimented society which the New Left would institute . . ."

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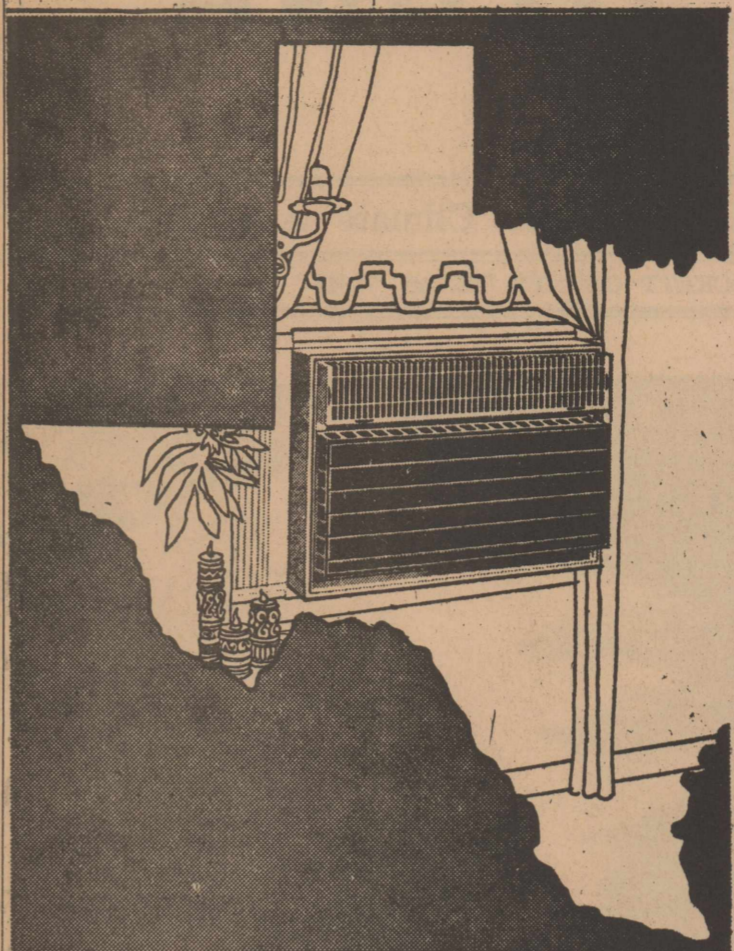

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club

July and August are perhaps the two most difficult months for successful gardening in our area. Especially, where there is a lack of water. We, in Ozona are fortunate to have good water available to keep our yards green and growing well.

An ideal summer bloomer is the common geranium, for the heat and dry weather do not effect its growth and blooms. They require very little care, a light, not too rich soil and not as much water as some other plants, but plenty of sunshine.

Someone once said "Everything is handsome about the geranium, even its name." Geraniums are used for both border and mass plantings, potted plants and window boxes.

Cannas are one of the most versatile and popular plants used in our gardens for blooms and beautiful foliage. The leaves are attractive before they unfurl and they give a tropical feeling to any planting or arrangement. Because of their ease in growing and their exotic blooms, gardeners are becoming more interested in them. New varieties are being developed, which are superior in color and size of bloom. The color range has been shades of yellow, orange and red. Now, they may be had in all of pink tone cream, shites and two-toned varieties. The Humbert varieties produce bronzy foliage which gives an effective accent. Their range in height is from dwarf to tall for backgrounds and screening. The height is easily governed by the amount of food and water they receive. The dwarfs make nice clumps of color in the perennial border in hot weather. Cannas will get along with what they have but they reward you with greater beauty for the care you give them. If they have a ragged appearance in the summer after flowers have faded, cut the stalk off even with the ground. Soon a new stalk will replace the old one. This will keep your plants neat and fresh looking.

Earlier in the season many were worried about the condition of their St. Augustine grass. A late warming up of the soil and freeze damage was partly the cause. It is now becoming well-established with a good color and thick turf. Should plants have a yellow color, a spray application of iron sulphate or a chelated iron will correct the problem.

