An Opportunity for All.

At no time in the history of our country have our people more fully realized the necessity of economical preparedness than they do at this time. A crisis, it seems, such as we are now facing, is necessary in the progress of a nation's history to bring out the flaws that enter into its agricultural, industrial and economical development. The greatest fault with our people, brought out by the present crisis, is the lack of proper training to enable them to efficiently cope with the demands of the occasion. Our old methods are found to be totally inadequate. Especially is this true with agriculture. Our old agricultural methods are having to go through a general revolution before they can adequately meet the demands of our country at this time. Our farmers are now forced to accept theories of diversification and food and feed conservation that heretofore have been rejected as book farming. The one great difficulty farmers are now facing is that of learning to intelligently apply the new methods they are now forced to take up.

The Texas A. & M. College holds each year a Farmers' Short Course of a week where farmers, farmer's wives, farmer boys and girls, rural teachers, preachers or any one who is connected with or interested in rural life may go and study the problems of the farmer and the scientific solution of these problems. Courses are offered in farm machinery, field crops, livestock farming, dairy farming, insect pests, truck growing, poultry, veterinary medicine, etc. A special course is offered in agricultural education for those engaged in teaching in rural schools. Ministers of the gospel may well take courses offered by the short course in order that they may better cope with the problems of rural life.

A special feature of the A. & M. Short Course is the course offered to farmers' wives and daughters in home economics and rural sanitation. Practical courses in sewing will be offered those who attend the short course. Several lectures will be given upon sanitation by Dr. P. W. Covington of Austin. Special demonstrations in canning and food conservation will be given.

The short course is from July 30 to August 4 inclusive. The Texas Farmers' Congress offers those attending the short course a chance of forming an acquaintance with some of the most successful farmers in the state.

The entertainment features of the short course have been well prepared for this year. Lectures, pic-

ture shows and music in the air dome will constitute the entertainment for the evenings. The college library and the Y. M. C. A. building, with its rest room, magazines, swimming pool and shower baths, will be open for the convenience of visitors.

The expense of the short course is inconsiderable. The railroads are offering reduced rates, and the college offers you board at the very lowest figure possible. The expenses of attending from Houston county will amount to about \$10, which is inconsiderable counting the wonderful benefits to be derived from the course. In fact, it is not an expense, but an investment that will return fourfold interest.

To sum up: the Farmers' Short Course at A. & M. College is a regular farmers' chautauqua where the farmers of Texas may go to receive instruction from the lectures and their associations with other successful farmers and at the same time thoroughly enjoy themselves. Do not stay away from the short course because you think the stringency of the times warrants your saving the \$10 you would be out to attend. As was stated in the beginning it is absolutely necessary now that we change our methods of farming, and in order that we may be able to intelligently apply these new methods we must have the practical and scientific training the Texas A. & M. Victories for the Commercial Club.

It is fortunate for the farmers of Houston county, who wish to avail themselves of the government's most liberal offer of money at five per cent on forty years' time, that the Crockett Commercial Club organization is a going concern properly equipped to stand sponsor for the farm loan association that the law makes necessary to put the machinery in proper working order to secure this money for their use.

As we have stated before, when the rate of interest was reduced from six to five per cent, each association had to provide the money necessary to pay the working expenses, besides furnishing an office outfit that could handle the complicated details that are inseparably associated with the work. The suggestion that farmers who make application for loans join the commercial club and pay fifty cents a month dues, thereby increasing the revenues of the club sufficiently to warrant the club in taking on this additional work, was a happy solution of the situation. At a meeting of the directors of the club held last week the proposition was fully discussed, and the unanimous decision of the directors was to the effect that nothing the club could do would help the farmers of this section more than to make it possible for them to get this long time, cheap money. It was therefore voted to accept the offer of the association members to join the club as contributing members, something that most of them realized they should have done long ago. And here is another victory for the commercial club:

