

Cattle Growth In Feedlots Is Spotlighted

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 25 The large commercial feedlot is becoming more and more important to the Texas cattle feeding industry.

Feedlots with capacities of under 8,000 head (at one time) decreased in number while lots with capacities between 8,000 to 15,999 head made the biggest gains in 1970, according to Dr. Ed Uvacek, Extension livestock marketing specialist.

Feedlot marketing in the U.S. reached a record 24.9 million head during 1970, according to a recent USDA "Cattle on Feed" report, Texas feeders turned out 3.1 million head in the calendar year 1970.

Last year Texas had 306 feedlots with 1,000 head or more capacity operating at any one time. Dr. Uvacek indicated that these feedlots accounted for 97 percent of the fed cattle marketed in the state.

Five large feedlots, with capacities of over 16,000 head, were also in operation last year in Texas.

A separate report issued by the Packers and Stockyards Administration shows that almost 11 percent of the 2.7 million cattle and calves fed in Texas in 1969 were owned by or fed for meat packers.

Texas ranks as the leading state for packer feeding, Dr. Uvacek said.

The Texas feeders figure represents an increase of 432, 000 head over last year, considerably smaller than the year earlier gain, Dr. Uvacek commented.

He indicated that Texas remains the third largest feeding state in the nation, surpassed by Iowa and Nebraska. Dr. Uvacek added the ranking of the top ten cattle feeding states remained about the same as the previous year, with Minnesota edging out Arizona for the eighth position.

Savings Bonds February Sale Figure Given

County Bond Chairman Dean Sparyberry announced today that the 1971 United States Savings Bond sales goal for Bailey County is \$60,000. January sales were \$2,775 with five per cent of goal achieved.

During January Texas sales amounted to \$17,375,765 -- an increase of 9.5 per cent over the total January 1970 sales of E & H Freedom Shares. This is 10 per cent of the annual dollar goal of \$181.9 million.

Nationally, Savings Bond sales for January 1971 were \$430 million for 8.9 per cent of the national goal of \$4.8 billion. Sales were 13 per cent above January 1970. Cash value of Bonds and Freedom Shares outstanding on January 31 reached an all-time peak of \$52.6 billion.

At the time of the fire, visibility was already cut drastically by blowing sand, and the smoke drifting across the highway would have been a potential traffic hazard. One Morton City Police unit was noted at the fire helping direct traffic until the smoke and sand lessened.

SAVORY BEEF STEW

- 2 lbs. boneless stew beef
- 2 T. flour
- 1 t. salt
- 1/4 t. chili powder
- 1/8 t. black pepper
- 2 cans cream tomato soup
- 2 c. water
- 4 carrots cut in pieces
- 8 small onions
- 1/2 lb. green beans, cut in pieces
- Mashed potatoes

Wipe meat with damp cloth. Mix flour, salt, chili powder, and pepper. Roll meat in this mixture and brown on both sides in fat. Drain off excess fat. Add tomato soup, and water. Simmer 1 1/2 hours, or until tender. Add vegetables and cook 35 minutes more. Pour mixture into greased casserole dish. Place mashed potatoes around rim of casserole. Bake at 375 degrees for 15 minutes or until potatoes are lightly browned.

Serves six to eight.

