Bailey County Bee Set For March 29

Spelling Bee Open To County Students

The annual Bailey County spelling Bee, sponsored by the Muleshoe Journal, will be held Wednesday afternoon, March 29, at 1:30 p.m. in the Muleshoe High School auditorium.

Students from grades 4-8 are eligible to participate. Contestants from Three Way, Bula, Mary DeShazo Elementary and Muleshoe Junior High School will compete for a chance to spell in the annual Regional Spelling Bee to be held in Lubbock at a later date.

Twenty-five counties will send representatives to this bee sponsored by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Mrs. Eldon Davis, former teacher in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades in Muleshoe, will be the pronouncer for the Bailey County Bee. She replaces the late Fred Johnson, longtime Spelling Bee pronouncer.

First place winner in the county contest will be eligible to spell in the Regional Bee at Lubbock. He or she will also receive \$15 from the Journal, a blue ribbon and a pen from the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Second place winner will receive \$7.50 from the Journal, a blue ribbon and a pen from the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Third place winner will receive \$2.50 from the Journal, a blue ribbon and a pen from the Lubbock avalanche-Journal.

City Council Passes Ordinances Tuesday

In a regular meeting of the Muleshoe City Council Tuesday, March 7, the council passed two ordinances prohibiting the parking of any vehicle on U.S. 84 (American Blvd.) between the east and west city limits of Muleshoe and between Avenue B and Ash Avenue on State Highway 214 in Muleshoe.

The ordinance prohibiting parking on U.S. 84 stated that by prohibiting parking vehicles within the rights of way provided for American Blvd., the movements of traffic on this roadway may be facilitated and the danger of both vehicle to vehicle conflict and vehicle to pedestrian conflict may be reduced.

Standard signs, stating "No parking any time" shall be erected on both sides of American Blvd., U.S. 84 within the city limits.

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance will be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and will be liable to pay a fine not less than one dollar or more than \$100.00.

The ordinance also stated that the ordinance was necessary for the protection of persons and property of the citizens of Muleshoe because of recorded difficulty and conflict for traffic along U.S. 84 and to permit the realignment of traffic lanes to provide a more uniform movement and a more safe movement along this roadway.

In Ordinance No. 103A, the city council determined that by prohibiting the parking of vehicles within the rights of way provided for First Street (State Highway 214), from the intersection with Avenue B northeasterly to the intersection of Ash Avenue, that vehicle conflict may be reduced.

Standard signs bearing "No Parking Any Time" will also be erected on both sides of First Street accordingly spaced from Avenue B to Ash Avenue.

Any person violating this ordinance will be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and fined accordingly not less than one dollar nor more than \$100.00.

Mayor Irvin St. Clair signed both ordinances into law Tuesday, March 7.

The new ordinances were recommended by the State Highway Department who will stripe the highways for four lanes of traffic.

Arthritis Victims Number 17 Million

In this second article on arthritis, the fact of arthritis will be discussed along with information on research being done.

In the West Texas Chapter area there are 100,000 diagnosed cases of arthritis severe enough to require medical care. There are 17 million cases in the United States, including 250,000 new cases are being diagnosed annually.

Rheumatoid, the most crippling form, strikes about one-third of these. It is a young people's disease, striking from infancy through old age, but mainly between the ages of 20 and 45.

There are 100 forms of arthritis and the rheumatic diseases, including Gout, Rheumatoid Arthritis, Osteoarthritis, Spondylitis (arthritis of the spine), Systemic Lupus Erythematosus (arthritis of the organs of the body), and Scleroderma.

Arthritis and the rheumatic diseases are second only to heart diseases as the most widespread chronic illness in the United States today. Leading causes of activity limitations are heart conditions - 16%, and arthritis - rheumatism - 15.4%. 3.4 million arthritis victims are disabled at any one time.

The cost of loss to the nation in lost wages, salaries and medical care is \$3,645,000,000 annually. The loss to the federal government in income and excise taxes in over \$200 million.

Payments to veterans annually for disability from arthritis totals \$271,130,256.

More farmers are stricken than people in any other field or occupation and three times more women than men are stricken.

Only 57 of the nation's 100 medical schools offer a full program of courses in rheumatology. The West Texas Chapter hopes that one can be set up in the Texas Tech Medical School. There are only 1,850 members of the American Rheumatism Association, a professional society of physicians interested in treatment and research in arthritis.

The large "delivery gap" between help that can be given to arthritis and help they actually receive indicates the need for more doctors to practice in the field and for more departments in more medical schools.

The total amount allocated for arthritis is \$271,130,256.

As last year, there will be four places awarded in both men and women divisions. Trophies for first, second, third and consolation will be presented and as in the past, the Jaycees will select and present trophies to an All-Tournament team.

The All-Tournament team will be selected for both men and women. It will be composed of three spikers and three set-up players on each team. A panel of judges will select the teams on athletic ability and sportsmanship.

The Jaycees will be sponsoring concession stands at the tournament, Monday through Saturday night.

The entry fee this year is \$7.00 per team, the same as it was in the past.

Entries were sent out early this year, so each team should have had ample time to get organized and to have practiced for the upcoming tournament. This should make for exciting games every night of the week-long tournament.