When the law was passed creating the State Highway Department, placing the control of all public-voted funds for road building in that department, also the selection of the state highways that should receive state and federal aid to make them permanent national and international highways of travel, the claims of the Red River to the Gulf Highway, to be seriously considered as being entitled to preferred consideration, were earnestly presented to that body; also Colonel Fauntelroy, the government engineer in charge of the federal part

of the work in this state, was seen and the matter properly presented. It will also be remembered that our club was largely responsible for the bridge at Riverside being built that made the Red River to the Gulf a possibility. The report of the State Highway Commission published in the papers Sunday shows that the Red River to the Gulf, extending from Paris to Houston, via Paris, Terrell, Tyler, Palestine, Crockett and Huntsville to Houston, has been selected as one of the state highways and designated as Highway No. 19, which means that it will receive its mileage proportion of the money available from the new automobile license tax, also the established state fund, and that the government funds to be proportioned throughout the state of Texas, as recommended by the State Highway Commission, will be available for making this great north and south trunk highway across the state a hard surfaced road from start to finish. This part of the work is yet to be done and will require a lot of push and co-operative endeavor, but it is well worth the price, and organized steps should soon be taken in this direction.

The report above referred to also states that No. 7, Central Texas Highway, from a point on the Sabine river, directly east of Newton, through Newton, Crockett and Waco to San Angelo, was selected. And No. 14 is still another that extends from Gonzales via Giddings, Crockett, Nacogdoches and San Augustine east to the state line. This follows the line of the old "King's Highway" or San Antonio road.

Good people of Crockett, just stop and think what this good road development will mean for our town and county. I think I hear

Farm Help to Be Enrolled.

The national government in cooperation with our state government is enrolling all the available farm help in preparation for the mobilization of the farm labor of the country. At the same time the government is ascertaining the needs of farmers in the way of labor. Thus the government intends to act as a clearing house for the labor problems of the country. County men have been appointed for all counties and each of these is responsible for the work in his county. This county man will also assist local farmers in obtaining help as well as help the farm hand secure work. In short, the county man will first ascertain the needs of his county, and if there is a surplus of help he will report it to the state department. On the other hand, if there is a scarcity of labor the

county man will also report that fact and the State Department of Labor will assist us in getting labor.

Any one, white or colored, who is available for work or will be available at any time should write the Farm Demonstration Office at Crockett, furnishing the following information: Name, nationality, age, time you will be available, how long you will work, kind of work you desire and the wages you demand.

Any farmer wanting help may write the Farm Demonstration Office at Crockett, furnishing the following information: Your name, address, kind of help wanted, work to be done, time help will be needed, how long work will last, what salary you will pay.

Please anticipate your future needs for labor and do not wait until the last moment to write me. Every American should feel it his or her patriotic duty to be engaged in some productive labor.

Local News Items

National Guard Organized.

The organization of a company of the National Guard was perfected in this city Sunday. This is the second company of the National Guard to be organized under the new call and its designation will be Company L, Fifth Texas Infantry. The first company was organized at Lufkin Thursday of last week and is designated as Company M, Fifth Texas Infantry. Plans for the organization of the Crockett company have been under way for two weeks or more and enlistments were received up to Saturday night. In order to be the second company of the Texas National Guard mustered, organization was perfected Sunday. Colonel Hoover arrived on the noon train from Houston and perfected the organization at about 7:30 o'clock in the evening. The oath to the government was administered and the duties and allegiance of the American soldier explained by Colonel Hoover. The company signed up and was received in military style.

It was generally believed that volunteering could not be done later than Saturday night, but the belief was an erroneous one, as the following telegram from John A. Hulen, commanding general of the Texas National Guard, will indicate: "The impression seems to have gained ground that volunteers will not be received after the 30th of June. This is wrong, as volunteers will be received in the Texas National Guard at least until Wednesday, July 11, and all parties volunteering will be exempted from draft. The week ending last Saturday was regular army recruiting week, designated as such by the president, but the recruiting week, Wednesday, July 4, is designated as Texas National Guard week. The Texas Guard must be recruited to full war strength, and you are requested to call on the mayor and join in the formation of proper committees to accomplish this important and patriotic work." The telegram was addressed to Hon. E. Adams Jr.

The Crockett company was mustered with 120 officers and men.

An effort to bring the company up to the full strength of 200 is being made and satisfactory progress reported. Following is the roll of the company as mustered Sunday, but another week of volunteering, beginning Wednesday, July 4, is to be added:

For Road Superintendent.

The attention of Courier readers is invited to the announcement, in the regular announcement place, of Alvis W. Ellis as a candidate for the office of road superintendent of Houston county.

As there is little time left before election day, which has been set for July 21, Mr. Ellis will not get to see many of the people of the county.
