Gold Dust is a little stick horse that Roddy and his father made. He was fashioned from a piece of white pine and fitted with a bridle, complete with reins, and a small leather saddle bag. On one side was placed a note stating that Gold Dust belonged to Roddy. It gave directions that whoever had occasion to find or come into possession of the pony to take him with them as far as he was going and then pass him on to someone else or leave him where he could be picked up by where he could be picked up by another traveler.

The note further instructed the bearer or 'rider' of Gold Dust

to send Roddy a report on the places visited. It also stated that 'On this the 100th Anniversary of the Pony Express, Gold Dust is on the job.

The Reynolds family took Gold Dust on a vacation with them to Dust on a vacation with them to New Mexico. At a roadside park on Highway 66, forty miles east of Albuquerque, Roddy 'tied up' Gold Dust and told him good-bye. This was on July 28, 1960.

About the middle of August, Roddy received a card from the first 'riders.' They reported that they had ridden Gold Dust to Phoenix, Ariz.

The next report, dated Sept.

8, 1960, said, 'Picked up Gold
Dust in Phoenix. Kept him on a
two weeks vacation in Dallas.
Returned to Los Angeles. Am
sending him northward. Good
luck.'

A picture postal card, dated Sept. 30, 1960, bore this message, 'Old Gold Dust is flying at 31,000 feet in the air on his way from Chicago to Los Angeles in a Boe-ing 707 Jet Airliner. He enjoyed the sights of Chicago and San Francisco with me. I will send him on his way.' Nothing was heard again from Gold Dust until the middle of January, 1961, but he was 'carry-ing the mail.' 
