

County Attorney Beavers Dead and Two Other Whites Are Fatally Wounded.

Muskogee, Okla., Oct. 22.—One white man, J. D. Beavers, city attorney, was killed, two more whites are fatally wounded and two negroes were shot in a race riot in Coweta, a town twenty miles north of here, this afternoon. A lynching of one negro was narrowly averted and tonight the town is in a state of terror because of threats of the negrões to wipe the town off the map before morning. Negro emisaries have been sent out to neighboring negro towns and settlements asking them to aid in the fight on the white population of Coweta. The negroes have threatened to set the town afire. There is little or no fire protection in Coweta.