Plant zenias in a sunny location now for fall blooming.

For gaps in the flower border, you can fill in with foliage or flowering plants from a nursery. Gazanias that I am experimenting with are good for a sunny location. Begonias and sultanas are colorful in the shade. Foliage plants that grow fast and attractive include caladiums, copper plant and coleus.

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Meat Loaf with Orange Slices

1 1/2 lbs. ground chuck
1 (1 oz.) pkg. instant oatmeal
1/2 cup light cream
1 small onion, finely diced
3 tbs. minced green pepper
1 tbs. Worcestershire sauce
1 teas. salt
1/2 teas black pepper
2 tbs. tomato catsup
1 egg slightly beaten
Orange sections and sauce
Combine all ingredients except the orange sections and sauce; mix well. Form into a loaf and place in a baking dish. Garnish the sides and top with orange slices. Make the sauce and pour half of it over the loaf. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 1 hour. Baste the loaf often with the remaining half of sauce. Serve with pan drippings.

Sauce:
1/2 cup brown sugar
3 tbs. tarragon vinegar, or enough to make a thin sauce
1 teas. prepared mustard
2 teas Worcestershire sauce
Blend all ingredients well and use as directed.

Mustard Potatoes
Roll cooked new potatoes, or canned ones, in heated melted butter until potatoes are browned on all sides. Stir in 2 tablespoons prepared mus-

tard. Add 1 cup sour cream; add salt and pepper to taste. Cover and heat slowly, but do not boil.

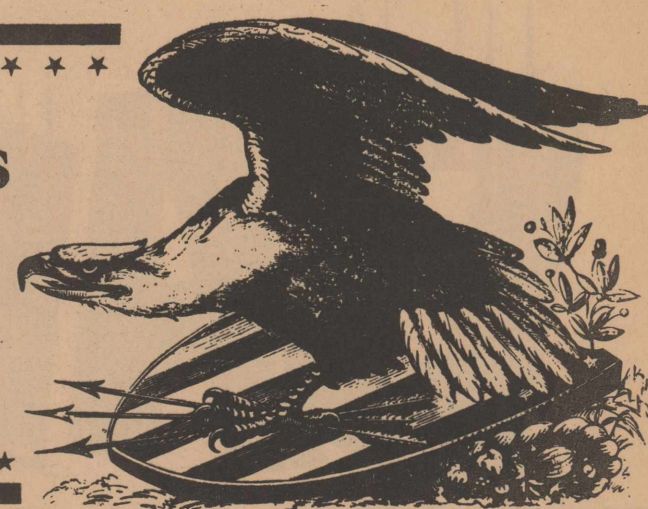
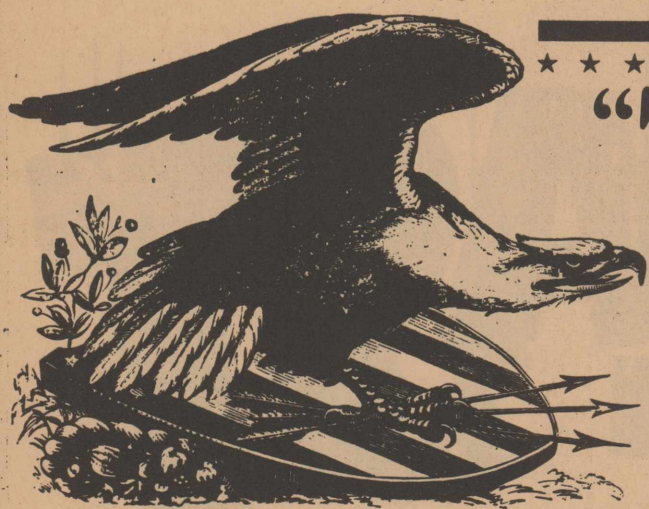

Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

The New Politics, a youth movement also known as the "New Congress Movement", grabbed headlines recently. Headquartered at Princeton, it established a sort of computerized clearinghouse to supply information to student workers and their chosen candidates across the country.