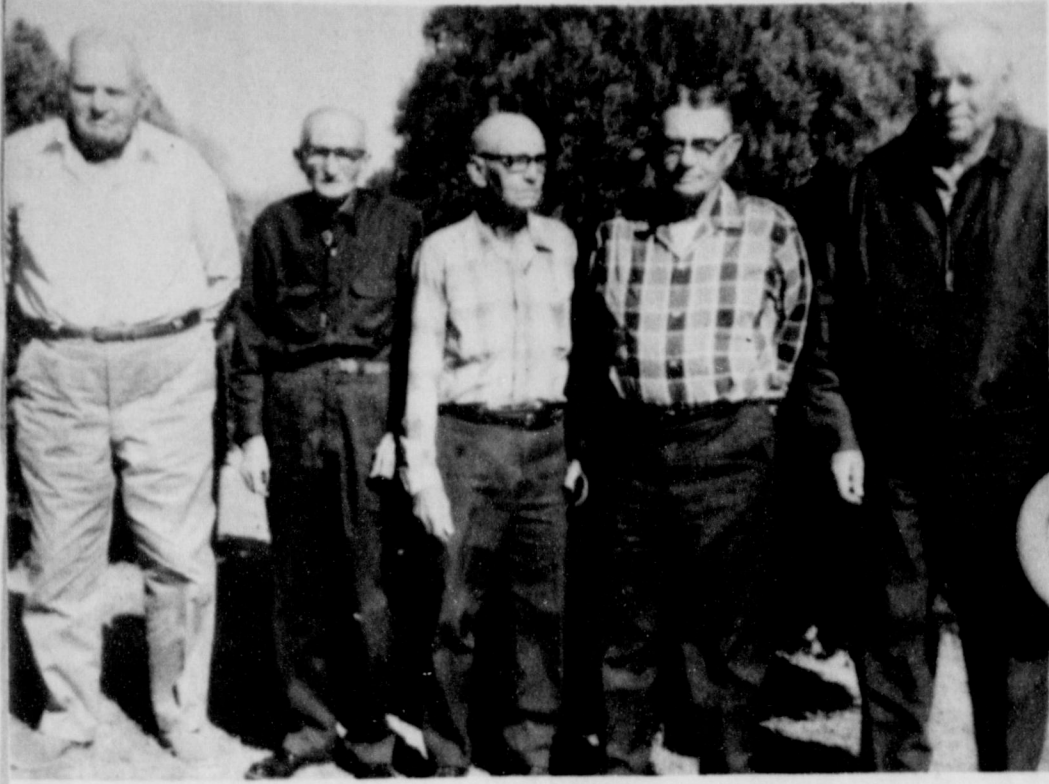

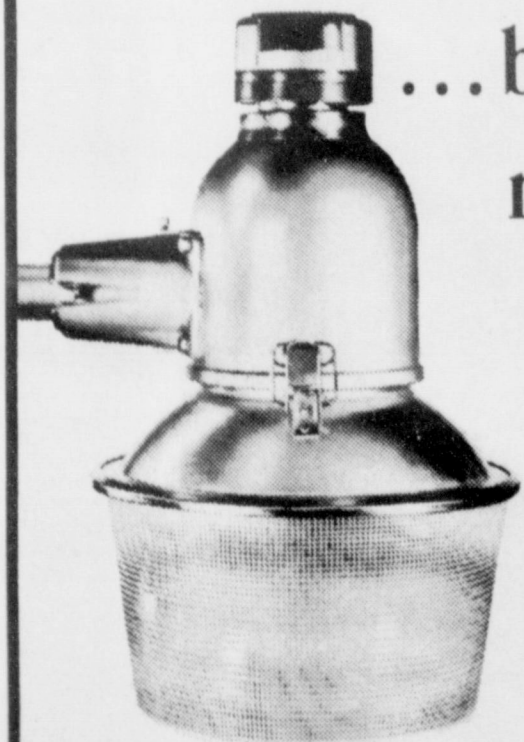

Debate This Week On Tax Showdown

AUSTIN, Tex.-- Legislators moved toward their first major tax showdown this week.

House Revenue and Tax Committee was due to bring out its version of a revenue-sharing measure to balance a record budget.

Heart of the measure is a raise in the sales tax rate from 3.25 per cent to four per cent

(good for \$300 million in additional biennial revenue) and an increase in motor vehicle sales tax from three to four per cent (for another \$70 million).

Proposal to be advanced to the House floor for debate reportedly will include:

* An increase of 50 cents (to \$3.75) per \$1,000 in the corporation franchise tax rate,

\$26 million.

* Extension of the sales tax to repairs, laundry, dry cleaning, hair cuts and beauty shop services, \$100 million.

* Sales tax on amusements, including professional sports and tourist attractions, \$35 million.

* An increase in hotel room tax from three to four per cent,

\$4 million.
* Sales tax on telephone and telegraph bills, \$40 million. House already has passed a bill to raise out-of-state students' tuition at state-supported colleges and universities from \$200 to \$700 a semester and a \$185 million bond bill to finance new college building. Neither measure has moved beyond sub-committee in the Senate.

