Proposed increases in money order and special delivery feees, starting July 1, 1961, were an-nounced today by Postmaster General J. Edward Day. No changes in special delivery fees for first class mail are planned. Randall C. Jackson, Baird at-torney, was named last Thurs-day by Gov. Price Daniel for a sixyear term on the Board of Regents of Texas Woman's Uni-versity at Denton.

The increases for this service are expected to yield about \$2.5 million in additional postal rev-enues, based on current special delivery volume.

Versity at Denton. The governor also appointed Robert A. Hall of Dallas, and re-appointed Mrs. Nelda C. Stark of Orange to six-year terms on the board. The terms of all three will expire Jan. 10, 1967. Hall and Jackson will succeed Ed Gossett of Dallas and Reagan Houston of San Antonio, whose terms ex-pired last January. delivery volume. Money order up to \$5 and over \$50 will be increased by 5 cents. The new money order schedule will combine the present 15c and 20c fee brackets into one at 20c.