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3161 Voters Register For April Election

According to Jean Lovelady, Bailey County Tax Assessor and Collector, 3161 voters have registered in Bailey County for the April 1 election.

These county wide figures are just short of the 3500 quota for Bailey County.

Three elections will be held on Saturday, April - the school board, city council and Bailey County Hospital District Board.

In the school board election, seven people have filed for the three offices that will be open. They are Aubrey Heathington, David Stovall, Ernest Ramm, Lewis Wayne Shafer, Greville Bland, Mrs. Herbert Griffiths and Mrs. Don Bryant.

The election will be held at Muleshoe Junior High with absentee voting beginning March 13 and continuing until March 28 at the County Clerk's office.

Dr. Charles Lewis, Creston Favor, Douglas Bales and Doyce Turner have filed for places on the Bailey County Hospital District Board. There are five places open. Candidates have until Saturday, March 11, to file to have their names printed on all of the ballots. Absentee voting will begin March 13 and continue through March 28 in the County Clerk's office.

Only two candidates, Max King and Clarence Christian filed for the city council election that will be held at the City Hall on April 1.

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City Council Meets, Discusses Business

At the regular City Council meeting Tuesday morning, March 7, at 8:30 a.m. in the city chamber, Pesky Winn representing Pioneer Natural Gas, was present and gave a resume to the council of Pioneer's gas reserves and activities in the past and for the future.

A damage claim by Ollie Jones in the amount of \$1500 was taken up for discussion. The claim was made on the sewer line easement of the new Waste Water Treatment Plant outfall line.

It was decided by the council to pay the damage.

In other action, the council passed a resolution authorizing the execution of an application to the Department of Housing and Urban Development for a \$25,000 grant to Develop Open-Space Land. It would include the construction of two tennis courts, a youth football field, softball field, landscaping, rest-

room facilities, and play ground equipment. The application for matching funds of \$25,000 would make a total of \$50,000 for improvements and expenditures on the park.

Henry Stoneham was appointed by the council to the Park Board to fill the vacancy left by Rev. Walter Bartholf.

Bids were received for a new fire truck for storage of fire fighting equipment. The lowest bid, \$4,279.18, was accepted to be paid for out of next year's budget.

The council authorized \$8,789.00 to be paid on Estimate Number Five on the Waste Water Treatment Plant to W.B. Abbott & Co.

A public hearing will be held March 21 at 8:30 at the council chamber on the budget.

The city also approved a \$3,600 payment on lights for the Babe Ruth park.

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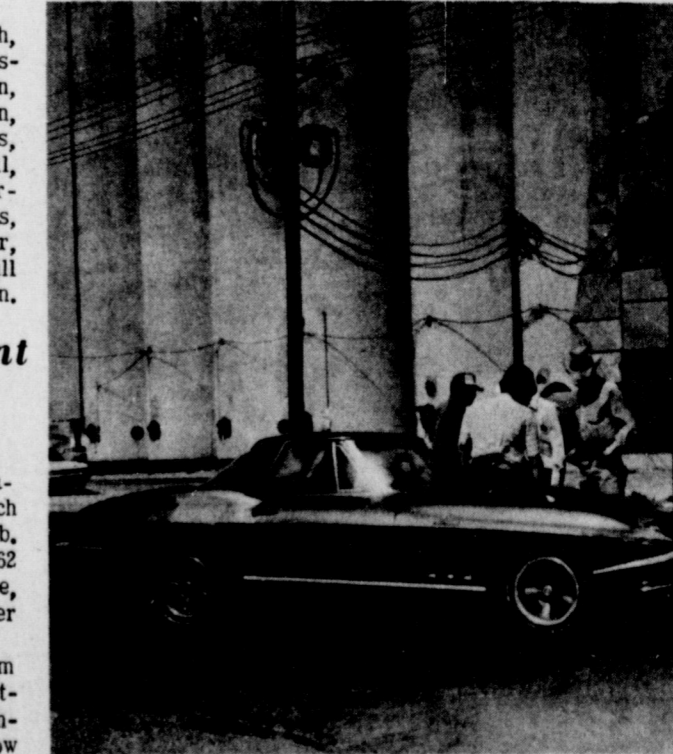
Golf Tournament Held Sunday

Passage of the Rural Development Act of 1972 last week by the House of Representatives is a genuine step forward in solving the problems related to the steady flow of rural Americans to the nation's large population centers.

As a co-sponsor of the bill, I am especially encouraged by the overwhelming voice vote in favor of this measure which will improve living conditions and stimulate employment opportunities in rural areas, since it shows that Members of Congress representing metropolitan areas are realizing more and more that helping stop the flow of people from rural areas to the cities helped not only the rural areas but the cities, too.

The result of the work of many of us on the House Agriculture Committee, the bill contains two separate pieces of legislation I introduced last year. The first would increase the size of farm operating loans from \$35,000 to \$50,000. The second - which is a continuation of the amendment I was able to add to last year's farm bill which raised home ownership loans from \$50,000 to \$100,000 - would convert farm operating loans from an appropriated funding to an insured loan basis. Both these provisions will be of substantial assistance to farmers and ranchers in West Texas as well as throughout the country.