Speaker Gus Mutscher has indicated he will allow representatives a full run with amendments to the tax bill on the House floor.

Revenue and Tax Committee Chairman Rep. Ben Atwell of

Dallas said lawmakers have to choice of wringing major new revenue out of tried sales taxes or looking to a combination corporate-personal income tax.

Smith designated Raiford Stripling of San Augustine a member of Texas Conservation Foundation, succeeding Jack Stone of Wells who was confirmed to the Parks and Wildlife Commission.
Governor named to the Neches River Conservation Board of Directors Emmett H. Whitehead of Rusk, Otis E. Lock of Lufkin, Arthur Temple Jr. of Diboll, Pitzer H. Garrison of Lufkin, N. C. Garrison of Garrison, Joe Davis Foster of Center and re-appointed Jack W. Flock of Tyler.

Texas Senate confirmed Governor Smith's appointment of the following to the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System: Harry Province of Waco and Watson W. Wise of Tyler for terms expiring in 1975, Newton Gresham of Houston and Wayne E. Thomas of Hereford for terms expiring in 1972.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:
* A justice of the peace is not entitled to any fee for conducting administrative hearings on the revocation or suspension of driver's licenses.
* Jury panels selected by jury commissioners appointed by a county judge who has an interest in a pending case in county court are not void and the jurors are not disqualified to serve on county court juries.
COURTS SPEAK -- U. S. Supreme Court reinstated the Texas obscenity law in a Dallas case involving prosecution of an underground newspaper.
State Supreme Court granted a new hearing for a Cameron County man who blamed his insurance company for negligence in defending him in a 1958 suit arising from a traffic accident and in rejecting reasonable settlement offers.
High Court ruled a Harris County iron and metal firm waited too long to bring suit against an insurance company to recover for electrical transformers and wiring taken from its warehouse by burglars.
Court of Criminal Appeals upheld the life sentence of a Dallas man in the beating death of his wife and rejected the appeal of a Lubbock man from a life sentence for participating in the fatal attack on a jailer.

Officials warned these figures may not be completely reliable, for federal-grants-in-aid may be reduced.
Reports from Washington indicate efforts by the administration to reach a workable compromise on revenue sharing.
VETERANS LAND PROGRAM REVIVED -- Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong signed the first three loan commitments to veterans from Jasper, Brownwood and Fort Worth under the newly-reactivated Veterans' Land Program.
More than 4,500 veterans have requested application forms and information booklets since the program reopened February 1. More than 225 loan applications have been received in the land office, and are being processed, Armstrong reported.