Joining in themovement, some college heads announced plans to suspend classes for two weeks before the next General Election to enable their crusaders to saturate chosen districts where Congressmen are not

acceptable to them.

Already, accompanied by fanfare and ballyhoo, thousands of these students have tested their strength with the electorate. They picked recent primaries in two districts for initial battlegrounds — the 14th in New York and the 15th in New Jersey, represented by veteran Congressman John Rooney of Brooklyn and 4-team Ed Patten across the bay in New Jersey.

The press reported that, with the accent on youth, well over 1,000 students fanned out over Patten's district, ringing doorbells, button-holing prospects and buzzing telephones. Their candidate's well-to-do father put up \$150,000 for a down-payment on campaign expenses, and hundreds of workers received up to \$20 per day for their services.

The primary results: Patten was handed the most overwhelming victory of his long political career!

In the case of John Rooney, it was about the same story. Again, with the accent on youth, the well-financed opponent was off and running with an endorsement at a meeting of

students from 61 campuses. Press headlines acclaimed the thrust of the New Movement. The campaign was described as a model of organized effort. And literally hundreds of student volunteers moved in.

When the votes were counted the Brooklyn Congressman won by a landslide! But the New Congress Movement is not dead, according to reports from Princeton. The movement is said to have already stored more than 10,000 student names who are available for voluntary campaign help, eager to swing into action.

Apparently what the New Congress Movement overlooks is that most Americans are much smarter than these people give them credit for being. If elected incumbents at all levels need to be replaced, the people have a way of taking care of that without any assist from the outsiders, who really have so little to offer.

Chris Perner, Ozona Native Receives Commendation For His Work In Space Program

Chris Perner, Ozona native who is presently employed by NASA as an electrical engineer, recently received a Sustained Superior Performance Award for excellence in the performance of his duties.

Perner, who lives in Friendswood with his wife and 10-year-old son, Mike, is the son of Mrs. Stephen Perner and the late Mr. Perner. He is a graduate of Ozona High School and of Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Perner is assigned with NASA as the Flight Crew Operations Directorate Subsystem Manager for the Command Module. He is expected to provide guidelines and requirements for the design of the command module crew station. He represents the Flight Crew Operations Directorate to the Apollo Program Office for coordination of all areas concerning the command module. He is required to determine the requirements for the types of controls and displays, lighting, stowage and crew station arrangement necessary to crew functions during various phases of the Apollo missions.

His recommendation for the award read in part:

"Mr. Perner, during the past year, has demonstrated a sustained exemplary performance as Subsystem Manager for the Apollo Command Module Crew Station. It should be noted that the Apollo missions 11, 12 and 13 have taken place during this time period.

"Because of the changing program and mission requirements, Mr. Perner was heavily involved with each spacecraft change as it affected the command module crew station. As a result of these changes, Mr. Perner developed concepts and methods in an extremely short period of time and implemented the requirements in a timely manner to support subsequent missions.

"Changes which were directly handled by Mr. Per-

ner included: stowage, controls and displays, bracketry for special camera attachments, suit requirements and special equipment. These items changed from mission to mission to accommodate different scientific and operational objectives for each flight.

"Indicative of Mr. Perner's motivation and superior performance is the fact that prior to the flight of Apollo 13, he set up a crew station team for the command module and lunar module to support the mission in real time. Because of the subsequent events, Mr. Perner and his counterpart were able to respond instantly to the changing situations that evolved. He was able to provide solutions to pressing crew-spacecraft problems in near real-time. The successful conclusion of the mission was substantially assisted by his efforts in the above area.

"All of the above evidence substantiates the reason why Mr. Perner is highly recommended for the Sustained Superior Performance Award."

Word was received here this week by Perner's mother that he had received the award, plus a check, which is the monetary compensation awarded automatically with the award.

Perner has been working with the space program for the past five years.