This bill offers positive programs to encourage and assist the development of business, industry, community centers and services, and pollution and abatement and control in our small towns and in the countryside. The bill encourages younger people to remain on the farms or in rural communities by making it easier to obtain loans for farming and rural development purposes.

It gives added flexibility to our Small Watershed and Resource Conservation and Development programs, providing Federal assistance in such projects as municipal and industrial water supply, water quality management, pollution abatement and control, and other purposes directly related to rural development.

An amendment was proposed on the Floor of the House to provide grants to public bodies for watershed loans rather than to private individuals. Fortunately, that amendment failed. I was among the 224 voting against it, because it would have restricted participation in the pollution abatement and control programs to public bodies and would have excluded small businesses, farmers, ranchers, and feedlot operators. Since livestock feedlot operators were one of the principal participants we could foresee making use of these programs, I am pleased that the bill was not amended to cut them out.

While this bill is not perfect - none are - it is a substantial step toward improving the standard of living of millions of families throughout the United States, on farms and ranches and in the smaller towns and communities, including those in West Texas.

The Sandhills Philosopher



Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm has been listening to the reporters' summaries of their trip to China, his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor:

A lot of columnists who didn't get to make the trip to China have been complaining that nobody has found out what actually took place over there, if anything, but they were looking for the big things when they should have been looking for the little things.

For example, on his return, Walter Cronkite, in summing up some of his impressions which didn't include what went on at the summit talks since he couldn't find out any more than you and me what went on there, said he couldn't get over how clean the streets of Peking were, and contrasted them with the streets of New York and other big cities where I understand it's considered unsanitary for children to play hop-scotch.

He pointed out also how 200,000 Chinese turned out one day to shovel the snow off Peking's streets.

Well, I'll tell you. If 200,000 New Yorkers tackled their streets some morning it'd make a difference too.

But what I wanted to know, and what the television reporters never thought to ask, is, what would those 200,000 able-bodied Chinese have been doing if they weren't shoveling snow? Don't they have regular jobs?

Also, the reporters and the other visitors too couldn't get over the immensity of the ancient Chinese Wall, the 20-foot-high, 40-foot-thick monstrosity running for thousands of miles over mountains and through valleys and built over 2,000 years ago by 300,000 slaves.

If you'll give me 300,000 slaves who'll work for a bowl of rice a day, and 50,000 other slaves who're growing and delivering that rice at the same rate of pay, no telling what I could build... maybe a paved highway to every house in the country and a rock fence around every farm and ranch, provided somebody would furnish the wheelbarrows and the whips.

But that was ancient China. How about modern China? I don't know a thing about it, same as the reporters who've been there, but there must be some people over there who, looking out the window from beneath their warm cover on a winter morning, sure hate to see it snowing.

research has been \$15 million, the total amount spent on quack remedies and fake "cures" by arthritics has been \$400 million.

Following are some facts concerning the voluntary health agency which is seeking the total answer - cause, prevention, cure - to the nation's number one crippling disease: It supports research through grants to 29 Arthritis Research, Treatment, Teaching Centers located at certain of the main medical schools in the U.S. - one of which is in connection with the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School in Dallas under the direction of Dr. Morris Ziff; it supports training for young medical scientists and physicians, and seeks to attract more medical workers to the field of arthritis; grants fellowships in research to doctors to develop and test new drugs; informs doctors and patients of the latest developments in arthritis; seeks to improve treatment techniques; and expands community services to patients and their families.

Two professional associations work within The Arthritis Foundation to lead the attack on critical problems, they are The American Rheumatism Association Section (representing the world's largest professional society of rheumatologists) which governs the Foundation's medical and scientific programs; and the Allied Health Professions Section (representing physical and occupational therapists, medical social workers, nurses, and others) which is devoted to overcoming the shortage of specialized health workers in arthritis.

The Clinical Research Centers demonstrates what can be done about arthritis - that with early diagnosis and proper long-term treatment programs, disability can be prevented.

The Foundation's goal is to extend the benefits of such center programs to all Americans who suffer from crippling arthritis.

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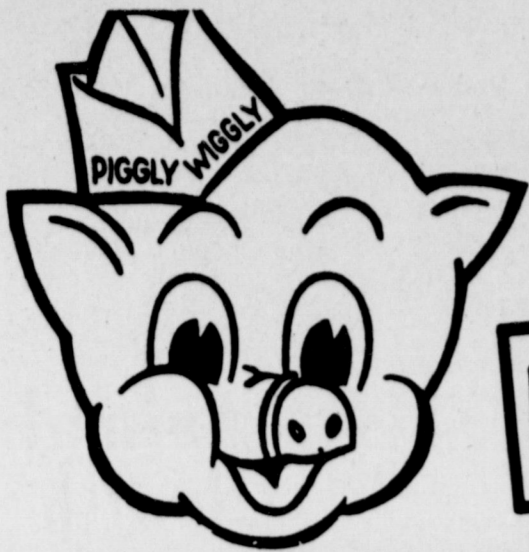
Animal Health