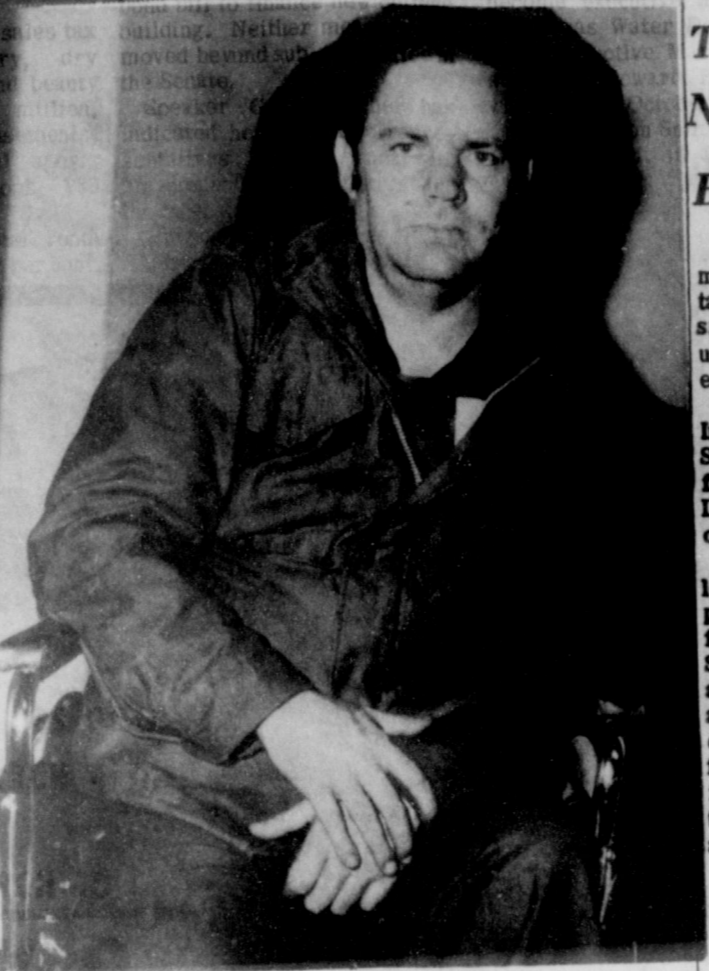

Forty North Dakota farmers Union members will arrive aboard the Farmers Union Convair at Municipal Airport in Lubbock, 3:45 p.m., Monday, March 8. The group will be escorted to the South Plains Electric Cooperative for a reception and welcome by Lubbock city officials and representatives of several south plains Farmers Union organizations. Refreshments will be served by the ladies of Lubbock County Farmers Union, and the group will receive a briefing by Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco, Director of Organization Kenneth Moss of Lubbock, and National Farmers Union Insurance Manager Ron Knobel of Waco.

Following the reception and briefing, representatives from the counties involved in the membership-building program will take the North Dakotans to their home counties for the three-day canvass. Drives are being planned for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, and

the group will re-assemble in Lubbock on Friday, March 12, for return to North Dakota. Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco, commenting on the visit by North Dakotans, states that the program serves two purposes. Naman said, "The visit by our fellow farmers and Farmers Union members from the north not only adds to the enthusiasm for building membership strength in Farmers Union, and enhances the opportunities for success in an area-wide membership campaign, but such a program is particularly meaningful in that it permits farmers from different areas of the country to exchange views on farm policy, and this 'cross-pollination' of ideas and exchange of viewpoints will be most meaningful in providing the basic understanding between farmers that is needed if we are to solve pressing problems."

The counties that will host the North Dakota visitors are: Lubbock, Castro, Parmer, Lamb, Hale, Bailey, Hockley, Dawson, Mitchell, Floyd, Martin, and Terry.

WASHINGTON--The government has just released its 1971 tax guides for individuals and small businesses containing up-to-date information on federal income taxes.

Both booklets, Your Federal Income Tax and Tax Guide for Small Business, are available from the Superintendent of Documents for seventy-five cents each.

Officials describe the booklets as "supplementing" pamphlets each taxpayer receives from the Internal Revenue Service, usually in January, along with his machine-readable tax form. The Guides contain more detailed information and aid taxpayers, in most cases, to complete their own returns accurately and quickly.

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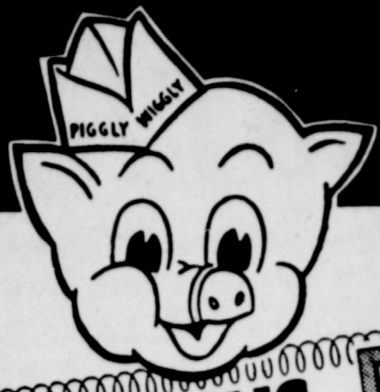

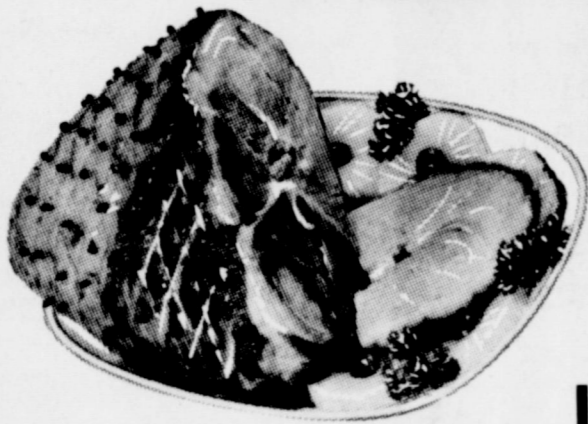
